Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose by ballot and plurality vote a town clerk.

2nd. To choose by ballot and plurality vote one selectman for three years.

3rd. To choose by ballot and plurality vote one trustee of the Robinson Female Seminary for the term of seven years.

4th. To choose by ballot and plurality vote one trustee of the trust funds held by the Town of Exeter, to hold office for three years.

5th. To choose by ballot and plurality vote one trustee of the Swasey Parkway for three years.

6th. To choose all other necessary town officers, auditors, or committees for the ensuing year.

7th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing highways, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling streets, for payment of the town debt, for lighting streets, for defraying expenses of decorating the graves of soldiers, for preventing the spread of insect pests within the town, and for other charges arising within the town, and for the payment of the firemen for the ensuing year.

8th. To hear the reports of the committees heretofore chosen and pass any votes arising therefrom.

9th. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of Robinson Female Seminary during the coming year.

10th. On petition of Edward O. Otis and ten others, to see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to call a town

caucus for the nomination of town officers to be elected at the coming town meetings.

11th. On petition of Albertus T. Dudley and sixteen others, to see if the Town will vote to improve the Old Cemetery on Newmarket road, by clearing the ground, by erecting a suitable boundary, and to preserve the boundary by surveying and mapping the premises, and to appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the same.

12th. On petition of Renfrew A. Thomson and nineteen others, to see if the Town will appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the purpose of defraying the expense of a series of eight band concerts to be played in the Swasey Pavilion by the Exeter Brass Band during the summer season of 1933.

13th. On petition of Arthur C. Watson and eleven others to see if the Town will vote to institute Daylight Savings Time to commence the last Sunday in April and to end the last Sunday in September.

14th. On petition of Alfred Moreau and ten others, to see if the Town will vote to make the pay of its Highway Agent twelve hundred dollars per year.

15th. On petition of Alfred Moreau and twenty others, to see if the Town will vote to make the minimum wage of its common laborers, who work by the day, subject to considerable lost time, three dollars and fifty cents per day, until voted otherwise.

16th. On petition of Arthur J. Conner and ten others to see if the Town will vote to co-operate with the State of New Hampshire under Federal Aid in reconstruction with concrete pavement, Main Street from near the end of the Parkway to the Boston and Maine Railroad crossing on the specific recommendations of the Tan Lane Committee appointed at the Town Meeting of 1931, and if the Town will appropriate money to carry out the same.

17th. On petition of C. A. Harris and ten others to see if the Town will authorize the installation of an electric light opposite the residence of C. A. Harris on Spruce Street, and appropriate a sum sufficient for its maintenance. 18th. On petition of Ralph E. Meras and nineteen others, to see if the Town will vote to stop buying fire insurance and instead appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars each year to create an insurance fund that shall be used for no other purpose. Five hundred dollars of such annual appropriation to be deposited in the savings department of the Exeter Banking Company and five hundred dollars in the savings department of the Rockingham National Bank. Said deposits to continue until the total amount of the deposits, with accrued interest, shall amount to thirty-five thousand dollars, when said deposits shall cease and the interest thereafter be used as the regular funds of the Town.

19th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a power side-walk snow-plow and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for the same.

21st. On petition of Helen A. Fellows and ten others, to see if the Town will vote to install an electric light on Gardner Street, opposite the land of Dana W. Baker.

22nd. On petition of Elizabeth J. O'Neil and fourteen others to see if the Town will vote to reimburse the Robinson Female Seminary Alumnae Association the sum of eight hundred and twenty-five dollars which they advanced to carry on the work of improving the sanitary condition of the Seminary Pond, and appropriate money for the same.

In June, the Snead Company put in four rows of stack on the left side upstairs. This addition relieved a very crowded condition in the library, and made it possible for us to arrange the non-fiction from the 100's through the 700's in order. The staff, assisted by Mr. Alger S. Bourn, who very kindly volunteered his services, moved and cleaned the books and re-arranged the library so that none of the shelves are now crowded.

