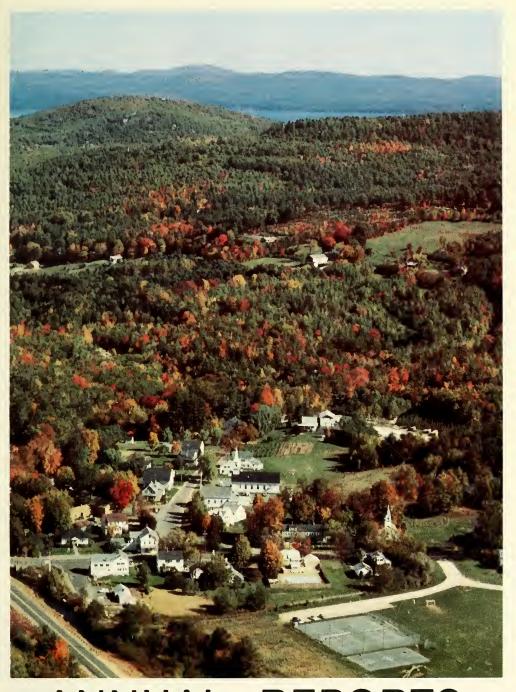

ABOUT YOUR 1977 TOWN REPORT

The theme of your 1977 Town Report is "a salute to citizen participation in local government". Throughout the report you will find pictures of the townspeople who presently serve our community on various boards, committees, and commissions, and in elected offices. Please join us in thanking and saluting them for their service.

By saluting citizen participation in our local government we hope to encourage more citizens to take part in our Town Meeting form of government. The Town Meeting form of government divides into two basic functions; the legislative function and the executive function. The annual Town Meeting constitutes the legislative function and sets forth local ordinances, the budget, goals and activities for the ensuing year. It is the purest form of democratic legislation because it is legislation directly by the people who cast their votes at the Meeting. The executive function is carried out by the citizen officials elected by the Town Meeting and by the citizen volunteers who are appointed to the Town's various boards, committees, and commissions. Here again we have government directly by the people of the Town who find the time to participate.

We encourage you to take your place in the legislative function by attending the pre-Town Meeting hearings on the budgets, and by attending the Town Meeting knowledgeably prepared to cast your vote in direction of the Town's activities. We encourage you to consider participating in the executive function by running for a Town-elected office or by volunteering for appointment for a town board, committee, or commission.

Government by the people, as we have in our New England Town Meeting form of government, will exist and prosper only if the people participate in it.

TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Gilford in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Gilford Elementary School in said Gilford, on Tuesday, the 14th of March, 1978, at 8 of the clock in the forenoon (polls to be opened from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose the necessary Town Officers for the following year.

Article 2. To see what action the Town will take on the following questions:

Amendment #1. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? Revise provisions concerning removal of sand and gravel as provided in Article III C. to require a site plan, control slopes, and protect against erosion.

Amendment #2. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? Substitute 1975 B.O.C.A. Building Code in place of 1970 B.O.C.A. Building Code and 1973 supplement.

Amendment #3. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? Revise Article V.A.B. (Professional District) in order to require that lots have a road frontage of 150 feet, or a minimum of 50 feet, provided a 150 foot square

exists within the lot within which all construction shall take place.

Amendment #4. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? Revise Article XVI (definitions) as follows: 1. To revise definition of "subdivision" to bring it into compliance with new State definition as follows? The division of a lot, tract, or parcel of land into two or more lots, plats, sites, or other divisions of land for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of sale, rent, lease, condominium conveyance, or building development. Includes resubdivision and, when appropriate to the context, relates to the process of resubdividing or to the land or territory subdivided. The division of a parcel of land held in common and subsequently divided into parts among the several owners shall be deemed a subdivision under this chapter. 2. To add a new definition for "Off Street Parking Space": "Each space shall be ten (10) feet by twenty (20) feet." 3. To revise definition of "dwelling": "A building or portion of a building containing any number of rooms designated for use by one family as a complete housekeeping unit." 4. To alphabetize definitions.

Amendment #5. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? To revise Article XVII Wet Land Conservation Areas by amending Paragraph C, Permitted Uses: To provide for use of poorly drained soils after review and recommendation by the Town Engineer and site plan review by the Planning Board. Paragraph D, Special Exceptions: To provide for use of very poorly drained soils and alluvial flood-plain soils by special exception to be granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment after public hearing and notice to the Board of Selectmen, the Town Engineer, Conservation Commission and Planning Board.

Amendment #6. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment #6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Gilford Zoning Ordinance as follows? To strike parking requirements from zoning ordinance and insert under site plan regulation checklist under subdivision regulations.

Article 3. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:66 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a Wind Powered Energy system which exemption shall be in an amount of the cost of the Wind Powered Energy system installed?

Article 4. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-c relative to expanded exemptions on real estate for the elderly, changing the eligibility requirement that a person may own no more than \$35,000 in assets in any kind to a requirement that a person may own no more than \$50,000 in assets of any kind?

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of the value specified in RSA

72:43-c, III provided that the exemptions shall be based upon the assessed value of the real estate?

Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 are to appear on the official Town ballot.

Article 6. To see what action the Town will take on the following proposal: To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance: All dogs in the Town of Gilford, whether licensed or unlicensed, shall be kept on the premises of the owner or keeper, and not allowed to run at large off the premises unless on a leash, or under the direct control of the owner or keeper. Any owner or keeper of a dog allowing it to run at large in violation of this ordinance shall be warned to restrain the animal, and upon subsequent offense, shall be fined ten dollars (\$10) for the use of the Town. Any police officer may impound any dog found running at large in violation of this ordinance. This ordinance shall take effect sixty (60) days after its passage. (By Petition)

Article 7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of paying salaries to the elected officers of the Town.

