#### **TOWN WARRANT 1975**

#### TOWN OF CHARLESTOWN State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, gualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Charlestown Elementary School Gymnasium in said Charlestown on Tuesday, the fourth day of March next, at 10:00 in the forenoon until the beginning of the business session at 7:00 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose the necessary town officers for their respective terms.
- Article 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? By ballot.
- Article 3. To see what action the Town will take to establish a three man board of elected assessors to be the legal assessing authority for the town. By petition. By Ballot.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$375,000, for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C.; 1251 et seq., 6 Stat.; 16 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes, the face amount not to exceed \$375,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the

best interest of the Town of Charlestown, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C.; 1251 et seq., 6 Stat.; 16 et sec.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed after being posted one (1) month in advance of the sale and duly posted and published in two local daily newspapers.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow notes on credit of the Town such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 8. To consider the budget. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, street lighting and for the necessary charges arising within the Town.
- Article 9. To see what action the Town will take to set the Tax Collector's portion of the Town Clerk-Tax Collector salary at 1/2 of one per cent of all real estate taxes collected.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to approve the construction and operation of a bleached kraft pulp mill as proposed by Parsons & Whittemore, Inc., conditioned upon compliance with all State and Federal environmental standards.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4000.00) to complete the Fire and Ambulance Building.
- Article 12. To see what action the Town will take to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the Charlestown Senior Citizens. By petition.

- Article 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of \$6,000.00 for use by the Medical Building Association in altering and adding on to the present Visiting Nurse room; to be repaid by the Medical Building Association over a six (6) year period.
- Article 14. To see what action the Town will take to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a five man Police Advisory Board, no member is to serve for more than six consecutive years. By petition.
- Article 15. To see what action the Town will take to honor the Bicentennial of our country by holding a Bicentennial -Old Home Day Celebration and further to select a committee for this purpose.
- Article 16. To see what action the Town will take to discontinue the cross road of approximately one hundred twenty (120) feet between the Old Claremont Road and the Reservoir Road, this being the road which passes between the residences of Raymond Fuller and John Cederstrand. By petition.
- Article 17. To see what action the Town will take to approve the name of Unity Stage Road, for the section of highway east of the railroad in North Charlestown, which intersects with Route 12. By petition.
- Article 18. To see what action the Town will take in naming a road in North Charlestown from a point on Little Sugar River near the residence of Burleigh Dunn, where the bridge was discontinued by the Town in 1968, across the Unity Road to the Burrough Road near the foot of Bailey Hill, south to the present Route 12, between the Harold Bemis residence and the Erma Besenreuther residence, to be called the Wheeler - Rand Road. By petition.
- Article 19. To see what action the Town will take to amend the amendment to Article 6 of the 1972 Town Meeting -"Whereas all ambulance funds in past years have reverted back to the general fund, I move that all ambulance income and donations be placed in a special notice account at the Connecticut River National Bank so that it may be drawn out and applied to the ambulance account for new equipment, secretarial help and ambulance replacement at the request of the ambulance

crew and the approval of the Board of Selectmen, secretarial help shall not exceed \$500.00 per year. In the event that the ambulance service dissolves for any reason, all assets, tangible or intangible, will be turned over to provide health care services in Charlestown."

- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the regional planning commission, now organized and named The Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, for the fiscal year 1975-1976. This membership is not to involve dues, fees or any cost to the Town of Charlestown.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purchase of a tractor snowblower for use in snow removal on the sidewalks of the Town.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against the following debt service incurred for "priority expenditures" since January 1, 1972.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other actions thereon:

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take with reference to participation in the National Flood Insurance Program and to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

- Article 25. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the enactment of necessary resolutions assuring the Federal Insurance Administrator that the Town intends to enact all necessary by-laws for the prevention of flood damage.
- Article 26. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the granting to the Planning Board site plan review authority for non-residential construction pursuant to R,S,A, 36:19a.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a planning consultant to assist the Planning Board in preparing a map which will accurately outline the area in the flood zone and to appropriate the sum not to exceed \$500.00 for the purpose.
- Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to revoke the action taken pursuant to Article 20 of the 1973 Warrant, whereby the Town authorized the appropriation of \$64,000.00 for the Crown Point Heights sewer extension and pursuant to Article 21 of the 1973 Warrant, whereby the Town appropriated the sum of \$160,000.00 for sewer treatment purposes, both appropriations to have been paid from sewer receipts contrary to the provisions of RSA 252.

