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
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About This Edition

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Dr. Thomas Franklin Freeman: 1919-2020

In 2009, when the Frederick Douglass Honors Institute became the Honors College, Texas Southern University (TSU) named it after Dr. Thomas Franklin Freeman. Distinguished Professor of Forensics and legendary debate coach, Dr. Freeman led the University's award-winning Debate Team to scores of regional, national and international competitions. Dr. Freeman instructed such iconic national and global figures as Representative Barbara Jordan and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and advised Academy Award winner Denzel Washington in the movie, The Great Debaters. Washington tapped into the more than 60 years of service and success that made Dr. Freeman an icon of TSU, the African American community, the United States, and the world.

Dr. Freeman passed away on June 6, 2020, just a few weeks shy of his 101st birthday. The person and the legacy of Dr. Freeman continues to inspire scholars in the Honors College, students in the University, and leaders in the nation and the world.

In the Beginning: Reflections from Dr. Sunny Ohia (Provost, 2008-2014)

"I was aware of **Dr. Thomas F. Freeman's** role as Denzel Washington's coach in the movie, *The Great Debaters*, before my arrival on TSU's campus as Provost/ Vice President for Academic Affairs in September 2008.

During my first meeting with **Dr. Freeman** (in his capacity as a senior academic leader on campus), I was very impressed by his personality and the stories he told me about the successes of the Texas Southern University Debate Team over the years. I was also enamored by his passion for students and the learning environment. As he left my office, I began thinking of a higher visible leadership position on campus for this legendary educator. Incidentally, during my preparation for interview for the provost position, I was aware of the presence of an Honors Program on campus. Indeed, I had discussed the idea of elevating the Honors Program to a full-fledged academic college with the Search Committee (if offered the position of chief academic officer). In my next meeting with then President of the University, **John Rudley**, I discussed the outcome of my meeting with Dr. Freeman and broached the idea of appointing him as an interim dean of a new Honors College. My thought at that time was that we needed individuals such as Dr. Freeman in a leadership position on campus.

By the end of our conversation that morning, we both agreed that our administration will name the new Honors College in honor of Dr. Freeman as a recognition for his lifetime contributions to the Debate Team and his support of academic excellence on campus.

You can imagine my joy in breaking the news to Dr. Freeman during my next meeting with him! He was silent for a while and had tears in his eyes as he asked me to convey his gratitude and appreciation to **President Rudley** for the opportunity to immortalize his name. I then informed him that the president and I would like him to also serve as an interim dean for the new college as we embark on a nation-wide search for a dean.

As I reminisce about my tenure as a former Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs at TSU, the creation of the Thomas F. Freeman Honors College would rank as one of the most significant accomplishments of our administration. I am glad that we were able to recognize Dr. Freeman's accomplishments and immortalized his name while he was still living with us. While very few eminent academic leaders in this world ever live to serve as the first dean of a college named after them, the late Dr. Thomas F. Freeman more than deserved this recognition for his selfless contribution to education and the nurturing of several thousands of students in the Debate Team and also in the classroom as a distinguished professor. He was very active as a tenured and later, as a retired emeritus professor until his departure from mother earth. I conclude this piece by stating that he was my academic idol and a mentor that I would always strive to emulate in my remaining days in the professoriate."

"When I came to TSU as a freshman in 1968 and I joined the Debate Team, I had no prior knowledge of **Dr. Thomas Franklin Freeman**, but I knew immediately, upon meeting him, that this man would be a very influential person in my life. At that time, I had no idea, the extent of that influence.

The experiences he afforded me as a member of the TSU Debate Team, (educationally, socially and spiritually), are second to no other experiences in my life. He was the scholar, always encouraging us to aim high. He was the teacher, the coach, sharing his knowledge so that we might learn.

He was the provider, sharing his earnings with a lot of students who had few if any financial resources. He was the example and the answer and he would never betray you. He was our surrogate father.

And so, when I returned to Houston in 1974 after completing graduate studies at Howard University and Dr. freeman asked me to serve as assistant De-

bate Coach because of his demanding responsibilities as Director of the Weekend College, I knew that I had no choice. I had to give back because I had gained so much.