Article 8. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of Town Officers' Expenses, including: Selectmen's Administrative Expenses, and the Town Clerk-Tax Collector's Expenses.

Article 9. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Election and Registration Expenses.

Article 10. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Property Appraisal, including: Appraisal Department Expense, and Revaluation Final Expenses.

- Article 11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Hall and other Town buildings, including: Town Hall & Buildings Expenses, and Wilson House Remodeling.
- Article 12. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Employees Retirement and Social Security.
- Article 13. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for other general Government Expenses, including: Building Code and Zoning Enforcement, Audit, N.H. Humane Society, and Informational Directional Plaza Signs Project, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$4,741 from the Anti-Recession Fiscal Assistance Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Public Law 94-369, for use as a set off against Audit Expense.
- Article 14. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Town Engineer's Department.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with a State certified private ambulance service for the provision of Ambulance Service to the Town, and to raise and appropriate \$16,615 for ambulance service in 1978.
- Article 16. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Police Department.
- Article 17. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.

- Article 18. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of Trees and the Conservation Commission, including: Conservation Commission Expenses, and White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- Article 19. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.
- Article 20. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Planning and Zoning and other Town Committees, including: Planning Board Expenses, Lakes Region Planning Commission, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and Budget Committee.
- Article 21. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Damages and Legal Expense, including: Legal Expense, and Dog Damage.
- Article 22. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- Article 23. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contributions for Health and Welfare, including: Lakes Region General Hospital, Lakes Region Community Health Agency, and Community Action Program.
- Article 24. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Sewer Maintenance and Construction Payments, including: Winnipesaukee River Basin Project.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,342 for Refuse Disposal, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

- Article 26. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.
- Article 27. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the General Expenses of the Highway Department.
- Article 28, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,118 for Maintenance, Construction, or Reconstruction of Class V Highways. (Town Road Aid)
- Article 29. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Gilford Public Library.
- Article 30. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Welfare, including: Direct Relief, Old Age Assistance and Administrative Expenses.
- Article 31. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patriotic Purposes, including: Memorial Day Expenses.
- Article 32. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Recreation and Old Home Day.
- Article 33. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Municipal Water-Laconia Water Works.
- Article 34. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of Cemetaries.

- Article 35. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Glendale Wharves and Parking Lot.
- Article 36. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Advertising and Regional Associations, including: Lakes Region Association, and Commercial and Industrial Development Project.
- Article 37. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Debt Service, including: Principal Payments on Long Term Notes and Bonds, Interest Payments on Long Term Notes and Bonds, and Interest on Temporary Loans, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set off against Principal Payments on Long Term Notes and Bonds Debt Service.
- Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,400 for New Highway Equipment.
- Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,360 for New Highway Construction.
- Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$64,000 for the purchase of the Jewett Property next to the Glendale Town Docks.
- Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 for the construction of Two Tennis Courts at the Gilford Village Field with the understanding and condition that half of the appropriation (\$17,500) will be reimbursed to the Town in the form of Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Funds. (Requires a two-thirds vote)

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of constructing a Water Supply Service at Stonewall Park with the understanding and condition that half of the appropriation (\$2,000) will be reimbursed to the Town in the form of Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Funds. (Requires a two-thirds vote)

Article 43. To see what action the Town will take on the following proposal: To see whether the Town will vote to authorize the Gilford Fire Department to provide for Emergency Care and Ambulance Services under the control and supervision of the Board of Fire Engineers on and after November 16, 1978. (By Petition)

Article 44. To see what action the Town will take on the following proposal: We, the undersigned, petition the Town of Gilford to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000 to be used for the construction of an addition to the Gilford Public Library. (By Petition)

Article 45. To see what action the Town will take on the following proposal: We, the undersigned, would like to see a completion of the original Village Field Project by the addition of two tennis courts at that site. (By Petition)

Article 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply any Federal Anti-Recession Fiscal Assistance Funds received in 1978 to Street Lighting expenses in accordance with the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Public Law 94-369, and thereby reduce the street lighting appropriation by the amount applied.

Article 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to: A) Accept the present

bridge and approaches connecting Governor's Island and the mainland as a Town owned and maintained bridge. B) Apply for, contract for, and accept State of New Hampshire Bridge Aid for 50% of the replacement cost of the bridge connecting Governor's Island and the mainland. C) Fund the remaining 50% of the replacement cost, at the time of construction, by the issuance of serial bonds, notes, or other methods in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. D) Contract for and accept funds amounting to 40% of the Town of Gilford's share (20% of total replacement cost) from the Governor's Island Club, Inc.

- Article 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept State and or Federal Aid relative to disasters.
- Article 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the Town in Anticipation of Taxes.
- Article 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and transfer title to all real estate taken by the Town in default of redemption from any tax sale, to such persons and upon such conditions as they shall see fit.
- Article 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept State and or Federal aid relative to the Community Development Act Block Grant Progaram.
- **Article 52.** To transact any other business which may legally come before such meeting.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the 1957 Town Meeting Meeting a motion will be presented to adjourn to the Gilford Middle High School in said Gilford on Wednesday, the 15th of March, 1978, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to take up Articles 6 through 52.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Gilford qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Gilford Middle High School in said district on the 22 day of March, 1978 at 7:30 P.M. in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 2. To hear the reports of the Agents, Auditors, Committees of Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000. or some other sum, for the purchase and installation of individual student lockers at the Gilford Middle High School.
- 5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000.00 or some other sum, to maintain and repair the paving and drainage system of the parking lot at the Gilford Middle High School.
- 6. To see if the district will vote to authorize the Gilford School Board to expend the sum of \$360,000.00 or some other figure, representing the original bond issue interest, all accrued interest received by the School District resulting from the bond issue, any temporary investment of bond proceeds, and any other monies received as a result of said bond

issue, for the purpose of using and applying these monies for the Gilford Middle High School project as previously voted by the school district in 1974, and that the Gilford School Board be authorized to take all action necessary in accord with this vote.