The inventory which we have been taking during the past year has been completed. All the catalog cards have been checked and author cards for all books except fiction have had tracings added. In most cases, subject cards have been rewritten, using the A. L. A. list of subject headings as a guide.

Books have been marked again where the label had become illegible and have been repaired wherever practical. A number of old books have been stored in the attic and this fact noted on shelf-list and catalog cards.

A finding list has been made for the pamphlet collection and the collection filed in boxes.

Two of the staff and one of our substitutes attended a district library meeting at South Hampton, where Mr. Tufts of the trustees spoke.

In her will Miss Nellie Moulton left us her collection of books on New Thought.

November 1st the trustees elected a new librarian to fill the office made vacant by the resignation of Miss Gillespie at the time of her marriage.

Children's book week was observed in the usual manner with book marks for the children.

The fiction has been rearranged on the shelves so that it now reads uniformly from left to right. An inventory has been taken of the same and a list has been made of all missing books in an effort to locate as many as possible.

The circulation has increased this year by 4,136 books.

Records received from the University of New Hampshire give evidence of work which is equal to, and in most cases above, the average of the class.

It is with pleasure and pardonable pride that reference is made to the award of the Phi Kappa Phi plaque to the Seminary. This honor is based on the record of the freshmen at the University of New Hampshire and a school must have a minimum representation of five to be eligible for the award. The class of 1931 earned this distinction with Abbie Ford, Laura Rowe, Elizabeth Scudder, Frances Smith and Muriel Smith comprising the group. Four years ago the Seminary had a

high standing but lacked one student to meet the eligibility rules. Needless to say the class of 1932 hopes to repeat the victory of the class of 1931.

Relations with Parents

One of the valuable and yet most difficult relations to establish is that with parents. It has been said often, and so correctly, that the contact comes too late in many situations. During the past year, added effort has been made to inform the parents directly, concerning the quality of work being done. In cases of unsatisfactory work in more than two subjects, a special letter accompanied the slips calling attention to, and giving reasons for, the student's shortcomings.

These letters brought responses that were valuable and both teachers and parents profited. One type of problem is worthy of special mention. It has been the writer's privilege to discuss with several parents the problem of excessive association of their daughters with any one girl or very small group of girls. In each case all parties understood that it was not a question of the character of the companion, but the extent to which each girl regarded it as necessary to be with the other. One's first impression might be that this is a minor matter, but continual observation by teachers has proved that even the best of friends can carry their companionship to excess.

An example of this is the unwillingness, or apparent inability of one to study except in the company of her friend. One must go to the home of the other to "study," meaning talk about the new dress, a dance, or possibly movie stars. Occasional meetings for study purposes are valuable, but when a young girl is constantly seeking companionship and diversion outside the home, she is making a serious mistake. Rather than developing concentration she is more likely drifting away from matters demanding her own individual attention. The responses from parents with whom the matter was discussed were very sincere and appreciative of the teacher's point of view.

Physical Examinations

Under the direction of Dr. Leonard and with the able assistance of nurses from the Exeter Hospital, the annual physical examinations have progressed very satisfactorily.

Prior to the examinations, questionnaires were sent to the parents to secure as much advance information as possible to assist the examining physician in understanding the individual. The reports were then divided in three groups, (1) those who needed only the routine examination, (2) those reporting some particular ailment calling for special attention, (3) those who needed even more care. This procedure should bring the valuable results sought. It is a proper division of time in accordance with the need. Both students and their parents should be very appreciative of this service.

Student Activities

The club program at the Seminary resembles very closely the plan of last year. Added interest has necessitated two divisions in some clubs and others have adopted a semi-monthly schedule in place of the monthly. Original French skits, local trips to historical spots, and the making of Christmas gifts are examples of the activities. Perhaps the best, from the real pleasure and satisfaction derived, was the preparation of eight Christmas boxes by members of the Home Economics Club under Miss Bryant. Faculty members assisted with contributions of money but the club members enthusiastically performed the labor of preparation. Each box contained a good roast of pork besides the generous supply of vegetables, candy and nuts.

