The President's Page

TO THE ALUMNI:

The new academic year brings several important changes. In the death of Dr. J. Harold Brownback on July 14, 1952, the College lost a great teacher whom hundreds of students and former students will remember with gratitude and admiration. Dr. Paul R. Wagner, for eighteen years a member of the Department of Biology, succeeds Dr. Brownback as Chairman of the Department.

Dr. John W. Clawson, since 1907 Professor of Mathematics and since 1946 Dean of Ursinus College, on June 30 became Dean Emeritus and Professor Emeritus. Dr. Maurice W. Armstrong, since 1945 Professor of History, succeeds Dr. Clawson as Dean. Dr. Charles Lyon Chandler, since 1946 Professor of Political Science, on June 30 became Professor Emeritus. Dr. William J. Phillips has resigned as Registrar in order to give more time to teaching and writing and to serve as Director of the Evening School. Professor William S. Pettit becomes Registrar, and Professor Geoffrey Dolman becomes Assistant Registrar.

Two new programs are this year offered at Ursinus College: the program of the Evening School and the five-year engineering program given in cooperation with the University of Pennsylvania.

The program of the Evening School is this year offered for the first time. The purpose of the Evening School is to make college work available to men and women employed in business and industry. The program emphasizes courses in business administration and in fields closely related to business administration. The program is planned to enable a student (1) to choose one or more courses that are of special interest to him, or (2) to complete in several years a series of related courses leading to the degree of Associate in Business Administration, or (3) to complete the 120 semester hours of work leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science. Instruction in the Evening School is given by members of the Faculty having charge of the same work in the day session of Ursinus College.

The five-year engineering program is designed to give the student a broader education and a more thorough preparation for engineering than can be given in a four-year program. Upon completion of three years at Ursinus College and two years at the University of Pennsylvania, the student receives from Ursinus College the degree of Bachelor of Arts and from the University of Pennsylvania the degree of Bachelor of Science in that branch of engineering in which the student has done his work.

I take this opportunity to ask the help of all alumni. First, we need the continuing help of the alumni in bringing Ursinus to the attention of students who will appreciate the opportunities that the College offers. Secondly, we need, as all colleges do, larger endowment in order to provide adequate salaries for the Faculty and to meet the rising cost of operation. Although the financial position of Ursinus is today stronger than ever before, and although our endowment funds have been greatly increased during the last few years, further increase is necessary. We need your help.

DONALD L. HELFFERICH FOUNDERS' DAY SPEAKER

Receives Honorary LL.D.

"Ursinus College" was the title of the Founders' Day address on October 22, 1952, and it was delivered by our Vice President, Mr. Donald L. Helfferich.

Perhaps no one is better qualified to deliver an address on Ursinus since the Helfferich family has been closely connected with the college since the very earliest days of Ursinus. Mr. William A. Helfferich, Donald L.'s grandfather, was one of the original founders. REV. AND MRS. WILLIAM URSINUS HELFFERICH (NORA SHULER) were both members of the class of 1893, and they sent four sons to Ursinus: DONALD L., '21, CYRIL C., '24, REGINALD, '28, and RANDOLPH, '29. Two sons chose Ursinus wives—MRS. DONALD L. HELFFERICH WAS ANNA KNAUER, Class of 1920, and MRS. RANDOLPH HELFFERICH WAS ISOBEL JOHNSON, Class of 1927.

While most of us know Mr. Helfferich, few of us probably know how full and varied his life's work is. He was a graduate of Mercersburg Academy before he came to Ursinus as a student; and after his graduation from Ursinus, he received the LL.B. degree from the Yale Law School in 1924. During the first World War, he was a Second Lieutenant Pilot in the U. S. Air Service from 1917 to 1918.

A man of many interests and talents, he has been a director and executive vice-president of the Upper Darby National Bank since 1936, a director of French Creek Granite Company since 1937 and assistant secretary of French Creek Granite Company since 1942. He has been a director of Ursinus College since 1927.

