Located in the Naval Postgraduate School, the CCC is the premier research wing of the Department of National Security Affairs.

The CCC specializes in the study of international relations, security policy, and regional studies. The Center has a unique capability to plan, manage and execute needed government research and development. Our 40 affiliated scholars provide broad and substantial research expertise. To ensure actionable research, the CCC leverages extensive institutional networks within the Department of Defense and the U.S. government, as well as worldwide partnerships with think tanks, educational institutions, militaries, governments, and alumni.

Our independent, high-quality studies often engage issues before they hit the "inbox" of policymakers and defense planners. It is this original research and expert knowledge that allow CCC to be the credible and trusted research partners of senior defense planners and to serve as a bridge between academia and policymakers. Achieving high standards and an international reputation, center staff execute and monitor projects that are approaching 1000% growth over the last decade.

We host and organize international seminars, Track II dialogues, and stability exercises that bring critical players together for an open exchange of ideas and formulation of recommendations. The CCC provides our sponsors with facilities and processes for classified projects whenever needed.

Our largest such effort is the Project on Advanced Systems and Concepts for Countering WMD (PASCC). The CCC serves as the program planning and implementation office, research center, and intellectual clearinghouse for the execution of analysis and future-oriented studies and dialogues for DTRA. We cultivate national and international research partnerships and bring scientific, technical and social science experts to look well into the future to anticipate and reduce the threat of WMD/WME capabilities. Launching PASCC's first project cycle in 2011–2012, after a competitive review of over 200 proposals, we are initiating approximately 30 project awards to 15 different institutions, including NPS.