And so, my growth continued. I saw Dr. Freeman, "Doc "as we affectionately called him, patiently helping students in 2020 prior to COVID 19, just as he did when I was a student in 1968, and just as he did in 1949, when he organized the team, encouraging, supportive and believing in them.

For 70 years, Dr. Freeman served as a beacon of inspiration by his example of excellence throughout his career. He epitomized Texas Southern University's core values: excellence, leadership, service and truth. He lived a life so full of accomplishments that few can match the honor and respect associated with his name.

As one of many, in whom he evoked the keenest admiration and respect, I take this opportunity to let the world know how much I appreciated him for being such a strong force in my own growth and development through his exceptional taste, extraordinary judgement and creativity and remarkable foresight.

"Dr. Thomas F. Freeman developed close, positive, enduring relationships with many people during his long, fruitful life. His evidence-based research led to his receiving approval to set the Honors College on its course to becoming a vibrant, essential academic unit. As interim dean from 2014-2017, I continued to connect with Dr. Freeman and relied upon him to help elicit support from the administration as well as Honors alumni and corporate donors to raise funds for the College. I deeply admired his focused high energy, his insistence upon excellence, his demand for innovation, and his belief that all things are possible if we, using all the smarts we can muster, work hard and pray even harder."

"Dr. Thomas F. Freeman exists in my mind on the Mount Rushmore of men and women who have made an indelible impression on my life. At the TSU Memorial Reflections from Dean Jemison Pollard

"As Dean of the Thomas F. Freeman Honors College, I attended the Homegoing of **Dr. Thomas F. Freeman** on June 16, 2020, at the Texas Southern University Health and Physical Education Arena. There were so many other mourners (relatives, associates, and friends) from different worldly venues to celebrate the Homegoing of Dr. Freeman. I listened attentively to program presenters as someone praised him for former "great successes," another for previous "exceptional achievements," and yet another for former "noble advancements." My role on the program was to acknowledge the many tributes and resolutions received. All presenters agreed that this Centenarian was a "one-of-a-kind man" – a legendary educator, administrator, debate coach and a gifted speaker and preacher.

All the sublime rhetorical praises awakened in me another way of thinking about Dr. Freeman. I remembered the many gleeful moments I spent with him. I can clearly see Dr. Freeman's waving to get my attention from a far distance across the TSU campus. Throughout my career at TSU, I frequently sought out Dr. Freeman for advice. I came to the university knowing about Dr. Freeman because he and my dad were schoolmates at Virginia Union University and Seminary. In 2017, TSU convened a Search Committee given the

task to select a dean. I had served as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs in the Honors College from 2011 to 2015. I asked Dr. Freeman if he thought I should apply. Before he answered, Freeman's iconic pleasant smile transformed into a perplexing expression. He said, "You already know what I think, Dianne. You just want me to vocalize what I think." I told him immediately that I respected his opinion. He reared back again in his cushion chair and said dramatically, "Dianne! Yes, you are a 'Man for all Seasons' and we laughed and spent the remainder of my visit talking about my children.

Dr. Freeman never missed an opportunity to attend all activities in the College. He delivered the closing remarks on all programs. With his lead, the scholars repeated the oath and pledge at induction and graduation recognition ceremonies.

By the time I forced my attention to my fellow mourners who had not shared my diverted pleasant memories of Dr. Freeman, the eulogy was being given. At that instance, I realized again the importance of the juxtaposition of death and life. Dr. Freeman, along with his staff, had given life to the Honors College in 2009 and established its present infrastructure consisting of a comprehensive body of scholarly standards for learning that will be passed on from generation to generation in perpetuity.

Now from this moment, Freeman Scholars will only read and hear about this great man. I am certain that the scholars will carry Dr. Freeman's banner during these "uncertain times," resulting from the COVID-19 Pandemic and city street protests that expose police brutality, and denounce corruption associated with social and economic inequality. They have been disciplined to analyze these outcries of injustices and deal subsequently with sudden and overwhelming change by identifying their personal roles in a world divided by diverse ideologies. His legacy will continue through them.

My memory of Dr. Freeman will be forever cherished."