His list of government and public services is a long one, including membership of the State Council of Education, and chairmanships of the Montgomery County Surplus Property Committee, Citizens Montgomery County Committee for Hoover Report, and the Montgomery County United States Savings Bond Committee. As a churchman, he has been an elder of the Evangelical and Reformed Church,

DR. ARMSTRONG NAMED DEAN OF THE COLLEGE

The election of Dr. Maurice W. Armstrong, of 559 Kathmere Road, Havertown, Pa., as Dean of Ursinus College was announced by the Board of Directors after the retirement of Dean Clawson in July 1952. Dr. Armstrong has been a member of the Ursinus faculty as a professor of history since 1945, having been a member of the Department of History at Harvard University prior to that time.

He was graduated from Dalhousie University in 1925 and received his M.A. degree from that University in 1927. After receiving the B.D. degree from Pine Hill in 1930, Dr. Armstrong studied at Harvard University where he received the degree of S.T.M. in 1941 and the Ph.D. in 1945.

In addition to his teaching, Dr. Armstrong was interim minister at the Walnut Street Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia from 1945 to 1950. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Historical Society, and Chairman of the Board of Counsel, Pennsylvania Industrial Home for Blind Women.

Dr. Armstrong is the author of "The Great Awakening in Nova Scotia",

DR. CLAWSON RETIRED

Ursinus bids a fond farewell to Dr. John Wentworth Clawson, who has retired as Dean of the College and Professor of Mathematics. At a meeting of the Ursinus Board of Directors, Dr. Clawson was named Dean Emeritus and Professor of Mathematics Emeritus.

Dean Clawson was graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1901. He received the B.A. degree from Cambridge University in 1904 and the M.A. degree from the University of New Brunswick in 1905. He came to Ursinus the following year to teach mathematics and has been a member of the Ursinus family ever since. In 1920 Ursinus College bestowed on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science, and he became Dean of the College in 1946 after the death of Dean Kline.

Mrs. Clawson, after 26 years of service as Secretary to the Dean of the College, has resigned her post and is another person who will be sorely missed. Students, secretaries and faculty all knew that they could depend on Mrs. Clawson to help them at any time.

So the Clawsons will be missed, indeed, at Ursinus, and we hope they will enjoy most pleasant years of well-earned rest and happiness in their home on Ninth Avenue in Trappe, Pa.

Two Clawson sons and one daughter are Ursinus graduates — ALEXANDER R., '36, JOHN W., JR., '32, and MRS. ARTHUR NEWMAN (JEAN), '41.

DR. JOHN B. PRICE DIES

DR. JOHN B. PRICE, College physician, died suddenly at his home in Norristown, Pa., on May 11, 1952.

Dr. Price was graduated from Ursinus in 1905, received the A.M. degree from Ursinus in 1912, and the M.D. degree from the Medico-Chirurgical College in 1914. He completed post-graduate work at Harvard Medical School and the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary. He served as an Army captain in the Medical Corps during World War I.

"Whitey" Price, as Ursinus friends affectionately called him, is a well-remembered athlete and coach as well as physician of Ursinus College. The Price Athletic Field was named in his honor.

Dr. Price had served as State Medical Director for Montgomery and Bucks County since 1949. In 1947, he retired from active practice as an ear, nose and throat specialist. But before his retirement, he was a member of the University of Pennsylvania Graduate Hospital, Department of Otolaryngology, from 1924 to 1931; and he became chief surgeon of the Ear, Nose and Throat Department, Montgomery Hospital, Norristown, Pa., in 1927.

He was a member of the Pennsylvania State Medical Association, Montgomery County Medical Association, the Philadelphia Laryngological Society; and was the author of many articles in medical journals on otolaryngological research.

Surviving him are his widow, MARY SHADE PRICE, '04, two daughters and grandchildren.

URSINUS WELCOMES NEW MEMBERS

Dr. Robert Lynn Hutchison has been named Associate Professor of Biology at Ursinus. Dr Hutchison is a graduate of the College of Wooster, Class of 1934. He received the M.A. degree from Ohio University in 1937 and the Ph.D. degree from Northwestern University in 1940.

From 1935 to 1937 he was Assistant in Zoology at Ohio University and from 1937 to 1940 held that position at Northwestern University. After serving in the United States Navy from 1942 to 1946, he took a teaching position at Bowling Green State University where he taught until the present time.