- 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
- 8. To empower the School Board to ask the Division of Municipal Accounting of the state of New Hampshire, Department of Revenue Administration, to conduct a certified audit of the school district's 1977-78 financial records by no later than January 1, 1979.
- 9. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

1977 was an extremely busy and active year for your Selectmen. In this report we will briefly review some of the important activities that we worked on during the year.

The Town's first complete revaluation of all taxable property since 1962 was completed in 1977. The purpose of the revaluation was to restore equitability to individual tax assessments so that no one individual or business would pay more than their fair share of the property tax burden. We are confident that the revaluation successfully realized its purpose. We have complimented the revaluation with the reorganization of our Appraisal Department. Whereas in the past our in-house appraisal operation attempted to reappraise every property in Town every year (with an ever increasing staff and budget) now our Department, which has been drastically reduced in staff and budget, will only place values on new buildings, additions and alterations to existing buildings. All other assessments will be held constant at the 1977 level and will only be changed when we have another complete revaluation. in approximately five to seven years. The Selectmen are confident that the revaluation and the reorganization of our Appraisal Department will successfully prevent spot assessing, the reappraisal of some and not others. and discrepancies and inequities that would build up again if the Town were to attempt to revalue every property every year.

For the first time in many years substantial successes were realized in the Town's relationships with Gunstock Acres during 1977. In the summer, with the proceeds from the defaulted Travelers Indemnity Company Road Performance Bond; we undertook a

major (\$250,000) road construction project that resulted in Town acceptance of many roads at the Acres, and laid the groundwork for the continued acceptance of more Gunstock Acres roads. Based on the in-progress acceptance of certain Gunstock Acres roads, the Selectmen, later in the year, negotiated an agreement with The Gunstock Acres Association to sand, salt, and plow the Gunstock Acres roads during the winter of 1977-78. Both of these accomplishments alleviated difficult and agonizing situations that have existed for many years. We are not completely out of the woods yet with the Gunstock Acres situation, because there are still additional road performance bond monies to be acquired for additional construction, reconstruction and eventual acceptance of more roads, but 1977 saw giant steps forward in resolving these matters. The most important accomplishment was the development of a cooperative working relationship between your Board of Selectmen and the President and Board of Directors of the Gunstock Acres Association. We are now working with each other, after many years of adversary relationships, and this more than anything else will help us to continue to realize a rejuvenated sense of community with our neighbors at Gunstock Acres that will thereby serve the betterment of the community as a whole.

In the early summer of 1977 the Town realized a major success by acquiring a no-local-match \$200,000 Federal, Economic Development Administration, grant for the construction of a public works facility. The award was preceded by lengthy and tireless efforts by the Board and our Administrator Steve McCabe and Town Engineer Joe April. The \$200,000 acquired will fund construction of a public works facility, entirely at the expense of the Federal Government. The facility will house our Public Works Departments and our expensive public works equipment and will allow our Public Works Departments to deliver high level services with greater efficiency and economy.

Our Informational/Directional Sign Plazas Project was only half completed in busy 1977. In the spring of 1978 the remaining two, of four, information center signs will be placed at main entrance arteries to the Town. The information plazas will direct visitors, tourists, and customers to our Town services, in lieu of billboards which were outlawed by Town ordinance in 1976.

During the summer of 1977 the Town was offered first acquisition rights to the **Jewett property** in Glendale. The property includes 247 feet of lake frontage directly abutting the Glendale Town Docks. In consideration of the growth of our island and lakefront population, the Board viewed this acquisition as a valuable investment in the Town's future, and took and option to buy the property that will be before your 1978 Town Meeting for approval.

Throughout the 1977 session of the New Hampshire General Court, your Selectmen took an active role in furthering the best interests of local government, through our legislative action program. In the course of our legislative action program we reviewed hundreds of bills that in one way or another would effect life in the towns and cities of New Hampshire. We actively opposed and supported many bills via direct correspondences with our local legislative delegation, the leaders of the House and Senate, the Belknap County delegation and several times via direct testimony before Senate and House conference committees. The main thrust of our legislative activity was to oppose State Legislature attempts to curtail or reduce the State Budget by legislating the reduction of State Revenue Sharing with the towns and cities, such as by cutting our share of the business profits tax and the rooms and meals tax. Areas in which we feel our legislative program was instrumental were; the maintenance of full State aid to communities, the creation of a municipal bond bank to save on the costs of long term borrowing, the defeat of a bill automatically changing all Class 6 roads to Class 5, the defeat of compulsary binding arbitration of collective bargaining impasses, the passage of a law allowing the transfer of OAA and APTD (welfare) costs to counties, and the enactment of a State-Municipal Revenue Sharing formula with hold-harmless from the loss of prior revenue provisions for towns and cities. We also supported and fought for an improved and more equitable means of taxing boats and intend to continue that consideration in the next session of the Legislature.

At our annual Summer Town Meeting, on July 23, 1977, where our summer residents are provided the opportunity to provide input to Town officials; our summer community expressed thanks and gratitude for the Town Meeting's acquisition of a fire boat for island and lakefront property protection and for the improvements made to the Gilford Beach. The Summer Town Meeting enthusiastically supported the acquistion of the Jewett property and expressed concern about the State system of taxing boats.

In 1977 we conducted a **complete review of our Town insurance programs** and invited proposals for booking the Town's insurances. This process resulted in cost savings on our insurance programs as the result of broker's sharpening their pencils to be competitive in the proposal process.

The Governor's Island roads were accepted as Town public ways in 1977, in a process in which we enjoyed the complete cooperation of the Governor's Island Club.

