LAWSUITS.

In the suit of A. Jennie Noyes against the town for alleged damages on the highway, the supreme court has sustained her exceptions to the verdict rendered in favor of the town; and the case is now on the jury list, and the plaintiff will probably move for trial at the next April term.

Dr. J. W. Staples, of Franklin, has brought suit against the town for alleged damages to a horse, by reason of a defective highway, which will be for trial at the April term.

Notice was filed with the town-clerk, by Hollis Towne, of intention to bring a suit against the town for alleged damages on the highway by reason of an obstruction, and naming the sum of \$3,000 as damages.

Notice has been filed with the town-clerk and selectmen, by Frank P. Keenan, of intention to bring a suit against the town for alleged damages on the sidewalk in Penacook, and naming the sum of \$2,000 as the measure of his injuries.

The Contoocook Manufacturing and Mechanick Company, by its treasurer, Samuel C. Eastman, has filed a bill in equity in the supreme court, asking an abatement of a portion of the tax assessed on its property by reason of alleged over-valuation in the appraisal, April 1, 1887.

The selectmen have carefully examined all these cases, and as far as possible have considered the evidence and attending circumstances; and, in their judgment and belief, the town is not liable in any of them for damages or costs.

While we exceedingly regret the trouble and heavy expense which must come to the town by reason of being obliged to defend itself in court, we have not considered it to be for the interest of the tax-payers to attempt any compromise or settlement in any of these cases.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION—PENA-COOK DISTRICT.

To the Citizens of Penacook School-District in Boscawen:

The Board of Education, in submitting its third annual report, take pleasure in attesting to the success and efficiency of our schools during the past year.

Since the formation of the board we have endeavored to so raise the standard of scholarship that those who may go forth from this district school to higher institutions of learning, or to seek employment in the various walks of life, may possess a more liberal education than has hitherto been possible, or that possessed by graduates of ordinary grammar schools.

The examination at the close of the spring term showed that our hopes had been more than realized. A class of four members graduating displayed scholarship of a high order, which could only have been accomplished by much industry on their part, seconded by earnest and faithful labor on the part of their instructors. We trust, however, that in the departure of the members of this class the standard of scholarship will not suffer, for undoubtedly there are many left, who, with proper application, can attain to as good results.

The system now generally adopted, of having the school year commence with the fall term, and the public examination at the close of the spring term, has been deemed by us worthy of imitation; consequently the usual public examination at the close of the winter term has been dispensed with.

We regret that the attendance has been irregular—a part by reason of sickness, was unavoidable; but in common with many other school-districts, there seems to be too much indifference, upon the part of parents or guardians, about a constant attendance, and they readily grant excuses upon frivolous pretences. Sickness should be the only valid reason for non-attendance. As the mastery of each lesson depends upon a thorough knowl-

edge of those preceding, not only does the absent scholar suffer, but his absence causes much annoyance and confusion to the teacher and other members of the class. We trust hereafter that this evil may be eradicated.

Another evil that should be corrected is indiscriminate fault-finding. Intelligent criticism is always desirable; but a criticism founded upon an erroneous conception of facts is most unjust and injurious. As personal observation is the most satisfactory and correct evidence of facts, we would invite parents and friends to make frequent visits so that they may ascertain the true condition of school affairs, and not accept too readily rumors that may be founded upon prejudice or misunderstanding.

With the close of the spring term Miss Alice M. Sargent completed two years of most faithful and conscientious service, and retires from the school deserving and receiving the gratitude and esteem of all its patrons.

The intermediate school during the spring term was taught by Miss Addie L. Flanders, who sustained her already well earned reputation as a successful teacher, and much endeared herself to her pupils.

In compliance with what appeared to us a general demand upon the part of the citizens of the district, that a male teacher should be placed at the head of the schools, we procured the services of Mr. Henry E. Chamberlain, of Berwick, Me., a recent graduate of Dartmouth college, who came highly recommended from his previous field of labor as a teacher. During the past two terms he has worked earnestly and faithfully, and his efforts have been attended with good results. In the early part of his service here he established the fact that he was master of the situation, and has maintained most excellent discipline. By his zeal for their advancement, and by his strict impartiality, he has gained the respect and confidence of his pupils.

Miss Grace Caldwell, an accomplished young lady, has rendered valuable services during the past year as an assistant. Being herself an apt and industrious student, she insists that the recitations of her pupils shall be thoroughly prepared, and that they possess a comprehensive knowledge of the subject pursued.
