New book by Eric Klinger examines relationships between motivation; how thoughts relate to life


Ever wonder how what's happening inside your head affects your satisfaction with your work, your marriage, your ability to get things done and your life goals in general?

A new book by University of Minnesota, Morris psychology professor Eric Klinger provides some interesting insights into how people's inner lives -- their thoughts and feelings -- depend upon and in turn influence their commitments to goals or incentives.

Recently published by the University of Minnesota Press, the book is entitled Meaning and Void: Inner Experience and the Incentives in People's Lives. It is geared for lay people as well as those with psychology backgrounds. Avoiding psychological jargon as much as possible, Klinger has succeeded in producing a book that is especially useful to people examining their own lives as well as to clergy and those in helping professions.

"The book casts a wide net," says Klinger. "It considers the way in which people's thoughts flow, the meaning of emotion and the nature of value, the causes and course of depression and alienation, satisfaction with work and marriage, the changes in people's use of the mass media and of mood changing chemicals."

Klinger also discusses the ultimate mood change -- suicide, including states of mind at the point of suicide and events that precipitate suicide attempts.




"I deal with humanistic issues, but from the perspective of scientific psychology to present a picture of the way humans think and feel, a theory of human inner experience as it is bound up with the goals people strive for.

"The materials for this picture are the many pieces of evidence that psychological investigators have uncovered using scientifically respectable methods," he says.

Drawing on both the clinical and experimental literature of psychology, on evidence from human studies, and where appropriate, from studies of animals, Klinger synthesizes many strands of contemporary psychology.

The resulting book bears on many areas of psychology and on some of the issues basic to the human sciences, such as the innate bases of value, the existence of universal symbols, emotion and hedonism, alienation and selfdestruction.

"The real nub of my work is the relationship between what motivates people to do things and how things people think about are related to what they do in life," Klinger summarizes. "You can't understand what people think about without knowing what is going on in their lives."