In the final quarter of 1977 we spent a great deal of our time working on **Town budgets** in an effort to prevent an increase in the 1978 tax rate. In that regard we wish to thank the members of our Capital Development Task Force who spent many hours reviewing future Town capital expenditure needs and filed a report that enabled us to recommend certain cuts in the proposed 1978 budgets that, if accepted by the Town Meeting, will result in a no increase tax rate in 1977.

We would like to take this opportunity to ask you to join us in welcoming our new Police Chief, Kenneth J. Carew, and in extending our congratulations to our Town Clerk-Tax Collector, Lorraine T. Royce, who was awarded the designation of "Certified Municipal Clerk" by the Institute of Municipal Clerks in 1977 and our Administrator, Steve McCabe, who was elected vice president of the New Hampshire Municipal Association in 1977.

In conclusion we wish to emphasize the theme of this year's Town Report, that being "citizen participation in local government". We encourage each resident of Gilford to attend the open and public meetings of our Town boards, committees, and commissions. We encourage you to attend public hearings (particularly those on the budget) and the Town Meeting. We encourage you to consider running for an elected office or to submit your name, to the Selectmen's Office, as a volunteer for appointment to a Town board, committee, or commission. We meet every Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. at the Wilson Farmhouse on Belknap Mountain Road, and encourage you to attend our meetings.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK-TAX COLLECTOR

Printed in the Financial Report section you will find many items listed which were processed through this office and for which a fee was received. The list of items is lengthy, but it does not entirely tell the story of the work done in the Town Clerk-Tax Collector's office for much of it has no fee attached. Because of this I thought it would be of interest to you to know more about the activities conducted here.

Twenty-eight Dredge and Fill applications were processed requiring the Clerk's signature on five copies of each one and distribution to the various boards and commissions as required by law.

One hundred eighty-one voters were registered, and the minutes of one hundred seventy-five meetings of various boards and commissions were read, cross-referenced and filed. All tapes of these meetings are in the custody of the Clerk, and quite frequently requests are received from people who wish to hear them.

Over three hundred applications were processed by mail for beach tags and stickers requested by non-resident property owners. Approximately six thousand beach tags in all were issued as well as stickers to Island Residents for use on their boats, taxpayer stickers and guest cards for use at the Gilford Beach and/or Glendale parking lots.

Oaths of office were administered to fifty-seven appointees and their appointments recorded.

A Town Clerk's Cash Book and a Tax Collector's Cash Book were maintained and all payments and abatements of taxes were posted in Property and Resident Tax Warrants and Tax Sale Book. As this office has been designated by the Board of Selectmen as the receiver of all fees, refunds, income from

departments and other sources a cash book covering these transactions was also kept.

The phone rings constantly with requests for information from lawyers, realtors, lending institutions, the general public and town, state and federal departments. Remember that Gilford has many non-residents who, except for motor vehicle registrations, require the same service and have the same questions and problems as the residents.

One hundred seventy-two property owners were notified by certified mail that their property was to be advertised for unpaid taxes. Copies of these notices were also sent to any known purchasers of the property since the assessment date of April first. Lists were compiled and reported to the Registry of Deeds for Belknap County of the properties to be advertised for unpaid taxes and also of the properties actually taken to the July Tax Sale. My records show that there were one hundred and seven payments of taxes prior to Tax Sale as a result of the above notices, and one hundred fifty-eight redemptions of property from Tax Sales during the year all of which were reported to the Registry of Deeds.

Over four hundred notices were mailed to the owners of dogs reminding them that licenses have to be paid prior to May first or a penalty will be charged.

Three thousand five hundred twenty-eight Resident Tax bills were typed and mailed.

Nine hundred ninety-seven abatements were received from the Board of Selectmen covering uncollectible taxes, corrections on assessments, non-residents charged for resident taxes and hardship cases. All of these required posting, new bills and/or correspondence.

Although not as many motor vehicles were registered in this office as in 1976 and property tax bills were not

received until December 27th, nevertheless 1977 has been a very busy as well as interesting year. Next year there will be three elections which will require absentee ballot mailing for each, standard registrations are to be placed into the "staggered" system which will mean that there will again be re-registration of several hundreds of vehicles beginning in August as well as the usual registration in March and the monthly registrations of those already in the staggered system. As previously mentioned the 1977 tax bills were received in December requiring nearly all work connected with them to be done in 1978. Due to the revaluation this year the 1978 tax bills will be received early in the fall, so that in effect we will be doing two years of tax collecting in one year.

To assist me with all the requirements of the work in the office is Mrs. Eastman, Deputy Town Clerk-Tax Collector, and Mrs. Marshall and Mrs. Giguere who work primarily at the counter, although they do have other duties also. In June we were fortunate to obtain under a federally-funded program the services of Cynthia Atwood who has been doing general office work and assisting at the counter and, in view of the known increase in workload next year, I sincerely hope that "Cindy" may remain either on the federal program or, if those funds are not available on the town payroll.

At the last session of the legislature there were many changes made in the laws under which this office operates involving motor vehicle registrations, elections, vital statistics and tax collecting. As a result of these changes your Town Clerk-Tax Collector attended a motor vehicle seminar, an election law seminar and a Tax Collectors' workshop, as well as the Town Clerk and Tax Collector Conventions at which State officials gave instruction covering every facet of our work. Also attended was a meeting at the Belknap County

Courthouse where instruction was received on researching deeds and tax records.

With the assistance of my deputy, two rabies clinics were attended so that owners of dogs could pay their dog licenses without having the inconvenience of coming to the office later.

Among the interesting events occurring this year was the awarding to me by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks, the designation of Certified Municipal Clerk. This certification is made to Clerks who have met the Institute's requirements as to education, experience, standards of conduct of their office and professionalism. One of the requirements is the writing of a paper on some professional aspect of the Clerk's work. Only one other Clerk in New Hampshire has received this certification to date. I was also honored by being listed in Who's Who in Government, third edition.

