TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at seven o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect necessary town officers and school officers for the ensuing year and ensuing three years.
- Article 2. To vote for the election of delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, and alternate district delegates to the national conventions of the various political parties to be held in 1964 for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.
- Article 3. To elect delegates to the New Hampshire Constitutional Convention to be held in 1964.
- Article 4. To vote on the question: "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this Town?"
- Article 5. To vote on the question: "Shall the Town of Bedford continue to maintain its existing Municipal Court so long as its present Judge remains in office?"
- Article 6. To vote on the question: "Shall the Amended Zoning Ordinance and Map, as proposed by the Planning Board, be adopted for this Town?"

Voting on the above Articles shall be by written ballot. Polls are to open at 7 A.M. and are not to close earlier than 6 P.M.

- At 8 P.M., action will be taken on the following Articles in the Warrant:
- Article 7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes in a sum not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00), if needed, and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the payment of Interest on such borrowing.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$5,200.00) for the operation and maintenance of the Bedford Public Library.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be used either for the purchase or renovating of any building which the Town may acquire for use by the Bedford Public Library. (Not included in Budget Committee's Budget).

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand, Nine Hundred Dollars (\$11,900.00) to purchase from Minnie F. King approximately two (2) acres of land, with the buildings thereon, known as 108

Meetinghouse Road in the Town of Bedford, not later than May 9, 1964, the purchase price of said land and buildings being Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00), against which a One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) deposit has previously been paid, and said purchase to be subject to the condition that Minnie F. King shall have the right to occupy and live in the dwelling house on said premises for and during the term of her natural life rent free.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand, Three Hundred Twenty-Nine Dollars and Eighty-One Cents (\$1,329.81) for the construction of Class V Highways within the Town, provided that the State of New Hampshire shall contribute Eight Thousand, Eight Hundred Sixty-Five Dollars and Forty Cents (\$8,865.40) toward such construction.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for the tarring of Class V Highways within the Town under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds and agencies for the control of white pine blister rust within the town.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Road Grader.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Tractor Loader.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the purpose of erecting a new fire station for the Town, said borrowing to be evidenced by a serial promissory note or notes of the Town, payable in equal annual principal payments over a period of five (5) years and bearing interest on the unpaid principal balance at a rate not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum, and if such borrowing is approved and authorized by the Town, that the Selectmen be further authorized to expend said Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) toward the

improvement of the Town's existing fire station if, in the opinion of the Selectmen, such improvement is preferable to the construction of a new fire station. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand, Seven Hundred Dollars (\$1,700.00) for the care of cemeteries.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a fulltime Police Department with a full-time Police Chief. (By Petition)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$14,500.00) to operate and maintain the Town Police Department. (By Petition) (The amount of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$4,700.00) is recommended by the Budget Committee. The balance of Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$9,800.00) is not included in the Budget Committee's Budget).

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Two Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$2,212.00) to purchase a Police cruiser. (Not included in Budget Committee's Budget).

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for use by the Town Planning Board.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the Town Board of Adjustment.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for Civil Defense in the Town.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this Article, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Hillsborough a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19 to 29 inclusive of Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Ministerial Branch, extending from previously accepted road 570' x 50' northeasterly to Steppingstone Road.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Steppingstone Road, from northeast end of Ministerial Branch 650' x 50' northwesterly to Nancy Lane.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept Nancy Lane, from northwest end of Steppingstone Road 1030' x 50' southwesterly to northeast end of Nancy Lane presently accepted.
- Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pinecrest Terrace in southerly direction from Meetinghouse Road a distance of 355' x 50' with a 75' diameter turn around.
- Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Colonial Drive in a southeasterly direction from Route 101 a distance of 1200' x 50' with a 75' turn around.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

In addition to subcommittee assignments for fact-finding purposes, the Budget Committee held meetings on January 20, February 3, 10 and 20, 1964. A public hearing of the Town Budget and the School Budget was held on February 17, 1964 at the Town Hall.