The basketball season, consisting of eight games, includes one new rival, Amesbury. The others are Sanborn Seminary, Dover and Epping. Only two hockey games were played last fall because of the expense of the trips. These were with Berwick Academy, one a victory for Robinson, and the other a tie.

Recommendation:

In view of present conditions there is one recommendation I should like to offer. Every possible measure should be taken to maintain the stability of the Seminary. Demands are being made everywhere for wholesale cuts in school budgets by people who are not always aware of the needs of the situation. Genuine economy can be practiced without cutting much more from the appropriations for local schools. With increased attendance as a general condition, schools cannot be expected to run on less money each year. In the matter of salaries, one must remember that there is in Exeter, no fixed tenure, no pension or teachers' retirement fund.

Each community should try to accept the responsibility of maintaining standards already attained. In the opinion of the writer, Exeter will continue to do the fair thing.

The Question of Taxes Between the Town of Exeter and the Phillips Exeter Academy

Following is Judge John Scammon's letter to the Selectmen of Exeter in answer to their request for advice in the controversy over the question of taxes imposed upon the Academy:

Selectmen of Exeter, N. H.

Gentlemen: — Am in receipt of request from you that I attend the special meeting of the town on September 18th to explain to the voters assembled the situation in the Academy tax matter. My physician advises against it, and, as the matter is much involved, I think it would be more informative to the voters if it were before them in print where they could read it in connection with the charter.

I would suggest that the charter and this explanation be printed and copies be sent to every property tax payer in town and a sufficient number be printed to give all persons interested an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the situation. This would minimize any likelihood of misunderstandings and check any misstatements as to your efforts and motives in what has been done to protect the interests of the town.

You will recall that at the time I was consulted it was understood that my efforts were to be limited to finding out what the Academy position was and what, if anything, could be done to amicably adjust the matter, and that if an agreement could not be reached that other counsel should be employed, as the litigation would be more prolonged and exact-

ing than I could undertake.

In accordance with my employment I found that the trustees had instructed its attorneys not to agree to any assessment upon a valuation in excess of three hundred fifty thousand dollars and to ask the return of approximately thirty thousand dollars paid under protest on account of the 1935 assessment. This would result in its tax being reduced to about nine thousand dollars. This offer was without waiver of its claim of full

exemption under its charter.

Its charter was granted in 1781 by the Colonial Council and is appended hereto, the exemption is claimed under the last clause reading as follows: "Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all the Lands, Tenements and Personal Estate, that shall be given to said Trustees for the use of said Academy, shall be and hereby are forever exempted from all Taxes whatsoever." There is nothing to indicate the words used had any different meaning in 1781 than they have today and it must be admitted that the exemption provision is both comprehensive and unlimited. It may be and in the event of future litigation it will be contended that the exemption was only to apply to what was then expected to be a small institution or to only what was given by John Phillips, but the opposition would doubtless claim that if that had been the inten-

tion it would have been differently expressed. Any way that is one of the

points in dispute for the courts to decide, if called upon.

It will be noted that in the preamble of the charter it appears that John Phillips was desirous of giving a fund for the purpose of supporting a "Free Public School or Academy" but that after the enacting clause neither the words "Free" or "Public" appear. Whether or not these words in the preamble control and limit the power of the trustees and if so, what was meant by a "Free Public School" in 1781 are both matters of interpretation, and must be determined not by what we today think but by what was the intention of those granting and accepting the charter at that time. Other charters granted at about that time indicate that the word "Free" was not used as we understand it today and that the Trustees did not so interpret it would be indicated by the fact that they began to charge for attendance as early as 1800. This, however, I have not been able to verify.

