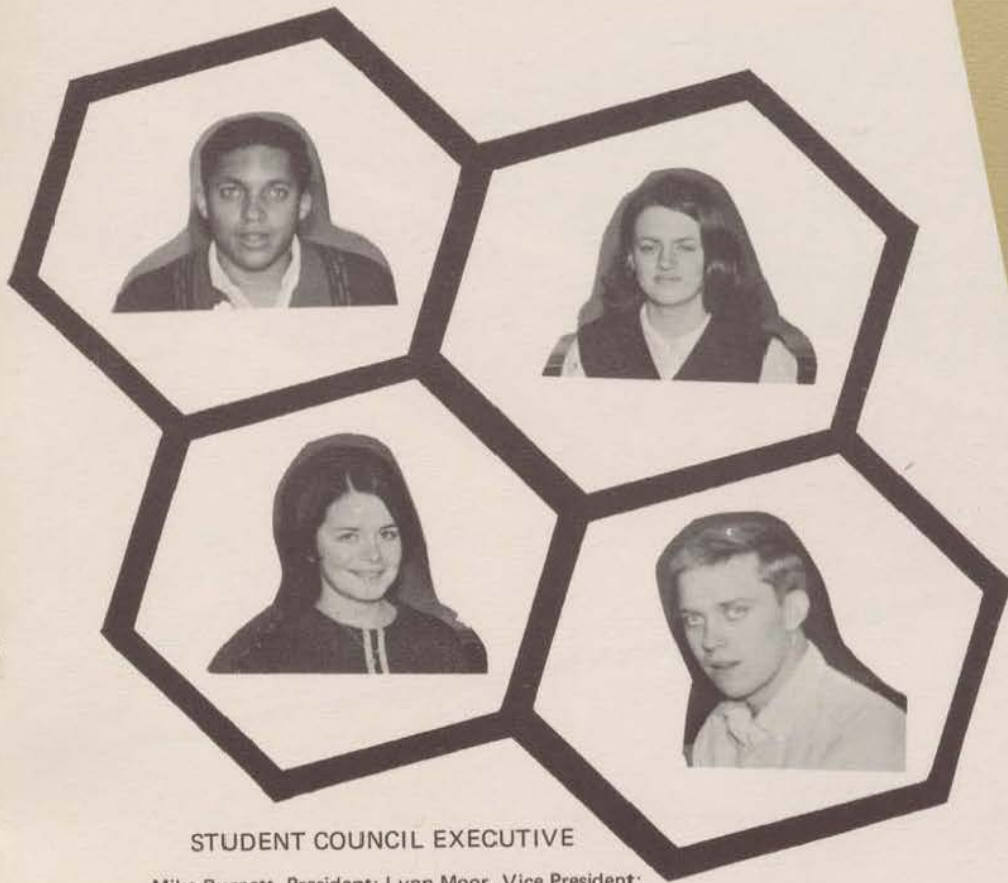



DEDICATION

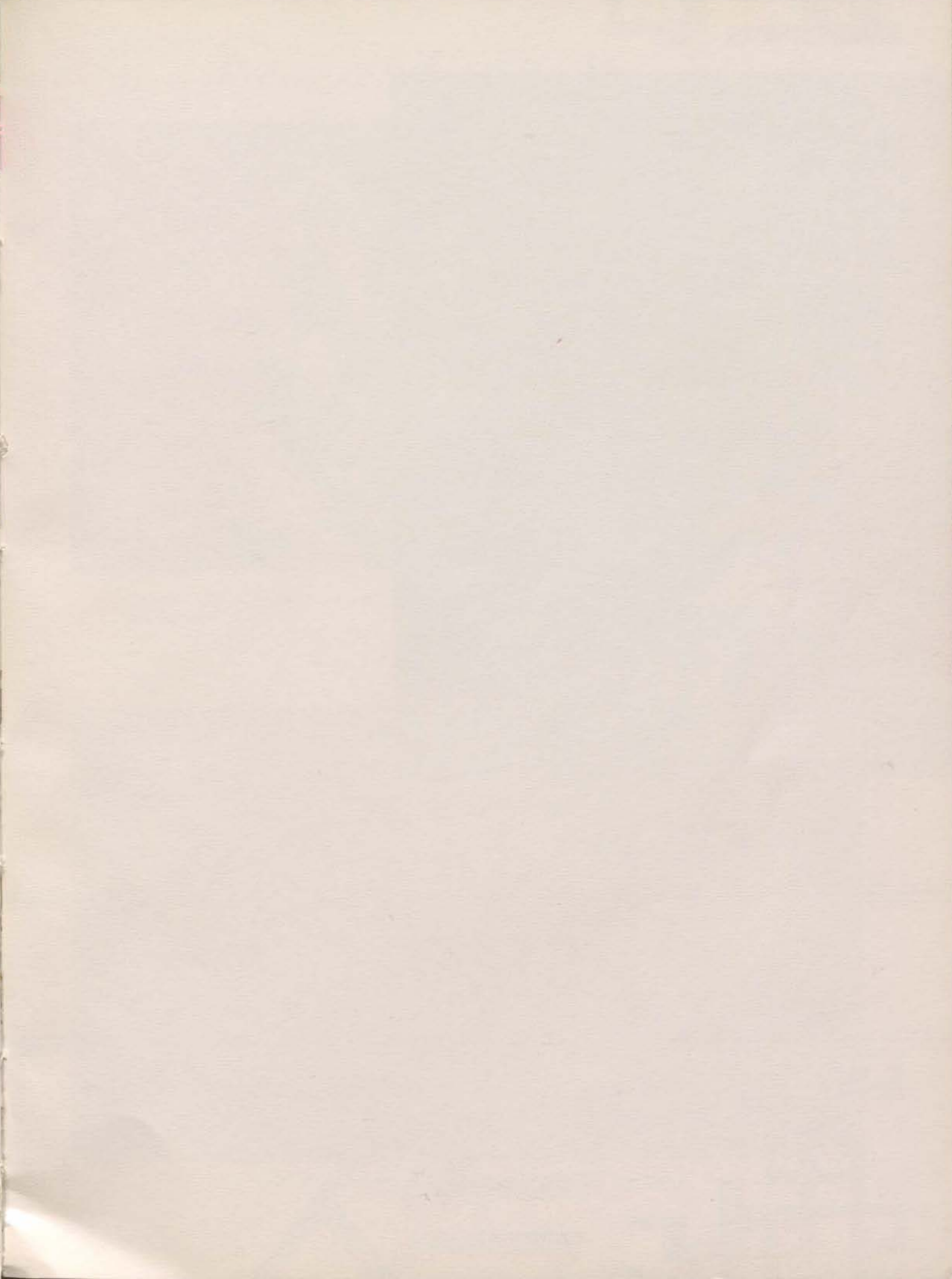
This the onset of our second century of Confederation, is the time for all Canadians to give thanks for the many gifts that have been bestowed upon us during the past one hundred years.