TOWN WARRANT

LIBRARY SPECIAL ARTICLE

This article was not included in the budget of the Budget Committee. The Library Trustees reported to the Committee that they wished to have this money available to spend in the event they acquired the Stevens-Buswell School, or to build a new library. Since neither of these events can possibly take place during the current year, and since there is no certainty that they will take place in the following year, the Budget Committee felt that this appropriation should not be included in this year's budget. In any event the size of the expenditure does not warrant the setting up of a Capital Reserve account.

POLICE DEPARTMENT APPROPRIATION ARTICLE

The requirements for a full scale, full time police force will require an appropriation from the Town greatly in excess of the \$14,500 listed in the special article. Based upon the Town's ability to pay, the Budget Committee feels that the needs of the residents can best be met by a part time police department operating within an appropriation of \$4,700 as itemized by the present Chief of Police. In the opinion of the Budget Committee there would be less police protection per dollar spent, with a full time department than under the present operation. It has been further pointed out to the Committee that an adjacent town of comparable size has a full time police force and continues to have as many, if not more, incidents of criminal violations as does Bedford.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The year 1963 has been one of continuous activity for the Board in an effort to take full advantage of the contract which the Town has with the firm of Metcalf and Eddy, planning consultants, prior to its expiration in February 1964. Working with its consultant, Mr. James Woglom, resulted in presentation to the Town for its consideration at two Special Town Meetings, Land Subdivision Regulations. Both sessions of the Special Meeting were recessed without a decision having been reached as to the adoption of the ordinance. An article to grant to the Planning Board authority to regulate land sub-division is included in the warrant for the present Town Meeting.

The other major effort of the Planning Board this year has been to prepare for presentation to the Town an amendment to the present Zoning Ordinance. This is included as a referendum question on the Town ballot and must be voted by the Town at the same time as it registers its choice for Town officials. The Planning Board held six public hearings on the amendment. Many changes in the original proposal were incorporated in the final draft as a result of the suggestions made by interested citizens who attended the hearings. A copy of the amended ordinance is posted on the Town bulletin board and also at the office of the Town Clerk.

The Planning Board wishes to thank Mr. Woglom for his efforts on behalf of the Town and for his excellent cooperation with the Board.

Concluding, the Board urges the adoption of this amendment to the ordinance as being in the best interest of the Town as a whole.

# PLANS AND REPORTS OF CIVIL DEFENSE ORGANIZATION OF BEDFORD

1964 shall see continuing growth in the Bedford Net in Communications, as well as added equipment procured for the Radar Teams, these two services work hand in hand in case of CD Emergency.

Further equipment shall be purchased for Light Rescue Teams and shall be used to give Firemen such Light Rescue training; the Fire Department will have added to its CD equipment two Walkie Talkies, these to have dual purpose, to be used in both local fire as well as any CD Emergency.

First Aid and Medical Self Help Course will be available to townspeople requesting such training from either the Civil Defense Director or Chief of First Aid and Light Rescue Service Leo Bongers, Jr.

Chief of Transportation Paul Johonnett, will continue with the development of a rapid School evacuation Plan, to be used to deliver children quickly to homes when alerted to a CD Emergency.

A continuing study will be carried on as to methods to be used for signals to towns people in outlying districts to alert them to a Civil Defense Emergency, feasible with the size of Civil Defense Appropriations granted the CD Organization.

