WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitantn of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to qualify for state aid for highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905.
- 4. To se if the town will vote to raise six hundred dollars, three hundred to be laid out on highway leading from state road at West Campton to Campton station, and three hundred to be laid out on highway from Blair station on road past Campton cemetery to state road near residence of G. D. Pattee.
- 5. To vote how much money the town will raise and appropriate for support of highways and bridges.
- 6. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for Campton cemetery, also clean up and fence other cemeteries in town.

- 7. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial day.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to defray town charges.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to build a store room in Campton Village for storage of water pipe and other plumbing supplies for water works, said store room not to exceed one hundred dollars in cost and this amount to be paid from collections of water rent, and no part of the cost of aforesaid store room to come from regular town appropriations.
- 10. To see what action the town will take regarding its leased lands and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 11. To see what action the town will take to make its bridges meet the requirements of the law passed at the January session, 1913.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to elect more than two road agents.

During the past school year the School Board has endeavored to give our scholars the benefit of the best teachers, school supplies and schoolroom equipment that was obtainable.

Although not quite so long as usual, the past year of school has been a successful one.

We were obliged to run a larger number of schools than formerly, and also to provide conveyance for children living in outlying districts.

There being no school house in the Livermore Falls district, children were conveyed from there to Pulsifer Hill. During good weather conveyance was furnished only one way.

In the so-called Bump and Blaisdell districts they were conveyed to the Centre, making one good sized school. As most of these children were girls it was found absolutely necessary to convey.

The school houses in districts No. 1 and 10 have had new hard wood floors, up-to-date seats installed, and necessary repairs were made in other districts.

We wish to thank those who have helped to make the past year of school successful.