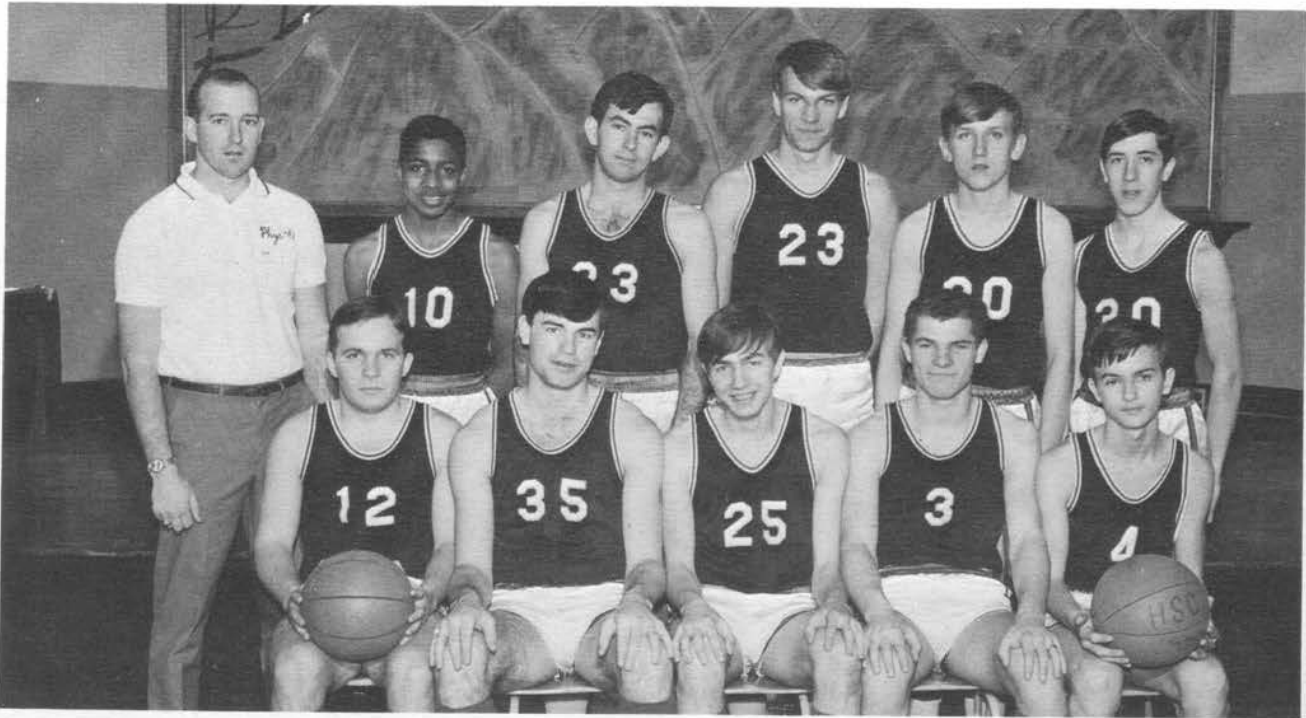

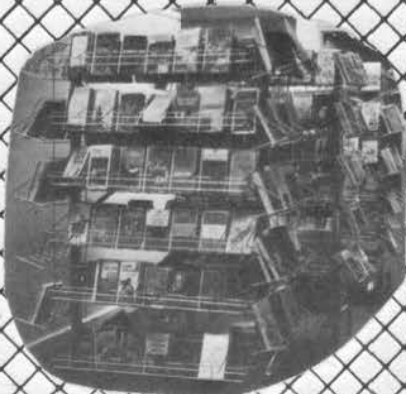
As a result, we united all our hard-earned "greenbacks" to form a grand total of \$1260.
