TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Freedom, N. H., in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Freedom on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of thirteen hundred and forty dollars to defray town charges (consisting of town officers' salaries, expenses, election and registration, town hall, and general expense) and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred dollars for the use of Hydrants, and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars for street lights, and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars for cutting bushes, and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars for summer high-ways, and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of thirteen hundred dollars for winter roads, and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars for sanding winter roads, and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of nine hundred and twenty-five dollars for State Aid Construction, and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred and sixty dollars and sixty-seven cents for class five roads, and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for putting up snow fences, and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for tarring West Ossipee Road, and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of sixty dollars for Lakes Region Association, and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred twenty-five dollars for Old Home Week, and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars for town poor, and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twelve hundred dollars for Old Age Assistance, and appropriate money for the same.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-six dollars and forty cents for Public Library, and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars for public water, and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars to reduce the town debt, and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars for interest, and appropriate money for the same.

22. To see if the town will petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

23. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen dollars for Memorial Day, and appropriate money for the same.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FREEDOM NURSE'S REPORT

This report is a summary of the work done by the school nurse from Feb. 1, 1940 to Feb. 1, 1941.

Pupils examined	53
Visits to schools	14
Visits to homes	20

Physical examinations, as well as vision tests, have been made on all the pupils. Each pupil has been measured once and weighed several times during the year. Individual inspection of all pupils has been made several times during the year.

Four pupils attended an eye clinic, by Dr. J. A. Hunter of Dover. Eye examinations and lenses were obtained for all.

A dental clinic was not held last spring, due to a poor financial condition in the community. I hope very much that a dental clinic will be held this year, as dental defects were very common in the children this year. I hope that all families will begin to make financial reservations for this clinic now.

The State Board of Education has definitely promised the use of the audiometer, an intricate machine used for the testing of hearing. The value of the audiometer test is the parents' willingness to take the child to a physician, in cases where hearing defects are found.

I feel very strongly that some consideration of the school nurse's mileage must be considered by each community that she serves. I serve the towns of Madison, Freedom, Effingham, Sandwich, Moultonboro, Center Harbor, Holderness and New Hampton (working in three supervisory unions). Transportation of all pupils to clinics was done by me, in addition to my regular work; as no one would undertake this duty; consequently extra mileage was added. My total mileage for the year was 9559.5 miles. The

upkeep on any car, plus running expenses and necessary insurance, necessitate that this question should be seriously considered by each school board.

The coöperation of the superintendent, members of the school board, teachers and parents of the community has been very much appreciated.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Freedom:

I herewith submit my fourteenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Democracy is challenged today as never before. Schools, church and home form the triangle on which our safety rests. The triangle is a rigid figure and used much in the construction of foundations of heavy structures. If any side is imperfect the foundation gives way and the structure falls.

Homes and churches should be very active in building characters for worthy citizenship. Our immediate task lies in the schools, in which teachers work so many days each year. We have comfortable buildings and good materials in a land at peace. We should do much. People in European countries are dying and the children are growing up in ignorance. The children of America must save the world for Freedom and Democracy.

We must train for sound bodies, so we teach health lessons, we provide healthful conditions and outdoor playgrounds, and we have nurses and doctors to check up and correct defects.

We must train for mechanical skills for trades and industries. Our immediate defense program is calling loudly for workers with intelligent manual ability.

We must train for governmental tasks, so we have classes in History and Government and much discussion of Current Events which are very much alive today. We have club activities and parliamentary procedure. We argue and discuss as people should in a Democracy. We try to train for future citizenship and worthy office-holding.

America marches on! What will be her fate? The answer lies in the progress we make in character and the finer arts. Education without character is shown in the world gone mad today. We have music

and art, poetry and literature. We seek to find the virtues which endure—the finer senses of beauty, harmony, justice and honesty. We try to understand that our home country is free and prosperous because others worked, struggled and suffered for us.

We are fortunate in having two strong teachers in our schools. Mr. Herbert, at the head of the school, is raising the standard of scholarship with faithful teaching. He is also leading the pupils in games and club activities which lead to practical citizenship.

The health work is in the care of the school nurse, Ruth E. Allen. Her report appears in another place in the school report.

School property is in good condition, the building having been recently painted outside. I recommend that the rooms be painted inside. The septic toilets are proving a great sanitary improvement.

We need more space for a playground where boys and girls can romp and play. It is to be regretted that in the open country the schools should be so limited for space. The bank in front of the school-house should be beautified with shrubbery.
