#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$7,500 to be expended with the sum of \$20,000 to be contributed by the State to build a State aid bridge over the Suncook river on the Short Falls road.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1147.50 to complete the Short Falls road from the Bridge to Route 28; the State to contribute \$2294.00.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for upkeep of McClary Cemetery, any balance to be used for resetting some of the grave-stones in the old part of the Cemetery, said money to be expended under the direction of the Cemetery Trustees.

- 8. To see if the Town will accept the following sums as Trust Funds, the interest, only, to be used for care of cemetery lots, all of which are in McClary Cemetery: One Hundred dollars for Batchelder Sanborn lot, One Hundred dollars for Walter J. and Mary E. Q. Philbrick lot, One Hundred dollars for Charles M. Steele lot, One Hundred dollars for George A. Long lot, and One Hundred dollars for William T. Sanders lot.
- 9. To see if the Town will adopt the Non partisan ballot system for the election of Town officers as provided in Public Laws Chap. 34, Sec. 112.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on all property taxes paid previous to July 1, 1946.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

13. To transact any other business that may be

legally brought before the meeting.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

Lest we forget, your Trustees would remind you that the Epsom Public Library was founded in 1893 and was first opened for distribution of books September 5, 1893 in George E. Warren's store building by the first Library Trustees who were, John H. Dolbeer, Warren Tripp, and Roscoe Hill. The first Librarian was Miss Elsie N. Warren. The Town appropriated and spent \$52.50 for books and incidental expenses in that first year. The State contributed \$100 worth of books — 105 volumes. Friends contributed books. At the end of the first year there were 304 volumes. 164 persons drew books averaging 52 books withdrawn each week.

The present Library building was completed and opened to the public Old Home Week (probably in August) 1902.

The Trustees reported that in the year 1907 books loaned numbered 2,585, and added, "We were pleased to have brought to the Library two books which belonged to the 'Epsom Social Library,' an association in existence in this town more than a century ago;" — about the year 1800.

In this year of 1946 we have more than 5,000 volumes and during the past year the Librarian has loaned 2,707 books.

For the comfort of the Librarian and the patrons of the Library, double windows have been placed and an electric heater has been installed. The Library Trustees were pleased to approve the request of the Women's Club to place the Epsom World War II Honor Roll on the premises of the Library. The installation took place on Memorial Day, May 30, 1945.

The reports of our Treasurer and of our Librarian found in these pages of the Town Report, will show the satisfactory condition of the Library's activities.

## PREVENT FOREST FIRES — IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result

of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

- 1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
- 2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
  - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.

- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
- c. Seeing that others comply with requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting. — that PAYS!

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

## To the School Board and Citizens of Epsom:

With the coming of VE and VJ days and the end of hostilities, some school activities connected with World War II have ended. However, the schools still have a part to play in building the Peace. The federal savings system will continue, also participation in relief projects, special study of the United Nations, and other means of cultivating world understanding and friendship. Postwar changes forecast in my last report are already taking place. It seems now that whatever form of compulsory military training and service may be in effect, young men will be allowed to remain in high school until graduation, provided their attendance and scholastic record are satisfactory.\*

At the annual school district meeting held March 10, 1945, a special committee was elected, consisting of Henry L. Stevens, Eleanora C. Nutter, John P. Yeaton, Warren T. Fowler, and Ralph E. Towle, and the Superintendent of Schools in an advisory capacity, to work with the School Board in investigating the needs and possibilities of a new central schoolhouse after the war. Mr. Stevens was designated chairman, and Mr. Towle secretary. This committee has held meetings and collected information by conferences and trips. It will doubtless report more in detail at the school meeting this year.

At the present time, funds are not yet available from

government agencies to assist with actual construction. However, the way is open to apply for funds for advance planning of projects to the extent that they are within the means of the district, to be repaid only if the project is entered upon by the district. Communities which have talked with different architects, selected one, chosen their site, and have some idea of the cost and general features of their post-war projects will be in a better position to secure immediate action as various forms of assistance become available.

This month (January 12) marks the 200th anniversary of the birth of Johann Heinrich Pestalozzi, Swiss educational pioneer. Instead of the prevailing methods of education for the few, consisting of memorizing printed words without regard for their meaning, beaten in by continual floggings, this great man exemplified education for the common people, inculcated with kindness, and including such humanities as music, drawing, history, geography, and nature-study, as well as improved methods in the 3 R's, taught by trained teachers. In a deserted convent, he gathered and cared for a group of refugee children, waifs such as roam in Europe today. His genius is largely responsible for interesting and friendly schools, to which children are willing and eager to go.
