# WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Amherst, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Amherst, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
3. To raise such a sum of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and bridges.
4. To raise such a sum of money as may be necessary for school purposes.
5. To raise such a sum of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the town poor.
6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
8. To see if the town will vote to accept from Isaac B. Dodge the sum of one hundred dollars, the interest derived therefrom, to be expended annually for the proper care and attention to the burial lot of Isaac Brooks, being lot No. 167, West cemetery, Amherst Plain, agreeably to the laws of the state in such case made and provided.
9. To see if the town will pass any vote or votes instructing the selectmen relative to the location and construction of such portion of an electric railroad within the limits of the town which may be proposed to be constructed under the charter of the Mont Vernon and Milford Electric Railway Company.

10. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars to be expended in purchasing and putting in a first-class iron pump in the well opposite the Post-office.

11. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars towards a concrete walk in the Park from the gateway, opposite the trough near the Town House, to the gateway at the west end of the Park, the main walk.

12. To see if the town will vote to lay a suitable pipe from the dry well at school house to L. F. Bills's, and from there an open drain to brook.

13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to unite with one or more town districts or special districts to form a supervisory district for the purpose of employing a superintendent of the public schools therein, under the provision of chapter 77 of the session's laws of New Hampshire 1899 (and to raise money to carry such vote into effect).

14. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate to pave the bank of the river above the highway in F. A. Holbrook's pasture to prevent its cutting a new channel and causing it necessary to build a new bridge.

15. To see if the town will vote to build a highway from a given point near Henry M. Parker's, southwest corner, to the land of B. & M. Railroad.

16. To see if the town will vote to adopt the law passed at the last session of the legislature in regard to money left for care of lots in cemeteries.

17. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, and other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF

## The Board of Education,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1900.

The time having arrived for the Board of Education to give account of its stewardship it respectfully submits its annual report.

At the school meeting held March 16, 1899, W. W. Sloan was reelected a member of the Board of Education for three years. He was also elected Treasurer.

A meeting of the Board was called March 17, at which Rev. A. J. McGown was chosen President; Rev. H. B. Marshall was chosen Secretary; W. W. Sloan was chosen to attend to repairs and the purchasing of fuel. The Secretary was appointed purchasing agent of school supplies.

The supervision of schools has been divided between the two senior members.

A change in the investment of the Spalding fund deprived the Board of income during the year from that source. This change was anticipated and provided for by a corresponding increase in appropriation at the school meeting. The amount raised was generous enabling the Board to provide three terms of eleven weeks each in all the schools. Nine schools have been in operation throughout the year. Two, Nos. 3 and 9, have been closed. The scholars from No. 3 have been conveyed regularly and comfortably to the village schools. During the Spring term the scholars in No. 9 were provided for at No. 7. Since then no scholars having appeared at No. 7, it is presumed that in this district at the present time they are entirely wanting. In the exercise of its full authority, the Board of Education unquestionably can determine the matter of closing a school here, and there, or of complete consolidation. But as this is a matter concerning which all are not agreed and some decidedly object to, the Board hesitates to exercise its authority arbitrarily, and earnestly craves in such a move universal cooperation.

It is confident however that consolidation, fully supported, would make for the advantage of all.

A good degree of success may be reported with respect to all the schools. A change of teachers has been made only at the teacher's option. In some instances no changes have been made. Miss Curtis who took charge of the Primary school at the beginning of the year, on account of an injury which she sustained during the winter term, was obliged to close with a week and a half of her contract unfulfilled. This time will be made up in the course of the coming year. Miss Holland who has been in charge of No. 2 for several consecutive terms, at her request, was given a recess during the winter term, and Miss Marshall was appointed as her substitute.

After five consecutive terms at No. 4, Miss Kimball resigned at the close of the Fall term and Miss Grace Moor was engaged as her successor.

At the beginning of the Fall term Miss Fowle was transferred from No. 7, to No. 6, and Miss Furber succeeded her at No. 7.

At the close of the Spring term, Miss Marshall who had occupied the position of assistant teacher in the High school for four terms, tendered her resignation. Miss Buzzel of Wakefield, Mass., a graduate of Smith College, was engaged as her successor. At the expiration of a term she resigned, and was succeeded by Miss Bradbury of Milford, Mass., a graduate of Tufts College.

