Moderator Alistair MacBain called the meeting to order at 8:34 P.M. in the Town Building. The Moderator began by making apologies for starting late, due to a 70% turn-out of voters.

Article 1. Acted upon by ballot vote. The Moderator read the results of Article 1, and declared the following duly elected: Karleen J. Sanborn, Town Clerk: Daniel Tucker, Selectmen: Nancy Dickowski, Treasurer: Pauline Keach, Tax Collector: Howard Sanborn, Constable: Theodore O. Read III, Road Agent: Barbara M. Gabaup, Melanie Harding, Cheryl Sargent, Library Trustees: Trustee of Trust Funds, both two and three year terms, to be determined by the Selectmen.

Article 2. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 3. Acted Upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 4. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 5. Acted upon by ballot and failed.

Article 6. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 7. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Selectman Gerald Davidson announced that the Town Attorney had been consulted regarding Article 6, as it is a conflicting situation. The Article is legal but could be contested.

The Moderator made several public service announcements:

(a) There would be no smoking allowed in the meeting.

(b) The Girl Scouts were providing refreshments in the hall.

(c) We have microphones this year and the meeting is being recorded so please stand and state your name when recognized.

(d) All nonresidents will not be voting so please move to the sides of the hall.

Article 8. (539,857.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same:

With considerable discussion amendments were made, seconded, duly voted and carried to increase Officers Expenses by \$1,600.00 for the purchase of a P.A. system: To increase the Police Department appropriation by \$2,400.00 for the purchase of radar, and expenses relating thereto: and to increase Parks, Pool, Playground, Little League by \$650.00 for the purchase of Little League uniforms.

Article 10. (\$898.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred ninety-eight dollars (\$898.00) for the Hazardous Waste Program.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 11. (\$1,500.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Littleton Hospital.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 12. (\$3,576.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,576.00 for the North Country Home Health Agency, Inc.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 13. (\$2,771.40 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,771.40 for the White Mountain Mental Health Center.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 14. (\$840.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$840.00 for Community Action Outreach Program.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 15. (\$1,217.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,217.00 for the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 16. (\$1,593.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,593.00 for North Country Council, Inc.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 17. (\$500.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission.

With a short explanation the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 18. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety-two thousand dollars (\$92,000.00) for the purpose of constructing a new bridge on Wing Road, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds for a sum not to exceed ninety-two thousand (\$92,000.00) and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds and shall be in the best interests of the Town. The total estimated cost of the project is nine

hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$920,000.00), seventy percent (70%) of which is to be paid by the federal government, twenty percent (20%) of which is to be paid by the State of New Hampshire and ten percent (10%) of which is to be paid by the Town. (by two-thirds ballot vote only).

After considerable discussion a motion was made and seconded to pass over the Article. The motion was duly voted and carried.

RESULT: The Article was passed over.

Article 19. (\$19,500.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$19,500.00) for repairs to the Town bridge on Wing Road.

With considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 20. (\$12,344.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Three Hundred Forty Four Dollars (\$12,344.00) for repairs to the Town Building.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 21. (\$27,000.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to establish the Town of Bethlehem Re-evaluation Capital Reserve Fund: to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Seven Thousand Dollars (\$27,000.00) to be raised from tax revenues: to transfer to said account Seventy Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$72,500.00) plus all accumulated interest currently in a Certificate of Deposit and raised in accordance with Article 17 of the 1984 Town Warrant.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 22. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectpersons to administer the Capital Reserve Fund established for the re-evaluation of the Town.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 23. (\$1,500.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) for snowmobile trail maintenance with funds to be expended at the discretion of the Board of Selectpersons.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 24. (\$15,000.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for repairs to the Bethlehem Country Club clubhouse, parking areas and golf course.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 25. (\$4,407.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,407.00 for the Upper Grafton Solid Waste District.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 26. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to lease a portion of the former Reed property (Map 203-25 of the town maps) to the North Country Council, Inc. upon such conditions and terms, and subject to such agreement as they deem prudent and necessary, pursuant to RSA 31:3.

After considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 27. (\$2,200.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 to be placed in the Town of Bethlehem Recreation Fund. Said amount to be appropriated from any rental paid by North Country Council, Inc. as provided in Article 26 and not from tax revenues.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 28. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to establish a fund pursuant to RSA 31:19-a for recreational purposes to be called the Town of Bethlehem Recreation Fund. The Board of Selectpersons shall have the authority to request from the Trustees of Trust Funds such principal and interest in the fund as they deem necessary and prudent to carry out the purposes of said fund.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 29. (\$800.00 appropriated) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cost-share with landowners the expense of hiring a professional forester to oversee timber harvests on their lands within the

Town. Said cost-share amount shall be determined by the Selectmen and shall not exceed 10% of the actual timber yield tax revenues paid by the landowner to the Town; and further to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for this purpose.

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 30. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's Representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within the Town of Bethlehem unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

After little discussion an amendment was made, seconded, duly voted and carried, to eliminate Seabrook and add "from any source".

RESULT: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's Representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from any source shall be stored or disposed of within the Town of Bethlehem unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot. After little additional discussion the amended Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 31. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to adopt "The Poetry Capital of New Hampshire" as the motto for the Town.

After an explanation the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 32. It was moved and seconded Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:0-c which authorize any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax?

With considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and failed.

Article 33. (\$15,000.00 authorized) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, and/or Anti-recession Funds for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated, or take any other action hereon, however, said Revenue not to be raised from Property Taxes:

After a brief explanation the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 34. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 35. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction or advertised sealed bids.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 36. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectpersons to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of Taxes to be collected for the year 1987 and to be paid therefrom.

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 37. (\$60,000.00 authorized) It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use (\$40,000.00) of surplus monies to aid in defraying the current year's budget (1987) and ease the effect on the tax rate.

An amendment was made, seconded, duly voted, and carried, to increase the amount to \$60,000.00.

RESULT: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use (\$60,000.00) of surplus monies to aid in defraying the current year's budget (1987) and ease the effect on the tax rate. With no other discussion the amended Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 38. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to contract with the Franconia-Sugar Hill-Easton-Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce to operate the Town's information booth and handle advertising and related items upon such conditions and terms, and subject to such agreement as they deem prudent and necessary, pursuant to RSA 31:3.

After discussion an amendment was made, seconded, duly voted and carried, to delete "Franconia-Sugar Hill-Easton."

RESULT: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectpersons to contract with the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce to operate the Town's information booth and handle advertising and related items upon such conditions and terms, and subject to such agreement as they deem prudent and necessary, pursuant to RSA 31:3. With no additional discussion the amended Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 39. It was moved and seconded To see if the Town will vote to establish a conservation fund to be administered by the conservation committee pursuant to RSA 36-A:5.

After considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 40. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

It was moved and seconded to change the name of the Bethlehem Country Club to the Town of Bethlehem Public Golf Course. After some discussion the motion was duly voted and failed.

It was asked that the Selectmen consider planting wild flowers in beds along Main Street.

It was moved, seconded, and agreed to adjourn the meeting.

The Moderator adjourned the meeting at 12:01 AM.

TOWN OF BETHLEHEM TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bethlehem, in the County of Grafton, and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Building in said Bethlehem on Tuesday, the eighth day of March 1988 at nine o'clock in the forenoon (the polls to close at 6:00 p.m.; business meeting to be held at the Town Building at 8:00 p.m.), to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. (*Ballot vote*)

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

This amendment would replace Part 3b which deals with increasing the density of condominium units. (*Ballot vote*)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

This amendment clarifies the procedures for the granting of special exceptions. (*Ballot vote*)

