#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Gilford:

In accordance with the requirements of the Public Statutes, we herewith submit our annual report.

During the past year we have endeavored to conduct the affairs of the town economically, and in the interest of all its taxpayers, and at this time we desire to make a few suggestions for the future.

Our most serious problem at the present time is our highways, and how to maintain them efficiently and economically. It seems to us that a change in our highway agent system is advisable, and that the agent, or agents, should be appointed by the selectmen, thus putting the entire road problem in the hands of the board that is obliged to shoulder the responsibility.

Owing to the rapidly increasing automobile traffic on the Winnepesaukee Road, it seems to us that the recommendation of Mr. Harry L. Smith, division engineer of the State Highway Department, that a patrolman be employed on that road is wise.

The work accomplished under state aid during the past year is fully described in a communication from Mr. Smith published elsewhere in this report.

Under the supervision of Highway Agent Mathias Kimball a very creditable showing has been made on the Wilkinson Shore Road. There is an unexpended balance of \$111 in the treasury to the credit of this account, and an additional appropriation of \$150 will be required to complete the construction of the road.

The public wharf at Glendale has been enlarged in accordance with a vote of the town, by extending same 64 feet in length. Mr. Charles E. Tuttle, of Lakeport, did the work at a cost of \$300.

We desire to express the hope that the town will vote to celebrate Old Home Day, and also that some steps will be taken toward establishing a public watering-trough in the village.

Mr. W. A. Jackson has very generously offered to furnish pipe railings, and Rev. Mr. Harding offers to give stone for abutments, provided the town will build a cement bridge at the J. B. Merrill place.

#### STATE AID CONSTRUCTION.

To the Selectmen of Gilford:

In accordance with the custom of the past few years, I take pleasure in submitting a brief report of state aid construction work accomplished the past season.

In 1916, there was constructed, in town, under state aid, twenty-four hundred feet of gravel road, at an average cost of eighty-three and one-tenth cents per linear foot.

One section built was on the Gully Road, so called, the main road from Laconia to Gilford Village, where, in continuation of the work done last year, fourteen hundred feet was built at a cost of seventy-five cents per linear foot. The work consisted of widening and straightening, and surfacing with gravel, rebuilding one stone culvert, installing three new corrugated metal culverts and the erection of standard guard rail where necessary.

The other section improved was also in continuance of work done in previous years, on the Lakeport and Alton Bay road, or Winnepesaukee Road, so called, where one thousand feet was built, at a cost of ninety-four and sixtenths cents per linear foot. The work here included widening and straightening, the placing of stone foundation for some distance over clayey sub-soil, surfacing with gravel; repairing one stone culvert, the placing of one corrugated metal tube, and the erection of standard guard rail at embankments.

On each section the work was done, as in previous years, by the town, under the direction of your board, and supervision of this department, and it seems to me, that in spite of the somewhat trying conditions under which much of the work was performed, both as regards difficulty in obtaining labor, and the adverse weather conditions encountered, that very satisfactory work was accomplished.

It may not be out of place here to suggest, that in view of the very great increase of motor traffic in the last two years, the matter of properly maintaining our state roads, and also the town roads, on through routes, demands our careful attention. As is well known, there are two general forms of maintenance, which may be called continuous maintenance and periodical repairs. Of these two forms, or methods, it seems to me there can be no question of which is the better on a gravel, or earth road, which is subjected to heavy, or even moderate traffic. Continuous maintenance is of course best accomplished by the patrol system, and our experience in the state has fully demonstrated its value. In the year 1916 there were 225 patrolmen appointed and in service in the state.

I would recommend that a patrol system be established on the Winnepesaukee Road, in Gilford, the coming season; the state will co-operate on terms as submitted to you in detail last week.

The undersigned, trustees of the public library of this town, submit the following report:

The library now contains 2,670 volumes. Number of volumes added since close of last fiscal year, 123, one of which was given by Martin A. Haynes, of Lakeport. A card-filing cabinet has been given to the library by Miss Nina A. Littlefield, of Cambridge, Mass.

The librarian gives the following report: Total number of books loaned, 3,485, classified as follows: Fiction, 2,751; general literature, 700; history, 34. Largest number of books loaned in any one day, 60. Number of new patrons, 23. Number of visitors for the year, 80. A large collection of books in the hands of the book binder; also, a revolving book-case, which has been ordered, will require the balance of cash on hand.

Mr. Nicholas Frost of the board of library trustees tendered his resignation to the board of selectmen.

The need of more library room and better facilities for book classification is very urgent.

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Citizens of the Gilford School District the School Board respectfully submit the following report of the Schools:

We have maintained eight schools and intend to have them thirty-four weeks each, but on account of infantile paralysis Nos. 4, 8 and 10 had only thirty-two weeks each. No. 1 had thirteen weeks in the spring and closed in the fall and winter, there not being children enough for a school, and the scholars of No. 1 attended No. 4.

Following are the names of the scholars who graduated from the eighth grade and received their diplomas in June, 1916, most of whom are attending high school: William W. Smith, Harold Smith, Arthur C. Harris, James A. Sawyer, Esther M. Sawyer, Muriel Rand, Helen B. Bacon, Margaret I. Bacon, Alice M. Johnson and Reba M. Dockham.

The past school year has been a success. It has been our aim to secure experienced teachers (and have for the most part) and to retain them through the year. They have given general satisfaction and good progress has been made.

We have introduced a new series of arithmetics, geographies, readers and copy books, which have made a great improvement.

Agreeably to the requirements of the law passed in January session, 1909, we submit to the selectmen the following estimates:

High school tuition, \$1,100 Text-books and supplies, 200 We suggest that parents or guardians who contemplate sending scholars out of town to high school, and expect tuition to be paid by the town, should notify the school board, as otherwise they will not be entitled to the benefit of the law. It is also necessary that the school board should know the number of scholars who expect tuition paid by the town, in order to make a proper estimate.
