REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

As the fifteenth of February marks the close of another year of the town officials, the school board in performance of their duties, with a statement of their accounts corresponding with the town's fiscal year, submit for your consideration a report of the past school year.

The school board have endeavored to the best of their ability to procure teachers for the several schools that would do credit to the scholars and be appreciated by the parents, and in a measure we trust we have succeeded.

If we are fortunate enough to secure a good teacher we appreciate them and retain them if possible, as we think when a teacher has learned the dispositions and capacities of pupils that better results are obtained.

In most of our schools we have had excellent teachers. Good progress has been made in all branches of study.

We have made it a rule to visit all schools several times during a term and at times when we were least expected, therefore we could judge of the condition of the schools and the progress made.

We notice by the registers the limited number of visitors in *some* of our schools. We mean parents; or to make it more emphatic and plain,—the men.

In some schools the parents have taken interest enough in their children's progress to visit the school several times, but as a general rule there is a lack of interest which we very much regret.

They should make a greater effort to visit the schools, at least twice a term, that they may encourage both teacher and scholars.

We think there are parents in town who have never stepped

inside of their school-rooms since the new laws for running schools have been in operation. Be that as it may, we hope there will be a waking up and a greater interest taken by some of the parents; we include only those the coat fits.

To encourage the interest of the scholars in their attendance we offered a framed certificate for perfect attendance during the spring term. While there were more that could have been obtained we were pleased to notice the interest taken, especially in the smaller schools, and hope there will be a larger per cent. on the roll next year.

The prosperity of our schools in the future depends not only on our school board but upon parents and teachers as well. We always have enough to criticise and find fault about, but if they live up to some of the suggestions we have made they would be relieved of some of their chronic troubles. But, alas, there are some people who are never satisfied with anything and there is nothing that gives them relief but to "kick."

We have maintained seven schools during the year and given each scholar twenty-six weeks of schooling. As there was no money raised except as required by law, it made the schools much shorter than formerly. We hope there will be more interest shown at our next school meeting and money raised for longer terms.

Repairs have been made on the River road schoolhouse, also at Wood hill, where a new hard wood floor was laid, walls newly plastered, and the woodwork painted. We think now all the schoolhouses are in good repair.

We have purchased four copies of "The Modern Atlas of the World," to be placed in the different schools and trust they will be used to great advantage.
