Jap Forces Land On Singapore Island In Night

British Imperial Force Endeavoring To "Mop Up The Enemy"

Tokyo (From Japanese broadcast) Feb. 8 (AP)—Japanese troops started an assault on British positions near the Johore Bahru causeway and the great British naval base on the north shore of Singapore island, Domei reported today. The Japanese were units of forces which landed at the northwest corner of the island earlier today. Three gun emplacements and pill boxes were smashed near the mouth of the Kranji river, Domei said. The end of the causeway, breached by the British after their retreat from Malaya, is about two and a half miles east of the mouth of the river.

London, Feb. 9 (AP)—A Tokyo broadcast recorded by Reuters today said the Japanese invaders of Singapore island had captured the Tengah airport, about 10 miles northwest of Singapore city. The broadcast said the airport was occupied at 1:30 p. m. (1:30 a. m. c. s. t.) by the Japanese forces which crossed Johore strait during the night over a deep salient into the northwestern part of the island.

YATES McDANIEL, Singapore, Feb. 9 (AP)—Determined defenders of Singapore rallied for attack to throw a strong invading force of Japanese off their embattled island today after pinning them down to a 10-mile front along the western swamps and beaches. "The situation is well in hand," declared Major General Henry Gordon Bennett, commander of the Australians, whose sector the Japanese had chosen for a surprise night landing. "We have taken a stand on a strong line and are organizing a strike which it is hoped will recover as much as possible of the lost terrain."

George Cooley, general chairman of the campaign in Kankakee county, will also attend the meeting. Persons interested in the campaign are urged to come.

War Shipping Administration Is Established By President

Washington, Feb. 9 (AP)—President Roosevelt today established a war shipping administration with nationally all-out authority over the nation's ocean-going vessels and their cargoes and named Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission, as head of the new agency. The executive order authorizes the 63-year-old retired naval officer to issue such "directives" pertaining to shipping operations as he might deem necessary and said "his decisions shall be final." At the maritime commission Land's office said he had no immediate comment. In his new capacity, Land's authority over shipping appears similar to that of Donald M. Nelson over war production. The order directed out, however, that with respect to overseas transportation of cargo essential to war production

Former French Liner Normandie Fire Swept

Police Radio Results In Arrest Of Trio

Another demonstration of the effectiveness of the local police radio system was offered early Sunday when three young Chicagoans who took a case of pop and other items of merchandise from a filling station here were later captured in Grant Park. The trio, Frank Swing, 20, Rudy Mitchell, 18, and Ted Gabryszewski, 18, all of Chicago, pulled into the Super Par station at Court street and West avenue about 1 a. m. Sunday to change a tire. While Gabryszewski was working on the tire the other two went into the station. When the attendant, Ray Dollins, was waiting on other customers, Swing and Mitchell picked up a cream pitcher, which was one of the premiums offered by the firm. They also put a case of pop in their car. After they left Dollins discovered the items missing and said also that \$4. a flashlight and spark plugs had disappeared. He notified police who broadcast a description of the car over police radio and Deputy Charles Kille arrested them at Grant Park about 4 a. m.

In their hearing before Magistrate Edward Hoennicke yesterday, the three pled guilty to disorderly conduct and were fined \$13.25 each plus an additional assessment of \$4.40 each for the deputy's fees and for the value of the other merchandise reported missing. Mitchell and Gabryszewski obtained money through friends and were released, but Swing was still trying to dig up his fine this morning.

New York, Feb. 9 (UP)—Authorities said at 4 p. m. today that about 200 workmen may have been trapped below decks on the starboard side of the burning liner Normandie. Rescue workers began cutting through the side of the ship in an attempt to rescue them. New York, Feb. 9 (AP)—A disastrous fire swept the huge former French liner Normandie at her Hudson river pier ear West 50th street today. Four alarms brought fire engines and boats from all sections of Manhattan.

The \$60,000, 0 liner, now a U. S. naval auxiliary ship named the Lafayette, was being refitted at her pier. An estimated 2,500 or 3,000 workmen were aboard when the blaze flared. Most of them were believed to have escaped down ladders from the bow to the stern.