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee for the purpose of reviewing proposals for the acquisition and development of the property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed described as Lot 205, Map 120. The committee would consist of one Selectman, one member from the Bethlehem Redevelopment Association, one member from the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce, and two members from the Town voting list. The committee, in conjunction with the Selectmen, would screen the various proposals and the Selectmen would place an Article on the 1989 Town Warrant to see if the Town would vote to accept one of said proposals.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of funding the position of Zoning and Building Inspector.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a road system in the Peppersass Woods development off Swasey Lane, as approved by the Bethlehem Planning Board, upon satisfactory completion to T.R.A. specifications and to the satisfaction of the Town Road Agent and the Board of Selectmen. (*By petition*)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will amend the dog ordinance to require one complaint in writing instead of three complaints in writing. (*By petition*)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to reopen the Bethlehem Town Dump to operate as it has in the past; receiving household waste with its traditional hours of operation. (*By petition*)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in accordance with RSA 80:42 III, to dispose of tax deeded property described as "the Corliss property", Lot 33 and Lot 40, map 416, and the "Herbert property", Lot 54, Map 411, as justice may require.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$13,500.00) to purchase a new police cruiser.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.00) for equipment and portable toilet facilities for the Town golf course.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 14. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. *(By petition) (Ballot vote required)*

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, and to further authorize the Selectmen to sell any other personal property owned by the Town which is no longer used for municipal purposes. In every instance, sale shall be by public auction, or advertised sealed bids.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1988 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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SELECTMENS REPORT

Another year has come to an end. It was a very busy one and we in the Selectmen's Office would like to share some of the highlights with you.

COUNTRY CLUB:

Using the committee report along with the Selectmen's views we proceeded to structure the Golf Course.

- A. We took over the financial management of the Golf Course.
- B. The Pro managed the Pro Shop, Snack Bar, Bar, and Golf Lessons as his enterprise.
- C. The Pro had more time to generate business for the Club in daily play, memberships, and tournaments.
- D. Adding Al Morancie as Greenskeeper was very successful. The Golf Course was put back in shape. Comment from the players and members "The Course is better than it ever was."
- E. The Town, this year because of poor existing available equipment had to purchase a greensmower and a greens top dresser. This was purchased on a rental payment plan to be paid out of our budget. Beginning with the year 1990 we will own this equipment. We were allowed to use an apron and tee mower along with a greensire 16" for leveling, drainage and seeding the greens, with hopes that we might purchase same at this Town Meeting under Article 12. We need this equipment to keep our Course in top shape.

THE RESULTS OF ALL THIS:

- A. Golfers report that our Course is in excellent shape.
- B. Membership increased by 29%.
- C. Daily play increased by 56%.
- D. Cart use (Town Share) increased by 47%.
- E. Profit to the Town after budget deduction was \$12,411.00.
- F. In the year 1990, the budget will be reduced by \$7,876.00 as we will own all of our equipment.

The Selectmen's Office feels good about the success of the Golf Course and would like to thank Al Morancie for his work in putting the Course in shape, and Fred Ghioto for promoting it so successfully.

POOL AND PARK:

- A. Attendance was very good, with a good turnout for lessons.
- B. Per State reports, the water was controlled very well.
- C. We were still losing some water at the top two feet of the pool overnight. Repairs were made this fall which should correct this situation.

TOWN BUILDING:

We were successful in repairing the following items at the Town Building.

- A. The catch basin was repaired in the Fire Station parking lot that had protruded above the ground level.
- B. A section of the floor in the Fire Station was replaced and the fire doors were adjusted.
- C. Replaced a section of walk and adjusted the stairs at the front entrance of the building.
- D. Painted the inside entrance, lobby, upstairs meeting room, downstairs hall, and the Police area.

E. We repaired the mortar in the exterior face of the brick in the Fire Station section and part of the main building. A water proofing was applied and we will continue with more work on the exterior brick this summer. All work was accomplished under the supervision of Al Morancie.

WING ROAD BRIDGE:

Per Article 19 of the 1986 Warrant, \$19,500.00 was set up to repair this bridge. Because the new bridge was turned down and the people expressed a desire to keep the existing bridge, it was felt that more repair was needed. The Selectmen met at the bridge site and decided to repair the north abutment, along with the repairs suggested under the Article. The abutment would be repaired under the Highway Budget and payment for same will show under this budget. The Selectmen are very satisfied with all the repairs that have been done and believe the substructure of the bridge is adequately protected at this time. Our next project will be to paint the superstructure.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL:

Unfortunately the North Country Council decided to relocate in Littleton rather than Bethlehem. This was due to deed restrictions, FHA financing, and the time element involved.