URSINUS OPENS 83rd YEAR 1952 Shows Increase in Enrollment of New Students

"Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling: For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure. Do all things without murmurings and disputings; That ye may be blameless and harmless, the sons of God, without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom ye shine as lights in the world"—Philippians 2:12-15. That was the text of President Norman E. McClure's address in Chapel on Wednesday, September 23, 1952, when Ursinus opened its 83rd academic year. Dr. McClure asked the students to ponder and think about these words of Paul, as well as: "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue; and if there be any praise, think on these things". Philippians 4:8. His message to all students this year was centered completely in those words, said Dr. McClure.

A total of 229 new students, an increase over last year of 46 students, have enrolled for the 1952-53 year. Of that total, 197 are freshmen (115 men and 82 women), 19 are transfer students from other colleges and universities, seven are special students, and six are former Ursinus students who have been readmitted. The total enrollment this year is approximately 680.

Among the students are a boy and a girl of special interest. ISOLINA TORRES comes to Ursinus from Honduras, Central America, as the recipient of the scholarship by the National Youth Fellowship.

CHRISTIAN DE LA ROCHE is a French citizen, the son of a French diplomat who is an official of the U. N. O. Christian has had a very interesting life, following his father in various assignments in African colonies. He comes to Ursinus as a transfer after a year at Fordham University.

Included, too, in this year's enrollment are about 10 Korean veterans.

URSINUS MOURNS THE DEATH OF DR. BROWNBACK

Ursinus was deeply grieved by the death of one of its most beloved professors when Dr. J. Harold Brownback died after a lengthy illness on July 14, 1952.

Dr. Brownback had been the head of the Department of Biology at Ursinus for 26 years, and was known and respected by a great and wide circle of friends and associates. His greatest interest at the College was centered on his pre-medical students; and Ursinus doctors, as well as the various medical schools with whom Dr. Brownback had contact, will always remember his tireless efforts to aid would-be doctors, and to prove over and over again to the medical schools that Ursinus sent the very best men to them for further study. But it was not only the "pre-medders" who will miss this teacher. He was long associated with the Student Activities Committee and many other committees of the College; and took an active and interested part in just about everything the students planned on the campus. As an alumnus of the college, he took an active part in the affairs of the Alumni Association for many years; and just recently had been reelected as one of the faculty representatives to the Alumni Executive Board.

Born on September 19, 1897, in Trappe, Pa., the son of Edwin G. and the late Mary V. (Beaver) Brownback, he continued to make his home there with his wife, LOIS HOOK BROWNBACK, '20, until his death.

He was graduated from Collegeville High School in 1916, and he received his B.A. degree in science from Ursinus in 1921. In 1937, Ursinus College be-

stowed on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science.

During World War I, from 1917 to 1919, Dr. Brownback served in the U. S. Navy in a chemical testing section, checking steel and steel products purchased by the government for Navy use.

In 1921, Dr. Brownback was awarded a teaching fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania and was assigned to teach biology there. But in 1926, he was called back to Ursinus College and appointed head of the biology department; and in 1934, he became a full professor of that subject.

He was a member of the Sigma Xi, a scientific fraternity; the American Association for the Advancement of Science; the American Entomological Society; and the Pennsylvania Historical Society.

One of his hobbies was palaeontology, the study of fossils, and he spent much time in the collection of local fossils. He was very much interested in folklore, especially Pennsylvania Dutch folklore, and his home contains a wealth of Pennsylvania Dutch furniture, china and glassware, all of which he loved and was very proud.

Active in community service for many years, he was a member of the Lower Perkiomen Rotary Club, president of the Mingo Express Horse Co., and the Montgomery County Health and Welfare Council. He was also a member of the Augustus Lutheran Church of Trappe.

Dr. Brownback was indeed a man whose influence and guidance will be long-remembered.

Contributors to the Alumni Memorial Scholarship Fund

Nearly four years ago the alumni set out to raise \$100,000 for the Alumni Memorial Scholarship Fund in memory of the Ursinus men who gave their lives in the service of their country 1941-1945. To date the alumni have contributed

\$61,000, and the gifts of others have brought the total to \$97,000. The total of gifts and bequests for all purposes during the four-year period is \$443,000.