Voted to accept this Article.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$20,500.00 for the purpose of updating the report on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, to qualify the Town to receive Federal funds under P. L. 92-500, and designing improvements to the sewerage system to eliminate the raw sewage outfalls in the Riverview area and to upgrade the existing sewage lagoons, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$20,500,00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation. sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Charlestown, and pass any vote relating thereto. Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants, or other funds for municipal purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire. Motion was made and seconded to amend the Article by deleting the words "and expend".

The Article as amended was defeated.

Voted to accept the original Article as read.

Article 10: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept aid from any and all agencies, both State and Federal, relative to disasters which may occur during the ensuing year and until the Annual Town Meeting in 1975, and to expend funds so received to repair and restore damaged municipal properties and to alleviate disorders resulting from such disasters.

Voted unanimously to accept this Article.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,500.00 for the equipment and operation of a Town operated, Sanitary landfill. This sum to include the purchase of a four-in-one bucket equipped, tractor crawler, the necessary operators' building, fencing, site preparation and labor. This sanitary landfill to be operated to specifications as required by State Law and recommendations of the Conservation Commission and Board of Selectmen.

Voted unamimously to accept this Article...

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$15,444.00 for the purchase of a new ambulance and related equipment; this amount to be reduced by a federal grant of \$5,444.00 and further reduced by \$3,000.00 from the ambulance reserve fund. The balance to be raised by taxation is not to exceed \$7,000.00. Approved by Finance Committee.

Voted unamimously to accept this Article.

Article 13: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,007.50 (bid price) for a base radio station for the Fire Dept. Approved by Finance Committee.

Voted unamimously to accept this Article.

Article 14: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate funds not to exceed \$80,000.00 for construction and site work for a Fire and Ambulance building. The total cost to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes, under and in compliance with the provisions of the

Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955, and any amendments thereto) and repaid in eight (8) annual payments. To authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other action as may be necessary to affect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Charlestown, and pass any vote relating thereto, By petition.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1974

It was a full and busy year with a total of 1285 Motor Vehicle Violations. The Radar was used extensively and is hopefully responsible for what appears to be less and less accidents as over 22,000 cars have been monitored on various streets and roadways. Criminal Acts remained about the same as last year with the new Criminal Code to become familiar with, with catagories in certain areas being grouped together under one heading, such as Theft By Unauthorized Taking, of which there was 50. Total Acts were 214, excluding Juvenile's, which by the way, still remains reduced greatly per capita since Charlestown has had a full time force. Crimes by adults ranged from the "Unauthorized Taking" to Indecent Exposure and Lewdness, Criminal Threatening, to Drugs and Thefts.

Town Ordinance Violations totaled 50, and these included from Illegal Parking - Snow Removal, to Town Dump Violations. (Use of our Dump by Outsiders)

Income amounted to some \$1,100, mostly from the hiring of Police Officers, such as traffic officer at Young's Diner, not counting what the Police Dept. brought in for the Town from Court Fines.

As for the Cruiser report, it went some 45,659 miles, bringing the total mileage on same (as of Dec. 31st) to 89,442, and by March, counting idleing time, will have gone an estimated 150,000 miles.

One piece of equipment in the cruiser this past year is a new Resusitator and has come in very handy many times until the arrival of our Ambulance crew.

Your Police Reserves donated some 72½ hours this year for Memorial Day, Walk-A-thon, Bike Safety Rodeo, etc.

Under "Other Services Rendered" which included from Taking Fingerprints for new citizens, to delivering Emergency messages, Escorting Funerals, helping depressed individuals, and Family Problems, plus assisting other Police Departments, we performed 2,161 separate acts. 106 alarms (security) were answered, 11,555 secutiry checks were made (3,299 for private homes away on vacation, in Hospital, etc.)

If this upcoming year is marked by high unemployment, more inflation and recession, I would expect an increase in Criminal Activities to rise accordingly.

In the event anyone wishes to see a breakdown of the various catagories, please feel free to come to your Police Station.