Whether or not the Trustees were required to establish a "Free Public School" to be entitled to the exemption: what constituted a "Free Public School" as intended by the act; and to what extent their failure would offset the right to the exemption given in the charter are all questions of law for the court, and, while individual opinions may be given, the final result is in doubt until its decision is announced by what would

probably be the court of last resort.

The limitation upon the Academy's holding capacity was removed by our legislature in 1883. This amendment was accepted by the Academy and would be read as a part of its charter and under it the Trustees' authority to receive property for the use of the institution is without limit.

The question as to the right of the town to tax and of the Academy to be exempted is not a new one. I have known of its existence for many years, and was privileged to be present when the matter was discussed by the late Attorney General Eastman and John E. Young, then a Justice of the Supreme Court—(but would have been disqualified to sit upon it). I know they made an exhaustive study of the charter and the law and came to the conclusion that the result of litigation to determine their respective rights could not be foreseen and that any opinion given as to what that result might be would be that persons guess only, and if a compromise could be made upon a self-respecting basis, it was for the best interest of the town to agree to it. I have also made an examination of the authorities, and while I should hesitate to disagree with such eminent and profound lawyers as they were admitted to be, I have come to the same conclusion that they did.

The Academy also claims an excessive valuation of their real estate. The assessed valuation of its property, including the New Stadium at \$30,000, is \$394,090, exclusive of the large brick dormitories assessed at \$1,163,000. The selectmen being familiar with values of the different properties other than the dormitories were unwilling to make any reduction on their valuation and that fact was communicated to counsel for the Academy. The dormitories were more of a problem as the selectmen

could not be familiar with the fair market value of that class of property and learning from the local representative of the Academy what they

cost, assessed them upon that basis.

Real estate is to be assessed at its full and true value. In the case of Amoskeag Manufacturing Company against Manchester this was held to mean at its "fair market value," and the assessed valuation of the dormitories should be at their fair market value. What that is depends upon their adaptability and the demand for such property in that locality. They may be of particular value to some one individual but that does not necessarily fix their market value, and while we know the Academy would not relinquish its claim upon any of its dormitories, that fact would not

compel them to pay a tax upon an excessive valuation.

There is also a constitutional provision that all taxes shall be equally and proportionately assessed. This of course means that if the dormitories are assessed at their cost the other property in the town should be treated the same. This applies particularly to new construction where the element of depreciation does not enter into it. I do not understand that the selectmen, when a new house is built, find out what it cost and then assess it on that basis any more than when an owner improves his property by installation of heat, plumbing, etc., that the cost is added to the previous valuation since such methods would tend to retard rather than develop a town, but that the universal practice of the selectmen has been to assess on its fair market value irrespective of cost. This is the proper and legal way.

Not knowing the value of the dormitories, a representative of the Academy was consulted and their cost given and they were assessed in

that way, without objection.

My individual opinion would be that the fair market value of the dormitories would not exceed fifty per cent of their cost although they may be worth all they cost to the Academy as a going concern, and with the understanding that the forty thousand dollars paid under protest for the 1935 tax would be immediately available to meet budget requirements, the petition for abatement dropped and expensive litigation avoided. I would advise a reduction in valuation of the dormitories of five hundred thousand dollars, beginning April 1st, 1936. This would be a reduction to a little less than sixty per cent of their cost. This may seem a large sum but there would be twelve buildings assessed on the average at slightly less than one hundred thousand dollars each, and in addition the stadium valuation of thirty thousand dollars would stand and the prospect of long continued and expensive litigation ended.

The selectmen very properly thought the situation should be brought to the attention of the budget or appropriations committee. This was done and it appeared to be the sentiment of those present that a compromise upon some such basis was advisable. The selectmen authorized my making a proposition, and having in mind that a reduction of one half a million dollars in value would leave an aggregate of one million, one hundred thousand to be taxed. I made the proposition on that basis. This

has since been withdrawn and whether it will be renewed or modified and by whom is for the selectmen alone to say and it is entirely immaterial to

me personally

Our courts do not favor exemptions, but they do insist upon the full performance of contracts. The trend of opinions in the New Hampshire courts appears to favor the town, some however are favorable to the Academy, and I find decisions in both Massachusetts and New York that

would give the Academy much encouragement.

