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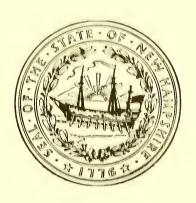

TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 1:00 P.M. TO 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Eaton in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Evans Memorial Building (Town Hall) in the Town of Eaton, County of Carroll on Tuesday the thirteenth of March at one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects herein after set forth. The polls shall open for balloting at 1:00 P.M., or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. Voting on Article 1 shall be by official ballot. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at 8 o'clock in the evening.

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Including town officers salaries, town officers expenses, election and registration expenses, expenses of the Town Hall and other buildings, Social Security, police department, fire department, insurance, civil defense, health department, vital statistics, town dump, town maintenance (summer and winter, highway subsidy and general expenses), street lighting, town poor, old age assistance, recreation, cemeteries and interest, planning and zoning, legal expenses, Capital Reserve and unemployment compensation.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or disperse of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector Deeds, reference RSA 80:42.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize for, accept, and expend such Federal, State, or other governmental unit or private source of funding which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.
- Article 6. To see whether or not the Town will authorize the Selectmen to investigate and contract in the name of the Town for the disposal of solid waste generated in the Town, with private contractor(s) lasting for a term of years at such price and other terms as the Selectmen deem prudent and reasonable acting in their sole discretion and capacity.

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to William J. Burns and Nancy E. Burns all the Town's interest, if any, in the former Snowville Schoolhouse Lot located on the southeast side of the road leading from Eaton Center to Snowville, which was conveyed by the Eaton School District to Arthur and Alice Evans in 1960, and by the Evanses to William J. and Nancy E. Burns in 1968. The purpose of this conveyance would be to confirm the Burns' title to this property.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to trade in the Town's mobile radio unit for a portable Walkie-Talkie unit with nickel cadmium battery and charger equipped with crystals for communications with the N.H. State Police, the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, the Conway Fire Department, and our Civil Defense radios, the sum not to exceed \$1,300.00 with trade-in and pending the authorization of the above agencies and licensing by the Federal Communications Commission.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to appoint a deputy with approval of the Selectmen, said deputy to be sworn in, have the powers of the Treasurer, and may be removed at the pleasure of the Treasurer.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Eaton Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1984 receipts, said funds to be placed in a special conservation fund IAW RSA 36,A:5.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the revaluation of the Town, such revaluation to be conducted by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration, and further to authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the above-mentioned purpose.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the removal and replacement of the present steps and railings on the back side of the Evans Memorial Building (Eaton Town Hall) for emergency fire exit purposes.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,000.0 for the purchase of a new highway truck to be deposited into the Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Act of 1972 for the use of setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

Appropriation Highway Maintenance Estimated Amount \$5,000.00

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$15,790.01 which is a State Highway Aid, designated as the "Highway Block Grant Aid", for the purpose of construction, reconstruction and maintenance of Town roads.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$388.00 for the purpose of becoming a member of the North Country Council for one year in order to obtain assistance for the Town Selectmen, Planning and Zoning committees and other committees requiring the services of the Council.

Article 17. To see if the Town shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Eaton, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the support of the summer water safety program.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred eighty seven dollars and fifty cents (\$787.50) to assist the Conway Recreation Commission in providing recreation programs to the residents of Eaton.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for Medical Transportation expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc.

Agreeable to petition signed by Harry Fowler and others.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program.

EATON TOWN MEETING 1983

The annual Town Meeting of the town of Eaton, NH was called to order on March 8, 1983 at 8:00 PM with Ellsworth T. Russell as Moderator.

Mr. Russell read the "Call to Meeting" and the Articles of the Warrant.

Recognition was given "by the Selectmen and the Townspeople of Eaton to Dr. John W. Cass for his many years as Health Officer of Eaton, since 1950. We would like to have spread upon the minutes of the 1983 Town Meeting our letter of thanks to Dr. Cass, so that his dedicated service may forever be a part of the Eaton Town Records."

Announcement was also made that Mrs. Leona Hurley had been appointed the new Health Officer of Eaton.

Corrections were made to the 1982 Town Report as follows:

On page 3, the term of the Moderator, Ellsworth T. Russell should have read "Term expires 1984."

On Page 22, on the Financial Report under Assets, the Grand Total should have read \$112,220.62. The Fund Balance - December 31, 1982 should have read \$46,918.27 and the change in Financial Condition should have read \$34,045.55.