#### **REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT**

During this past year we straightened corners and added culverts on Margaret Street, Hemlock Road and Burrough Road. We also spread gravel and tarred in three different places and spread hot top on the rough places.

We put in new culverts and graveled the Boy's Camp Road, Meany Road and Lamb Road.

We repaired the bridge on the Unity Road in North Charlestown, strengthening the underpinning.

Used 217 tons of hot top and 212 tons of cold patch.

Moved pile and fill from new fire house to swimming pool and rest to dump. Put in drainage to swimming pool, dug in front of new firehouse and put in two feet of gravel and helped on the Landfill project.

Am asking for a sand spreader and truck. Would also like a yard bucket loader with mowing machine attachment and a machine to clean sidewalks.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid-August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the vear.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHARLESTOWN RECREATION AREA OPERATING COMMITTEE – 1974

The newest addition to Charlestown's recreation program was opened to the public on June 24, 1974. The above named committee was formed as a sub-committee of the recreation committee to be responsible for the operation of the swimming pool.

A full time staff of seven people were hired to maintain and service the new pool. Our first year of operation was successful in great measure because of the caliber of our staff. #### CHARLESTOWN VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SERVICE

During 1974 the CVAS responded to 180 calls. This was a large increase over the 114 calls logged the previous year.

We received our new ambulance the first of July and have used it extensively in emergency and transfer work. The new vehicle gives us much badly needed room.

We have had two new members complete the standard and advanced American Red Cross training program; also four men recertified as Red Cross instructors. The entire squad was also recertified by the Vermont Heart Association for their CPR cards.

We also held weekly training sessions throughout the summer and climaxed this with a mock disaster to evaluate this training.

Also, throughout the year members have attended seminars at Springfield and Hanover hospitals on the latest methods of emergency care.

We distributed cards with the Charlestown Emergency numbers to local merchants to be passed out to persons wanting them. Anyone wishing one of these cards may obtain one by contacting a member of the ambulance service.

In closing I would again like to thank the many merchants and individuals who made contributions to the service during 1974 and the members of the squad who donated many hours of their time to manning the ambulance and participating in the training programs.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER TOWN OF CHARLESTOWN - 1974

The required number of water samples were taken in Charlestown and North Charlestown with no discrepancies found in either municipal supply. Periodic samples were drawn directly from the wells serving Charlestown and N. Charlestown. All reports were returned as satisfactory.

Several foster homes were inspected at the request of the N.H. Dept. of Welfare and a report returned as to the sanitary conditions existing in the home.

The new swimming pool reduced the duties of the health officer in that weekly samples were no longer required with a constant, chlorinated, recycled system in operation.

Because of the conversion of the town dump from an open-face operation to a sanitary land-fill, there were three rodent extermination programs carried out over a period of three months previous to the closing of the old dump. After the land fill had been in operation for a short time it was also treated three times for rodent control. This program resulted in an almost complete removal of all infestation at the land fill. My compliments to the Conservation committee and Ronald Blair for the smooth transition from one system to the new improved facilities.

Again as in other years, I extend my sincere appreciation to the Selectmen, Water Department, and all others I have come in contact with in the performance of my duties.

#### CHARLESTOWN MEDICAL BUILDING ASSOCIATION

This year has seen a substantial change in the services being provided by the occupants of the Medical Building.

Doctor Merriam has continued to lease the building and to provide utilities for the Visiting Nurse Association, additionally the newly formed Child-Youth Program has been operating from the Medical Building.

The two Agencies, the Visiting Nurse Association and the Child-Youth Program, in cooperation with Doctor Merriam as consultant Physician have experienced greatly expanded growth and cooperatively are providing a much more comprehensive community and area health service.

Sharon Hartwell is the Child-Youth Program nurse and Kay Fraiser is the Visiting Nurse. More information can be obtained either from them or from the Visiting Nurse report.

Because of the expanded activities of the Visiting Nurse Association and increased Staff, plans are presently being made to provide additional room at the Medical Building by adding on two rooms to the present Visiting Nurse Room. This would be leased to the Visiting Nurse Association.

We have continued the maintenance and upkeep program for the building, this year the carpet in the waiting room, hall, receptionist office and Doctor Merriam's office was replaced.