The fact that the New Hampshire courts are favorable is not conclusive, as was evidenced by the Dartmouth College case reported in the 1st N. H. Page 111. This was not a tax case but involved its rights under a charter granted Dec. 13th, 1769. The original charter fixed the number of trustees, and in 1816 the legislature amended the charter by increasing the number to twenty-one members, nine more than in the original act. To this the members of the board of trustees objected and the action in court resulted. The New Hampshire court held that the charter was not a contract and found against the college, but an appeal was taken to the United States Supreme Court and the decision of the State Court was reversed, the U. S. Supreme Court holding that the charter was a contract and could not be altered by the legislature of New Hampshire without the consent of the college and that the act increasing the number of

trustees was void. See 4th Wheaton Page 514.

It may be of interest to note that the counsel engaged in this case were Jeremiah Mason, Jeremiah Smith and Daniel Webster for the college and the then Attorney General and Ichabod Bartlett for defendant. that the litigation lasted in excess of three years and with the present condition of congestion in our courts, that the present controversy might last fully as long and probably longer. There is not a doubt that if the decision of the State Court is unfavorable to the Academy they can and will follow the same procedure as in the Dartmouth College Case, and if the finding of the State Court should be sustained the question of values would still be open and for the court to determine. I should not expect the end of the law suit for a minimum of five years and the expense cannot be estimated but would amount to thousands of dollars, and, while the suit is in process, the assessments and paying under protest would continue and a large amount of money would accumulate in the treasury of the town, title to which would necessarily not be determined until the final decision of the court; and while it might be used to defray expenses, there is the possibility that the town might be required later to raise a large sum by taxation to repay it.

A compromise upon the proposed basis means:

1st. The immediate availability of \$40,484.34 now in the hands of

of the town paid under protest by the Academy for the 1935 tax.

2nd. The assurance that approximately thirty thousand dollars will be paid by the Academy in 1936 and probably for years to come on account of taxes assessed against it.

3rd. The ending of a law suit that may last for years, entailing great

expense and a possible disastrous result.

4th. The establishment of a value upon the dormitories by agreement and for a substantial amount without further delay or expense. There are other benefits from such a settlement.

A failure to compromise upon some basis means an unsettled condition of the town finances until a settlement is made or the litigation is concluded, the possible loss of twenty or more thousand dollars annually forever, a tremendous expense for attorneys and court costs with an even chance of not getting more for the town than the compromise provides, and the carrying in suspense of possibly forty thousand dollars a year for several years of taxes paid under protest that may in the end have to be repaid. There are doubtless other advantages to be gained but I have stated but a few. In dollars and cents it means approximately twenty thousand dollars more yearly to the town than the three hundred fifty

thousand dollar offer would provide.

The conclusion of the town should be made without prejudice. The selectmen have certain duties to perform, which duties are defined by law, one of which is to protect the rights of the town in the assessment of taxes on an equal basis for all and to obtain what justly belongs to the The Trustees of the Academy are what their name implies, the property in their custody is not theirs but is devoted to a certain purpose. It is their duty to protect that property from unlawful seizure for taxes or any other claim that appears to be unjust. Neither the selectmen nor the trustees can be blamed for doing their respective duties and a decision brought about by prejudice rather than by sober and mature consideration of the facts might result in great hardship to the town as well as to the Academy, its largest taxpayer. To my mind the advantages of a compromise as proposed far outweigh any reasons that can be given for nonacceptance and in my opinion the proposed special town meeting can do a real service to the town by passing a resolution authorizing the selectmen to make a contract with the Academy, beginning April 1st, 1936, fixing the value of the Academy property, now taxed at one million and one hundred thousand dollars (or some other sum) for a period of twenty years providing the petition for abatement now pending is dismissed.

