# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Belmont, in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Hall's Hall, in said Belmont on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray all expenditures as listed in Budget and make appropriations for the same.
3. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of Public Library for three years.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to install an electric fire alarm.
5. To see what the Town will vote to do with its parsonage fund.
6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Week.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they examine the property to be taxed.
8. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1925, and if so, how much.

9. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to reduce its debt; and if so, how much.

10. To see if the Town will vote to take the South Church land or land and building by law for Town purposes, and if so, to raise a sum of money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Laconia Hospital Association.

12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a forest on that part of Johnson lot bought by town and not used for gravel, and raise a sum of money for the same.

13. To hear reports from Committees, etc.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# SCHOOL REPORT

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## Report of the School Board

*To the Citizens of Belmont:*

Once more it becomes our duty to report to you the condition of our schools. Schools have been maintained in all our buildings with the exception of Union and Jamestown. As there is no prospect that these buildings will be needed in the near future, it might be well to dispose of them. The Plummer school house has been repaired the past year and is now in very good condition. A new fire alarm and new drinking fountains have been added to the Gale so that all the scholars can get a drink in a short time. Outside painting is needed on both Province Road buildings and also the Gale. It is suggested that storm windows on the north and west fronts of the Gale building would not only make it more comfortable but save much fuel.

Teachers salaries, fuel and transportation, are the items calling for the largest appropriations; none of these are less than last year.

In accordance with the vote of last spring a ninth or first grade in High school was added to the course at Gale. Six scholars are enrolled. And while we think that under the circumstances fair progress has been made, with so small a number and the lack of equipment which the larger schools are able to offer, that our scholars are not on an equal footing with the boys and girls of other towns. The cost this year will not be far from \$1300.

We wish to call your attention to the budget printed on another page which it is your privilege and duty to approve or reject. Owing to the large tuition bills for the year ending June 30 last, we find a deficit of \$700. and we have been forced to bor-

row from this years funds. We are asking for this amount to repay.

We are also asking for \$500. for repairs. The repairs mentioned above will cost much more than this but part might be taken from the regular school funds.

We are glad to be able to report that we have a sidewalk part way to the Gale school with the prospect of more later.

If you would visit the schools oftener and learn for yourself what your schools are doing, we would not need to present a report.

In closing, we wish to express our regret at the removal from town and the consequent resignation from the school board of Mrs. Swain. The schools of Belmont have lost a good friend.

## School Superintendent's Report

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools. It may be of interest to note that only three other superintendents in the state have had as long a service in the communities which they are now serving. The continued forbearance of school board and citizens has made this long period possible.

The school year which closed last June was a reasonably successful one. Matters of interest may be found in the statistical table printed on another page. All our schools were in session thirty-six weeks which has become the minimum standard throughout the state. The total number of different pupils enrolled was 186, the average membership 172, and the percent of attendance 95. In all three of these items we showed a gain over the previous year. The superintendent made 131 visits to schools and attended six meetings of the school board.

The usual closing exercises were omitted. However, certificates were granted to seven pupils who completed the work of the eighth grade. This was the smallest class we have had for several years. Those completing the work were as follows:

Ladd Hill: Leroy Merrill. Gale: James Currier, Wayne Eaton, Kenneth Muzzey, Ida Ricard, Beatrice Thompson, Mary Ring. Five of these continued the work of the ninth grade in our high school.

The measure of a school is generally to be found in the teacher. While other things have an influence it is really the teacher who makes or unmakes the school. The elementary schools opened in the fall with four changes in the teaching force Mrs. Lillian Knowles, whose interest in her school and community cannot be too highly commended, resigned at Upper Province Road and she was followed by Miss Bessie Smith. Miss

Smith has had much successful experience in rural schools. This school now has an enrollment of only seven pupils and there is a possibility of even a smaller number of children in this community next year. It may seem the proper and feasible thing to unite these two schools on Province Road. There were no other changes in the teachers of our rural schools. The Plummer school continues to be the largest and deserves special commendation for its fine spirit.

At the Gale school Miss Gerrish was the only teacher to return and because of her experience and success the school board elected her principal. She has successfully assumed this larger responsibility. Mrs. Dorothy Phillips Swain was elected to succeed Miss Nute in grades one and two, Miss Florence Cushing succeeded Miss McCloud in grades three and four, and Miss Ethel Sanborn succeeded Mrs. Thurston in grades seven and eight. Mrs. Swain and Miss Cushing have had experience and summer school training. Miss Sanborn is a graduate of Plymouth Normal, with several years very successful experience. We have here a fine school.

The scarcity of teachers which has prevailed for several years seems to have disappeared. At the opening of schools in September there was a considerable number of normal graduates who were not placed in positions. This was in part due to

the fact that many of the rural positions were filled early in the summer by partly trained girls, and in part to the fact that some of the normal graduates did not desire to take rural schools. At the present time there is training in our two normal schools 750 girls. The time seems reasonably near when there will be a trained teacher in every school in the state.

Following the vote of the school meeting a ninth grade or one year high school was established and organized at the Gale school. Six pupils were enrolled at the time of opening in September. There have been no withdrawal of pupils and the attendance has been very good. The pupils are accommodated in the seventh and eighth grade room and the room formerly used as the lunch room is used as the recitation room. Reasonable equipment has been installed. The class is grouped about the table with the teacher in the most approved way. While the course which is offered gives no choice to the pupils it is probably the best that could be arranged for under the circumstances. The subjects offered are as follows: English, Algebra, Physical Geography, History of Civilization.

We were very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Nancy Knowlton of Manchester for this high school work. Miss Knowlton is a graduate of the three year course at Keene Normal School. She has a fine spirit, much interest in her work and is sure to make this a worthwhile year for her class.

This school has been inspected by Mr. Walter M. May, Deputy Commissioner of Education, who has general charge of the high schools in this state. Mr. May reported very favorably on the beginning we have made and commended Miss Knowlton. The school is now on the state approved list of high schools, offering one year of work.

The cancellation of the afternoon train was very unfortunate for several of the village boys and girls attending Tilton School. They were unable to continue their work. Naturally we have a much smaller number attending outside high schools than for several years past.

Under present conditions of train service, which are not likely to improve it is no longer possible for Tilton School to provide satisfactory high school privileges for the boys and girls of Belmont village. That such privileges should be provided in some way I think we are all agreed. I feel that the best policy for the district to adopt would be to extend our high school course of one year to two years, and eventually to offer a full four years' course. I am well aware that there are arguments against this, but unless this is done it is reasonably certain that some of the children who would profit by receiving a high school education will be deprived of the opportunity. This would unquestionably mean an enlarged financial outlay but it seems the natural solution of the problem.

Dr. N. W. MacMurphy has continued as medical inspector. He has shown a real appreciation of the importance of this work and has performed his work in a thorough manner.

Needed repairs have been made at the Plummer school and at the Gale school. A new and efficient fire alarm system has been installed at the Gale.

Two years ago your superintendent attended the national meeting of school superintendents which was held in Cleveland Ohio. He is planning to attend the meeting this year which is held in Cincinnati, Ohio, the last week in February.

I wish to express my appreciation of all the help which has come to me during the year from teachers and children, from school board and citizens.