JESSIE ROYER GREAVES CELEBRATES 60th REUNION

Our congratulations and best wishes go to JESSIE ROYER GREAVES, Class of 1892, who returned to the campus on Alumni Day to celebrate the 60th anniversary of her graduation from Ursinus. It was particularly appropriate for her to be celebrating such an event this year, since her great niece, ANN ROYER, was being graduated as a member of the Class of 1952. Many alumni will remember Dr. Greaves as the sister of MRS. MAE ROYER RAUCH, '86, for many years preceptress of Maples Hall.

It was a thrill and a challenge to hear Mrs. Greaves speak to the group of alumni at the Buffet Supper. And yet the life's work of this remarkable woman is an even greater thrill and challenge for everyone.

In 1898 she went to Emerson College in Boston, Mass., to prepare for public speaking where, she said, she learned not only public speaking, but also the value of service, and was "unintentionally" trained to be a teacher.

Fifty years ago she became a teacher of physical expression and declamation in the Overbrook School for Blind; and for 25 years taught those handicapped children to appear and to express themselves as seeing people. Overbrook pupils gained the reputation of being the most normal pupils in any school for blind in our country.

When mental tests for blind were introduced and a number of pupils were dismissed from Overbrook, she established her own school for blind children who could be trained for usefulness in an environment other than that of a large regimented institution. Despite bitter opposition from the Principal of the Overbrook School and others whom he could influence, she managed to build up her school through many years of deprivation and very hard work.

Today, after thirty years, Royer-Greaves School has proved that the retarded blind child can be trained for social fitness. Not only does the school receive appeals from all parts of our own country, but is asked to help blind children from South America as well.

KENNETH FINK A NATIONAL POLLSTER

With the nation election-minded and polls being taken far and wide, Ursinusites turn with interest to one of its alumni, KENNETH FINK, '27.

On April 1, 1947, Mr. Fink, in a converted office in his home, brought forth the first New Jersey Poll; and a year and a half later, his Princeton Research Service correctly called the turn in New Jersey while others were foundering at the national level.

This year, under the name "The U. S. Poll", Mr. Fink and his associates began national syndication of their survey findings through King Features. Upwards of a hundred newspapers in all major cities carry the weekly releases, which will culminate in November with a prediction on the outcome of the presidential election.

The Princeton Research Service has never been wrong in its pre-election prediction, has never had a variance of more than four percent and is frequently within one or two percentage points of the results it forecasts. His executive assistant is his wife, the former MARGARET SPENCE, '30, whom he met while both were students at Ursinus.

Mr. Fink's belief on poll-taking technique is that "anybody can make up a cross section — it's the proper interviewing procedure that counts".

PAUL MATTIS JOINS SKF AS HEAD OF PHARMACOLOGY

DR. PAUL A. MATTIS, '30, former Assistant Professor of Pharmacology at Western Reserve University School of Medicine, has joined the research staff of Smith, Kline & French Laboratories, Philadelphia pharmaceutical firm, as head of the Pharmacology Section.

While at Western Reserve University, Dr. Mattis also served as Assistant Professor of Pharmacology at the School of Dentistry, Senior Instructor in Radiology, and Chief of the Radiation Toxicology Section of the Atomic Energy Research Project. He was a consultant and member of the Research Council of Strong, Cobb & Company, Inc. Previously, Dr. Mattis was Professor of Pharmacognosy and Pharmacology at the University of Florida; and served as Assistant Director of Pharmacological Research at Sharp & Dohme, Inc.

After being graduated from Ursinus, Dr. Mattis studied at Jefferson Medical College and received the D.Sc. degree in 1932. He followed this with four years of graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. His special research interest is in the toxicology of fissionable materials and treatment of radiation injury.

TWO URSINUS ALUMNI WORK TOGETHER AT AGAPE

LOIS EHLMAN, '51, sent the Alumni Office the following news of her interesting and worthwhile summer which was shared by DOROTHY MARPLE, '48.

