#### BRISTOL SEWER TREATMENT PLANT

In the 1880's, Bristol installed a network of underground sewer lines to carry off surface drain from the village streets. Many homes tied into this system to also carry away sewage. The depository was the Newfound river. In addition to the town's system, many homes and businesses along the river emptied their waste directly through a private sewer line.

As towns and cities grew in New Hampshire the effects of water pollution began to take its toll. No longer did salmon run the rivers from the ocean. Fishing became restricted to mostly lakes and streams. Gases released from the rivers during the humid spells discolored painted buildings. And lastly, the smell of the polluted river was becoming intolerable.

Consequently in 1960 the New Hampshire Legislature passed a law requiring the cleaning up of the Pemigewasset river by 1970. As the Newfound river was a tributary to the Pemi, it too was affected by the law. Thus Bristol embarked on the development and installation of a new sewerage system during the sixties which ended in th fall of 1970 with an oxidation ditch sewage treatment plant and a new underground piping network. The system was designed by Anderson, Nichols and installed by the Robert Levesque Construction Company of Hudson, New Hampshire.

The treatment plant is located down behind the state highway department sheds on Rte 104 east out of Bristol. It has already captured the nickname of "Honey Creek." The plant receives its waste from a pumping station located on Central street where the village gravity feeds to. Currently, the system takes care of most of Bristol village. Plans are in the works for extensions out Willow street and beyond the bridge on Lake street to just above Mill Stream. It will only be a matter of time until the foot of Newfound Lake will have to be connected into the system.

At the 1970 town meeting, the voters authorized the establishment of a board of three Sewer Commissioners to supervise the town's newest utility. First members of the board were Wilbur Bowen, John Bianchi and Ernest Hopkins. Terms to the elected office are for three years. In addition, the Sewer Commission has a superintendent who is in charge of seeing to the proper running of the sewerage system. The superintendent is currently Thomas Morrison.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol, the Seventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

#### Action on the following Articles at 8:00 P.M.

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Survey of Fourth Street. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Planning Board membership from 5 to 7 members.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for solid waste disposal.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a "Solid Waste Disposal Commission" of from 3 to 5 members to oversee the operation of Solid Waste Disposal.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$2000.00 for a Fire Department Reserve Fund. Money to be left with the Trustees of Trust Fund. Purpose of said fund is to create a reserve to aid in the growth and development of the Bristol Fire Department. (Submitted by Petition and Recommended by Budget Committee)

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to request the assistance of the State Tax Commission in making a reappraisal of land and buildings in said town, with one-half of the cost of same to be raised this year and the balance to be raised upon completion and vote to raise and appropriate money for same. (Recommended by Budget Committee)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to use the accumulated interest in the Proctor Capital Reserve Fund for improvements at the Town Beach if needed.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the sums set forth therein to be raised by taxation.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to enter an Ambulance District if necessary.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In January of this past year, the Town of Bristol accepted for operation, from the contractor, our sewage treatment plant and its related facilities. Final payment to the contractor was made in May 1971 after numerous meetings with our engineers, lawyers, and bond counsel.

We are pleased to report the plant is operating smoothly. The town has now let a separate contract for extension of facilities to Willow Street and to cross Lake Street bridge as far as the Millstream. Work will be progressing shortly on this project. The contractor expects to do necessary bridge crossing work early in the spring.

The town has initiated preliminary studies to extend our sewer lines to Newfound Lake which will be discussed at future town meetings.

Again this year we experienced numerous personnel problems; appointments were made which we feel were beneficial to the town and we can report all departments functioning smoothly.

One of our major problems this past year has been new property valuations. This came about due to the fact the town was reassessed in 1964 at 100% evaluation. At present, the Tax Commission figures give an equalized valuation at 63%. This presents a problem in trying to assess new property as it might have been in 1964. The Selectmen have placed in the warrant an article to correct this situation. We consider a complete reevaluation at this time is necessary to be fair to all our taxpayers.

The Municipal Budget Committee was departmentalized this year which has been of great assistance to the

Selectmen. We wish to take this opportunity to thank them for their efforts on behalf of the Selectmen and various department heads.

It is necessary this year for the town to make other arrangements for its solid waste disposal. A committee has been active on this subject and an item in the warrant will take up this problem.

There are numerous problems such as waste disposal, ambulance service, regional planning, etc. that points to the fact we must have closer cooperation between the Boards of Selectmen of our area towns. In the past our efforts have met with little success. It is hoped in the future, cooperation between various Boards of Selectmen may be realized.

In closing, we wish to thank all the town officials for their efforts and assistance throughout the past year.

#### TOWN CLERK - TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

1971 was a year of many changes in these offices. Matthew Flood was elected to the newly created joint position of Town Clerk-Tax Collector but was unable to assume his duties due to ill health. An office was opened in the Municipal Building and for the first time these two areas of town business joined other municipal services. Another change was the addition to the Tax Collector's duties of collecting the Town Sewer Assessments.

Curtis Akerman volunteered to assume the Tax Collector's duties and Jerry Filteau carried on the Town Clerk duties until when one more change occurred as the Selectmen appointed the writer to office as of May 1st.

Town residents can be proud of their excellent record in meeting their tax obligations. No property has failed to be redeemed since 1966 and there is less than \$1,400.00 outstanding from previous years.