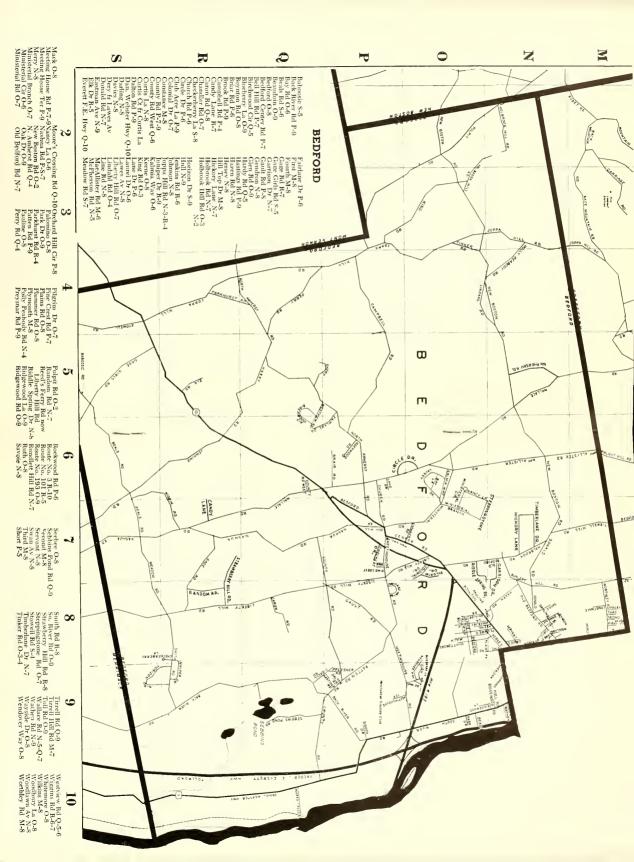

#### CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

During 1963 we have continued the weekly manning of the Hillsborough County Radio Network with our six radio operators rotating this duty.

We now have radio units set up in five different home locations. This is called the Bedford Net and is manned weekly on the same evening as the above Net. This enables us to have local radio communication with not only the County Net, but also the





State Net at Concord. Two of the radio units are owned by the Town and the other three are owned by the Amateur Operators themselves.

We have acquired a portable loud-speaking Megaphone for our Civil Defense work, as well as one pair of short range Walkie-Talkies.

Three of our obsolescent radiation detection sets were replaced with modern transistor versions. Background radiation readings have been taken at regular intervals during the year by our three stations, and reported to State Headquarters in Concord.

Again we issue our yearly warning, that during and after a nuclear attack, no one should go outside his shelter or home until positive clearance has been given by your own radiation detector, or a member of our Radiological Teams. Monitor your portable radio (battery-operated), and wait.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience—a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop, extinguish it promptly.

Carry your rubbish to the public dump—its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.

Never discard lighted cigarettes or matches. Make this
a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.

4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

#### REPORT OF BEDFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Bedford Fire Department answered 68 alarms during 1963. These calls consisted of:

- 47 grass and brush fires
- 14 building fires (chimneys, etc.)
  - 6 calls to control town dump
  - 1 automobile fire

We have organized a training program for the members of the Department with a drill night twice a month. The men have received training in the use of the resuscitator, scot air paks, and first aid. The men were also instructed in the operation of the pumping equipment, handling of ladders and location of accessories on the trucks. We have purchased a new Maxim Fire Truck with a 600 gallon tank and a 750 G.P.M. pump. This truck is completely equipped and should add a great deal to the efficiency of the Department.

We have inspected 26 oil burner installations in the past year. In several of these inspections, violations were found and have been corrected. The installers of oil burners have been very cooperative, and this is greatly appreciated.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

The trustees are happy to report progress in added improvements to our present Library building. The wiring on the second floor has been replaced and suitable fixtures have been installed. Books and furniture, stored on the second floor and long useless, have been discarded to make room for new book stacks, which have been purchased and installed this year. A suitable clock has been purchased for the main room of the library. New tables and chairs have been purchased with the needs of the High School students in mind. A "book wagon" and stand for the new dictionary have also been added to our equipment.

The year has brought the usual activities with some additional ones. National Library Week was observed from April 21st to 27th. Our librarians planned a Second Annual Art Show as part of this observation. Ninety-nine pieces of art were on display, the work of thirty-two local artists. This event was well attended and held over a second week. The Summer Reading Contest for children was conducted as it has been for several years. Over sixty children were listed as participants, and the winners were invited to a party, planned for them by our librarians on November 6th. This party was a part of our observation of National Children's Book Week. During this week our librarians visited Stevens-Buswell School, where they told stories, reviewed books and invited the children to the library. On September 11th the boys and girls of Bedford were invited to the library for a demonstration of paper folding by the grandchildren of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Nickolls. This proved to be a very pleasant and informative event.

