SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Gilford:

We herewith present our annual report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1918.

During the past year we have adopted the Uniform System of Accounting, as recommended by the State Tax Commission, and this report is arranged in accordance with the new system.

Agreeable to chapter 129, section 8, Laws of 1917, we present herewith a budget of estimated requirements for appropriations for the ensuing year.

EXPENDITURES.

Current Maintenance Expenses.

This includes town officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration expenses, police, fire, damage by dogs and various other town expenses. Our expenditures on these accounts during previous year was \$1,697.27, and we recommend that \$1,500 be appropriated for the ensuing year.

For Memorial Day, the same as previous year, \$40, is recommended.

Public Library, appropriation previous year, \$100, recommended for ensuing year, \$100.

Highways:

Our expenditures for maintenance of town highways during the past year was \$4,070.22. This exceeded our appropriation over \$1,400, and was caused by the unusually severe winter, which made it impossible to keep our roads in passable condition. An appropriation of \$4,200 will be necessary for the ensuing year, as after deducting permanent improvement money as required by law, \$941, and \$428.86 necessary for patrolman on the Winnepesaukee road, the balance of \$2,830.14 is not excessive for maintaining our highways.

Trunk Line Construction:

There is now in the treasury to the credit of this account the entire appropriation of last year, \$1,800, as on account of labor conditions no trunk line work was done. An appropriation this year of \$470.50, which, together with the permanent improvement fund, \$941, making a total of \$1,411.50, will enable us to get an equal amount from the state. It seems to us that it is good business policy to accept this proposition.

Our state tax for the ensuing year is \$1,680, and our county tax is \$1,650.94.

Assuming that the School District will not vote to raise any more than last year, our total appropriations and assessments will not exceed \$14,000 if these recommendations are adopted.

We shall be very fortunate indeed if we can maintain the present assessed valuation of \$941,396, and the tax rate is sure to increase unless we practice strict economy.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Voters of the Gilford School District:

The annual report of your school board will this year be brief, for the superintendent's report covers fully the conditions of our schools.

We have examined his report and heartily agree that it is in accord with the times. Therefore, the Public Board of Education's report will contain only the financial conditions of the district to date, as the fiscal year has been changed and will not end until August 31, 1918.

We recommend, according to law, the following:

High school tuition,	\$1,600.00
Text-books and supplies,	200.00
Flags and appurtenances,	10.00

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

GILFORD, N. H., February 1, 1918.

To the Public Board of Education and Voters of Gilford:

/ I deem it a privilege and a duty to present to the inhabitants of Gilford School District the first superintendent's report ever given, as defined by the present public statutes.

In August I was elected district superintendent of Gilford, Meredith and Woodstock. Within this short time I have endeavored to become acquainted with the problems of your schools. The suggestions and recommendations in this report are intended to be strictly in accordance with the progressive ideas of education.

The cities in our state for the past ten years have made great strides toward improving their educational equipment, buildings, teachers and administrative officers. The rural towns in many sections have already realized that they must also keep pace with the times. Therefore Gilford has placed itself on record as desiring to give its boys and girls educational advantages by securing better qualified teachers, better school equipment and by having a longer school year.

TEACHERS.—During the past year we have endeavored to secure only experienced or normal trained teachers for our schools, for they are able to accomplish more for our pupils and the community. Then again they are apt to have far better methods in presenting the various school subjects, which tends to save much valuable time for the pupils, and also the interest of the pupils is far better. The experienced teacher costs no more in the long run than the untrained one. We receive two dollars per week from the state for every teacher employed who has either a state or normal certificate. For example: A teacher whom you pay twelve dollars per week costs the Gilford School District ten dollars per week.

VISITS AND CONFERENCES.—Your superintendent has met the school board in joint sessions each month. He has given at those meetings a written report of the conditions of each school. These reports have been discussed and accepted by the Board of Education. I have visited School No. I, 12 times; No. II, 10 times; No. III, 8 times; No. IV, 6 times; No. V, 14 times; No. VIII, 16 times; No. IX, 8 times; No. X, 9 times; No. XII, 10 times.

You will notice from the school statistics later in this report that No. IV had only 9 weeks in the fall term. At these visits, methods of teaching have been freely discussed, supplies and equipment furnished, individual pupils classified, tests given and professional reading suggested, thus bringing about a uniformity of work in all the schools.

Grading.—It was advisable to grade the various schools. This has been accomplished and the State Program of Studies is followed in each school. The results of having our schools graded are many. Among the most important, the pupils will be better prepared when they enter high school; second, the pupils will have a greater and wider field of knowledge, for many times a change of teachers causes too much repetition or waste of time; third, the teacher has a definite amount of work to do in each subject; and fourth, parents are far better satisfied.

Tuitions.—We have at the time of writing 27 pupils who are receiving their tuition paid by the school district. New Hampton Institute has six pupils from Gilford, Laconia High School has 19, and Alton High School, two. Both New Hampton Institute and Laconia have advanced their tuition rates the past year to \$55 per pupil per year.

REPAIRS.—The school at No. VIII was shingled and a closet was made in this building for books and supplies of the district. This simplifies very much the matter of distribution to the various schools. The coming year the outer houses at No. IX and No. XII must be repaired or new ones constructed. They are in a very bad condition. Illness among the children is often caused from bad toilets. They should be connected with the school building, increasing the efficiency of our school system. The lighting at No. IX is very poor. If two or three windows could be added on the west side it would improve conditions very much. Then again the underbrush around the building needs to be cut.

Drinking Receptacles.—In all the schools we have placed sanitary water jars and in a few cases the pupils have individual drinking cups. Every pupil should have

a drinking cup, for no doubt many diseases are spread in this manner.

MEDICAL ACT.—Many towns in the state have become fully convinced that medical inspection in their schools has decreased the number of diseases, improved the health of the children and in some cases even of the parents, thereby directly benefiting the community. The cost of carrying out this act is very small. I hope the district will act favorably upon this matter at this annual school meeting.

FISCAL YEAR.—"The fiscal year of towns and special school districts beginning February 16, 1917, shall end August 31, 1918, and thereafter the fiscal and the scholastic year shall end August 31, annually." It is recommended by the Department of Public Instruction that the school board make its report to date, but not its final statement until February, 1919.

In conclusion: Never in the history of this generation have the public schools the vast opportunities of rendering greater assistance and aid to the communities in our rural sections than today. We must all strive and endeavor to place the schools of Gilford on a par with neighboring schools.

I wish to thank the board of education, parents and teachers for the help which I have received by having their loyal support.