On Page 23, under Fund Balance - Current, it should read:

Surplus \$46,918.27 Grand Total \$112.220.62

Article I was on the ballot. Elected to office were:

Selectman for three years
Highway Commissioner for one year
Auditor for one year
Trustee of Trust Funds for one year

Richard H. Young
Elwyn R. Thurston
Douglas K. Blue
Mark S. Provost

Also on the ballot was the question, "Are you in favor of the amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board as follows: To add (on page 5) at Article V, Section B. Rural Residential District Zone RR,1- Permitted uses: J. Gravel pits operated in the Jackson Forest by the Town of Eaton exclusively for its own use?" This question was approved 100-11.

Article 2. Alex McKenzie moved to raise the sum of \$102,308.64 as printed in the budget. Allan Robotham seconded. Then Alex McKenzie moved to change the figure for the Library appropriation from \$100. to \$125. Charles Hurll seconded. This was done because the Conway Library had asked for the additional amount this year. There was also some discussion on the fire expense. We now have to pay Conway for each fire or rescue call since Conway will no longer give us a contract as in the past. The new amount of Total Appropriations of \$102,333.64 was voted on and passed 54-0.

Article 3. Alex McKenzie moved, and Philip Kelly seconded, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to have Property Taxes collected on a semi-annual basis. After some discussion, it was felt that this would not save the Town enough money to warrant the change at this time. It was also felt by several that the State mandated times of collection, July 1 and December 1 (RSA 76:15a) would be an additional hardship. The article was voted down 14-36.

Article 4. Charles Hurll moved to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary. Paul Hennigan seconded. Passed 58-0.

Article 5. Charles Hurll moved to see if the Town would authorize the Selectmen to administer or disperse of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector deeds (RSA 80:42). Paul Hennigan seconded. Passed 51-0.

Article 6. Charles Hurll moved to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for a part-time secretary for the Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission and the Office of the Selectmen. Dr. Cass seconded. There was some discussion as to the necessity of a part-time secretary. It was pointed out that because of recent law suits against the Planning Board, Board of Adjustment and the Town, it has become a complex situation, and a secretary is really necessary for these bodies. Mr. McKenzie pointed out that the Conservation Commission did not have these complexities and did not see that this Commission would need a secretary in the near future, but he understood the necessity of one for the other Boards. The motion passed 45-7.

Article 7. Stephen Biddle moved to dismiss this article to see if the Town would authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy, with the approval of the Selectmen, who shall be sworn in, have the powers of Collector and may be removed at the pleasure of the Collector (RSA41:38). Robert Thurston seconded. When told there could be no discussion on this article until it was on the floor, and that there would be an explanation, Mr. Biddle and Mr. Thurston withdrew the motion. Alex McKenzie moved to accept the article and Douglas Blue seconded. It was explained that this would enable the Town Clerk as a deputy tax collector to accept Residence Tax money, upon request, from a resident who wished to register his car, but did not want to make a special trip to the Tax Collector's office to pay this tax. Article passed 58-0.

Article 8. Sam Head moved to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Capital Reserve Fund as established under Article 11 at Town Meeting on the 9th of March, 1982. Alex McKenzie seconded. It was explained that this amount should be changed to \$10,000. Last year when the article was voted on, there was no amount of money mentioned in the Warrant, so the Department of Revenue Administration would allow the Capital Reserve Fund to be established for the purpose of re-assessing the Town but the \$5,000 appropriated would have to go into the General Fund until a Warranty article could be voted on designating a specific sum of money. Therefore, this year we needed to vote the \$10,000 but \$5,000 of it was already in the General Fund to be transferred to this Capital Reserve Fund. The article as amended passed 51-0.

Article 9. Charles Hurll moved and Robert Thurston seconded to see if the Town would raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700. for the installation of two (2) dry fire hydrants, one located at Crystal Lake opposite the Jonathan Goodwin home, and the other located at Pollard Pond opposite the Fred Pollard home for the safety needs of homes in both the Eaton Center and Snowville areas. It was pointed out that the dry fire hydrants we already have are not kept in working order, and that these new ones would not be practical. Paul Hennigan pointed out that there were many inaccuracies in the Report on which this article was based. It was defeated 49-3.

Article 10. Charles Hurll moved and Allan Robotham seconded to see if the Town would raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for the removal of the existing oil-fired forced warm air furnace and for the purchase and installation of a new furnace and burner for the Evans Memorial Building (Eaton Town Hall). It was pointed out that the present furnace and burner are very old, out-of-date, and very inefficient and expensive to operate. Motion passed 42-3.