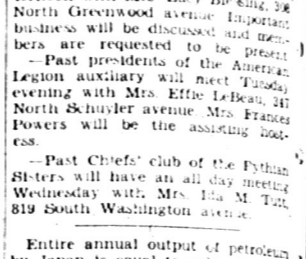

Japs' Drive On Salween River Front Halted

Stalled In Northern Burma And Possibly Broken

Rangoon, Burma, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Crack Chinese fighters and fresh Indian troops bolstered the British on the Salween river front today when Japan's drive toward Rangoon and China's last gateway to the sea was stalled in northern Burma and, possibly, broken.

The "reasoned optimism" which Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell, the united nations' generalissimo in the southwest Pacific, voiced after his just-disclosed second visit to the Burma front was reflected even more forcibly by Lieut. G. T. J. Hutton, the British commander in Burma.

With the Japanese still stationary a week after capturing Moulmein and falling repeatedly to get an effective foothold across the Salween or cripple Rangoon as a base by air attack, he declared:

"We are in a far sounder position to call a halt to the Japanese than before."

Wavell Reviews Situation

Wavell flew from his Java headquarters in the Netherlands East Indies to talk with officers and men on the Moulmein front within earshot of enemy cannon and reviewed the whole situation in southeast Asia with Hutton.

Much weight was attached to the presence of large Chinese forces fighting alongside Britain's imperial forces in Burma.

Sir Archibald Clark Kerr, until recently Britain's ambassador at Chungking, speaking over the Calcutta radio, predicted a "big push" by American, British and Chinese troops. His reference to American forces was not explained.

Has New Plan To Spur Sales Of Defense Stamps

Miami, Fla., Feb. 9.—(INS)—Taking a tip from the management of the Roney-Plaza Hotel in Miami Beach, Postmaster George E. Merrick today was recommending to other postmasters in the country:

Have hotel desk clerks present each guest upon registration, with a defense stamp album, including a brand new 25-cent defense stamp pasted on the first blank.

It was the branch chief of Hazen J. Titus of the Roney Plaza. He passed the word along to Postmaster Merrick, who in turn tipped off contemporary postmasters that the plan would bring in hundreds of thousands of dollars in defense bonds.

Reports 10,000 Jews Are With British Forces

Kansas City, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Fighting in the British ranks against the Axis forces today are 10,000 Jews, according to Rabbi Barnett Brickner, of Cleveland.

Rabbi Brickner, an executive board member of the American and World Zionist organizations, made that statement in a lecture recently in Kansas City.

"Although it is little known, there are 1,500 Palestine Jews in the Royal Air Force," the rabbi asserted. "Jews are fighting in the Near East, and they fought with honor in Crete and Libya."

Palestine, he revealed, has been a source of supply for the British forces. Cantonments have been built and technicians have devised roads for the expeditionary troops.

Two million casualties have occurred among the Jews of the world in the war so far, he said, adding "and there probably will be two million more before the war is finished."

Concluding, he declared: "The Jewish people have suffered more than any other race as the

President's Victory Program Costs Billions Of Dollars

New York, Feb. 9.—(Wide World)—Want to try your brain on some "boxcar numbers" and see if you can get a reasonable idea of what the President's victory program of planes, ships and rams means in dollars and cents, not only to the treasury, but to you as a consumer?

If you want to play this game you will be following close behind its originators, the country's financial and statistical experts, who have been indulging in an orgy of calculations and guess-work in print and in private, of what the gigantic arms totals means in terms of such forbidding abstractions as "the national income," "the standard of living" and "the inflation spiral of prices."

Three Rules

The way we'll play it, the game will have three rules, which ought to make it simpler:

First, we'll call the big numbers by their first names, and leave out those confusing multiple zeros second, the year we will talk about won't be any specific period but a sort of typical twelve months somewhere along in the victory program—because most statisticians are not sure just how fast we can get spending the big sums for victory; and finally, we'll try to figure out what some of the economists' fancier names mean.

Our typical V-program year will be one in which the national income—all the wages and salaries paid out and all the savings of corporations and other businesses—is about \$115 billion.

The government, taking first cut at this, will get about \$27-30 billion of taxes of one kind and another, all but a few billions of which will go into the war effort.