A complete financial report is contained elsewhere in this Town Report for information. Additionally it is noteworthy that through December 31, 1974 the Medical Building Association has turned over to the Town \$9,550.00 since the building has been in operation.

Your confidence in the Association's ability to provide health service is greatly appreciated and is a direct reflection of the Association's tremendous growth over the past year.

Since our reorganization at the end of 1973, we have made great strides and accomplishments.

1. We have 1 full-time and 2 part-time registered nurses providing service, equal to 2 full-time nurses (1973, one part-time nurse).

2. We have 2 people to maintain our office and records, each working forty hours a week (1973, 1 part-time person).

3. We provide services of an occupational therapist.

4. We have made 1,391 visits (1973; 789 visits - an increase of 76%).

5. We have an active Board of Directors of 15 people representing the towns.

As you can see, our Agency has grown tremendously in the past year due to the many requests for Agency service. The services provided by the Agency are directly proportioned to the need of our patients, as requested by our sources of referral.

#### CHARLESTOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Year of the Landfill best describes the efforts of the Conservation Commission in 1974. In accordance with State law, the Commission undertook the task of planning and implementing landfill operations before the legal open burning cut-off date of July 1, 1974. The entire process in developing a state approved landfill operation is one that required dozens of evenings of hard work on the part of all members of the commission. Late 1973 and the first 6 months of 1974 were spent developing a landfill plan. First site selection followed by appropriate soils exploration to determine landfill capabilities were needed. After preliminary assurance of the land suitability to landfill operation, the actual landfill plan had to be drawn up. Relying on the talents of the commission members (rather than expensive engineering consulting firms) we were able to produce suitable scale maps of the area, prepare and accept bids for equipment (crawler) and buildings (20X24 building at landfill), prepare a rather extensive environmental impact statement on the effect of the landfill on the local ecology, screen applicants and hire a landfill operator, and develop a comprehensive landfill operations plan.

The planning process took longer than anticipated and as a result, we were not ready to begin operations on July 1. This necessitated a special hearing in Concord wherein we requested an extension of the July deadline, showed just cause and said extension was granted.

Final acceptance of the plan required the approval of five State agencies in all, including the Water Pollution Control and Supply Board, Public Health officials and others in addition to the Air Pollution Control Board. Also, numerous OSHA regulations had to be met. The plan was accepted and we entered the transition stage by early September. Our initial operations plan called for the trench method of landfilling so the first trench had to be dug before we could cease open burning. Several rat kills followed by grading and covering the old dump face signaled the end to the era of open dump burning in Charlestown (September 13, 1974).

Wednesday morning, September 18, 1974 marked the beginning of landfill operations in Charlestown. Initial reaction has been favorable and operations are now running very well.

The idea of re-cycling glass, paper and other material was one that came with sound credentials and our reasons for instituting re-cycling were based on these. First, re-cycling paper, metals, glass, etc. provides much needed raw material to manufacturers. This re-cycled material helps conserve vast quantities of raw materials including trees, minerals and ores and oil and coal. (It has been estimated that energy inputs reduced by 90-95% through recycling). Besides this indirect benefit to the town came the direct benefit of reducing the amount of material that had to be landfilled. With the cost of land, cover material, etc. this

means tax dollars saved. Response to recycling has been overwhelming as most people realize the benefits of re-cycling and are eager to help.

All the efforts of the Commission were not directed toward the landfill operation. Once again an Annual Earth Day clean-up drive was held this year organized by Commission member Margaret Spaulding. Under her guidance the day was a big success and all the rural roads of Charlestown were cleared of litter. It is encouraging to note that each year the amount of litter is decreasing.

There are many concerns for the future and the Commission will deal with these. The landfill, of course, will need continued supervision. A town natural resources inventory, future town watershed protection, scenic roads, prevention of pollution of water and air are but a few of the opportunities that lay ahead.

#### UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Council has been undergoing a period of rapid growth in this, its second year of full work in the Lake Sunapee Region. It originated as a six member economic development association in the Upper Valley. But with its growth and the development of the Lake Sunapee Region two years ago, it is now a comprehensive regional planning agency serving the needs of 22 member communities, from offices in Lebanon and Newport.

The Council operates on an annual budget of about \$109,000 for the current 1974-75 fiscal year. It is under the direction of a 45 member board of directors composed of two directors from each of its 22 member communities (plus one director-at-large). Since these directors are appointed by the Selectmen and set the overall policies and programs to be administered by the professional staff, there is complete local control.