The usual meetings of trustees and librarians have been held. In April Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck attended a luncheon and lecture at the N. H. Highway Motel as part of the observation of National Library Week. On May 8th and 9th both librarians attended the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association, held at Wentworth-by-the-Sea. At this meeting Mrs. Wiggin was installed as President of the Association for the current year. In October Mrs. Wiggin attended the annual

meeting of the New England Library Association, again at Went-worth-by-the-Sea. In addition Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck attended a course on reference work held at the Manchester Public Library during February and March. This course was sponsored by the New Hampshire State Library.

The trustees and librarians are most appreciative of the interest shown in this library by the "Library Associates", which were organized in June of 1963.

The work of the State Library in loaning us hundreds of books through the Bookmobile has continued throughout the year. These books, as well as being used in this library, have in turn been loaned to the Bedford Schools. For the last fiscal year Mrs. Wiggin reported that Bedford had borrowed more books from the Bookmobile than any other library in this area.

We wish to thank the many friends of this library for gifts of books, magazines and pictures, that have come to us throughout the year. Included in these friends are the Bedford Mother's Club, the Bedford Women's Club and the Bedford Garden Club.

In August trustees, librarians and friends of the library were saddened by the death of Mrs. Edith Farrar, who during recent years has been of tremendous help and inspiration to this library. Following her death money has been contributed to a Memorial Fund in this library which will be used to purchase books chosen with special consideration of Mrs. Farrar's interests.

Year after year the trustees of this library have closed their report with a statement of the needs of our library as Bedford increases in population. It is very illuminating to come to the library when elementary school children and high school students are there looking for help with "home work". Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck are doing their best to meet this situation, but more time, more books, and more room are badly needed. In this connection we note that the recommended figure per capita for library services in New Hampshire towns under five thousand is \$5.00. Our figure per capita in 1963 was approximately \$1.03.

However as 1963 closed, we have been encouraged for the future of libraries in New Hampshire. Legislation is pending at both federal and state levels which will bring additional funds for library services and the remodeling and building of libraries. We have every reason to believe that the 1965 State Legislature will vote the funds to support the project for a statewide library

system, authorized in House Bill No. 306, which was passed during the last session of 1963. It is our part to keep informed as to these bills and ascertain how best the Bedford Public Library can be benefited by them.

# BEDFORD, N. H. — HEALTH OFFICER Report for 1963

In the first half of 1963 your Health Officer handled three complaints concerning septic tank surface overflow, had two water supply calls and checked on one call about a trapped skunk.

The new State licensing of sewage disposal truck companies was discussed with the Selectmen. At the time of my resignation we talked over the current water supply, disposal, and zoning problems.

Well child clinics were held at the Town Hall in April, May, and June. The children attending received 308 doses of Sabin polio vaccine (an average of 103 at each clinic), 51 D-P-T immunizations, 35 smallpox vaccinations and 19 skin tests for tuberculosis. The Bedford Women's Club sponsors these clinics with the cooperation of the Manchester Visiting Nurse Association, the N. H. State Dept. of Health and Dr. Gardner F. Manning.

The Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer Bedford residents free classes for parents expecting new babies, a home visit to families with new babies, and part time nursing care to homes where nursing help is needed.

# REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD 1963-1964

To the residents of Bedford:

For the past year, it has been my responsibility and pleasure to serve as chairman of your School Board. In regard to administration, personnel, curriculum, etc., I respectfully refer your attention to the reports of Mr. Francis G. Ciarfella, our Superintendent, and Mr. Raymond G. Edwards, our Teacher Consultant. These gentlemen are far better qualified to report on these subjects than I. I should like to devote this report to major decisions and progress made during the past year with respect to our major building program.