During July, I attended an International Christian Work Camp at Agape, located high in the Italian Alps. Agape is a Waldensian conference ground, one mile from the small village of Guigo. The Waldensian church is the oldest Protestant church in Europe, dating back to the twelfth century.

On shipboard, we had been warned that our hardest job at work camp would be to work with the Europeans — their way. It is hard to forget "American efficiency", but we tried. We ate spaghetti and pasta asciutta every day, and we slept in our sleeping bags on straw sacks. The days were hot, even though we always saw snow on the mountain peaks, so we worked Italian hours, from 8 to 12, and 3 to 7. Each night after dinner, we had a short and meaningful worship service, often followed by political and religious discussions. In our free time, we were constantly getting to know our new friends better.

We were 65 in number, and half of this group were Italians. The remainder were from other European countries and the United States. Probably those who sacrificed most to come to Agape were the two young men from the Eastern sector of Germany, for they took the chance that they would not be missed by any Communist officials during their absence from home. It was a great surprise and thrill when I discovered that one of the other Americans going to Agape was DOROTHY MARPLE, Ursinus, '48.

Our job this summer was to build a playground behind Agape and a lawn in front. This meant simply flattening out the side of a mountain, so most of our work consisted of pick and shovelling. A bulldozer could have done in six months what it has taken these people six summers to complete with their hands, and yet with a bulldozer, Agape wouldn't have been Agape. For here, language, educational, and cultural barriers disappeared in the common medium of work. This is proof that people of many nations can work together peacefully and have a wonderful time doing it.

Sports Review

COACH GURZYNSKI LOOKS OVER THE GRIZZLIES

Coach Ray Gurzynski believes that the 1952 football season should be one of the best in recent years. Returning lettermen and very promising newcomers make the outlook a bright one.

The loss of eleven starters from the offensive-defensive line-up make a rebuilding job a big problem, but if the center, quarterback, and defensive halfback spots come along, there will be cause for optimism.

Thumbnail Sketches of the 1952-53 Football Squad:

CAPTAIN ROBERT "ROCKY" DAVIS: senior; 6', 180 lbs.; tackle; from Sewickley, Pa.; an aggressive three-year veteran; equally tough on offensive and defense; an inspiring leader; should lead the Grizzlies to their best season in twenty years.

ROBERT "BOB" SWETT: senior; 6' 9", 205 lbs.; end; from Madison, N. J.; should prove a very important cog in the passing attack; a fine blocker and pass-catcher on offensive; plays a rough game as defensive end or tackle.

HERB "HERBIE" BENNETT: senior; 5' 7", 165 lbs.; guard; from Clifton Heights, Pa.; a "watch charm" guard who likes it best when the going is rough; a fine blocker; also shines on defense either as a lineman or line-backer.

HOWARD "HOWIE" ROBERTS: senior; 5' 10", 160 lbs.; halfback; line-backer; from Long Beach, California; has proven to be a keen diagnostician of offensive maneuvers and has the knack of being in the heart of the play.

ORIN "HOOTY" HOUSER: junior; 6', 170 lbs.; end; from Perkiomen Prep School; one of the finest defensive ends in recent Ursinus football history; catches almost as many ball-carriers attempting to run the other end as his own.

BEN MALIKEN: junior; 5' 8", 180 lbs.; from Asbury Park, N. J.; a battering-ram type of fullback; a power on offense and a bone-crushing defensive line-backer; hampered by injuries the last two years; seems at last destined to demonstrate his ability when in top physical condition.

DICK GLOCK: junior; 5' 10", 165 lbs.; halfback; from Maywood, N. J.; a fast, elusive, hard-hitting, high-scoring boy who tallied eight touchdowns last year; an all-the-way threat everytime he carries the ball.

JOHN ANDERSON: junior; 6' 1", 195 lbs.; guard; from Carlisle, Pa.; a tower of strength both offensively and defensively; one of the roughest guards in Ursinus history; asks no quarter—gives none.

MARTY BOYER: junior; 5' 10", 185 lbs.; tackle; from Far Rockaway, N. Y.; very rugged, fast and aggressive defensive player; tough to dislodge; shifty enough to catch plays going to the other side.