Yet, the membership dues from local communities account for less than 30 percent of the council's total revenue. The remainder comes from various state and federal sources; sources available to the Council because of its status as a comprehensive regional planning agency recognized by the federal government and the states of New Hampshire and Vermont.

Within the present year, there has been the completion of a comprehensive solid waste management study, which has helped all member towns head in the right direction as they approach the state-mandated deadline for closing their open burning dumps; and which has revealed new options and technical areas for exploration by those towns which already have a landfill established.

Direct staff assistance is made available to most communities via a technical services program with help given in such diverse areas as sub-division regulations, land use maps, downtown improvement studies, new zoning ordinances, planning for new municipal facilities, transportation and recreation.

These types of services will be continued in its new fiscal year. The exact components remain to be identified and they will depend largely on what the town-appointed directors see as pressing needs.

While each town has its own pressing problems, it does not exist in a vacuum. Many of its neighbors face some of these same problems. This is where a regional planning program can help, working with and for local communities to seek solutions to these common problems. That is the continuing mission of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF CHARLESTOWN, NEW HAMPSHIRE

To promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the Town of Charlestown; to secure efficiency and economy in the process of developing the town and to keep it an attractive place in which to live and do business, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of said town in town meeting convened, in accordance with authority conferred by Chapter 31:69-81 R.S.A.

#### ARTICLE ! DEFINITION OF ZONES

Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance, the Town of Charlestown shall be divided into Zones as follows:

**ZONE** A. All property on the west side of Main Street from the South underpass to Railroad Street to a depth of 300 feet from the center of Route 12 exclusive of any railroad property in the zone. All property on the east side of Main Street from 250 feet south of Paris Avenue to School Street not including the property inclosed by School Street, Arbor Way, Elm Street, and East Street. All property on the east side of East Street to a depth of 250 feet south of High Street, (Paris Avenue). Crown Point Heights (Adopted at Town Meeting, March 13, 1956.)

Zone A-1. All property enclosed by a line starting with the intersection of Clay Brook and the Connecticut River. Proceeding Northerly along the East Bank of the Connecticut River to a Point 600 feet East of the middle of the Cheshire Toll Bridge. Then proceeding Southerly on a line parallel to Route 11 and 12 at 600 feet from the center of this road on the Easterly side to a point where the line intersects with the Boston and Maine Railroad, then proceeding Southerly along said Railroad to a point where Clay Brook intersects with the Railroad. Then proceeding Westerly along Clay Brook to the Connecticut River and the point of origin.

Excluding from this parcel all land owned and occupied by Old Fort Four Associates Inc. to be called Zone C as further stated.

**ZONE B.** All property on the west side of Main Street from Railroad Street to River Street with the railroad property as the Westerly boundary.

All property on the East side of Main Street from School Street to Sullivan Street to a depth of 250 feet from the center of Route 12.

Zone C. All property owned and occupied by Old Fort Four Associates Inc. as dated January 1, 1974.

#### ARTICLE II REGULATIONS

Section 1 ZONE A. The following uses shall be permitted:

a. Customary home occupations, such as paying guests, offices, of lawyers, dentists, physicians, real estate operators, dressmaking or hairdressing parlors and similar occupations not offensive to the area in which they are located.

b. A detached one or two family dwelling, church, school offering general education course, private school library.

c. Private club not conducted for profit, municipal recreation or water supply use, hospital, clinic, convalescent home, sanitarium, museum, research center, philanthropic use, hotel or inn, golf club, garden or nursery may be allowed in any zone under special exception granted by the Board of Adjustment under the standards set forth in Article VI, Section 2.

d. Only the following signs shall be permitted: ....Town and State Highway directional and regulatory signs, historical signs, and those relating to the sale, lease or rent of the property or to the profession of the occupant; no sign or group of signs shall exceed five square feet in area.

e. Every new building or structure or any building or structure moved from another location shall be set back from the property line at least twenty-five feet and from the side lot at least twenty feet.

f. Each lot of a new building development shall have a minimum of 15,000 square feet and a minimum frontage of 100 feet.

g. Conversion of existing dwellings or the construction of new dwellings for the housing of a maximum of four families shall be permitted providing that the lot upon which said dwelling is located provides sufficient parking space for the cars of all occupants. Where the building is for three or four families, 5000 square feet of land area shall be added for each additional family.