That will leave (using the higher tax figure) \$85 billions to be used for other things. The \$85 billion figure about equals the national income last year.

Treasury Hopes To Borrow

The treasury hopes to borrow, directly out of the income of the people, further money that will be needed for the war, via defense stamps and bonds.

Let's suppose this borrowing in our typical year—and its bound to be guess work—averages \$1 billion a

month, the best monthly total so far, reached since Pearl Harbor.

So we can "knock off" \$12 billion from our \$85 billion, bringing it down to \$73 billion. This may be too small a figure for war savings program.

This \$73 billion is the "spending money" of the people in V-year.

And here is where the standard of living and the "upward spiral of inflation" (just call it higher prices) comes in:

What will the money be spent for?

Here the economists have gotten pretty far apart on their big-number guesses, but they all point to some of the conclusions any average citizen has already drawn.

There won't be anything like as many kinds of goods to use as spending money on as we're accustomed to.

Automobiles and tires, great soakers-up of Mr. American's spending money, are already off the list, and many other kinds of goods will not be replaced when present stocks are gone.

Enumerates The 'Four Horsemen Of War Panic'

Harrisburg, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Rumors, threats, fatigue and malnutrition are the "four horsemen of war panic," according to Dr. Charles Burlingame, psychiatrist.

Dr. Burlingame told delegates to the Second Pennsylvania Health Institute at Harrisburg that it was of "primary importance that the public become acquainted with the implications of psychological warfare; what they mean, what can be done to check them."

"Mental health today is a national problem with national fighting power at stake," he declared.

Fatigue and malnutrition, he added, have been allowed to "grow up until they have become the two most powerful fifth columnists in the country."

"Pessimism, forebodings, gloom, fear, inefficiency, and all other earmarks of the neurosis flourish in those who are not properly nourished," Dr. Burlingame said. "These are the people who are fertile soil for the seeds of foreign propaganda—these are the people who listen and succumb to the dictator's weapons of threat and rumor."

Educator Seeks National Dental Health Program

Harrisburg, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Soundly financed dental health programs for every community in the nation is the aim of Dr. Lon W. Morrey, Director of Public Education for the American Dental Association.

Addressing the Second Pennsylvania Health Institute at Harrisburg, he emphasized that figures released by National Selective Service headquarters reveal that the largest single cause for rejections was failure to meet dental health standards.

Dental decay, Dr. Morrey said, is the most prevalent of childhood diseases.

"An examination of 1,500,000 school children in 26 states in 1933-34 U. S. Public Health Service," he declared, "revealed that at least 90 per cent of American children of school age suffer from dental decay."

"There can be little argument," he added, "that every community in this country needs a soundly conceived adequately financed and ably executed dental health program."

Gunfire Ends First Airplane Ride Of Couple

Granite City, Ill., Feb. 9.—(AP)—A burst of gun fire ended the first airplane ride of Delbert Henson and 15-year-old Beverly Ann Keith, leaving Henson critically wounded.

He was given several blood transfusions.

The plane was flying near the restricted defense area at Alton, Ill., which houses the vast Western Cartridge company plant.

Soldiers from Jefferson Barracks, Mo., and company police patrol the area.

Lieut. J. A. Villauer, in charge of the army guards, and company officials declined comment.

Army authorities at Jefferson Barracks said merely that a report of the shooting had been sent to Seventh Corps area headquarters at Omaha and an investigation would be made there.

Delbert Richardson, Granite City flying instructor who was piloting the plane, gave this account of the incident:

Henson and Miss Keith, taking their first plane ride, asked him to fly over the girl's home at Alton. He refused because he feared it was too close to the restricted area.

He then turned the plane at an altitude of 1,100 feet at a point he believed was eight or 10 miles from the restricted zone.

As he banked, the first of seven shots hit the ship. One pierced Henson's hip and stomach. Another penetrated the gasoline tank, forcing Richardson to switch to an emergency supply.

Henson slumped against Miss Keith, groaning. Richardson, fearing another salvo, decided against an emergency landing and flew his crippled ship back to the airport.

Seven of the bullets struck the plane's under carriage, wings and fuselage. One of them pierced the pilot's chair, only an inch from Richardson's body.

"It sounded like hail," commented Miss Keith.
