At 7:30 P.M. the meeting to discuss the budget and other town affairs was opened by Charles H. Whittier, moderator; and the remaining articles in the warrant were voted upon with the following results.

Article 2: It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72,759.00 to defray town charges as follows:

Article 3: The sum of \$35,900.00 was raised and appropriated for Highway Purposes as follows:

Winter	Maintenance	 13,500.00

Article 4: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for Nursing Services.

Article 5: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Memorial Day and other Patriotic Purposes.

Article 6: It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies on the credit of the town from time to time, to pay current maintenance and operation expenses for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 towards the maintenance of the Littleton Hospital for the ensuing year.

Article 8: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$860.01 for Town Road Aid.

Article 9: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the control of Ragweed.

Article 10: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Band Concerts.

Article 11: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the White Mountains Region Association and Town Signs.

Article 12: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Advertising and/or Related Purposes.

Article 13: It was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 to maintain an information booth during the Summer Season of 1962.

Article 14: A motion was made by Fred Stevenson to raise \$600.00. An amendment to this motion was made by Lewis Roberts to make the motion read \$1,000.00. The vote on the amendment carried and then the amended motion was voted and the sum of \$1,000.00 was raised and appropriated to construct, operate and maintain, or participate in the construction, operation and maintenance of a ski tow with appropriate facilities on a site to be approved by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 15: It was voted that in the future Town Meetings, the polls would open at 7:00 A.M. and close at 6:00 P.M. and the budget part of the Town Meeting shall take place at 7:30 P.M.

There was much discussion regarding the disposal of garbage and rubbish but it was finally voted to leave these matters to the discretion of the Selectmen.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting was adjourned.

Due to an emergency it was impossible for moderator Charles H. Whittier to officiate from 9:00 A.M. until 6:00 P.M. Therefore, the Supervisors appointed George T. Noyes acting moderator for these hours. This left a vacancy in the office of town clerk and Selectmen appointed Floyd S. Brown to act as town clerk during the same period. At 6:00 P.M. the moderator, Charles H. Whittier returned to his post which released Town Clerk, George T. Noyes to return to his duties as town clerk. These two duly selected officers carried out their duties at the evening session.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Bethlehem:

The school board herewith submits its annual report. This report includes the treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1961 to June 30, 1962 with a statement of receipts and expenditures, budgets and estimated receipts for the present school year and for the next school year, written reports by the superintendent of schools, the principal of the high school and the school nurse.

We recommend to you a budget of \$108,448.91 for the ensuing year, with an assessment of \$104,698.91 to be raised by the town for the support of schools.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bethlehem:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your school.

A number of changes have taken place on the faculty since my last report. Mrs. Edith Stevenson of Bethlehem, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, with previous experience in Sugar Hill, North Stratford and Littleton, was appointed to teach grade one, replacing Mrs. Swedenborg who resigned in June. Mrs. Louise Smith of Lisbon, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was appointed to teach remedial reading. Mr. Charles E. Day of North Hampton, a graduate of Boston University, with previous experience in Athol, Mass., and North Hampton, N. H., was appointed to replace Mrs. Judith Millen who resigned for family reasons in June. Mrs. Claramond H. Morrill of Lancaster, a graduate of Randolph Macon Woman's College, with a Master's degree from Welleslev, was appointed junior high teacher to replace Mrs. Allison Buxton who resigned in May for health reasons. Mrs. Elizabeth Burrill of Littleton, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire., was appointed to teach French and English, replacing Miss Shirley Fowlie who resigned to get married. Mrs. Linda P. Gordon, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with previous experience in Penacook, was elected to teach Business Education replacing Mrs. Mosher who resigned because of change of address. Mr. David B. Davis of Bridgton, Maine, a graduate of the University of Maine, with previous experience in Old Town and Unity, Maine was appointed to teach mathematics and physics, replacing Mrs. Pauline Keach who resigned for family reasons. Mr. Bruce McGinley of Whitefield, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was appointed to teach Social Studies, English and coach athletics, replacing Mr. Bernard Bouchard who resigned to spend full time in business. Mr. William H. Marston of Gorham, New Hampshire, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and with 28 semester hours credit beyond the Bachelor's degree, with experience in Warren and Gorham, was appointed principal and teacher of science, replacing Walter Tibbetts who resigned to accept employment in another area.

During this past summer a room was renovated in the basement to be used as a classroom. This has turned out to be very satisfactory. Blackboard and bulletin space is needed to further improve it for classroom use. The entire asphalt roof of the building was replaced and new flashing applied. Both roof and flashing carry a 20-year bond. All outside woodwork was painted and minor repairs were made inside the building. Boilers and stokers were put into condition for the new year. The fixed furniture was removed from the third and fourth grade room and new movable furniture was provided.

Enrollment figures and curriculum will be covered in the principal's report.

Concern for the future of Bethlehem High School is evident as a result of the implementation of the new minimum standards effective September 1963 for an academic high school. If Bethlehem is to meet these standards, it will be necessary to add both space and teaching staff. The new standards however have accepted the mandate of the legislature in defining all aspects of an approved high school. This means that the academic high school must provide a college preparatory course and a non-college course. If a high school does not provide both it must provide for tui-

tion transfers. Pupils desiring Home Economics and Mechanic Arts could also apply for tuition transfer. This could very well place a heavy financial burden on the school district.

