## Graduation Is a Serious Affair...

For well over two hundred young people, Saturday, November 2 marked the end of one of the most important phases of their lives, as they graduated from Riverside Secondary School. Mr. William Wood, Assistant Superintendent, Supervision Section of the Ontario Department of Education, was the guest speaker, and Kent Billinghurst delivered the Valedictory Address. The school band and choir provided music for the programme.

Among the many awards presented were twelve Ontario Scholarships, awarded to students who had attained an $80 \%$ average in seven credits. The recipients of these were Penny Brooks, Wendy Bunt, Ann Carlsen, Glenn Chapman, Ralph Chou, James Eng, Donna Fraser, Peter Krailo, Roland Meisel, Raymond Smith, and Bryan Thomas.

Mr. Wood addressed the graduates on "Change and Values." The following are highlights of his speech:
"Your education has been mindful of your usefulness in terms of both self-satisfaction and the contribution which you will make to society. The benefit which you have derived from your course can be measured by the effort which you put into it. Usefulness is a measure of happiness. The man who does not consider himself useful cannot be expected to lead a happy or a rewarding life, nor can society regard him as a contributing member. Today greater emphasis is placed on some areas of accomplishment than on others and I believe that a reappraisal of this emphasis is necessary.....All (areas) involve a skill and ability to assess, to comprehend and to draw conclusions--in short, to think."
"The type of education that a person has does not necessarily determine the kind of life he will lead. People, regardless of their educational training, can be uninspiring, unhappy and unsuccessful, or they can be enthusiastic, ambitious, happy and filled with a zest for life. Each of you may choose the life you want but regardless of the choice, your usefulness will be an important measuring stick in determining your success and happiness."
"Your education has been effective if it has prepared you as an individual to take an intelligent, fruitful and honourable part in the life of our society. You have been exposed to the truths of right thinking, right acting, and right living--truths which protect freedom for yourself without infringing upon the freedom of others. You have learned to differentiate among the freedom to do what you please--which is anarchy, the freedom to do what you are told--which is dictatorship, and the freedom to do what is right."
"This age, like all others, is a time of change. The world cannot stand still because man will not stand still. He will continue to think and experiment, for all time and eternity in search of the good life. The problem with which man is faced today is not change itself, but the rate of change....."
"Not a day passes without an announcement of a new develop-
 ment in technology which will change our lives, frequently beyond anything we can imagine, but in these times of changing technology, Bernard Baruch, an outstanding American at the age of 87 , reminds us, 'I have witnessed a succession of technological revolutions, but none has done away with the need for character in the individual of the ability to think.'