I would be remiss if I did not speak of the change in my office hours. Closing of this office on Saturday mornings, may, regretfully, have inconvenienced some of you. Originally the intent of being open on Saturday was to give service to non-residents who arrived in town on Friday night and returned home on Sunday. At that time they could obtain non-resident motor vehicle registrations and pick up their beach tags and stickers. Now state law does not permit a non-resident to register a motor vehicle in the state and beach tags and stickers are available by mail, applications being furnished for this purpose early in the spring. Taxpayer stickers, boat stickers and guest cards now may be obtained at the police station on the weekend, therefore, it is no longer necessary to remain open for this purpose. Motor vehicle registrations could not be completed the same day as all state offices were closed on Saturday. People seeking information on deeds and/or tax sale records could not be referred to the

Registry of Deeds as county departments were closed on Saturday. People could not be referred to other town administrative offices as they were also closed on Saturday. The members of my staff who worked on Saturday were given time off during the week to compensate as there were no funds in my budget for overtime and this created employee shortages during the busy weekday hours. Considering all these factors it seemed better to have the office open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. five days a week giving forty-five hours of service to the public, usually with a full staff, and with access to other offices if needed.

It has been a pleasure to serve the townspeople of Gilford and the many non-resident property owners. We have tried to give you good service in a friendly, helpful way, and if you have suggestions to improve the efficiency of the office they will be most welcome and given thoughtful consideration.

### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Your Planning Board continued to be active during the year 1977. The Board reviewed 39 proposed subdivisions and 13 site plans.

In addition to the regular work of the Board, its representatives attended Conservation Commission, Historic District Commission and Lakes Region Planning Commission meetings.

Because of a concern as to capital priorities, the Board appointed a Sub-committee known as the Town Building Committee and charged it to study and update the Town Comprehensive Plan of 1970 and, on the basis of that study, give recommendations for capital expenditures. The Committee consisting of Jack Boyd, Merrill Fay, Parkman Howe, Kent Locke, Bette McDonald, Don Morin, Ruth Pratt, David Scott, William Southworth, Frederick Winterbottom and John Weeks, Sr. have completed their report and it should be of considerable assistance to the Board in its planning activities.

The Board is proposing six zoning amendments for consideration by the voters which in addition to certain technical amendments, update the sand and gravel ordinance and procedures as to the use of wetlands. In addition, the Board has under consideration steep slope/critical elevation regulations concerning which there will be a public hearing in the near future.

New appointees to the Board this year include Wilber Goddard, Jack Sawyer, Gregory Dickinson (representative of the Selectmen) and Gary Howard. Two alternates have been appointed to the Board, Sandra McGonagle and Peter Sabbow, and they have been most active.

It is appropriate at this time to give special acknowledgement and thanks to Town Engineer, O.

Joseph April, for his fine cooperation and technical assistance during the past year.

Your Planning Board office is open Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Items to be scheduled on the Board's regular Monday meeting night are requested to be in the Board's office by the previous Thursday noon. The regular Monday evening meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. on the second floor of the Community Church Parish Hall. Anyone is welcome to attend these meetings.

## REPORT OF OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

This year found 35 families (86) persons directly served by financial support, counseling, or information and referral services. Another 20 families were indirectly served through our support of the excellent Lakes Region Day Care Program (524-1235).

More than a dozen families received State Welfare Aid to Families with Dependent Children and around 200 person benefited from the Department of Agriculture Food Stamp Program (524-4485). Our County Welfare District has been most cooperative and helpful this past year.

At the time of our "crisis evacuation" when it was necessary to quickly move hundreds of families, we were particularly impressed with the cooperation of many friends and neighbors who so greatly assisted. Particularly the Margate resort management staff are to be commended for their outstanding help and consideration on such short notice. Our thanks to them.

The Julia Ladd Fund "for the worthy poor," administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, has assisted a number of families. The Laura Buttrick Fund, administered by the Lakes Region General Hospital, has been well spent.

The Welfare Guide for New Hampshire Local Officials, published in May, 1976, by the New Hampshire Municipal Association, is our basic manual. This, used with understanding and discretion, seems to well express the friendly concern that has epitomized Gilford's good neighbors' "helping neighbors to help themselves."

There are very few licensed foster families in our Town. Could not one or two of us share our families and blessings with a less fortunate youngster? If you

have any questions or become aware of any neighbors who might need help, please get in touch with me through the Town Office (524-3287) or at home (293-4990).

With the intense growth Gilford is experiencing, recreation plays a more important and demanding role in our community each year. Thus, the Recreation Commission is continually expanding recreational services to meet our ever-increasing needs. Gilford Beach is the center of activity during the months of July and August. An active swimming instruction program was continued and with additional personnel and an increase in supervision the burden of swim lessons was eased considerably. Renovation of the parking lot was completed in the 1977 season and was a huge success, well accepted with many compliments being conveyed by the townspeople. It is anticipated that a rustic fence will encircle the parking area in the future. Plans are in the offing for additional parking facilities and also a small children's playground.