Article 11. Charles Hurll moved, Stephen Biddle seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500. for the purchase of a new highway truck and to authorize the withdrawal of \$7,500. from the Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. Passed 53-0.

Article 12. Paul Hennigan moved and Charles Hurll seconded to see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use of setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced, or take any other action hereon. Appropriation Highway Maintenance estimated amount, \$4,500. Passed 54-0.

Article 13. Paul Hennigan moved, Charles Hurll seconded, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,314.91 maintenance allotment (Duncan Fund) for the maintenance of Class V roads. Passed 57-0.

Article 14. Paul Hennigan moved, Charles Hurll seconded, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,672.61 which is a State additional Highway Subsidy allotment for the purpose of construction or reconstruction of Town Roads. Passed 51-0.

Article 15. Alex McKenzie moved, Leona Hurley seconded, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Eaton Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1983 receipts, said funds to be placed in a special Conservation Fund IAW RSA 36,A:5. Passed 50-0.

Article 16. Charles Hurll moved, Barbara McKenzie seconded, to see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate action by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Eaton and to the health and welfare of the people of Eaton. This article was amended by Alex McKenzie and seconded by Mary Gospodarek, to read: "To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate

actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain, which is harmful to the environment and economy of Eaton and to the health and welfare of the people of Eaton. These actions shall include, 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain—sulfur dioxide emissions—by the year 1990, and 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.'' This article passed as amended 27-15.

Article 17. Dr. Cass moved, Marge Kendrick seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Passed 53-0.

Article 18. Philip Kelly moved, Linda Jenkins seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$232. for the support of the Children and Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C&Y). Passed 44-1.

Article 19. Ginger Blymyer moved, JoAnn Kelly seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225. to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Amended by Barbara McKenzie and seconded by Charles Hurll to reduce the amount by \$25. to read \$200. Amendment defeated 18-19. Back to article as written. Passed 25-10.

Article 20. Paul Hennigan moved, Dr. Cass seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Passed 40-5.

- Article 21. Dr. John Cass moved, Paul Hennigan seconded, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. for the 1983 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway. Passed 41-0.
- Article 22. Harry Fowler moved to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$409.60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum equal to \$1.60 per person in the Town of Eaton. Philip Kelly seconded. Passed 46-0.
- Article 23. Linda Jenkins moved to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Programs. Seconded by Mary Gospodarek. Passed 35-5.
- Article 24. Mark Provost moved to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. for the support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Ronnie Day seconded. Passed 24-22.
- Article 25. Judy Goss moved to see if the Town of Eaton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750. to be turned over to the Conway Village Recreation Commission to help assist the programs of the Conway Recreation Center. Ronnie Day seconded. It was brought out that most of the children in town take part in some of these many programs. Passed 41-2.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125. for Eaton-resident use of the Conway Public Library for one year. Alex McKenzie moved and Sam Head seconded to vote this article down as unnecessary since it was already taken care of in the Budget. Voted down 41-0.

Article 27. This article on amending the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board had already been voted on by ballot and passed 100-11.

- Article 28. Any other businesas that may legally come before this meeting: 1. Charles Hurll asked why the Tricentennial Trust Fund was not listed in the Town Report. The Trustee's reply was that he had received a letter from the Office of the Attorney General stating that the Town could not have such a fund and that it should be added to the General Fund balance. Mr. Hurll stated it is not a Town Trust Fund but a private fund and should be handled in a similar manner to the way the Cemetery Trust Funds are handled. He offered to get this straightened out as he had done before when he was Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee and established this Fund.
- 2. Mary Gospodarek made a motion that the Town of Eaton go on record in support of proposed legislation submitted to the NH Legislature by the Conway Representative, Howard C. Dickinson, Jr., regarding return of 20% of the Rooms & Meals Tax to the town in which it is generated. Seconded by Ginger Blymyer. Passed 36-0.
- 3. Barbara McKenzie asked to thank Eugene Kleinmeier for his services as Selectman during the past six years. It was so moved and a rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Kleinmeier.
- 4. Paul Hennigan moved and Douglas Blue seconded that the meeting be declared closed. So voted. Meeting adjourned at 10:35 PM.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board's last annual report reminded us that 1983 was the 10th anniversary of Zoning in Eaton, and time to review its provisions and recommend changes deemed appropriate. A Questionnaire was formulated, mailed, and summary results published, reflecting the townspeople's wishes and feelings.

In conjunction with this, and as an integral part of Zoning, it is the duty of the Planning Board, at the same time, to update its Master Plan since it establishes a guide to desirable community growth.