Leona Bender volunteered her services on Mondays during her stay in Bethlehem last summer. Bob Jailer was a new and valuable volunteer who spent many hours at the typewriter cataloging books which we inherited from the bookmobile. Ruth Miller is our year-round volunteer and is very much a part of this library. She also writes all the fiction reviews you read each week in the Courier.

Nine trustees meet regularly with the librarian to insure the operation of the library runs smoothly. Polly Keach deserves much credit for her time in serving as treasurer of the library; a responsible but unpaid position.

Because the library is sadly lacking in space we are unable to offer any programs. This year some new shelves were added in the reading room but were filled as soon as the varnish was dry. We added a paperback rack which gave us a little more space for hard cover books on the shelves in the young adult section. The library needs to expand to keep up with the growing needs of the people in this community. I sincerely hope this takes place in the very near future.

The Town of Bethlehem applied for and received a Community Development Block Grant early in 1987. The Bethlehem Housing Improvement Program opened in April with \$200,000 in funding from the Office of State Planning. The goal of the Housing Improvement Program was to rehabilitate 18 homes within the town precinct with \$170,000 of the \$200,000. The remaining \$30,000 was budgeted for administrative costs.

The program was due to end in December, 1987 but received a time extension until June, 1988 in order to allow additional time for the program to reach the 18 unit goal. The program will have completed rehabilitation work on 14 homes, one of which contains three apartments, by the program's end in June.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Roads graveled in 1987 were Muchmore, Maplewood Hill, Noyes, Mt. Cleveland, Reardon, Blaney, Tip Top, Hazen, Cyrs, Wing Road and South Road.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with *your* help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

BRETZFELDER MEMORIAL PARK COMMITTEE

In 1987 the Park saw the final construction stages as called for in the Master Plan. A picnic and play area was constructed adjacent to the park office. This grassy opening in the woods provides welcome sunshine on summer days and is equipped with grills for barbecuing.

The first timber harvest at the Park's Demonstration Forest was completed in March. The benefits of this harvest included: educational opportunities demonstrating proper forest management techniques, opening of the forest for increased wildlife diversity, proceeds accrued to the Trust Fund, and a permanent system of cross-country ski trails through the parcel. The log-landing has been cleared for seeding this spring and will provide a parking and picnic spot near the pond.

In addition to the Park-sponsored programs at Bethlehem School, which this year included a field trip to Mt. Willard for 6th graders, the Park was the site of the annual Girl Scout Friendship Day Camp, meetings of the North Country Resource and Conservation Committee and Bethlehem Poetry Council. At the request of the School For Lifelong Learning the Park ran a course on the "Natural History of Northern New England" for adult learners this summer. The yearly summer evening lectures attracted a wide audience (including two Barred Owls.)

The Park Committee sponsored a free picnic for townspeople in September; unfortunately due to pouring rain the turn-out was lower than expected; we congratulate the 75 hardy souls who turned out and thank all the volunteers who assisted or made contributions to this event, which will be held each year.

Again, thanks are due to the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, the private, non-profit organization which manages and staffs the Bretzfelder Park and Trust on behalf of the town under the terms of Helen Bretzfelder's bequest.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

Budget for the current fiscal year is \$8,947,343. Town taxes to the County average 6.7% or \$2.21 per \$1,000, of the property owner's tax bill. The major portion of county expenses goes to the operation of the Nursing Home (39.69%) and to human services programs for the elderly, disabled, nursing care and children (26.86%).

Registry of Deeds had gross income of \$3,630,159 in 1987. The total number of documents processed in 1987 was 29,983. \$3,184,982 was received in transfer tax, of which 96% or \$3,057,584 went to the State of NH and 4% or \$127,398 was retained as county income. Other receipts include recording and copy fees in the amount of \$445,177. Total income to the County was \$572,575 compared to a total of \$3,057,584 paid to the State, although the county is liable for 100% of all operating costs.

