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Upcoming Internships

In July 2008, Wright State University will send a delegation to Le Mans, France, to support the Sarthe Wright Centennial Celebration. The celebration will commemorate the hundredth anniversary of Wilbur Wright's flights at Le Mans in 1908. WSU's presence at the celebration will strengthen an already strong collaborative relationship between the university and the city of Le Mans, France.

The WSU delegation will be led by Dawne Dewey, Director of Public History and Head of Special Collections and Archives. Joining her will be Stephen Foster, University Librarian and Associate Vice President for International Affairs; Jack Bantle, Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies; and Angelia Hopkins, First Lady of Wright State University.

Also included in the delegation will be WSU Public History student Daniel Schlegel, who was chosen from among a pool of applicants to serve as a student ambassador. In France, Daniel will have the opportunity to meet with those who are involved in planning the celebration and those who preserve and interpret Wright Brothers' history in Le Mans.

This will be an especially meaningful experience for Daniel since he preserves and interprets Wright Brothers' history himself as Lead Interpreter of Industrial Technology at Dayton History's Carillon Historical Park. Daniel says his main reason for applying for this opportunity was the chance to learn more about

A DAY IN THE LIFE... Melissa Shaw

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE USAF

As a curator at the National Museum of the United States Air Force I spend my days caring for artifacts located at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base and at roughly 300 loan accounts throughout the world. I have the opportunity to talk with a variety of museum professionals and donors across the country.

Recently I began my day answering an e-mail from a historian looking for a particular F-4 aircraft in the collection. I was able to inform her

that it was on display at Tinker Air Force Base, OK.

I then received a phone call from Dansville, VA, where a potential donor was curious if the museum was interested in an A6M Zero technical manual in Japanese. I passed this query onto the Reference Archivist, Brett Stolle (also a Public History alum) who would get in touch with the donor to set up shipping arrangements.

I spoke with an Air Force

historian in Montana about the proper classification of a painting. We also discussed a couple of options for packaging and padding the painting for shipment to the National Museum.

After lunch, I met with the curator of the Grissom Air Museum who returned 72 items to the museum. We completed a joint inventory of the items and I removed them from his account using our electronic database, AF-MATS, Air Force Museum



Artifact Tracking System.

I received annual and semiannual loan renewal packages from military and civilian museums. Each package contains an inventory and photographs. I was able to update each loan and check each artifact's condition by comparing photos from past years to current photos.

Before I went home for the day I assisted a group of curators from my office who were in California preparing artifacts for shipment to the National Museum. I was able to

use AFMATS to help them verify how many of each type of item we already had in the collection.

Being a curator at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force is a wonderful experience. I have been able to travel to different Air Force bases around the country, as well as share my ideas with museum professionals at civilian and military museums. Working for the Air Force, I have learned about international treaties that affect museum property. Working for this large institution, there is

always more to learn and share.

Brothers sites in Le Mans, France several times, Dawne had hoped that the idea of a student ambassador would eventually become a reality; the 2008 celebrations were the perfect fit. She knows that Daniel will get a great deal of benefit from this trip, both in his coursework at Wright State and in his career, wherever that may take him. She also hopes, along with Daniel, that this will not be the last time an oppor-

tunity like this will arise. Daniel says, "I am really excited that I was chosen to go on this trip and hope to see more opportunities like this open up for graduate students [at Wright State]."