JOE TOTINO: senior; 5' 8", 170 lbs.; back; from Chester, Pa.; yet untried under game conditions, but has shown promise of being an able replacement both on offense and defense.

"TAPP" WEBB: junior; 6', 180 lbs.; tackle; from Upper Darby, Pa.; playing his third year for Ursinus; has proven to be a very dependable man on both defense and offense.

ED SELLA: junior; 5' 9", 170 lbs.; end; from Dunellan, N. J.; has shown fine blocking and pass-catching ability on offense; has played a tough brand of game at defensive end.

Samuel L. Hertzog, 1878

MR. SAMUEL L. HERTZOG died on March 8, 1951. He was in his 99th year. His home had been in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Thaddeus S. Krause, LL.B., '87

MR. THADDEUS S. KRAUSE, Pennsylvania state senator from the Eighth District from 1923 to 1934, died on May 12, 1952, at the Fairview Nursing Home, Chestnut Hill, Pa.

After Mr. Krause was graduated from Ursinus College, he studied law at the University of Pennsylvania and received the LL.B. degree in 1891.

He was a member of the Philadelphia Bar Association for 60 years, and also a member of the Pennsylvania Bar Association.

During the Pinchot administration, he was chairman of the George Washington National Memorial Committee for Pennsylvania. In 1933, he headed a senate committee which investigated the Public Service Commission.

Howard Ursinus Miller, M.D., '02

DR. HOWARD URSINUS MILLER died on September 29, 1952 at the Reading Hospital after a lengthy illness.

Dr. Miller, a practicing physician, was chief of the medical staff of Reading Hospital from 1935 until his retirement in 1946 when he became a consultant. He had been president of the Board of Health of the Mount Penn Borough since 1922, and medical examiner of Berks County Schools.

After his graduation from Ursinus fifty years ago in June, he attended the Medico-Chirurgical College where he received his M.D. degree.

An active and highly-esteemed physician and public servant, Dr. Miller held many and various posts including the presidency of the Berks County Medical Society and directorship of the Mt. Penn Trust Co. He had also been an elder in the First Reformed Church of Reading. He was a member of the A. M. A., the Pennsylvania State Medical Association, the Chamber of Commerce, the Wyomissing Club, and the Masonic Lodge.

At the May meeting of the Reading Regional Alumni Group, Dr. Miller was named honorary president of the group.

He is survived by his wife, the former BERTHA E. SHPE, '05, and his son, DR. EUGENE H. MILLER, '33, Professor of Political Science at Ursinus College.

J. Linwood Eisenberg, PH.D., LL.D., '06

THE REV. DR. J. LINWOOD EISENBERG, active churchman and schoolman, died on Tuesday, September 2, 1952, at Chambersburg Hospital, Chambersburg, Pa., of a cerebral hemorrhage.

After serving as president of Slippery Rock College from 1917 to 1934, Dr. Eisenberg went

to Shippensburg State Teachers College and served as chairman of the education department, Professor of Psychology and acting Dean of Instruction until 1939. From 1938 until his retirement in 1948, Dr. Eisenberg, a minister of the Church of the Brethren, served as pastor of the Shippensburg congregation.

Born in Chester county, he was graduated from Juniata College with the bachelor of education degree in 1895; received the A.B. and A.M. degrees from Ursinus College in 1906 and 1908 respectively; and the Ph.D. degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 1913. In 1928 Grove City College conferred on him the honorary degree of doctor of laws. Dr. Eisenberg was ordained a minister in 1902; and served his first charge at Royersford, Pennsylvania. He also served pastorates in Germantown, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and in West Chester, Pennsylvania.

During his forty-four years of education work, Dr. Eisenberg served as principal of the grade school at Royersford, Pennsylvania, where he later served as a teacher in the high school and for seven years as supervising principal of the Royersford Schools. For two years he headed the department of education at West Chester State Teachers College and for three years was superintendent of schools at Chester City.

Ralph L. Roth, '08

MR. RALPH L. ROTH, supervising principal, Spring Grove, Pa., died in May 1952.

After his graduation from Ursinus College, Mr. Roth received the M.A. degree from Gettysburg College in 1933.

