

OFFICIAL OPENING



The new Riverside High School was officially opened January 18, 1964. At two o'clock, the ceremonies began when the flag was raised and the plaque was unveiled by Mr. A. Reaume, M.P.P. in the main corridor. In the auditorium, the programme commenced with the singing of O Canada. Father McNabb then gave the invocation. Mrs. Davis, Chairman of the Riverside Board of Education, expressed the hope that parents would encourage the students to use the new facilities to the utmost.

After Mr. Pentland introduced the platform party, the ceremony of presenting the keys began. Mr. Odette of Eastern Construction presented the keys of the school to Mr. Johnson, one of the architects who designed our school, then Mr. Johnson in turn gave the keys to Mr. Burnell of the building committee of the Riverside Board of Education. After assuring those present that Mr. Pentland and his fellow educators would do their utmost to increase the knowledge of the community's future leaders, Mr. Burnell, in his turn, presented the keys to Mr. Pentland, who then stated his hope that by his efforts, and the efforts of his staff, the students would gain knowledge, goodness, and discipline. Mr. G. R. Stewart, Mayor of Riverside and also the guest speaker, was introduced by Dr. Mills. Mayor Stewart urged that students be encouraged to complete high school and said that this school showed vision and courage on the part of our community. Greetings and best wishes from the Department of Education were expressed by Mr. W. Wood, a Secondary School Inspector.

Our new Composite High School received several gifts from various organizations. Pictures of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip were given to Jane Johnston, vice-president of Student Council, by Logan Photography. Later, Jane also accepted a Bible from the Ontario School Trustees and Ratepayers Association. Two flags from the Canadian Legion were received by the School cadet corps.

Jane Johnston expressed thanks on behalf of the school. The ceremonies closed after Reverend L. Howan gave the benediction, and those present sang God Save The Queen.

Last year, I did as its lone representative, work at the task of establishing such a department.






TRACK AND FIELD





A CRICKET AS SEEN BY AN ESSAYIST IN SEARCH OF A POEM