HUMAN SERVICES:

Old Age & Disabled grant programs remain fairly constant with the elderly program averaging 100 cases at \$4,800 per month and the disabled averaging 225 cases at \$21,000 per month.

Intermediate Nursing Care caseload increased with SB-1 where the County became responsible for all INC cases and eliminated town liability. INC cases now average 255 at \$110,000 per month, a rapidly increasing cost to the counties with savings to the towns.

Children and Youth Services also became a county liability under Senate Bill 1, with counties reimbursing the State 25% for all child service costs. It is impossible to give accurate figures for child expenses, as they are rapidly increasing monthly. Current accounts reflect 130 to 150 cases costing from \$64,000 to \$75,000 per month. (At the beginning of this fiscal year, we had approximately 120 cases at about \$50,000 per month.) The County has 25% funding liability of child placement costs and we are taking an active interest in the needs of children in Grafton County.

Social Service agencies receive \$247,217 or \$4.03 per capita, to provide much needed services for home health, mental health, developmentally disabled, senior citizens transportation and nutrition and many other valuable programs.

Correctional Facility is increasingly overpopulated, now averaging 58 inmates per day and frequently housing 60+. The current cost of operation is \$28.63 per inmate day. We have contracted with an architect to present design and cost for a 34 bed addition. Schematic designs and price estimates are expected by mid-January to go out for bid by late January with bid results due in by the end of February. Funding issues should go to the delegation and public in March with anticipated ground breaking in April.

Grafton County Nursing Home for intermediate nursing care is licensed for 136 beds and is about 80% reimbursable. FY 87 cost per patient day was \$68.78 with \$58.87 reimbursed by Medicaid.

Grafton County Farm continues to be self-supporting and provides work for inmates as well as offering access for experimental agricultural projects. This is primarily a dairy farm with an average herd of 170, but also grows produce for the nursing home.

Grafton County Commissioners meet weekly on Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance and welcome facility tours.

We were deeply saddened by the deaths of Commissioner Arthur E. Snell, Dist. #2, and Commissioner Leonard Anderson, Dist. #3, early this year.

1987 ANNUAL OUTREACH REPORT

Outreach is the field services arm of the agency. The purpose of this program is to assist low-income, elderly and handicapped persons to solve individual problems and meet needs through individual and/or group self-help efforts. Outreach Coordinators accomplish this purpose by providing information, referrals, guidance, organizational assistance, individual counseling and by effectively linking and utilizing community resources.

This program operates primarily during the summer months. Last summer, the following people were served by the CAP Outreach Program in the Littleton Area. (1/1/87-10/1/87)

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council was extremely busy in 1987 as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to North Country communities.

As a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45, the Council is responsible for assisting its member communities in local town planning, regional planning, economic development and numerous other community services. In addition to the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legislative and funding issues with the state and federal governments.

The North Country is experiencing tremendous growth and development pressures. The Council is dedicated to assisting towns with the impacts associated with these pressures. In order to more efficiently serve its membership, the Council has assigned a staff person to respond to each town's request for assistance. In this way, continuity between the town and the Council is ensured and the overall effectiveness of the Council is increased.

In Bethlehem, the Council provided the Planning Board with information regarding subdivision review, zoning amendment proposals and the Master Plan update. NCC assisted the Town in developing a community attitude survey and compiled and analyzed the survey results. In addition to planning assistance, the Council worked with the Town in coordinating the Upper Grafton/Lancaster Solid Waste District and the North Country Household Hazardous Waste Collection Project. NCC continued to administer the Downtown Revitalization Loan Program, initiated a Community Development Block Grant Housing Program and provided the Town with tax billing services.

The Council again provided information and guidance to many towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year the Council administered over \$6.7 million in Community Development Block Grant funds in fifteen communities. The funds were used for housing rehabilitation, downtown revitalization, public facility improvements, business revolving loans, and feasibility studies for housing rehabilitation and public facility improvements.