Starting his teaching career in 1908 in Nashville, Pa., he taught at Lansdale, Pa.; Branchdale, Pa.; the Philippine Islands; and finally at Spring Grove, Pa., where he became supervising principal in 1918.

Hiram F. J. Seneker, D.D., (Honorary, '12)

THE REV. DR. HIRAM F. J. SENEKER, pastor of Pottstown's Transfiguration Lutheran Church, died on April 24, 1952, at the age of 89 years.

He began his life as a teacher, but turned to the ministry; and prior to his pastorate in Pottstown, he served St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Easton, Pa.

On May 15, 1912, he went to the Pottstown congregation where he remained until May 31, 1937. He continued to assist the present pastor of the church, Rev. Theodore Fischer, at Communion services, until about five years ago when he was no longer strong enough to do so.

Henry J. Herber, D.D., '11

THE REV. HENRY J. HERBER, a member of the board of directors of Ursinus College and the pastor of St. Mark's Evangelical and Re-

formed Church in Lebanon, Pa., since 1933, died on April 14, 1952, of a heart attack. Dr. N. E. McClure spoke at the funeral services.

After attending Berks County public schools, Rev. Herber was graduated from Kutztown State Normal School, Ursinus College and Central Theological Seminary, Dayton, Ohio. He was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree by Ursinus in 1942, and was named a member of the board of directors of Ursinus College in 1947.

In addition to serving St. Mark's Church and Calvary Chapel in Reinholdsville, Pa., a mission of St. Mark's Church, Rev. Herber was vitally interested in the welfare of the community at large, and was a leader in numerous civic and welfare movements. He was particularly interested in his work in the Family and Children's Service, serving as president of the board of this organization since 1945 when it was formed by merging the Children's Aid Society and the Associated Charities.

In connection with his church activities, he acted as general chairman of the Committee on Evangelism of the General Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and was chairman of the Kingdom Service Committee of the Lancaster Synod. He also served as president of the Leadership Training School at Lebanon Valley College.

Prior to his call to Lebanon, he had served pastorates at Marion and Dayton, Ohio, and at Butler and Orwigsburg, Pa.

Surviving are his wife, Blanche (Colvin) Herber; one son, ROBERT C. HERBER, '51; and one daughter, CAROLYN HERBER, '52. Another son, ENSIGN DENTON HERBER, '42, was killed in action while serving with the U. S. Navy in the Pacific during World War II.

Robert C. Wells, D.D., (Honorary, '21)

THE REV. ROBERT C. WELLS, a former pastor of the First M. E. Church, Norristown, Pa., died after being stricken with a brain hemorrhage in the pulpit of the Emmanuel Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa.

In the ministry for 48 years, Dr. Wells served as dean of the Collegeville Epworth League Institute for ten years, and was superintendent of the South District of the Philadelphia Conference from 1930 until 1936. He also served a term as president of the Philadelphia Federation of Churches.

He served as secretary of the Philadelphia Annual Conference of Churches for 16 years, and was chairman of the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association and leader of the young people's meeting there for 20 years. For eight years he was a member of the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church.

Other charges served by Dr. Wells included

St. Andrew's, Llanerch, and several Philadelphia churches.

Walter V. Molitor, '26

MR. WALTER V. MOLITOR, Swedesboro, N. J., teacher of chemistry, died suddenly of coronary thrombosis at his summer home in Townsend's Inlet, N. J., this summer.

After his graduation from Ursinus, Mr. Molitor worked as a chemist at E. I. duPont de Nemours Co., at Deep Water, N. J. In 1932, he enrolled in the Temple University School of Education; and left the duPont Co. to teach Chemistry in Gloucester High School.

He is survived by his wife, LILLIAN MOSIA MOLITOR, '27, and a sixteen-year old daughter.

Charles A. May, '28

MR. CHARLES A. MAY, Spring City, Pa. died on March 27, 1952, after suffering a heart attack while driving on Route 663, near Pottsville, on his way home from Allentown, Pa. His sedan went out of control, swerved off the highway, and crashed into a guard rail.

Mr. May, a sales representative for a meat packing firm, had driven to Allentown on a business trip.

Mrs. Pierce Van Keuren (Margaret H. Ozias), '28
