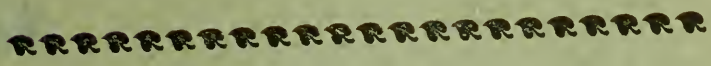

Minot-Sleeper Library

The Library has had another successful year. The Pray collection of birds and animals has been classified and catalogued.

The card catalogue has been completed down to the latter part of 1903. This work has unavoidably increased the expense of the Library for the past year quite a good deal, but as it was necessary to have the catalogue, if the matter were delayed longer, the greater would be the expense for the years in which it was made, it was deemed wise to complete it as soon as possible.

The work has been well done and at reasonable cost. Hereafter the expense of maintaining it will be small, being confined to the annual collection of books. No extraordinary expenses are anticipated for the current year. Two hundred seventy-three new books have been added for circulation, making 4,551 in that department, and 63 for reference, making 1,842 reference books, a total of 6,393. The reading-room has been maintained from the Day-Jackman fund, and has been well patronized.

The following magazines are taken for the present year: Century, Scribner's, McClure's, Munsey, Atlantic, Harper's Monthly and Weekly, Cosmopolitan, New England Popular Science, Review of Reviews, World's Work, Granite Monthly, Outing, Outlook, Country Life, Youth's Companion, St. Nicholas, Success, Art Interchange, Leslie's Weekly, Puck, Judge, and Saturday Evening Post.

At the annual meeting of the trustees the following

officers were chosen : Chairman, Richard W. Musgrove ; secretary, Channing Bishop ; treasurer, George H. Calley ; executive committee, Ira A. Chase, George H. Calley, Marshall W. White ; librarian, Miss Emma Pratt Berry.

The Library is an invaluable adjunct in the education of the community, especially of the children and youth. By reason of it, many who would otherwise expend considerable sums of money in the purchase of books for themselves or their children, are relieved of the necessity of so doing, and others who would be wholly unable to purchase them reap the benefit thereof by reason of the progressiveness and generosity of our citizens as a whole.

The more the Library is used, the better it is appreciated.

School Report

UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2

The school board reports a year of successful work in all the grades. No change in teachers was made and thus the work has continued without friction.

We would like to call your attention to certain advantages that the schools have enjoyed this year.

The pupils have had regular instruction in drawing and in vocal music under special teachers. Good foundations have been laid and we hope that the work in both departments may be continued. Miss Josephine Emery has supervised the work in drawing and Miss Anna B. Musgrove, that in music.

Believing it to be the general desire of the parents interested, and that it would be of benefit to the community, the school board voted to engage the services of a teacher to have charge of the classes necessary in the first year of high school work. A course of study was submitted to the state superintendent of public instruction, it was legally approved, and the school providing for this course was designated The Bristol High School. Under the instruction of Miss Emery, we believe that the pupils have been able to do as good work as is done in other approved schools with the advantage of remaining at home one year longer than was possible previously.

We desire to see more pupils in our higher grades and regret the tendency of parents to take their children from school as soon as they reach the age when the law no

longer requires their attendance. To become successful in any line of work, a good education is more necessary than ever before and the amount of schooling the parent received is not usually sufficient for the success of the child.

A few more years in school will be of far more profit in the future than the small amount of money he can earn now. No better financial investment can be made, to say nothing of the increase in enjoyment and ability resulting from greater mental development.

If possible, let the children *complete* the course of study in our schools.
