STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Bristol on Tuesday, eighth (8) day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, and choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two thousand eighty-one and 60-100 dollars (\$2,081.60) the State Highway Dept. estimate for the Trunk Line Maintenance for the year ensuing, and raise the sum of twelve hundred and ten and 12-100 dollars (\$1,210.12), the State Highway Dept. estimate for State Aid Maintenance for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the observance of Memorial Day for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.

- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of Sidewalks for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to ask for State Aid Road for construction of new road, and if so make the necessary appropriation of the same, and raise the money for the same
- 8. Agreeably to vote of the Town at the annual meeting March 8, 1921, to elect five (5) members for the Budget Committee for a term of three years, and fill any vacancies in said committee.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise, instead of setting aside from the regular Highway money, the sum required by law, for the purpose of permanent improvement, on some designated piece of Town Highway, approved by the Town Officials, and make appropriation of the same. (Sum required to be set aside, under the Statute, is about \$1,996.00.)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), for the purpose of continuing the cost of control of the White Pine Blister Rust in the Town of Bristol, and make appropriation of the same
- 11. To see what action the Town will take, relative to repairs of the Town Hall, and remodel the Heating Plant, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

MINOT-SLEEPER LIBRARY—REPORT OF TRUSTEES

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol:

The past year has seen a number of changes, and we hope advancement, in library affairs.

In the spring, the interior of the library, both in the book room and in the basement, was thoroughly renovated. The books were cleaned and sorted under the direction of Miss Frances Hobart of Concord, secretary of the Public Library Commission of New Hampshire. and some of the ancient papers and books were placed with the New Hampshire Historical society at Concord for safe keeping. New shelving was added, while varnish and paint were applied to all surfaces. Cement work and grading now prevent moisture in the basement, where formerly books and magazines kept there were badly damaged. Repairs were also made on the roof, the entire cost of repairs being about \$600. While these changes were in progress, the library was closed to patrons. The amount paid for new books totaled over \$400. The books purchased included largely fiction and children's books.

A prominent place in the reading room was given over to the mineral specimens of the late Hon. Ira A. Chase, and these have been appreciated by many. The books from Mr. Chase's library, which also were given to this library, were placed in their respective places on the shelves.

From May to the last of July, a collection of wild flowers, as they appeared, was shown in this library, through the efforts of Miss Margaret Whipple, this exhibit being not only interesting but instructive. One hundred fifty-four varieties were shown, the list and the dates now being posted in the library.

That the reading room is much appreciated is shown by the number of patrons, 2,264, during the year. The privileges of this department have been increased by permitting any magazines except the current issues to be issued on the library cards. Many of the out-of-date magazines have been distributed in the rural schools and otherwise placed where they are appreciated. Some of the best are retained to be bound for the library shelves.

Magazines to be found on the tables are the best, and include American, American Boy, American Girl, American Forests and Forestry, Country Life, Child Life, Junior Home, Atlantic, Asia, Century, Christian Century, Current Opinion, Garden, Geographia, Woman's Home Companion, Granite Monthly, Harper's, Ladies' Home Journal, Literary Digest, Moody Monthly, Nature Magazine, Our Dumb Animals, Our World, Outlook, Pictorial Review, Popular Mechanics, Travel, World's Work, Youth's Companion, and others. A few periodicals are contributed by clubs and individuals, but this reading room is made possible from the Day-Jackman fund.

The book committee is giving attention to the purchase of new books, with careful consideration to requests left with the librarian. During the past year, 174 new books have been purchased, and a number have been donated. This year, when two books have been allowed on a card, the number of books delivered has been 11,403. The age limit for children was changed a year ago to eight years, and this enlarged liberty has resulted in increased interest in this department.

Again we call attention to the desire for old pictures, especially of photographs of early buildings of the town

and others of historical interest. Any contributions for this collection will be appreciated.

In her first year of service, Miss Mary A. Rogers has proven of real worth as a librarian. She has efficiently accommodated all patrons to the best of her ability. Since she began her duties, the open hours for the library have been increased, the hours now being Wednesdays and Saturdays, both afternoon and evening. A delivery of two hundred books on Saturday is the average.

It is our desire and purpose to enlarge the efficiency and usefulness of the library as far as possible and to meet the wishes and convenience of the public.

The record for the year June 30, 1926, in many instances is below that of the previous year. This year was one of sickness. Mumps followed closely after a long siege of measles and the attendance record of many of the pupils was affected. This is plainly shown by the drop in the number of pupils neither absent nor tardy: 24 for the year 1924-25 and 6 for the year 1925-26.

There was a noticeable drop in the number of tardy marks from 438 to 230. This gain is worthy of mention. There should not be many. This trait of being on time is well worth cultivating.

The record shows that more half days were lost than during the previous year. More and more are school districts arranging their school calendars so as to avoid losing days. The calendar for the year 1926-27 has been prepared with this in mind. Vacations have been arranged so as to include some of the "no school days." The break at Thanksgiving has been shortened. Two vacations of one week each between Christmas and the close of school in June, approximately eight weeks apart, have been provided for. The calendar has much of merit in it and I urge its adoption.

The annual spelling match was omitted due to so much sickness. The time used in getting pupils ready was needed in helping the pupils make up the work lost.

High School

There was an increase in the enrollment of high school pupils. The graduating class numbered nine. Of this number two entered college, one normal school, one a business college, and one is training to be a nurse. The members of the high school brought out the first number of the school paper.