There still seems to be some confusion about the exemptions to the Resident Tax which replaced the Head and Poll Tax. Those over 65 years on April 1st are exempt. Veterans' widows but not veterans unless over 65; also active servicemen are exempt.

At the end of this first year in office I wish to thank all those who have helped me and those who have shown their patience while I have been learning.

### ROAD AGENT'S REPORT FOR 1971

Summer maintenance consisted of the regular work of brush cutting, repairing guard rails and fences, culvert replacing and resetting, grading and ditching graveled roads, patching asphalt roads and streets and keeping our town as clean as possible.

Some of our main graveled roads were widened and graveled to allow passing because of more traffic.

Asphalt jumped from 16.7 cents to 23 cents per gallon in March 1971, therefore we were not able to asphalt as many roads as planned.

Storm drain maintenance required more maintenance than usual due to continued growth of roots in our old lines.

Winter maintenance cost more this year due to amount of snow and ice storms. Looking back as far as 1966 the cost of snow removal per inch is still about the same or lower. This is primarily due to time saved on equipment and man hours by using sand and salt spreaders operated by the truck drivers only, therefore eliminating the need for paying idle time for a loader and operator at the pit.

I feel one of the biggest assets to our town is the clean appearance of our village square in both summer and winter. Compared to other towns and cities our streets and roads are well kept also.

In the future we will need a large town truck in order to do the work required of it. It may also benefit the town to purchase a pickup, complete with snowplow, to use in both summer and winter maintenance. There are other gravel roads in need of regraveling and widening. I'm in hopes the town can start a long range street rebuilding program soon.

### REPORT OF THE BRISTOL FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Bristol Fire Department wishes to take this opportunity to summarize the fires and their activities of this past year.

The Department responded to 28 calls from Dec. 1, 1970 to Nov. 30, 1971. There were no structural fires this past year, 6 chimney fires, 3 Mutual Aid calls, 3 flooded burners, 1 gas heater, 7 car and truck fires or accidents, 4 false alarms, 1 dump fire and 3 miscellaneous fire calls.

Several of the firemen attended the Fire School held at Lily Pond. Others attended the Fire School held at Fitz-william.

The men of the company have continued with their voluntary training program again this year. Monthly drills and classes were held covering different phases of fire fighting, use and care of fire fighting equipment and hose layouts for different sections of town. More classes will be held in the coming year so that all aspects of fire fighting can be reviewed and so that new members will be brought up to date on fire fighting techniques.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

### Lest We Forget - It Can Happen Here

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 – nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

- 1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
- 2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
- 3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them *dead out* when leaving.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination

which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year -1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

The full time visiting nurse service of NANA has continued to grow. We were recertified with Medicare in October for another year. The offices are located in the Medical Building next to the First National. Twenty-four hour coverage is available in the event of emergencies. The phone is also covered by an answering service located in the Community Service office from 9:00 AM - 3 PM. The NANA black jade Maverick is easily identified by the NANA seal and NANA 1 license plate. The staff now consists of 2 Registered Nurses and two LPNs, and an office secretary.

### BRISTOL PLANNING BOARD

Report to Board of Selectmen, Bristol, N.H. January 18, 1972

In 1971 The Planning Board held 15 meetings and made five field trips.

Three sub-divisions were given final approval.

Six requests for approval were voted not to be under the jurisdiction of the Planning Board.

The Board was requested to inspect two roads to see if the town should consider taking them over. It was the Board's recommendation to the Selectmen that the town take over Timber Lane and that part of Roy Wright's road which runs from the end of Prospect St. to the southerly end of Timber Lane.

At the request of the Selectmen the Planning Board organized a zening study committee. This group with John Greenan as chairman has been working very hard with the Planning Board since September. It is the hope of the Board and the Zoning Study Committee to have a zoning ordinance to present to the voters later in the year.

The Planning Board has requested that the Selectmen increase the Board from 5 to 7 members. It is the feeling of the Board that this would facilitate our having a quorum for all meetings. With increased land development taking place we can foresee a much heavier work load for the Board. It is our hope that the voters will give this their approval at Town Meeting in March.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

### Year Ending December 31, 1971

At this time I would like to briefly report to the people of the Town of Bristol the activities of the Police Department since March 1, 1971.

Due to the large increase in Police activities in the town, it would be impossible to include in this report the total happenings of 1971.

A few items of interest are as follows:

- 1. A complete criminal file has been set up.
- 2. A complete motor vehicle file set up.
- 3. A complete juvenile file set up.
- 4. A complete photo file set up.
- 5. A complete accident file set up.
- 6. A complete fingerprint file set up.

The Cruiser is now set up for most emergencies. The Cruiser now has, at no cost to the town, approximately \$1,400.00 worth of radio equipment which includes State Police, car to car and Sheriff Department. This radio system means we have communications with all departments at the State and local level.

A new Radar unit was purchased at no cost to the town. The total cost of the unit was \$1,250.00 of which \$625.00 was paid for through the Highway Safety Act and \$625.00 was raised within the Police Department.

A complete survey was taken of Bristol on safety which resulted in:

- 1. New traffic lights installed.
- 2. New traffic signs erected.
- 3. New traffic lines painted.

### 4. New school signs erected.

Traffic accidents have decreased approximately 76% over the last year. The children's Bike Rodeo was a great success.

At this time I would like to extend my thanks to all the members of the Department, regulars and specials, for the excellent job they have done in 1971 to make Bristol a safer place to live.