This would forestall any controversy for twenty years and establish both the value and taxability for that time. If more property is acquired it would be added to that value and if any was disposed of it could be deducted from it. While I have no reason to believe such a contract would be accepted by the Academy, it would show a spirit of fairness on the part of the town in fixing values and it might be of some benefit to the Trustees to have the tax question settled for that length of time. I have seen nothing in their attitude to date indicating their unwillingness to bear their just share of the public expense. In my

opinion it is worth trying.

Following is a copy of the Academy's Charter:

(CHAPTER 9.)

(State of) (New Hampshire)

An Act To Incorporate An Academy In The Town of Exeter By The Name of Phillips Exeter Academy

(Passed Apr. 3, 1781. Original Acts, vol. 8, p.71; recorded Acts, vol 4

p. 241. See act of June 14, 1783.)

Whereas the Education of Youth has ever been considered by the wise & good, as an object of the highest consequence to the safety & happiness of a People; as at an early period in life the mind easily receives & retains impressions; and is most susceptible of the Rudiments of useful knowledge; And whereas the Honorable John Phillips of Exeter in the County of Rockingham Esquire, is desirous of (giving) to Trustees hereinafter to be appointed, certain Lands & personal Estate to be by said Trustees forever appropriated & expended for the support of a public Free School or Academy in the Town of Exeter; and whereas the Execution of such an important design, will be attended with very great embarrassments unless by an Act of Incorporation said Trustees & their Successors, shall be authorised to commence & prosecute actions at Law, and transact such other matters in a Corporate capacity as the Interest of the said Academy shall require—

Be it therefore enacted by the Council and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened, and by the authority of the same, That there be & hereby is established in the Town of Exeter, and County of Rockingham an Academy by the name of the Phillips Exeter Academy, for the purpose of promoting piety & virtue, and for the education of Youth in the English Latin, and Greek Languages; in Writing, Arithmetic, Musick, & the Art of Speaking; Practical Geometry, Logic, and Geography, and such other of the Liberal Arts and Sciences or Languages as opportunity may hereafter permit, and as the Trustees hereinafter provided shall

direct-

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid that the said able John Phillips Esquire Daniel Tilton Esquire Thomas Odiorne Esquire and Benjamin Thurston Gentlemen all of Exeter aforesaid, John Pickering of Portsmouth Esquire, and the Reverend David McClure of North Hampton Clerk, all in the County of Rockingham and State of New Hampshire, and the Honorable Samuel Phillips Junr of Andover in the County of Essex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts Esquire, be and they hereby are nominated and appointed Trustees of said Academy, and they are hereby incorporated into a body politic, by the name of the Trustees of the Phillips Exeter Academy; and that they and their Successors shall be and continue a body-politic and corporate, by the same name forever—

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the said Trustees, and their Successors, shall have one Common Seal, which they may make use of in any cause or business that relates to the said office of Trustees of said Academy; and they shall have power and authority to break, change, & renew the said Seal from time to time, as they shall see

fit; and that they may sue and be sued in all actions real, personal and mixed, and prosecute and defend the same to final Judgment and Execution, by the name of the Trustees of the Phillips Exeter Academy—

Anb be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid that the said John Phillips Esquire and others the Trustees aforesaid, the longest livers and survivors of them, and their Successors, be the true and sole Visitors, Trustees and Governors of the said Academy, in perpetual succession forever, to be continued in the way and manner hereinafter specified, with full power and authority to elect such Officers of the said Academy as they shall judge necessary and convenient; and to make and ordain such laws, orders and rules, for the Good Government of said Academy, as to them the said Trustees, Governors and Visitors aforesaid, and their Successors, shall from time to time, according to the various occasions and circumstances seem most fit and requisite; all which shall be observed by the Officers, Scholars and servants of the said Academy, upon the penalties therein containd: Provided notwithstanding, that the said Rules, Laws and Orders be no ways contrary to the laws of this State—