The considerations and inclusions comprising this report, and any revisions, demand extensive study in all areas having an impact, big or small, on the municipality's development. A committee of nine citizens was selected to undertake this in-depth review of our Master Plan and report its findings to your Planning Board in October of 1984, with recommendations for any changes and additions to current ordinances and regulations.

Continued input from all of Eaton's citizens is welcomed, as is your attendance at our regular meetings scheduled for the third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the Evans Memorial Building (Town Hall).

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

Lack of funds and failure to obtain rights of way necessary before available stumpage can be sold have slowed the Commission's work of completing its survey of the remaining Town lands for which it is responsible.

This being the newburn year in Brooks Pasture, there was no crop to produce income. A remote section of this property, from which there is an interesting view, was further opened up. The cost of this work was paid with a gift for the purpose approved by the Selectmen.

As shown attached to the report of the Eaton Conservation Fund, the Town received its share of the Foss Mountain blueberry harvest and this money has gone directly into general revenues to help reduce taxes. It is in the interest of Townspeople to assist in preserving this crop. After it has been raked, there are usually plenty of berries left for domestic use.

Interest continues in preserving the integrity of the Town wetlands and the Commission has acted responsibly when informed of requests for dredge and fill permits; at the same time speeding the action when its safety has been determined.

Despite addressing letters to the 33 eligible young people for whom a scholarship to the Conservation Camp was possible, only one answer was received and that was negative.

Jonathan Simonds once again voluntarily cleared the Willie Bean site off the "Bush Road" and feels that it has now come under control.

Shirley Blue being unwilling to accept reappointment, the Selectmen appointed Richard Fortin to the vacancy. Shirley's special interest and contribution to the work of the Commission was appreciated during her tenure, and she will be missed.

At the August reorganization meeting, Jonathan Simonds asked to be replaced and Philip Kelly was elected Chairman. Other officers were willing to continue in office. Townspeople willing to serve on the Commission should make known their interest to the Selectmen, who have the appointing power. At least one vacancy is expected to occur in August when two terms run out.

As provided under its bylaws, regular meetings of the Commission are held at 7:30 p.m. local time on the second Monday of each month from April through November at Arthur and Alice Evans Memorial Building (Eaton Town Hall). Special meetings are given advance public notice. All meetings are, by law, open to the public. The Commissioners welcome active participation, especially by residents and taxpayers.

The names of the members responsible for actions reported above are listed. Their terms end in August of the year indicated, except as noted.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

by David Hawkins

In the spring of 1983 a Presidential report entitled A Nation

At Risk was released to the public. That report generated considerable concern and press attention. It was followed shortly thereafter with other studies and reports. Some of these back up studies compliment that report while others discount it as a political football.

Whether any of these studies are completely valid or completely invalid is insignificant. The significance of them all is the strong reference to the fact that schools cannot nor should they be allowed to operate in a vacuum. Education is far too sophisticated and complicated to be left to a few experts sitting in some far off office writing critical or complimentary reports.

The health or weakness of any school system is a local issue. Its health is determined by the questions the community asks, by the programs it endorses and by the quality of the people the system attracts and keeps. No school can be anything except what the community wants it to be.

To this end, the Conway Elementary School continues its pursuit of establishing a community-based school; a school which provides forums for discussion and questions, where parents are encouraged to visit and participate in their child's education, where excellence on an individual level is pursued over excellence on a class level.

Academic excellence is not enough. Clear thinking, creativity and the assuming of responsibility must be considered, as well as respect for what we are and where we are going. Certainly we have a long way to go to achieve these goals, but we have accomplished much. As parents and community members, you are encouraged to visit your schools and witness for yourself what is being done to provide your children with the very best of educational opportunities; opportunities that will prepare them for the challenges of the 21st century.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Dr. Francis M. Murphy

The school year 1983-84 has been, by all accounts, a reasonably successful year for S.A.U. #9. The transition from Bob Kautz's administration has gone quite smoothly thanks to the help and experience of the staff that stayed behind.

The high school has made a greater effort to be responsive to community needs, both in Conway and in the outlying districts. A new computerized attendance procedure has brought information to decision-makers soon enough to act on that information before it is too late.

In keeping with a move for cost cutting and efficiency, an administrative position has been cut from the S.A.U. budget. Elaine Woodman, our former Special Education Director, decided in light of this to move to the Bridgton School District in Maine. The tasks that she was charged with were divided between the elementary principals, the high school guidance director, the assistant superintendent of schools and one school psychologist whose working year has been extended by one month to help him accomplish the added duties. Next year the pattern will be similar. We have closed out the old position of assistant superintendent in the 1984-85 budget and opened the position of assistant superintendent for instruction and special education. Accordingly, we will be seeking applicants for this position.

