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

Campus Press

Carleton College's 1,640 students returned for the second semester to find their Minnesota campus had become the smallest college in the country to have a daily newspaper.

Operating on advertising and subscription revenue completely independent of the college, the Carleton Daily replaced the weekly campus publication and has become a thriving business venture. With the lowest ad rates in the county, the Daily advertisers pay \$1.50 per column inch for an ad that runs twice. Retailers advertising in the weekly paid the same rate for a one-time insertion. Assistant Managing Editor Mark Weinstein said the special rate has had the two-person ad staff hoping and has "turned on advertisers - more and more want to advertise."

Editor John Koten gets much of the credit for making the four-page tabloid a reality. Koten has edited the paper since 1975 when it was weekly and since his arrival profits have risen 200%. Koten has also been able to recruit an 11-person management staff and about 30 writers at a college offering no. journalism courses.

Problems with opeating a fledgling daily on a small campus? Quote Weinstein: "No sleep." Lance Cavanaugh, editor of the College of St. Scholastica Cable in Duluth, Minn. agrees. Uncounted snooze hours were spent establishing the Cable as a semi-weekly publication. Over spring break, the staff planned the switch from a campus announcement bulletin to a

newspaper and were often awake "until 4 a.m. talking, arguing and reading journalism books."

Under Cavanaugh's direction the Cable has added color to the front page and established a beat system for reporting which includes campus and city coverage. The 22 staffers are also trying to set up a car pool system so reporters can travel the five miles into town easier. Staff members are also getting weekly instruction in journalism by Cavanaugh.

The college has had six different newspapers since 1898, but Cavanaugh forecasts better success for the Cable based on the paper's ability to fill the students' need for news and competitive ad rates. He said ads were "selling themselves" at \$3 an inch with a circulation of

In addition to ad revenue, the Cable gets \$10,500 in student activity fees. Since its inception in mid-February, the paper has recorded a \$3,500 profit.

But some small college newspaper editors see profit in other terms. "I got a far greater journalism education at this small university than I could have gotten at a big name school," according to Terry Parker, editor of the 4,100 circulation Daily Lass-O at Texas Women's U. The Lass-O is a department-bound publication with what Parker calls "a lot of slack" in editorial independence and judgment.

The four-page paper is published four times a week on a \$45,000 annual budget, but that doesn't mean the manpower

budget is as high. The Lass-O has seven managerial positions and only five reporters to cover news for the TWU campuses in Denton, Dallas and Houston. City coverage is minimal and rewritten from local papers and the paper has access to an Associated Press state wire used "only in the most extreme situations."

For Parker, a married student living off-campus, the tiny staff proves a big headache for the small paper. The staff has to be intimately acquainted with every facet of newspaper production because someone on the copy desk could become editor with a phone call. "At a small paper you just have to learn to trade hats," Parker said, "and we do it a lot."

LSAA Grant For ASC

The U.S. Department of Justice advised Armstrong State College officials Wednesday (March 8) that ASC is one of two colleges from eight southeastern states selected to receive an LEAA Internship Grant for the upcoming academic year.

Alan Scheerer, LEAA (Law Enforcement Assistance Administration) Region IV Coordinator, told Dr. Bill Megathlin, Head of the ASC Department of Criminal Justice, today that ASC and the University of South Florida were the only institutions selected to receive grants this year.

Megathlin said the amount of

the grant is not yet known but that it will provide enough money for 20-30 advanced pre -service Criminal Justice majors to spend one quarter in an internship during the summer and fall quarters.

Students will be assigned to the courts, to corrections and crime prevention agencies in Chatham for their internship.

ASC has previously received Internship Grants, but, according to Megathlin, this year's total should be higher.

"In the past, the total grant appropriation had been split

among literally hundreds of institutions in the region but this year, the Justice Department elected to concentrate its efforts where it felt the most good could be achieved," Megathlin said. "Our receiving this grant speaks well for our program and for the agencies which cooperate with us in our internship program."

According to Megathlin, the internship program provides an opportunity for students with no prior Criminal Justice experience to gain insights into the system prior to graduation.

Haley "Roots"

COLLEGE PARK, MD. — "Roots" author Alex Haley is currently the hottest lecturer around - on or off the campus circuit. But his scheduled appearance at the University of Maryland was cancelled at the last minute last week rather than allow him to become the focus of a potentially dangerous campus protest.

The Black Student Union (BSU) was urging a campus boycott of Haley's speech and several BSU members reportedly had vowed to "use any means necessary" to prevent people from attending.

The BSU claimed the student entertainment board's charge of \$2 per ticket for the lecture was an "exploitation" of black students. The black students had no quarrel with Haley but charged the board with being

insensitive to minorities in planning various other events this school year.

Although the BSU wanted Haley's lecture to be free, student government president Luis Luna said the \$2 charge was necessary since Haley, with a fee of \$3,500, was the most expensive speaker ever scheduled at the university.

"He would have been walking into a controversy he had nothing to do with," said Luna. "Rather than subject him to that indignity, I cancelled the lecture."

When informed of the brewing controversy, Haley agreed to the cancellation the day before the scheduled lecture without payment and indicated he would speak with black students about a possible later appearance there.


Mike Durkin had the game


winning a double. Warren Heller also got in some much needed offense as he got two hits and drove in some runs. The victory upped the Pirates record to

Bowling Team Faces Funding Snag

There seems to be a slight misunderstanding among some S.G.A. senators as to whether the A.S.C. Bowling Team should be supported by S.G.A. funds or by the Athletic Department.


Last year the S.G.A. finance committee initially denied Coach George Bedwell's budget request for the bowling team on the grounds that the Board of Regents by-laws specify that no student funds should be spent on anything other than intramural sports activities. After consulting with Athletic Director Bill Alexander, who refused to pick up the \$4,500 tab, the money was allocated through S.G.A. funds.

This year Coach Bedwell faces the same problem. He says the misunderstanding stems from the fact that while bowling is not considered an intrmural

sport, it is not recognized by the N.C.A.A. as an intercollegiate sports activity. Therefore, it cannot be funded by the Athletic Department, which is singularly concerned with intercollegiate sports.

Bedwell went on to say that of the 40 schools participating in the Southern Bowling Conference, all of them are supported by S.G.A. funds. "Bowling is considered a club sport by the N.C.A.A. and is funded by all participating schools like any other campus organization," said Bedwell.

This year Bedwell plans to submit a \$5,015 budget request to the finance committee. He hopes the situation will be clarified by then. If anyone has any questions about the bowling team they can contact Bedwell at the intramural trailer next to the gymnasium or call him at Extension 244.

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