The two room addition to the Bedford Memorial School has been completed and has been in use since last fall. Because the bids came in below our budgeted estimate, we were able to install new kitchen equipment to better accommodate the increased enrollment, within the original estimated figure.

Plans for this two room addition to Bedford Memorial School and the plans for the new fourteen room Upper Elementary School were drawn by the architectural firm of Dirsa and Lampron, of Manchester, New Hampshire. Eight contractors have submitted bids on the new school. At this writing, the contract has not been awarded, but we have been assured by the low bidder that usable occupancy can be realized by November 1, 1964. This means that the Peter Woodbury, Stevens Buswell, and Donald Street schools can be closed at that time.

The site for this new school will be located on a fifty acre tract at the intersection of Liberty Hill Road and County Road, commonly known as Six Corners. The site has the approval of the State Department of Education and the Town Planner. The decision was made only after careful consideration of some nineteen sites within the town.

Final plans for the new school consist of fourteen classrooms, including a General Science Laboratory, as well as a Library, Cafeteria-Auditorium, and a Gymnasium. The fifty acre site affords us room to grow and the school has been designed with

flexibility in mind so that we can expand at minimum cost. This combination of site and school will accommodate our classroom needs for many years to come.

I can't over emphasize the important role our Building Committee played in the entire building program. Their contribution has been invaluable. We have had meeting after meeting with the architects, and I want to publicly thank the following members of the Building Committee: Henry J. Ellis, Major James A. Fraser, Mrs. Peter S. Freedman, Maurice J. Letendre, Jack N. McKelvie, and Aubrey G. Robinson, Jr.

Last fall, Superintendent Louis Ramsay resigned to accept a position with the Keene Teachers College. We were very fortunate to obtain the services of Mr. Francis G. Ciarfella as our new Superintendent. Mr. Ciarfella comes to us from Ludlow, Vermont.

Next fall we will require two additional teachers, plus a Principal for Bedford Memorial School. Mr. Donald Fournier has accepted the responsibility as Principal of the new Upper Elementary School.

This past year has been extremely busy with meetings as frequent as three times a week. But the job has been made easier by the cooperation of Superintendent Ciarfella, Teacher Consultant Edwards, our Principals, teachers, custodians, and cooks. I also wish to thank Mrs. Gladys Smend, School Nurse, and Mrs. Ruth Gott, Hot Lunch Director. Finally, my special thanks to fellow Board members, Jack Middleton and Ann Van Loan for their untiring cooperation and assistance.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January, 1964

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report on

your school system.

Never before in this country's history has so much attention been directed toward the matter of education. People from all walks of life are complimenting or criticizing schools and educators. Parents of school children are concerned and, in this district, the teachers are also concerned. They know best the problems encountered in teaching children. They also know, however, the methods and means necessary to teach.

The majority of the teachers of this district are experienced professional people who share this experience with the newer members of the staff. They have shown a constant interest in their pupils and the ability to seek out each child's weaknesses and strengths. They have the patience to teach and re-teach as necessary. The children of the community are in good hands.

Every effort is made to insure that the quality of staff is maintained. In this age of change, the recruitment of new teachers seems to be as inevitable as increased enrollments. This district is fortunate to have enlisted the services of the following teachers new to the system.

Mrs. Barbara Gingras, Bedford, grade two teacher replacing Mrs. Elaine Ostergren who resigned to remain at home with her family. Mrs. Gingras is a graduate of Illinois State Normal College, 1942, and Keene Teachers College, 1963. She did her practiced teaching in Amherst.

Miss Marie Hatch, of Alstead, appointed to teach social studies in grades 7 and 8, holds a new position made necessary due to increased enrollments. A graduate of Keene Teachers College, Miss Hatch practice taught at Charlestown High School.

Miss Phyllis Barry, of Manchester, appointed to teach grade two, replaces Mrs. Marilyn Guillemett who has been appointed teaching principal of the Peter Woodbury School. Miss Barry is a graduate of Notre Dame College, 1963, and practice taught in grades 1 and 2 in the Manchester Schools.