Because of a rising demand for paperwork, some from the state and federal agencies, and some generated to do a more effective job here, we were at risk of having to add another secretary. At the same time our old computer was beginning to break down almost weekly. The solution to both of these problems seemed to be a new computer that could help the secretaries to produce more paperwork faster and solve the problem of breakdowns. The new computer can be used in locations other than just the S.A.U. administrative offices. By merely attaching a phone modem and a so-called "dumb" terminal that has no memory, outlying shoools can tap this superb machine, the IBM System 36. During the school year 1984-85 Kennett High School hopes to make use of the new computer for word processing, type setting and scheduling. By the 1985-86 school year, our hope is that we will be doing our own scheduling and have our own report cards and academic records computerized. Many other applications are also possible.

This year was also a year devoted to gathering community perceptions about the schools. The superintendent spoke at a number of local community functions, deliberately seeking what the community saw as the needs of the school district. A great deal of information was revealed about the towns' perceptions of the schools' performance; curiously, meetings with boards, teachers and administrators revealed that we all see some common areas that need improvement. These will become priorities for the administration.

Generally, we will focus on increased community involvement, more decisive administration, and increased student expectations. We fully expect, while maintaining and improving our programs in vocational and special education, to do more to make our more able students competitive in an increasingly challenging world.

Some small but significant achievements this year are the following:

- Every teacher's performance has been evaluated this year for the first time in many years.
- (2) Every administrator's performance has been evaluated.
- (3) A new staff newsletter has been initiated.
- (4) A comprehensive study of the Guidance Department at Kennett was begun with the goal to make the department more efficient.
- (5) The vocational education program has revamped its scheduling and will allow a greater participation in the program by freshmen and more flexibility by upper classmen.
- (6) A new comprehensive testing system is being implemented to allow us to compare our performance as a school district to other districts and our own standards. This should enable us to determine priorities more realistically.
- (7) The science program at Kennett is undergoing a study to discover how they can improve.
- (8) The graduation requirements of Kennett High have been stiffened to include 2 units of science and 2 units of math.

In the area of physical plant the energy conservation projects at Kennett High School have progressed well with the installation of insulation panels, new windows, and the insulation of the attic in the 1923 building. John Fuller School got its new roof; and Conway Elementary, John Fuller and Kennett received new doors to make more energy efficient entries. Part of the play area at Bartlett was rebuilt and improved. Madison got a new roof, and the kitchen was relocated to squeeze a little more space out of that building. Freedom is now located happily in their new school. In Jackson the donated barn was improved with a new roof among other structural improvements, and a large area between the school and the barn was upgraded for a play area. The Tamworth furnace was replaced and the heating system was modified to improve energy efficiency. Also, the outside brick was cleaned, repointed and sealed.

In all, we believe it to have been a good year thus far, with progress having been made in a large number of areas and more to follow.

EATON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The annual meeting of the Eaton School District was held on March 8, 1983, at 2:00 p.m. with Samuel B. Head as Moderator.

Articles 1-6 were voted by ballot.

Article 7. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Eaton School Board to apply for, accept and expend monies from any source during the fiscal year in the name of the School District. Charles Hurll seconded. The motion carried 25-0.

Article 8. Charles Hurll moved to raise and appropriate \$174,646 as stated in the School Budget. Joan Simonds seconded. Paul Hennigan made an amendment to reduce the School Budget figure of \$174,646 by 5% to \$165,913. Alex McKenzie seconded. Steve Biddle asked if the per pupil cost, which includes the Superintendent Office Expenses as part of the tuition costs, and the Office of Superintendent are in fact the same and the town is being charged twice for the same service. Mr. Kautz said that under state law SAU costs are determined by what Eaton's property evaluation is in comparison to the whole property evaluation of all the towns in the Supervisory Union. The town is being charged on students through tuition, and the SAU costs are added into the tuition calculation. The amendment was defeated 14-5. The original motion carried 21-1.

Article 9. Alice Linscott asked why the School Board meeting could not be held at a time when more townspeople would be available. Mr. Kautz said that under state law the Selectmen and School Board have the right to set the date, time and location.

Paul Hennigan moved to adjourn the meeting. Charles Hurll seconded. Motion carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 2:25 p.m.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 Board Conway, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 as of and for the year ended June 30, 1983, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.
