
Introduction

Between 23 October 2018 and 6 January 2019, Kettle's Yard was delighted to present *Richard Pousette-Dart: Beginnings. A Young Abstract Expressionist in New York,* the first major solo exhibition of the prominent American artist to take place in a UK public institution.

Richard Pousette-Dart (1916–92) was one of a remarkable generation of American artists who reimagined what art could be and do. Whilst his name is perhaps less well known in the UK than that of his peers such as Jackson Pollock and Mark Rothko, the richness and depth of Pousette-Dart's artistic achievement is considerable. This new exhibition, the first in the UK to focus solely on Pousette-Dart's work, revealed an artist of prodigious talent and ambition, and one who was constantly experimenting with form, techniques and materials. The aim of the exhibition was to reassess Pousette-Dart's contributions to the development of Abstract Expressionism and to the history of American Art more broadly.

Over five years in the making, the exhibition, book and related activities reflect the commitment of Kettle's Yard as part of the University of Cambridge to research and the public dissemination of new knowledge, contributing to discourse and debate. *Beginnings* was a unique opportunity in this country to encounter a group of works by an outstanding twentieth-century American artist. It included US loans from The Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, as well as from the artist's Estate and Foundation, and works from the Kettles Yard's collection.

The exhibition was also the first, since Kettle's Yard reopened in February 2018 following a major building project, to focus entirely on the work of one of the artists in the permanent collection. The scale and form of the exhibition were only possible because of the new galleries and other spaces, designed by Jamie Fobert Architects.


Beginnings ran for 11 weeks from 23 October 2018 to 6 January 2019. The exhibition largely focussed on the formative period of Pousette-Dart's work from the mid 1930s to the late 1940s, which has not been the subject of a single exhibition anywhere worldwide to date. It also included selected later paintings to exemplify how the artist's early experiments and fascination with symbols, in particular the circle and spiral, impacted upon his ongoing artistic development. Although usually recognised primarily as a painter, and particularly so within scholarship on Abstract Expressionism, the exhibition demonstrated the fluidity with which Pousette-Dart moved between, and experimented with, different materials including drawing, painting, sculpture and photography. It also drew out Pousette-Dart's fascination with nature and its symbolism, which he discusses at length in his correspondence with Kettle's Yard's creator Jim Ede.

The primary research catalyst for the exhibition (and accompanying book) was the remarkable artistic friendship between the creator of Kettle's Yard, H. S. (Jim) Ede, and Pousette-Dart. They first met in New York in 1940 and thereafter corresponded for over 40 years. Their letters, which number over 200, are held in Kettle's Yard's archive and by The Richard Pousette-Dart Foundation. This long and poetic correspondence was built on a shared admiration of the French artist and sculptor, Henri Gaudier-Brzeska (another significant artist in the Kettle's Yard collection and an artist for which Ede's scholarship was renowned). They also shared a love of nature and its forms, light, music, and a fascination with the spiritual power of art, themes which informed the exhibition. The most intense period of correspondence was during the 1940s and early 1950s, and thus directly influenced Pousette-Dart at a key moment in his artistic development. This material had not been studied in any existing scholarship on the artist and period, and it was the primary source to inform the exhibition, thereby making a significant contribution to this field of research.



The idea for an was initiated by Powell and Duncan as a consequence of an archive exchange of the letters sent between Pousette-Dart and Ede.

The exhibition was accompanied by a book edited by Jennifer Powell, *Richard Pousette-Dart: Beginnings. A Young Abstract Expressionist in New York,* published in 2018, softcover, 170 pages, 260 (h) x 210 (w) priced at £19.95, 391 copies sold at the time of writing (April 2019).

As noted, transatlantic correspondence over four decades and other archival materials informed the new research base for this publication.





3. Special projects

Circuit Projects

Circuit is a group of young people aged 18-25 who meet every Wednesday at Kettle's Yard to work on creative events and projects. Circuit recruited over 20 participants in autumn 2018 from Anglia Ruskin University, Cambridge Regional College and a few from Cambridge University.

Circuit delivered two public events during the exhibition, one at Take Over Day and one with young people at our November LATE evening event at Kettle's Yard.

