## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

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To the School Board of Chichester:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

### REPAIRS.

At Bear Hill, the interior wood work and ceiling have been painted. At the Pine Ground, the outhouses have been put in sanitary condition. At New Dover, the outhouses repaired.

I have noted on my inspections that no cuts or immoral marks have been made in outhouses that have been put in sanitary condition, proving the child's appreciation of clean and wholesome environments which also has been reflected in the moral tone of the school. I recommend that appropriations be made sufficient to put the outhouses at the Center, Bear Hill, and Kelley's Corner in condition to meet the minimum requirements of our state department. Also renew my recommendation of last year to paint the exterior of schoolhouses at Kelley's Corner, Center and Bear Hill.

### WAR ACTIVITIES.

Among the more important war activities were the War Gardens. In spite of the fact that there was a frost every month of the year in some localities of the town, twenty-seven pupils reported the successful completion of their gardens, totaling \$261.85 worth of products. There is need of greater effort the coming year in this work if we are to approximate our share in feeding the world during the winter of 1919-20. The work for the ensuing



year is to be more thoroughly organized and supervised than heretofore. Every school is expected to have its captain, two lieutenants, and at least seventy-five per cent. of its pupils enrolled in the great United States School Garden Army. This means that Chichester's force, consisting of one superintendent, six teachers, six captains, twelve lieutenants, and at least one hundred pupils should so support the great movement that New Hampshire with her 45 superintendents, 3,000 teachers, 3,000 captains, 6,000 lieutenants and 50,000 pupils, all working on a definite plan as a part of their daily school work, will place it star high in the zenith of the world's food production in the fall of 1919.

Another activity was the Junior Four-Minute Men introduced into several of our schools. These contests elicited a deeper interest in the current events of the day and increased the pupils' knowledge of the world in its relation to the Great War.

Red Cross and Thrift Saving Societies have been formed in nearly all schools of the town.

Thus our school children have shown in a most generous way their loyal trust in our institutions, have engendered a higher spirit of patriotism and developed a stronger appreciation of their home, their school and vital principles of liberty. All this work has been so correlated with their studies that it has furnished not only a new motor agency to improve their power of mental activity, to improve and clarify their expression of English but also given them a chance to do their bit in making the world safe for Democracy.

#### MUSIC.

The music has been under the instruction of Mrs. Sophronia Wells, of Epsom. The schools have made commendable progress and the pupils have acquired an

increased ability to read music at sight, made improvement in tonal quality and have learned many songs that will aid them in the rhythmic poise of their characters. Some one has said that "Music is the one great universal language, understood, loved, and used by every nation engaged in the great struggle.

"Music, the common tone in the new harmony of Nations, is more valuable than text or sermon, bell or book, treaty or diplomacy in reaching the hearts of all our citizens and helping all to sing a mighty pæan of praise for our great Nation."

I strongly recommend suitable appropriation to continue our singing in the schools.

#### IN GENERAL.

During fall and winter terms, the work has been greatly retarded by shut-downs and absentees caused by the prevailing epidemic of influenza and other kindred diseases. Not only has time been lost, but the vitality of the children lowered and a corresponding drop in the mental activity and powers of retention on part of the pupils.

Another unfavorable feature is the fact that, with the exception of two schools, every school has suffered the change of one or more teachers, due to sickness or the more lucrative promises of other vocations. These conditions are not conducive to best educational advancement. However, I feel that we are under no worse conditions than elsewhere in the state and that through the strenuous efforts of our present able teaching force we may be able to bring the work up to normal conditions before June. The work of all our teachers has been characterized by faithfulness and efficiency.

In our appropriations we should be alive to the facts: (1) that after the terms of peace in Europe have been

signed doubtless we will need new material in geography; (2) that under the inspiration of the great issues of a World War, historian, poet and essayist will vie with one another in giving new poetry, new prose to the educational world, mental nourishment that should be fed to the rising generation, to the school children of Chichester, if they are to be kept abreast of the times, ready to do their part when called to keep the world safe for Democracy.

We trust your appropriations for the ensuing year will be compatible with the demands of our new conditions, and with economic management along progressive lines.

In conclusion, I desire to express my appreciation of the helpful assistance of the school board, of the courtesy and hearty coöperation of the teachers and of the hospitality and support of parents and citizens.
