

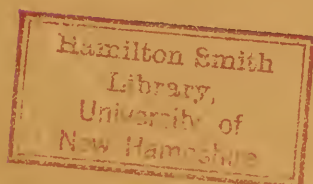

Contained within the foregoing report, the sum of \$483.22 has been paid for the maintenance of state aid road, leaving actual cost of highways and bridges \$5,237.01.

The highway expenses of the town have perhaps been somewhat larger this year than usual on account of so many bridges that had to be either rebuilt or repaired, six were built over new. The lumber for these and six thousand feet of railing cost about \$1000. Eight hundred feet of sewer and about 1300 feet of sidewalk has been laid. The crusher and steam roller were repaired at a cost of about \$200, which came out of the highway money, besides many hundred tons of stone bought and crushed, of which 300 tons were used to re-grade depot hill.

## UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2

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### REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

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*To the parents and citizens residing in Union School District:*

In accordance with custom the annual report of the Board is once more submitted.

We can hardly realize that another school year is closing, so quietly yet so rapidly has it passed. There have been 36 weeks of school in all of the grades.

With one exception the teachers in all departments have been faithful to their trust and have labored very earnestly and assiduously for the discipline, advancement and mental and moral progress of the pupils committed to their care and instruction. The majority of the pupils have dutifully responded to the efforts exerted in their behalf, to train their minds and help them to think and act and grow in the power of perception and concentration, and to improve their morals and their manners.

During the present winter term Mrs. Maude Ferguson was employed in Grades VI and VII for the balance of the term.

As a general rule the health of the pupils has been

excellent. The usual instruction has been given in hygiene, physiology and physical culture and in the Constitution of New Hampshire.

The sanitation of the various rooms and parts of the school building has received careful attention.

The fire-drill has been practiced at proper intervals.

The pupils are specially favored in having the large grounds of Kelley Park so near at hand for a play ground, wherein is a fine tennis court, a field for baseball and other sports, and during the winter a commodious skating rink provided by Park Commissioners.

The finances of the District are in a satisfactory condition as may be seen by examining the report of the treasurer. During the year no extraordinary expenses have been incurred.

The usual exhibition of the arts and crafts of the pupils during the spring term promises to be unusually interesting as well as the Memorial exercises, both of which the parents and all others interested are urgently requested to attend.

During the year manual training, so-called, has been taught in several of the grades during a portion of one day in each week.

The girls have been instructed in the art of mending, darning, patching, making buttonholes, and in various kinds of useful sewing and needle work, things which are so useful and yet of which so little is systematically and scientifically taught in many homes.

The boys have been instructed in drafting and in planning their work and in the proper use of ordinary carpenter's tools, in sawing and planing lumber, driving of nails, etc., and have made benches, knife-boxes, screens and a book cupboard to be used in one of the school-rooms.

Under the direction of Messrs. Sidney A. Brown and Harry Wells on behalf of the boys, and of the teachers on behalf of the girls, commendable progress has been made.

Some of the pupils have shown especial aptitude and it has opened new avenues of thought and action in their course. Such training is practical for those who may have occasion to use it, in business life, and excellent discipline for the mind and the eye of those who do not.

Although this course is necessarily limited yet it has proved beneficial and worthy of continuance. The pupils have been much interested in this work but unfortunately for the boys there is no appropriate and sufficient place in the school building for the proper performance of it. The small annex formerly used for toilet purposes has been converted into a small workshop, but it is entirely too small, and there is no way of heating it except by an oil heater. The District should decide to erect a small building for this purpose in the yard. Considerable of the work of building this could probably be done by the boys themselves.

Very excellent instruction in music has been given

by Mrs. Crafts under whose direction the pupils who have any taste or capacity for music have made decided improvement.

The High School Department is approved for a two years course. It is the hope of the Board that those in anyway interested in the pupils below this grade will urge all who possibly can to prepare themselves for the High school in Bristol and take the excellent course of study furnished therein.

Those who do not are missing an unsurpassed opportunity for study and discipline under a most excellent teacher who has the time and the ability to give them that personal attention which they will, except in rare instances, fail to receive elsewhere. The instruction given therein is necessary to make more perfect and complete that which has been received in the lower grades and is as it were the keystone of the arch of our local public schools. It is a matter of regret that there are not more in the next graduating class, but the class immediately succeeding promises larger numbers. The last graduating exercises were very interesting and well attended.