Village Field: The Village Field continues to be the focal point for sports and activities for young and old alike. During the months of May and June numerous baseball and softball teams utilize the field. July and August saw a very successful tennis program for our youth. The summer of '77 saw the Little Red Wagon perform on six consecutive Wednesday evenings. This caravan of travelling creative drama entertained the entire family from ages 5 to 75. Old Home Day highlighted the summer at the field. Setting of trees was undertaken this past Fall at the village field by the Weeblos Boy Scout Troop. Many thanks for a job well done! A new Christmas tree for the village was donated and planted by the Conservation Commission and a tree lighting ceremony conducted by Rev. Wixson in December. In addition, the month of August saw the village field used as "home base" for an out-of-doors Christian Education program for

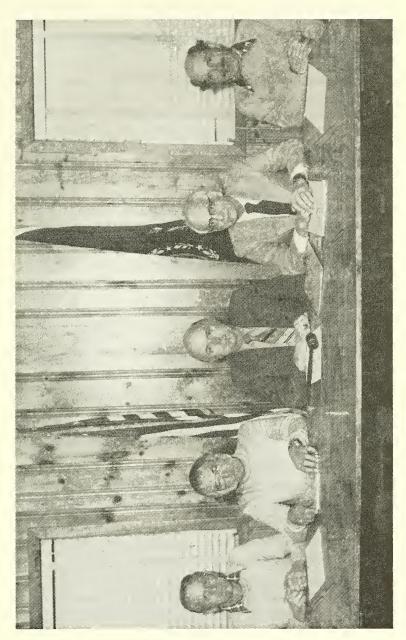
children in grades one through six. This program was conducted by the United Methodist Church of Laconia/Gilford and the Gilford Community Church.

# REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During 1977, the Gilford Zoning Board of Adjustment heard thirty (30) appeals. Twenty-four (24) cases were appeals for variances, of which sixteen (16) were granted, seven (7) denied, and one (1) dismissed without action. Of the requests for rehearing on two cases, one (1) was denied and the other withdrawn by the applicant. Of the three (3) Special Exception appeals, all were granted. Of the three (3) Appeals from Administrative Decision, one (1) was granted and two (2) were denied.

Regarding Variances, the Board wishes to emphasize that it is entirely up to the applicant to prove that his or her request meets the five points required under the laws of New Hampshire. They are:

- 1. The proposed use would not diminish surrounding property values.
- 2. Granting the variance would be in the public interest.
- 3. The proposed use would not be contrary to the spirit of the ordinance.
- 4. By granting the variance substantial justice will be done.
- 5. Denial of the variance would result in an unnecessary hardship to the owner. Hardship under zoning law has nothing to do with the physical or economic conditions of the owner.

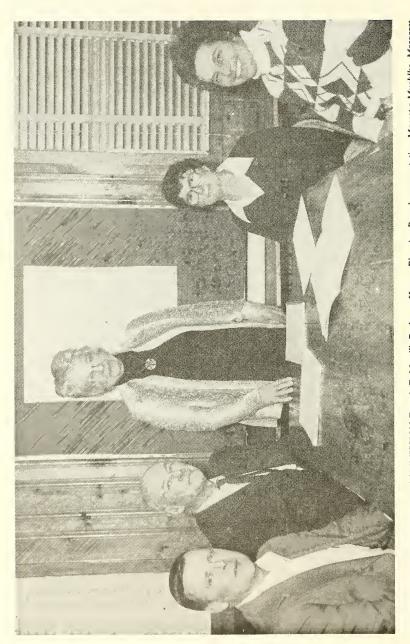
Without these points being proven, no Zoning Board has the right to grant a variance.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GILFORD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1977 found the Conservation Commission active in many areas. Through the efforts of the Commission, the provisions of RSA 72:62 were approved by a large majority of the voters at town meeting. This will encourage the installation and use of solar energy systems.

The Commission reviewed numerous Dredge and Fill applications and is concerned with protecting the watershed, keeping the streams clean and preserving our valuable natural resources. In one case, appeal was made to the Special Board in Concord. This year several wetland subdivisions were passed on in conjunction with the Planning Board. The Commission also ruled on Current Use Assessments and established four basic current use criteria.

In January members attended the Safe Drinking Water Act conference under the auspices of the N.H. Water Supply and Polution Control Commission. In October we attended the annual Municipal Conservation Commissions meeting in Durham. Wetlands protection was on the agenda along with legal help for Conservation commissions, budgets and uses for old town roads. An all day Solid Waste Study trip was sponsored by the League of Women Voters and the Squam Lakes Science Center. One member participated in this and brought back valuable information.

This past summer partial scholarships for Rhondi Pike and Noelle Martin, elementary school teachers, were provided to attend the week long program at the Conservation Camp at Cardigan Mountain, run by the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests. The experience is invaluable and both teachers came back with many ideas to be used in their classrooms.

In conjunction with Arbor Day, the Commission planted spruce trees at the corners of Alvah Wilson and Belknap Mt. roads and near the entrance to the Village Field. The latter will be the **new town** Christmas tree — we hope that all town residents, including the children, will help in its nurture and protection.

Through our recommendation to the Selectmen a unique old original stone culvert with attractive headers of granite will be preserved. The town engineer has had one of the headers repositioned. The area is town-owned in a beautiful spot off the south end of Belknap Mt. Road.

Mr. Spofford of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation came in April to give a detailed description of the BOR program, its funding and the procedures for land acquisition. The Commission is interested in attaining for public use, two parcels of land: one on Cobble Mt. (former Gunn farm), and one in the Piper Mt. area (Powell property). Acquisition of these two pieces would enhance and preserve open space in Gilford.

Throughout the year the Conservation Commission has worked with the Planning Commission on regulations controlling use of lands on critical slopes and higher elevations. It has, without success, looked into obtaining easements along the Gilford brook to ensure that the brook will be stocked by the Fish and Game department and that Gilford children will have fishing opportunities there.

Anyone interested is invited to the Conservation meetings held the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the Town Engineer's office.

Revenues from the sale of this notepaper go directly into the Town's General Fund.

# REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN OF THE GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

The year 1977 was another busy year for the Gilford Public Library and its staff. The circulation of magazines and books increased by almost 700 over 1976 circulation. The increase was reflected in the addition of many new patrons.

Due to problems with the State Library Budget, the Bookmobile visited only twice. The library still borrowed over 2000 books.