Miss Mary Mahoney, Manchester, teaching grade 4, replaced Mrs. Constance Patchen now a grade five teacher in Bedford. Miss Mahoney is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and did her practice teaching in Manchester.

Mrs. Mary Nicholson, Manchester, teaching English in grades 7 and 8, replaced Mrs. Elizabeth Kean who has retired. A graduate of St. Anselm's College, Mrs. Nicholson practice taught in the Manchester Schools.

Miss Rosemary Shea of Manchester, teaching grade three at the Stevens-Buswell School, holds this additional position made necessary due to increased enrollments. Miss Shea is a graduate of Notre Dame College and did her practice teaching in the Manchester Schools.

Miss Patricia Simmons teaching grade six, replaced Charles Colpitts who resigned to teach in another system. A graduate of Keene Teachers College, Miss Simmons did her practice teaching in the Manchester Schools.

Growth continues to keynote the various reports involving the school district as in recent years. Anxious minds think ahead to the new upper elementary school and the learning experiences and educational opportunities it will make available to the youth of the community. The addition to the Memorial School which was expected to provide sufficient space so that the Donald Street School could be closed, was completed in time to handle the added growth of school population. The district was fortunate to have had these new rooms at this time. As the enrollment continues to increase, it becomes necessary to add to the staff. There will be a need for an additional teacher at the grade six level and an additional teacher at the grades 7 and 8 level for the 1964-65 school year. A supervising principal will be needed to handle the administration of an additional school.

A large change in staff creates conditions under which it becomes very difficult to maintain the high level quality of teaching and learning necessary to the modern school program. The School Board has taken steps through its salary schedule deliberations and decisions to help attract and retain quality teachers. These actions could constitute the most important steps toward improving our schools and your support of their decisions reflected in the budget is solicited.

The 1964-65 requests for the operation of the district's schools must necessarily reflect the continual growth in pupil population. This continuing increase in pupil load requires larger sums for books and materials as well as for the additional personnel mentioned. Increased costs of materials and services cannot be ignored.

Those responsible for the direction and operation of the schools are aware of the need for holding down school costs wherever possible in view of the financial burden on the taxpayer. There is a constant effort to keep costs in line and yet not impede the educational program.

That these efforts have been effective is evident in a comparison of per pupil costs throughout the state, which tabulate the local elementary per pupil cost well below the state average. The educational program, nevertheless, has continued to grow and develop. The quality of teaching, the educational services, and the curriculum are noteworthy for being of high caliber and forward looking.

The development of the school budget is a time consuming task, which takes place over a considerable period of time. It represents, in a sense, the thoughts and help of all school personnel to a varying degree. In effect it is the financial program needed to carry out the policies and practices of the School Board and the program of education based on these policies voted in the past, in effect now, and planned for the future.

Principals and various staff members were required to prepare individual requests for the various schools or services prior to January. Certain basic considerations involving details of this budget were necessary with the opening of school in September 1963. Since the funds requested are expended from July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965, it becomes evident that detailed decisions were being made at least eighteen to twenty-one months in advance. This is of necessity, the normal range of school budget planning, but does not represent the planning referred to as long range planning.

The year of the first Sputnick is often looked to as a year which seeded change in education. The past year is also noteworthy in its effect on the school of which two events stand out, 1. the decision of the Supreme Court regarding prayer in the public schools, and 2. a time of violent death by assassination of a President dedicated to the support of schools and the cause of education.

I wish to take this opportunity to express sincere thanks and appreciation to all who have cooperated in helping to carry on successfully the program of education in the district's schools. A special thanks is extended to my predecessor, Mr. Louis Ramsay, for his assist and fruitful orientation sessions during my first few weeks in the district and whenever requested thereafter. We are deeply indebted and genuinely appreciative for the support of the School Board, central office personnel, the patience and dedication of teachers and principals, the untiring efforts of service personnel, the ambition of pupils, and the interest of parents and townspeople, all of whom share in the struggle to insure the future of our country through the education of our children.