I sincerely hope that the citizens of Bethlehem will consider the high school situation very seriously and arrive at a solution that will best meet the needs of its pupils. You are about to make a serious decision and it should not be taken lightly.

I recommend very strongly that you abandon any idea of trying to continue Bethlehem High School as an approved academic high school. I feel certain the costs will be excessive and the results disappointing. I would suggest you ask yourself one question. Are not my children entitled to the same opportunities as those provided for children in other areas in the state?

On other pages of this report can be found the statistical report, school lunch report, nurse's report, teachers for the present school year, principal's report and tentative calendar for the school year 1963-1964.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the citizens of Bethlehem, the school board, teaching staff and other school personnel for their cooperation.

Subject: Annual School Report

The total present enrollment of grades 1 through 12 for the 1962-1963 school year is 181. Our present elementary enrollment is 120 for grades 1-8. Twelve students have been dropped from the elementary enrollment since September due to transfers. Our present high school enrollment is 61. Four high school students have left school since September due to transfers or for other reasons.

The present high school curriculum is designed to offer both general and college preparations in the social sciences, English, mathematics, business, French, and science areas. With the exception of one math class all courses are homogeneously grouped. This means that students taking the general non-college preparatory courses are in classes with the college preparatory students. The individual classes are taught so as to sufficiently challenge and prepare those students with higher learning potential but at the same time present material geared for the slower learner. Although twenty academic courses of a college preparatory caliber are offered, only 16 are taught this year because of the dependence on alternating courses.

There have been several curriculum changes this year in the various academic areas. In order to reorganize our business offerings in light of presently accepted ways, and in view of the fact that of 17 girls in the sophomore class 16 of them are desirous of pre-

paring for a business career, certain steps were taken to put our business offerings on a more sequential schedule. We are presently offering typing I to 16 sophomores. Fourteen of these students are also taking shorthand I. In order to make typing I available to this many students, three classes a day have been scheduled. Typing II is offered to 5 juniors. We are offering personal typing to 9 juniors and seniors for the last half year. Next year we will offer general business at the freshman level, typing I at the sophomore level, typing II and shorthand I at the junior level, bookkeeping and clerical and secretarial office practice at the senior level. In so doing we have attempted to reschedule shorthand I so that it is taken with typing II. For this year typing I students have also taken shorthand I as this was feasible in light of the initial change. For next year's freshman class the business curriculum will offer a number of courses organized on a sequential basis from grades 9-12.

The French offerings have been enriched by the addition of French III to the curriculum. This enables our French II people to continue on in the language area. It is our hope to add French IV to the curriculum another year and thereby provide four years of a foreign language at Bethlehem High School.

At present we are introducing a physical education program to include grades 1-12. Currently we have grades 1-6 involved in various activities. Before the end of the current year we will have the 7th and 8th grades and the senior high school organized on a participating basis.

Opportunities are provided in the co-curricular activities to satisfy student interest and to provide areas where social and civic responsibilities can be emphasized. Soccer, basketball, and baseball are offered to

boys in grades 1-12 and basketball is offered to the girls in grades 1-12. Girls' cheerleading is also offered. The senior class play and school minstrel will be produced this Spring.

PRINCIPAL'S RECOMMENDATIONS

In light of the newly proposed minimum standards set forth by the State Department of Education it is my recommendation that the following areas be given careful consideration if we are to provide the necessary number of courses organized in such a manner as to satisfy the requirements for an approved high school. Some of the recommendations concern the elementary school and do not apply to our meeting the minimum standards for our secondary school.

- 1. French IV should be added to the curriculum.
- 2. Adequate space for a suitable library should be provided.
- 3. A qualified, part-time librarian should be added to the staff, or one of our own staff members should be given adequate training in this area.
- 4. Academic courses should be organized on separate levels of instruction. College preparatory courses should be offered and only students with the academic potential should be in this division. Students not taking college preparatory courses should be in separate classes where the material is geared to their level of learning.
- 5. The present third and fourth grades should be divided into two separate classrooms.
- 6. The present fifth and sixth grades should be divided into two separate classrooms.
- 7. Academic classes should be integrated down as far as the sixth grade for next year.

8. I wish to quote from a report returned to the Superintendent of Schools from Mr. C. Paul Quimby of the Division of Instruction at the State Department of Education concerning his brief evaluation of Bethlehem High School last November 13, 1962:

"The standard requiring ten academic courses of a non-college level will create the need for more teachers in this particular high school. If the district decides not to offer any one of those non-college courses, the course so omitted would then become available to any pupil as a justifiable reason for transfer to a comprehensive high school. There does not seem to be any question that the district has the obligation to make those transfer opportunities known and available to their pupils. Thus, any consideration of running a limited curriculum and seeking approval as a non-comprehensive high school must be viewed alongside the possible expense to the district which would be involved in such tuition transfers. This office cannot possibly make such a comparative assessment.

"It should be clear however, that the limited kind of school approval would not require the school to offer any non-college preparatory courses in the academic area, would not require practical arts courses in business, home economics, or industrial arts, would not require a guidance program and any fine arts courses. All such courses would be available for tuition transfer if they are not offered at Bethlehem. All other aspects of the standards would apply: the same variety of college preparatory; academic courses would be needed; the same administrative and supervisory arrangements would be required; the same standards would apply for the facilities and equipment."

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the superintendent of schools, members of the school