An informal survey of library use has been conducted since last June. From that time, approximately 650 patrons, juvenile and adult, have borrowed 15,690 books & periodicals.

Because of many requests, the decision was made to include three daily newspapers in our periodical collection. The papers are the Boston Daily Globe, Christian Science Monitor and the New York Times, both daily and Sunday editions.

Exhibits were displayed throughout the year. In February, Mrs. Mabel Walter showed her costumed dolls. She has crocheted authentic costumes for George and Martha Washington and the flags of the American Revolutionary period. Also, Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln and the Civil War flags.

Another doll exhibit was loaned by Mrs. Mary Siefert a native of Czechoslovakia. The dolls were clothed in the colorful costumed of that country. Mrs. Siefert also loaned a collection of hand decorated Easter eggs.

The library was supplied with plants donated by Mrs. Dorothy Emilio, Mrs. Helen Weeks and Roy N. Holmes. In season, fresh flower arrangements were given by Helen Weeks and Mr. & Mrs. William

Holman. The area at the foot of the flagpole was again planted with tulips and later petunias. Mrs. Kathryn Woolston and Helen Weeks again tended this lovely garden.

The winners of the annual art contest at the Gilford Middle-High were exhibit for a month in the late spring.

In the early summer, a patron started a Building Fund for the Library. Since that time, four substantial gifts have been received. We wish to thank all of you who help support the efforts of our staff to serve you.

# REPORT OF THE GILFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 1977, brought about a change in the administration of the Gilford Police department, Chief Cheney took over the Laconia Police Department, and for a period of about four months the present Deputy Chief Alvin Fortson assumed command of the department.

A change in the administration of any police department, usually has an affect on its personnel. During the transition period, business went along as usual in the very capable hands of the departments temporary chief administrator awaiting the selection of a new Chief.

Despite being short handed the department had a successful year with an increase in calls for service of 419, but a slight decrease in accidents (no fatals) and criminal offenses known.

Motor vehicle offenses (arrests & summonses) were down, due to the department being with out a radar unit for almost the entire year. This unit, is an important tool in law enforcement, and has enabled the department in the past the capability of doing selective traffic enforcement, when complaints come in from citizens about speeding vehicles in different areas of the town.

A change in Administration sometimes brings about personnel changes within a police department, the Gilford police department experienced three personnel changes after the new administration took over. I as chief let all of the department know at the first departmental meeting, that the primary duty of the department, would be service to the community, that is what police work is all about in that the officer must relate with the town and the town in turn relate with the officer.

The department is now at full strength, and all of its members are anxious to perform a service to the town, and meet their obligations with fair but firm enforcement of the law being their guide line.

The usual comparative list of department activities for 1976 and 1977 are provided for your examination.

## REPORT OF THE GILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

For the calendar year ending December 31, 1977, there was, again a dramatic increase in responses by the Gilford Fire Department. The 1977 total, 373 calls, was 71 greater than the 1976 total, and, when compared to the total number of calls for 1967, ten years ago (70 calls), it is easy to see why the present manpower is being taxed to provide the services you desire.

The large increase in structure fires indicates the need for fire safety in the home. Although this Department has been anxious to provide a voluntary inspection program aimed at eliminating common fire hazards in the home, your response to this program has been disappointing. "Let us come to your home, check your wood stove, chimney, and wiring for fire safety, and let us either assure you of having a fire safe home, or leave some suggestions with which to improve the safety of your home."

The loss of \$122,600 in taxable property due to fires in 1977, although less than the 1976 fire loss, is still too large to be acceptable to the Gilford Fire Department. We responded to fires involving \$1,480,910 worth of property (assessed value). The difference — \$1,358,310 — indicates the total assessed value that was saved in the year 1977.

#### II. MANPOWER

The Gilford Fire Department presently has five permanent employees, including the Fire Chief, as has been the case for the last ten years. Ten years ago there were only 70 calls for the entire year. With the increase in calls, especially in the "fire" categories, the Board of Fire Engineers feels that a dangerous situation has developed. More and more often the one firefighter on duty has responded alone to a fire in a structure. The possibilities of injury on the fireground are great. (The Department of Labor has determined that your firefighters are involved in the most hazardous occupation.) These possibilities become frightening when a firefighter is alone trying to fight a fire or effect a rescue.

Your Fire Department is responding to five times the number of calls than was the case in 1967, but with the same number of people on duty. It is from the firefighting and safety point of view that the Fire Engineers have asked for one additional firefighter per shift, a total of three firefighters, to be added to the Fire Department roles.

The Fire Department and your Fire Engineers are

not reacting or overreacting to the future growth of the Town. The Department is simply trying to satisfy the demands of the taxpayers who call for service and whose calls have increased 371% since five permanent personnel were placed on duty in 1967.

### III. EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICES

The Board of Fire Engineers has recommended that in 1978 the Gilford Fire Department assume primary responsibility for the transportation of emergency patients to Lakes Region General Hospital. The added service will involve little or no added expense to the Fire Department budget in 1978.

At present, and due to your requests for service, we respond to all medical emergencies in Town. Our trained permanent and volunteer employees render proper first aid. We use our equipment and oxygen. We ready the patient for transportation. We follow the ambulance to the hospital to pick up our equipment. In the future, the Engineers believe it would be wise and economical to add emergency patient transporation to the services now provided.

The item has been placed on the warrant so that the issue can be discussed and so that the Fire Department can clearly act according to the wishes of the people at Town Meeting.

# IV. MOTORIZED EQUIPMENT

The Gilford Fire Department experienced several major equipment breakdowns in 1977. Although repairs were costly, other expenses and purchases with the Department were put off so that equipment could be kept in efficient operating condition.

