VIII. Announcements and Special Reports

A. Semester Committee Report: Thomas Sudkamp Thomas Sudkamp thanked the committee members for their work. The committee looked at the issues involved in a potential conversion from quarters to semesters and informed the faculty of those issues and then got the faculty feedback and their opinions. A survey was sent to all full-time faculty asking whether they thought WSU should begin a conversion to semesters or remain on quarters. The results are:

Results by deadline:171 for semesters, 137 against semestersResults after deadline:179 for semesters, 150 against semesters55% of faculty supported conversion to semestersStudent representatives (Euvondia Barto and Susan Carafiello) got student feedback on the issue(informal survey of students) - 135 against semesters, 28 for semesters, 2 undecidedThe committee decided not to make a committee recommendation but to forward the voice of the faculty.

The committee has officially disbanded.

B. Report from Graduate Council: Donald Swanson

The Graduate Council plans to report monthly to the Faculty Senate. The Graduate Council met on May 12, acting upon recommendations of the Council's three standing committees (Policy, Membership and Student Affairs). The Policy Committee brought forward three new graduate certificate programs. Certificates in Software Engineering and Software Management were proposed by the Computer Science and Engineering Department. These each require a completion of four courses, totaling 16 credit hours. In addition, the committee recommended an achievement program for older adults, proposed by the Graduate School, requiring 21 credits of elective courses. All were approved by the Council. The Policy Committee also reminded the Council of the U.S. Council of Graduate Schools Resolution, establishing April 15 as the earliest date a graduate applicant can be required to respond to an offer of admission or financial aid. The Graduate Council continued their long-standing endorsement of this resolution. The Policy Committee recommended that an ad hoc committee be established to explore guidelines for electronic submission of thesis and dissertations. The Membership Committee proposed full graduate faculty membership for Ann Runyan and Robert Sumser, both of the College of Liberal Arts. These nominations were approved by the Council. The Student Affairs Committee reported on new graduate fellowship programs. The committee reviewed and approved college plans for the selection and award of 150 graduate tuition fellowships. These are divided among the six colleges and SOPP in accordance with the number of full-time graduate students. The committee also presented a new Graduate Council's Scholar's Program for fellowship. This replaces the School of Graduate Studies fellowship program. This new program was unanimously endorsed by the Council. It is planned to phase in this program over the next two years, beginning the fall of 1997. The Council requested that Dean Thomas recommend to the Faculty President that the Council representatives be included on the proposed 1997-98 Faculty Senate ad hoc committee on councils. The next Graduate Council meeting will be scheduled during October, 1997.