The Council has taken an active role in addressing the affordable housing issue in cooperation with member communities. The Council is presently administering a regional housing rehabilitation program which is making 358 housing units available to eligible North Country residents.

Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or one-time basis for subdivision and site plan applications.

This past year the region witnessed increased economic development activity with companies locating and expanding their facilities in the North Country. This business activity will help to provide a diversity in the labor market and a stronger regional economy for all.

The Council sponsored four industrial development workshops for local economic officials. The workshops provided information on business recruitment, marketing and working cooperatively with federal and state officials to promote community economic development.

The Council again co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series with the NH Municipal Association. The Law Lecture this year covered local planning board procedures, administration and enforcement of ordinances, growth management and review of recent court cases and state law changes regarding local land use planning.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC.

1987 Annual Report and Service Summary

The North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. is a not-for-profit, New Hampshire licensed Medicare and Medicaid certified Home Health Agency. 1987 saw the Agency observe its' seventeenth year of providing care in Northern Grafton and Southern Coos Counties. Services available are:

Home Visits by Registered Nurses, to make health observations and assessments, change dressings, give injections, draw blood, assist with medications, instruct families in care, make referrals and report findings to the physician. Prearranged weekend/holiday visits are available. In 1987 the R.N.'s made a total of 3,084 home visits.

Homemaker/Home Health Aides provide personal care, errands and light homemaking to help individuals remain at home. There were 4,739 Aide visits in 1987.

Therapy services include Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Speech Therapy, by Registered or Certified Therapists or Pathologists. There were 403 Therapy visits in 1987.

Family Assistants provided 3,714.5 hours of direct service in 1987 to 38 families with children at risk for abuse or neglect or already involved in abusive or neglectful situations. The Family Assistants work very closely with Social Workers from the New Hampshire Division for Children and Youth Services to prevent abuse or neglect and reunite families.

A new program in 1987 is Adult-In-Home Day Care, a State of New Hampshire funded program to provide day care at home to elderly or disabled individuals. 33,950 hours of service were provided February through December, 1987.

Flu immunization, foot care, blood pressure and blood sugar testing clinics are also offered on a regular basis to North Country communities and groups.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

1987 Director's Report

We are pleased to announce that, during this past year, we received a three-year J.C.A.H. (Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals) accreditation for all programs offered through our agency. In addition to the work involved in "gearing up" for the accreditation, we have also initiated several program changes. They include the following:

Expansion of Respite Services - We offer a period of respite to families of developmentally disabled or mentally ill clients. This is done by assuming the responsibility of care of the client for a brief period of time (usually 24-48 hours). This is done either in the client's home or in the home of the individual who is providing the respite service.

Initiation of Apartment Supervisors - During this past year, we have been involved in the screening and hiring of individuals to assist clients currently living in the community. This creative program involves staff working with clients in their own homes or apartments in an effort to enhance their ability to live independently.

Expanded Work Sites - We have increased the number of work sites within the community in which we have clients placed. The expansion of this program has afforded us the ability to offer more variety of work to our clients.

Transitional Employment - This is a new program which has been initiated through a Vocational Rehabilitation grant. The program involves working individually with clients who are job ready. We locate suitable employment and provide support to help them transition into jobs which they will maintain independently from our agency.

These program efforts have been made in addition to our existing and very active services. Our activity in the more traditional services remains very constant.

Mental Health Services

We operate one full-time and three part-time offices. The full-time office is located in Littleton at 16 Maple Street. The part-time offices are located in Woodsville at Woodsville Clinic, in Lincoln at the Lin-Wood Medical Center, and in Lancaster at Weeks Memorial Hospital.

Last year, we provided the following services to our twenty-two town catchment area:

Children's Services - Evaluations of children and/or their families, as well as treatment (therapy).

Adult Outpatient Services - Psychiatric, psychological evaluations, treatment (therapy) including individual, conjoint, family and group services. Annually, we do 60% of our treatment with this population. We recorded 5,674 visits for children and adult services.