Section 2. Zone B. The following uses shall be permitted:

a. Apartment house, grocery store, drug store, theater, meat and/or fruit market, filling station, automobile parking, shoe repair shop, restaurant, and other retail business or service.

b. Places of amusement and assembly, auto repair shops, and other motor vehicular services, any wholesale business.

c. Manufacturing which will not be detrimental to a neighborhood for reason of odor, smoke, dust, fumes, vibration or because of danger of fire or explosion. No dry cleaning establishments or paint shop shall be permitted in close proximity of other buildings.

d. All new buildings shall be set back at least ten feet from the front property line and shall provide sufficient off-street parking in accordance with the following standards:

Sufficient off-street parking shall be provided to allow 300 square feet for each 3 people on premises.

e. No sign or group of signs shall exceed twenty-five square feet in area on any one property nor be placed in a position which would be a traffic hazard.

# ARTICLE III GENERAL PROVISIONS – SHALL APPLY TO ALL ZONES

Section 1. Any lawful use of any building or premises in existence at the time this ordinance becomes legal may continue its use though it is contrary to the ordinance.

Section 2. If any non-conforming use of any building or premise be discontinued for at least a year subsequent use shall conform to the ordinance.

Section 3. Junk yards or places for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles or other materials shall be permitted only in rural areas at least 1500 feet from Routes 11, 12, and 12A.

# ARTICLE IV ENFORCEMENT

Section 1. A zoning administrator shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen and he or she shall be responsible for administering and enforcing the provisions of this ordinance. In fulfilling his or her duties and responsibilities, the zoning administrator shall receive applications, inspect premises, maintain records, issue permits and perform other tasks necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. No building or structure shall be moved, altered or erected and no land shall be used without a permit duly issued by the zoning administrator. A zoning permit shall be issued by the zoning administrator only if the requirements of this ordinance have been met. A zoning permit shall be issued or denied by the zoning administrator within 10 working days of the submission of an application.

Section 3. Whenever any provisions of this ordinance have been violated, the Board of Selectmen upon their own initiative or upon notification by the zoning administrator shall take such action as shall be appropriate for the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 4. Whoever violates any provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each day of violation.

## ARTICLE V VALIDITY

Section 1. The proven invalidity of any section or provisions of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

#### ARTICLE VI BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Section 1. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment consisting of five (5) members and shall be removeable by the Board of Selectmen only upon written charges and after public hearings. In addition the Selectmen shall appoint five (5) alternate members removeable only upon written charges and after public hearing and who shall serve during their term whenever a regular member of the Board of Adjustment shall be absent or disqualified under the provisions of RSA 31:73. Within thirty (30) days of adopting of this amendment the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a new Board of Adjustment and alternate members and one regular member and one alternate member shall be appointed to serve for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years and one for five years and thereafter the Board of Selectmen shall annually appoint one regular member and one alternate member for a term of five years. The Board of Adjustment shall have all of the power and duties set forth under provisions of RSA 31:66 through RSA 31:77 as amended. The Board of Adjustment shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. Whenever a special exception may be granted under the provisions of this ordinance such special exception shall be granted only in accordance with the following regulations and restrictions:

(1) No use shall be permitted which could cause any undue hazard to health, safety or property values or which is offensive to the public because of noise, vibration, excessive traffic, unsanitary conditions, noxious odor, smoke or other similar reason.

(2) Sufficient off-street parking shall be provided to allow 300 square feet for each 2 anticipated patrons or employees on the premises at the same time.

(3) All set back regulations shall be complied with.

All known abutters of any proposed special exception site shall be notified by the Board of Adjustment by Certified Mail at least one week prior to any public hearing regarding the special exception. The names and addresses of the known abutters shall be supplied by the applicant on plat plan to be submitted to the Board of Adjustment.

#### ARTICLE VII AMENDMENT

**Section 1.** This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting, providing two public hearings have been duly notified, such hearings receiving fifteen days notice: as prescribed by RSA 31:63-a and 31-63-b. Such vote to be on official ballot only.
