## SCHOOL REPORT

UNION DISTR CT NO. 2.

The attendance in our schools the past year has been quite remarkable. The past few weeks the severity of the weather has caused much sickness and thus reduced the number of pupils in the lower grades. During the entire year no epidemic has occurred. A mere rumor at the beginning of the fall term made the enforcement of the state law regarding vaccination compulsory, which caused a slight irregularity of attendance. With a single exception the same teachers have been retained through the year. This fact, added to the good attendance has assured in st excellent progress in all of the grades. Much attention has been given to reading and a decided improvement has resulted. The work done in drawing is very commendable; it is surprising that such good work could be attained in so short a time. Music is still taught by the teachers with satisfactory results.

At the beginning of the spring term Miss Mary Taylor, teacher in the fourth and fifth grades, was obliged to resign. Miss Taylor had been in this school nearly three years, she had labored faithfully and earnestly, her efforts were very satisfactory, and her resignation much regretted. Miss Bertha Holbrook of Concord Training school was engaged to fill the vacancy. Her intelligence and superior judgment made her work a credit to herself and pupils. A better position made her resignation necessary at the beginning of the fall term. Miss Clara Ingalls was engaged for the remainder of the year. Too much praise cannot be given Miss Ingall's work; her love for her pupils and quick perception of their capacities make her school a marked success.

In the primary room there is now a truly primary school; small in numbers and ages, it is a very bright, interesting grade. The new single seats and other improvements made at the beginning of the fall term have wonderfully changed this school. The text-books introduced last year have proven very satisfactory. In all ways the schools are well supplied with books and other necessities.

The lack of acquaintance between parents and schools still exists. Very little knowledge of the true condition and real work being done can be gained by a visit on a gala day. The sanitary condition and means of ventilation, are still the same; they need no comment of censure or explanation, they have been suffered and so can.
