New Regulation This Term For Program Changes

Beginning next semester, a new regulation designed to decrease the number of study-program changes will go into effect at Humboldt College. During the first two weeks students can make changes without penalty, but thereafter there will be a charge for each change made the charge increasing as the semester advances.

Despite the fact that students are pre-registered each semester for the following semester, many still change their programs. A study in the office of the Recorder revealed that more than four hundred different changes were made this fall, ranging from a change of section to an entirely new program. The result was a large increase in the clerical work. The new regulation follows:

"Students shall be free to make any changes in program during the first two weeks of each semester.

"Every change in program after the first two weeks and not later than the beginning of the seventh week shall entail a service charge of twenty-five cents.

Valerie Barker and James Hall, the two Humboldt students just chosen to membership in the college honor society, Chi Sigma Epsilon, both have combined scholarship with participation in student activities to meet the standards of the society.

To be eligible, students must have an average of "B" and must also excel in outside activities.

"Valerie Barker," Ray Pedrotti, said at the recent honor assembly, has maintained an enviable record during her college work. As a freshman, she was elected to the Rousers, the freshman honor group. As a sophomore she was awarded the scholarship medal given by faculty members who belong to Phi Beta Kappa national college honor society. Today she has the highest scholarship index of the upper division students.

"She has participated in numerous activities. Always an active member of the Women's Athletic Association, she has been chairman in many of its important committees and last year was its treasurer. In addition, she has played in the college "pep" band, has participated in dramatics, is a member of the Science club, and a "Lumberjack" reporter.

"Although she has carried a heavy schedule of studies each semester, she has earned a large part of her college expenses. A major in social sciences she has worked as an assistant to Dr. Homer Balabanis of the social science department. She will graduate in June 1940 with the general elementary and junior high school teaching credentials and the A. B. in social science.

"James Hall also has participated in many extra-curricular activities," Pedrotti said in announcing his election to the society, "He played football during his first year here. Last year, an official photographer, he was largely instrumental in making a success of the college annual. This year, in

the same capacity, he is again busy on the campus at plays, assemblies, and athletic events taking pictures for this year's annual.

"He has developed a keen interest in the courses in science and has made a splendid record in that field. He is known to all science students as the laboratory assistant to Dr. Doris Gillespie. In this capacity he has earned much of his own way through college. He is a candidate for the A. B. degree in biological science and plans to continue his education at the University of Washington.

"With all his activities he is a wide reader, and enjoys Shakespeare especially."

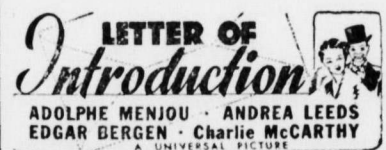