This school being open to all scholars in town who are competent to enter it, calls for special mention. Strictly speaking it is not a High school, as the course of study is not long enough, nor ample enough to entitle it to that dignity. If the advice of the best educators is to be followed with the prospective outlook, the attempt to make it such would not be wise. Its present course of study is not necessarily a constant factor, but may be supplemented to a certain extent as fast as such action is called for. For want of closer grading the lower classes pursue for two years Grammar school studies.

The High school department offers two courses of two years each; an English course, and a Latin Scientific course. These are respectively:

### English Course.

Latin Lessons, Algebra, Physiology, Rhetoric and Composition, Penmanship.

It will be seen by this statement that there is a four years' course in the upper school, but the two last years only, have to do with High school studies. Having pursued either of the above courses scholars find easy admission to the third year in the best High Schools and Academies.

In June last, a class of nine was graduated. This event marked a new era in the school. The exercises, consisting of prayer, music, and the usual parts assigned to two representatives of the class, together with an address by Dr. Richardson of Nashua, the awarding of diplomas and the distribution of the Lawrence prizes, were interesting and profitable. A class, fewer in number, is expecting to graduate the coming June.

Miss Fulton, a graduate of the Northfield seminary, who has received supplementary training, is the principal, having occupied the position for nearly four years.

So far as it goes, this school is not excelled by any in the neighboring towns, and it invites and should have the patronage of all the scholars in town until they have enjoyed its full advantages.

#### REPAIRS, FURNISHINGS, ETC.

Repairs have been made as follows :

No. 1. Blinds painted and other minor repairs. Blackboard cleansers in the form of a wire screen, have been affixed to the boards in the room below and above. Nos. 2, 6, and 8, have been painted outside. No. 4. painted inside, whitewashed and papered. No. 5, blackboards painted.

#### REPAIRS NEEDED.

Soiled and tattered paper is both unsightly and unsanitary. With one exception, all the school houses in use should be papered and whitewashed before the opening of the Spring term. The seats at No. 8 should be sand papered and retouched with the proper material.

Through the personal solicitation of Mrs. Flora A. Hanson, and the generosity of the citizens of the town, a substantial flag of ample proportions, was purchased in the early summer and presented to the village schools. This flag in suitable weather now floats over the school building, reminding the children and youth who gather there of the glorious country in which they live.

The Woman's Relief Corps, as a means of stimulating the patriotic instinct, has placed in nearly every school house in the



town, a large and substantially framed picture of Washington.

By the courtesy of Senator Chandler, through the solicitation of Mrs. Elizabeth W. Nichols, who mounted it, the High school comes into possession of a large map, indicating in bold relief, our new possessions, which will prove a valuable accession.

Through the energetic endeavor of Miss Kimball, assisted by her scholars, a series of entertainments were given in district No. 4, the proceeds of which, supplemented by contributions from the residents of the district, were expended for the purchase of a cabinet organ which helps to develop the musical talent of the scholars and adds greatly to the interest and efficiency of the school. It is hoped that others may be stimulated to like effort by this example.

#### DISTRICT SUPERVISION.

A movement is on foot, agreeably to a legislative enactment, for the grouping of several towns into a district, with reference to a general supervision. It is proposed to commit the supervision of the district to the hands of a single person who will draw one-half of his salary from the state, the other half to be provided for by the district. In this way it is contended better supervision will be secured.

State Superintendent Folsom is an earnest advocate of the measure and it will be well for the towns which are easily open to such grouping to be thinking the matter over,

The common school has been styled "The Poor Man's College." It is the place at any rate where the great majority of men and women in this country receive their education. Good schools are leading promoters of good citizenship; hence the endeavor on the part of all should be to make them as excellent as possible.

## ABSTRACT OF REGISTERS.

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The whole number of scholars during the year ending March 1, 1900, between the ages of 5 and 15, as shown by registers, is 133; above 15 and less than 6, as shown by registers, is 17. Total, 150. We have had nine schools and employed ten teachers.
