## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Bristol, on Tuesday. the tenth (10) day of March nest, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, and choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-atLarge, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Convention of the Republican and Democratic parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for the President and Vice President of the United States.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see what sums of money the town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
4. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of Class II road, known as the West Shore road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of twenty-seven hundred and twentyfive dollars and eighty-eight cents ( $\$ 2,725.88$ ) : or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the
sum of three hundred fifty-nine dollars and eightyseven cents (\$359.87).
5. To see what sums of money the town will rote to raise for construction and maintenance of Sidewalks for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.
6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sewers for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.
7. Agreeably to the vote of the town at the Annual Town Meeting, March S, 1921, to elect five (5) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, and to fill any vacancies in said committee.
S. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the obserrance of Memorial Day and make appropriation of the same.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$275.00) for Band Concerts and make appropriation for the same.
9. To see what sum of money the town will rote to raise, if any, for the permanent improvement of Highways of the side streets in Bristol village and make appropriation of the same.
10. To see if the town of Bristol will vote to cover with tarvia the road leading from the main highway, in said Bristol, to the dam of the Public Service Company of New Hampshire, Utilities Power Company division, located in said Bristol and appropriate money for the same.
11. To see what sum of money the town will rote to raise, if any for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
12. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing the present heating plant, or installing a new plant at the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.
13. To see if the town will vote to publish in the Town Reports a detailed statement of the assessed valuation of each and every real and personal property, in the Town of Bristol.
14. To hear the report of the Town Zoning Committee. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the Town Zoning Law, as provided in Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, and make the necessary provisions for the requirements and enforcement as required and contained in said Chapter pertaining to town zoning : and raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding fifty ( $\$ 50.00$ ) for a town map as required in said law, and any other expense pertaining thereto.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with towns in the lakes region.
16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Franklin, Laconia and Plymouth Hospitals.
18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## MINOT-SLEEPER LIBRARY-REPORT OF TRUSTEES

The trustees of Minot-Sleeper Library have nothing unusual to report in the way of library activities for the past year.

Miss Mary Rogers has again filled the position of librarian in the same efficient and courteous manner with which she has served the reading public of this community for the past ten years.

The open hours on Monday afternoons and evenings have been sufficiently appreciated to warrant continuation, the library now being open 21 hours weekly. A table of comparative data has been prepared by the Public Library Commission which may be of interest to our readers and give an opportunity to see how our library compares with others of similar rating. Comparison of circulation must always take into account the factors of hours the library is open and the library income, since these two points have the greatest bearing on circulation figures.

The librarian's report shows that this library had cooperated with the Public Library Commission in the loan of books for a three months' period. She stated that in spite of the omission this year of the three traveling libraries sent by the Commission which increased the circulation credit for the local library, and other factors, the circulation this year shows an increase of 2,096 . Adult fiction loaned, 13,687; adult non-fiction, 2,350; junior fiction, 3,712 ; junior non-fiction, 1,241 ; total, 20,990 . Received for fines $\$ 35.80$. New books added during the year, 174 .

The reading room, with its excellent supply of good magazines, made possible by the Minnie Maria DayJackman Fund, is, as formerly, one of the most appreciated divisions of the library and brings to our readers each month copies of such magazines as Atlantic. American, American Boy, American Girl, American Forest, American Home, Among the Deep Sea Fishers, Better Homes \& Gardens, Country Gentleman, Current History, Child Life, Clubwoman, Christian Century, Cosmopolitan, Dumb Animals, Delineator, D. A. R., Embroideress, Forum, Field \& Stream, Flower Grower, Good Housekeeping, Garden Digest, Harpers, Hunting \& Fishing, Junior Home, Ladies’ Home Journal, Literary Digest, National Geographic, Nature, Home Arts Needlecraft, New Outlook, Parent, Popular Science, Popular Mechanics, Readers' Digest, Review of Reviews, Scribners, St. Nicholas, School Art, Scientific American, Tiny Tower. Woman's Home Companion, Woman's World, Radio and Modern Mechanics and Inventions.

As trustee in charge of gifts, Miss Pray reports :
During the year 1935-36, the Minot-Sleeper Library has been the recipient of four interesting gifts.

The first of these, from Stephen Hill, is a picture of Washington the age of which is not known. However a mat showing brilliantly-colored draped flags and the frame of old gift suggests that it may have belonged to someone's great-grandparents.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Jewell have added to the Bristol picture collection in a copy of the topographical sketch of the town made in 1884. This has a black walnut frame, probably of the same date as the picture.

Through the generosity of the late Philip G. Bartlett, the library has received two antiques from the personal effects of Colonel Peter Sleeper, one of Bristol's earliest residents. These are a pair of silver shoe buckles and a grandfather's clock, all in an excellent
state of preservation. The clock stands behind the librarian's desk, and adds materially to the appearance of the room as well as filling a long-felt want in the way of a time piece.

It is hoped that other residents or friends of Bristol may add to the Minot-Sleeper collection of antiques from time to time, and it is suggested that all trustees having. opportunity will encourage this work whenever possible.

## Report of School Nurse

MR. E. P. FREESE, Supt. of Schools, Bristol, N. H.

## Dear Sir:

I hereby submit my annual report, as school nurse, for the town of Bristol.

Number of pupils examined-335.
42 pupils were underweight $10 \%$
15 pupils showed defective vision, 10 of which were corrected and 5 were uncorrected
3 showed defective hearing 4 pupils had symptoms of anaemia
3 pupils are known to have cardiac trouble
100 pupils have defective teeth
26 pupils have large or diseased tonsils
3 pupils show defective breathing
3 pupils probably have adenoids
4 pupils have defective speech

Under the provision of the Child Health Recovery Act Bristol was alloted $\$ 101.08$. The following corrective work was made possible with the aid of this money:

Six children had their eyes examined and were fitted with glasses. Four were fitted privately.

Four children who were somewhat deaf had examinations made to determine the cause of deafness. One child had an obstruction removed and three others were recommended to get the tonsils and adenoids removed. This was done in two cases. The third will be attended to this June.

A total of four children had tonsils and adenoids removed. (The above work was all accomplished by Miss Moynihan in July, 1934, except one tonsilectomy.)

Forty-nine children were treated at a dental clinic made possible by the local Red Cross. The clinic was held in Dr. Davis' office where the following work was done:

Cod liver oil was given to underweight and underprivileged children during the winter months.

One-half pint of milk was provided from the Federal funds for the underprivileged and minderweight children also during the winter months.

Eighteen children were immunized against diphtheria, at a toxoid clinic conducted by the State Department of Health murse, Mrs. Lois Barton, at which the school nurse assisted.

One child will be fitted with glasses and four have tonsilectomies done at Laconia Hospital later in June.

Frequent class room inspections have been made to control pediculosis and skin disease.

The children have been weighed and measured twice in all the lower grades. This was done once in the upper grades.

Ninety-five visits have been made to schools.
Home visits have been made in twenty-three homes including forty children. Several calls have been made in a few homes.

I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, Mr. Freese, state relief workers and the local Red Cross for their splendid assistance in making possible so much corrective work.