The October term was a time for the Circuit group to consolidate and develop understanding of each other's practices. To explore the exhibition *Richard Pousette-Dart: Beginnings*, the group worked with a range of artists, testing out different ways responding creatively to art and audiences. This included multi-layered photography with Laura Hindmarsh, playful collaborative collage with Dyad Creative, letter-writing and archives with Lucy Steggals and sound and movement with Paulette Mae. The group then drew upon these different ideas and approaches to produce two activities that they offered to the public in the galleries as part of our Takeover Day on 23 November. After this, the group developed a workshop with artist Josh

Bilton for the LATE, using slide projections and collage to build up layers of visual conversations that were projected over the studio walls. Over 127 people took part in this workshop.

Take Over Day

Friday 23 November 2018, 11am-5pm

This national initiative, led by Kids in Museums, allowed the promotion and exploration of new ways of working with our young people. Studio Sunday participants, Art Club attendees and Circuit members were invited to respond to the exhibition and translate the interpretation of the galleries for the official Take Over Day open to the public. Studio Sunday participants interpreted the work and created their own painting and images which were displayed in the galleries. Art Club participants reimagined and created the labels for the exhibition and mounted them on the wall, and Circuit created view finders for members of the public to use and view the work in new ways. The images were requested for inclusion on the Kettle's Yard Instagram feed and this feed was projected on the wall in the galleries for all visitors to see throughout the day. This was an opportunity for the learning programme to be visible and represented in the galleries.

Miniature to the Gigantic Sunday 28 November 2018, 12-4pm

A Sunday event for families, part of the Cambridge Festival of Ideas. The event explored the theme of extremes through a day of miniature and gigantic drawing activities; from creating your own miniature museum through to using your whole-body top draw. The afternoon was very well attended.

Successful outreach partnerships during this time saw joint events with Cambridge Carbon Footprint, Cambridge Film Festival and Cambridge Winter Fair, ensuring profile raising for audiences in the city. The workshops delivered were socially engaged and aimed at developing conversations with the general public around the Richard Pousette-Dart exhibition and the collection.

Performance: 9th and Castle

A programme with contemporary artist Anna Brownsted working with young people in North Cambridge to create a dance and movement-based work connected to the exhibition and performed at Kettle's Yard. Brownsted, whose work is often socially engaged, collaborated with 6 adolescent girls from local schools to devise a new performance responding to themes in the work of Pousette-Dart and his New York contemporaries. The group of girls worked with Brownsted over 9 sessions and one of these included a tour of the exhibition with Dr Powell to discuss the work and its main themes. The final performance work was created collaboratively. It was a durational performance, delivered in the Kettle's Yard House, that explored themes in Pousette-Dart's works including repetition, tactility and circular movement and symbolism. Aspects of the work were developed around a photograph of the Irascibles artist group in the exhibition and directly by paintings in the exhibition including 'Gothic Garden', 'Genesis' and 'Black circle, Time'. This event enabled young people to engage with and interpret the exhibition in new ways as well as developing knowledge, friendships, new skills and an increase in their well-being. For two young people the process also used the work to contribute to their Silver Duke of Edinburgh award.

LATE at Kettle's Yard Friday 30 November 2018, 6-9pm

As well as the art-making workshop and photography activity in collaboration with Circuit (see previous page), this LATE was inspired by the photography and letters of Richard Pousette-Dart and his interests in music. It was programmed in collaboration with *Circuit* and Cam Lates. From 6pm artist Josh Bilton gave a photography workshop in the Clore, using mixed media and photography to create multi-layered projections. In the galleries at 6.45pm and 7.45pm, curator Dr Powell gave short pop-up talks on the exhibition, exploring Richard Pousette-Dart's interests in classical music, which he shared with Kettle's Yard's creator Jim Ede. On the top floor in the Ede Room, audiences experienced the workshop #Ooh0 Circle Self using objects and materials provided by the artist Lucy Steggals to create their own letters, using circles instead of words, to send to an unknown friend. Music by jazz band 'Love for Sale' was live throughout the evening to reflect Pousette-Dart's encounters with contemporary jazz musicians.