# TEACHER CONSULTANT'S REPORT

Mr. Francis G. Ciarfella Superintendent of Schools Bedford, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Ciarfella:

The following paragraphs constitute my report as Teacher Consultant in the School District of Bedford, New Hampshire.

#### READING

Bedford's reading program has undergone a critical reappraisal both with respect to materials used (books and teacher aids) and grouping procedures utilized. To alleviate dependence upon a single basal reader we are adding as many supplementary readers as possible at the various grade levels. One of our objectives is to add strength to our phonetic program. Furthermore, advanced grouping techniques are utterly impossible without sufficient numbers and variety of readers available in our classrooms.

Grouping procedures presently in operation in the country range from a situation in which children progress through a series of readers in lock-step fashion, regardless of real achievement, to a situation in which children are afforded the opportunity to move according to their ability. The latter, of course, is the goal toward which the staff of the Bedford Schools is striving. Children should be afforded the opportunity to move laterally when reinforcement at a given level is needed or allowed to advance beyond grade level as far as is educationally wise. This is the policy being pressed forward in your school. To this end, various inter—and intra—grade grouping procedures are being utilized, often described as the Joplin Plan or modification thereof.

To provide a step by step evaluation of each child's progress in reading, a testing program has been instituted to be administered at each and every reading level to help better determine proper reading level placement and to analyze the child's reading difficulties if any exist.

#### **MATHEMATICS**

As promised, a REAL modern mathematics program has been established in the Bedford Schools in grades 1-4. The program will be extended through grade 6 in 2 years. The Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program is one of the finest in use in the country. It has brought about the necessity of a partial retraining of your staff—a retraining program that is still going on and one into which your teachers have poured all of their energies.

For the same reasons as described under my report on reading, differences in rate of learning must be considered. To this end, achievement grouping in mathematics has been established in grades 2 through 6.

#### SCIENCE

Administrators and science teachers throughout Union No. 27 are cooperating in efforts to improve and articulate the present science programs. In general, the goal of this group is to prepare science programs that will better prepare Junior High pupils for more advanced and more difficult science programs on the high school level.

In isolated areas throughout the country, the 1960's began with the development of new science curricula that are quite different in point of view and content from traditional courses of study. These include such new programs as found in the Physical Science Study Committee Report, the Chemical Bond Approach, The Chemical Education Materials Study, and The Biological Sciences Curriculum Study.

The new programs present science as a scientist sees science and in terms of modern concepts and theories. Emphasis is placed on basic science and not on engineering or technology. A student is asked to explore and discover, to develop an understanding of the big ideas in the science rather than to memorize large numbers of facts and formulas, many of which will be out of date in a few years. These programs are designed to bring about learning through the act of problem-solving in a laboratory setting. The new science laboratory facilities to be included in the New School are therefore of paramount importance.

#### **SPELLING**

The new Webster Spelling Series has been adopted in all grades during the past 2 years. This "Speller" represents a language arts approach to the teaching of spelling whereas the former books used were little more than an accumulation of weekly spelling lists.

When children deal with spelling lists of words randomly grouped, it is difficult to make generalizations which will apply to thousands of words—not merely to those in the weekly spelling lists. Being equipped with these rudimentary generalizations, learners will find themselves able to look discriminately at all printed symbols. To look at words discriminately means to observe agreement with or deviation from a body of phonetic and structural generalizations. This is the invariable habit of the skilled speller, a habit which must be developed early. Once the learner has formulated a body of phonetic and structural generalizations, it matters less that English spelling is not perfectly consistent.

In closing, may I say that it is a personal as well as a professional satisfaction to participate in the instructional program at the Bedford Schools.

A Pre-school Clinic and Registration was held at the Town Hall in April 1963. At this time the 67 children entering school in the fall were given a physical examination by Dr. Manning. All the children were weighed and measured and had their eyes tested.