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the number of said Trustees, and their Successors, shall not at any one time be more than seven, nor less than four; four of whom shall constitute a Quorum for transacting business; and a major part of the members present, at any legal meeting, shall decide all questions that shall come before them, except in the instances hereinafter excepted; That the Principal Instructor for the time being shall ever be one of the said Trustees; That a major part shall be Laymen and respectable Freeholders; Also that all elections of the said Trustees shall be so governed in future, that a major part shall consist of Men who are not Inhabitants of the Town where the Academy

is situate — And to perpetuate the succession of said Trustees—

Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid that as often as one or more of the Trustees of said Academy shall die or resign, or in the Judgment of a major part of the other Trustees, be rendered by age or otherwise, incapable of discharging the duties of his Office, then & so often, the Trustees surviving and remaining, or the major part of them, shall elect one or more persons to supply the Vacancy or Vacancies so happen-

ing—

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the Trustees aforesaid, and their Successors, be and they hereby are rendered capable in Law to take and receive by Gift, Grant, Devise, Bequest or otherwise, any Lands Tenements or other Estate, real and personal; provided, that the annual income of the said real estate shall not exceed the sum of five hundred pounds; and the annual income of the said personal estate shall not exceed the sum of two thousand pounds; both sums to be valued in Silver at the rate of six shillings and eight pence by the ounce; To Have and to Hold the same to them the said Trustees, and their Successors, on such Terms, and under such conditions and limitations as may be expressed in any deed or instrument of conveyance which shall be made to them — Provided always, that neither the said Trustees nor their Suc-

cessors shall ever hereafter receive any grant or donation, the Condition whereof shall require them or any others concerned, to act in any respect counter, to the design of the first Grantor; And all Deeds and Instruments which the said Trustees shall make, when made in the name of said Trustees, & sign'd and deliver'd by four of the said Trustees at least, and Sealed with their Common Seal, shall bind the said Trustees and their Successors and be valid in law—

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that if it shall hereafter be judged upon mature, and impartial consideration of all circumstances by two thirds of all the Trustees, that for good and substantial reasons which at this time do not exist, the true design of this institution will be better promoted by removing the Academy from the Place where it is founded; it shall be in the power of the said Trustees to remove it accordingly, and to establish it in such other place within this State, as they shall judge to be best calculated for carrying into effectual execution the intention of the founder—

And whereas the said institution may be of very great and general

advantage to this state, and deserves every encouragement—

Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all the Lands Tenements and personal Estate, that shall be given to said Trustees for the use of said Academy, shall be and hereby are forever exempted from all Taxes whatsoever—

AN ACT EXPLANATORY OF A CLAUSE IN AN ACT ENTITLED AN ACT TO INCORPORATE AN ACADEMY IN THE TOWN OF EXETER BY THE NAME OF THE PHILLIPS EXETER ACADEMY (Passed June 14, 1783. Original Acts, vol. 9, p. 11; recorded Acts, vol. 4, p. 474. The act referred to is dated April 3, 1781.)

Whereas the Trustees of said Academy have petitioned the General Court setting forth that they apprehend that it is not the Spirit & Design of the Clause in said Act whereby it is enacted "that all the Lands Tenements & personal Estate that shall be "given to said Trustees for the use of said Academy shall be & "thereby are forever exempted from all taxes whutsoever" to exempt any Estate from Taxation when transferred and holden in the Right of any other Person or body corporate — and therefore praying that an explanatory Addition may be made to the said Clause—

Be it therefore Enacted by the Council & House of Representatives in general Assembly convened and by the Authority of the same That all lands Tenements & Personal Estate that have been or hereafter shall be vested in the said Trustees for the use of said Academy When transferred, vested & shall remain in the Right of any other Person or Persons or body Corporate shall be subject to taxation in common with the lands tenements and personal Estate of other Subjects of this State — any thing in

the said Act to the contrary notwithstanding-