An address to the class was made by the Superintendent and the diplomas were presented by the Chairman of the Board.

If parents and citizens would visit our schools more frequently they would encourage the pupils, the teachers and the Board, and they would be the better able

to judge for themselves of the quality of the work that is done therein. Come in and examine for yourselves and then give the teachers and the Board the benefit of any suggestions that will make for the improvement of the quality of these schools.

As we have said before the responsibility for the mental, moral and spiritual education of the child begins with and largely continues with the parents. The teachers in our schools can supplement this education, but the home life is most important. If the parents set a good example, if they duly appreciate the great responsibility resting upon them, if their lives are measurably correct, the lives of the children will reflect this condition and will very largely be excellent in goodness and in virtue, but if the lives of the parents are careless, indifferent and immoral, the lives of their children will be likely in a large degree to reflect the conditions last named.

The Board and the teachers are striving to educate the pupils to a full and useful life, to make of them noble men and women, intelligent, honest, and high-minded citizens, possessed of personal and civic righteousness, and who shall be a power for the perpetuation of our free schools and other public institutions which are the bulwarks of our liberty.

Will not all our good people actively cooperate and "lend a hand" in the home, the school, the church, the street or the place of work, both by precept and example, wherever they may be able, in assisting and en-

couraging our pupils and youth to be honest, clean-minded, courteous, virtuous, properly ambitious, looking upward not downward, man-loving and God-loving men and women ?

It is expected that the present winter term will close March 27th, with a vacation of two weeks ; that the spring term will open April 13, and close on June 19, a period of ten weeks.

The present members of the Board are Messrs. Frank N. Gilman, chairman ; Wm. C. White, secretary ; Albro Wells, Mrs. Ada B. Cavis, Mrs. Mabel M. Ladd and Ira A. Chase.

It is a matter of deep regret that Mr. Wells, who has for so many years been an officer of the District, who has taken a very deep interest in the welfare of the pupils and schools, and who has freely given of his time and strength as a member of the Board to further and subserve the interests of the District, has been and still is so ill, during the past year, that we have been prevented from availing ourselves of his excellent advice and assistance, based upon practical sense and long experience. We are sure that all who know him extend warm sympathy and hope for his complete recovery to health and strength again.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

---

A brief report to the citizens and parents is always acceptable in matters pertaining to our schools.

The schools in practically all of the districts the past year have been in session for thirty weeks, something which has not occurred for some years past.

Excellent discipline has been maintained. The teachers have been faithful to their work and the pupils have worked accordingly. Only one change of teachers has been made during the year, Miss Mabelle Curtice resigning at the close of the spring term, and Mrs. Katherine Bacon being secured to take her place.

The sanitary condition of the school buildings has been closely watched and the buildings have been kept in a healthy condition.

Several repairs have been made during the past year. In district No. 1 the shed and part of the main body of the schoolhouse was newly clapboarded and painted over with two coats. The interior was all newly painted and the ceilings mariscoed. The other schoolhouses received more or less renovating, but all need more repairs to keep the buildings healthy and attractive.

The finances for the past year have been run rather close, owing to the Board being obliged to pay higher salaries for competent teachers and longer terms. The day has come and gone when we can secure competent tea-

chers for five or six dollars per week, and in order to maintain our schools and keep them up to the standard we must raise more money.

This year the town district lost its state aid for High school tuition rebates, owing to our failing to raise the amount required by the state. Next year we will be called upon to pay several hundred dollars out of the treasury for this purpose, owing to the large class now attending preparatory schools.

We trust that the citizens and parents will show enough interest in their schools to come out to our next school meeting and help elect the officers for the coming year.

It would seem that the business men and those seeking technical knowledge on almost any subject did not fully realize the wealth of information contained in its books of reference. These books can profitably be consulted more often than they are. The library taken as a whole is a gem of which any community may well be proud.

The trustees have kept constantly in mind the nec-

essity for economy in the management of the library and expenses are kept at the lowest point consistent with the needs of the library and the desires of the public.