Emergency Services - We operate a 24-hour-a-day phone line to respond to psychiatric emergencies. Last year, we responded to 700 crisis calls through our emergency services.

Inpatient Services - We provide inpatient services through local general hospitals and a psychiatric inpatient unit (8 beds) in Berlin. We also make referrals to private hospitals and New Hampshire Hospital.

Case Management - Services which help to keep clients in the community who otherwise might need institutional care. We had over 2,000 contacts in this supportive service program.

Alcohol Services - Individual and group services to individuals with alcohol or drug problems.

Partial Hospitalization - A day program for clients in need of more intensive services, including: therapy, vocational training, skills for independent living, and working with the clients to integrate into the community. This past year, we provided 4,742 hours of service to clients in this program.

Developmental Services

Early Intervention - Home based service for 0-3 year old children who are delayed in their development. Services include: screening, assessment, treatment, and referral. Last year, we served over sixty-five families and provided over 1800 hours of direct service.

Day Habilitation Program - Provides instruction to our most severely impaired adult population. The program works in conjunction with their residential programming as well as providing training and instruction in self care skills, pre-vocational skills, paid work, and other therapeutic services such as speech therapy and physical therapy. This program has been primarily used by former Laconia State School residents; however, we have or have had community clients who have been in the local school systems.

It is planned that by January, 1988 a Day Habilitation Program, to be located in Pike, will be operating to provide services to the Haverhill area. Currently, it is planned that it will serve six individuals from that area.

Supported and Competitive Employment - Provides training, instruction, and work adjustment for vocational and job needs. Paid work opportunities for the individuals can take place either in the community or in the Workshop itself. The programs have been successful in meeting their objectives and are popular with the individuals who have participated.

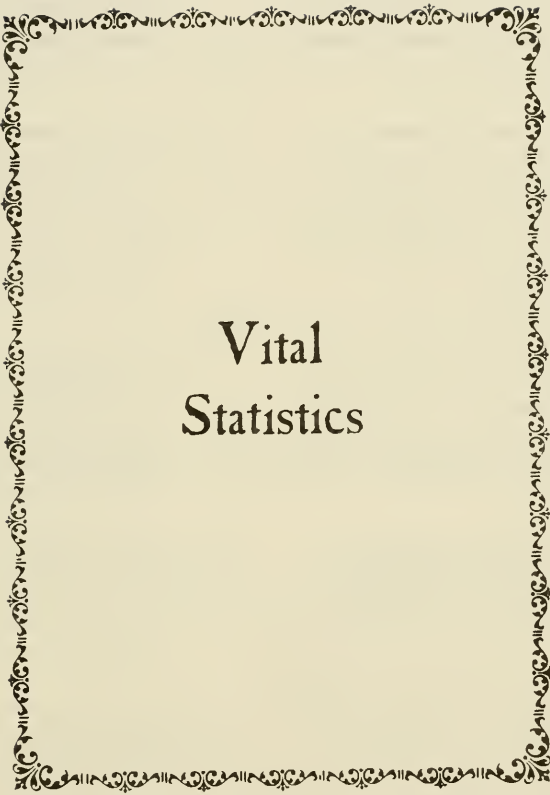
UPPER GRAFTON/LANCASTER AREA SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

The Upper Grafton/Lancaster Area (UGLA) Solid Waste District voted to pursue the siting of a District owned regional landfill in early 1987. At March 1987 Town Meetings, 11 of 12 towns in the UGLA District raised \$54,000 to support the District's decision.

Wehren Engineering was contracted by the District for Phase I of the landfill development. Phase I included site determination and evaluation, test pit and well sampling and preliminary design.

Following site work by Wehren, two possible locations for the landfill were identified. The most feasible site in Bethlehem was withdrawn for consideration by the landowner in December. The second site owned by the Town of Littleton is now under investigation . A meeting with the State's Waste Management Division to review the initial work has been scheduled.

Calendar year 1988 will be a busy one for the UGLA District as landfill development continues and a district agreement is drafted. The District also plans to actively promote recycling as a means of reducing waste volume.