At present, we operate the following equipment:

Engine #1: A 1959, 750-gallon-per-minute pumper

Engine #2: A 1972, 1,500-gallon-per-minute pumper

Engine #5: A 1968, 750-gallon-per-minute pumper

Tanker #3: A 1963, 1,000-gallon capacity tank truck

Brush #6: A 1970, four-wheel drive brush fire truck

Rescue #1: A 1977 Rescue/Ambulance

Fire Boat #1: A 1977 MonArk 23½-foot fire rescue boat with a 500-gallon-per-minute fire pump

In addition, the Department has several pieces of auxiliary equipment, including:

1 Chief's car

1 pick-up truck

1 jeep with brush fire equipment trailer

1 rescue boat with trailer

# V. REPLACEMENT OF EQUIPMENT

With our four pieces of major fire equipment and considering the recommendations of Fire Insurance Officials concerning replacement of apparatus reaching 20 years old, the Fire Department has established a 20-year replacement schedule for the large fire trucks. As each truck approaches its 20th year, it should be replaced. A major piece of apparatus would be replaced each five years in order to avoid having to replace two trucks in one or two years. Following this schedule, Engine #1's replacement should be ordered in 1978. Maintaining up-to-date apparatus capable of handling today's hazardous materials emergencies is a necessity if the efficient operation of the Department is to continue. The replacement fire truck will contain foam equipment, large diameter hose, and other devices essential in maintaining a fire attack capability equal to the fires in today's world.

## VI. SUMMARY

In conclusion, we wish to note that with the equipment provided at the 1977 Town Meeting, the Gilford Fire Department was better able to handle emergencies encountered during the past year. In order to make this community safe from both the terror of fire and the threat of medical emergencies, we are asking the people to follow our suggestions and keep the Gilford Fire Department up-to-date and capable to handle emergencies we encounter in the future.

# REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENTS OF PUBLIC WORKS AND ENGINEERING

In 1977 the Department of Public Works consisted of the following departments: Town Engineer, highway Department, Refuse Disposal, Glendale Wharves and Parking, Street Lighting, Cemeteries, Winnipesaukee River Basin, Gilford Sewerage and Building Code.

There were 226 building permits issued in 1977 which is a 5.6% increase over 1976, and there were 46 permits issued for new residences. The total value of the new construction as shown on the building permits was in excess of \$3,250,000.

The refuse disposal situation seems to be working well.

The Winnipesaukee River Basin is progressing slower than anticipated. The design of Gilford's sewers is 95% complete and the preliminary plans are available for inspection at the Town Engineer's Office.

All of the Highway Department deserves a vote of thanks for serving the extra road mileage (over 50% increase since 1974) without a substantial reduction in services.

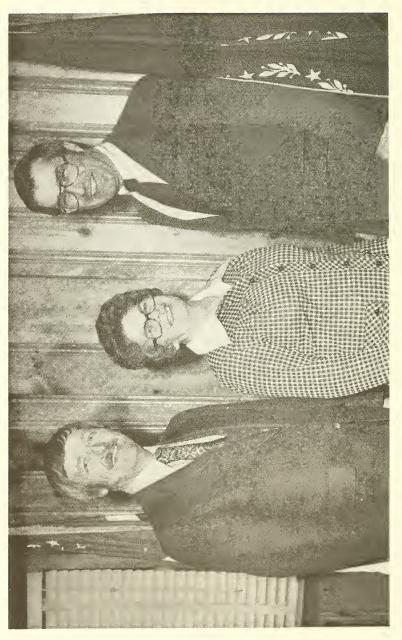

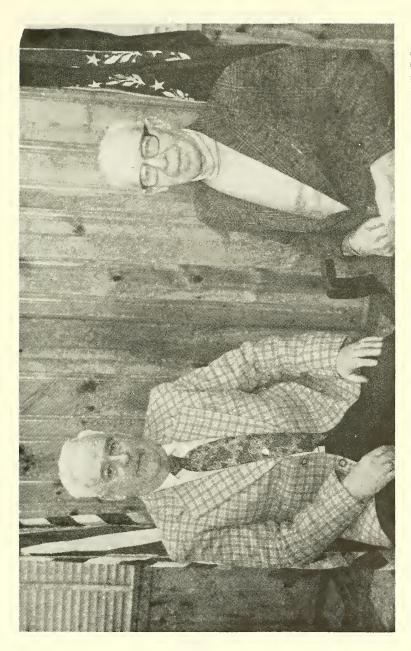

### HOW YOUR 1977 TAXES WERE DETERMINED

Basically two factors determine the tax rate, one is the "total net valuation" of Town property (the total of all assessments — also known as the tax base), and the other is the "total net budget" (the net school, town, and county budgets.)

The "summary of valuation", Report No. 1 on the following pages, gives the "total net valuation", the first factor.

The Town appropriations, Report No. 2 on the following pages, gives the Town portion of the budget, not including revenues (income other than property taxes).

Report No. 3 on the following pages, is the estimate of revenues (estimated income from other than property taxes). These revenues are deducted from the Town appropriations to come up with the **net** Town portion of the total net budget.

Report No. 4 is the actual computation of the tax rate. The net Town appropriation (Town budget less estimated revenues) is added to the net school appropriation (school budget less estimated revenues), and then to the county tax assessment (Gilford's portion of support of the county budget.) The Town's return from the State business profits tax is then deducted from the three budgets, and then added back to them are; the expense to the Town for veterans exemptions and the overlay expense (which is an amount provided to cover expenditures that cannot be budgeted, such as property tax abatement awards and refunds to taxpayers for various reasons), we then have the final amount to be raised by property taxes, the "total net budget". The "total net budget" is then divided by the "total net valuation" to determine the tax rate.

133,725,298.00 ("total net valuation")  $\div$  2,995,446.68 ("total net budget") = \$22.40 Tax Rate per \$1,000 of your assessed valuation.

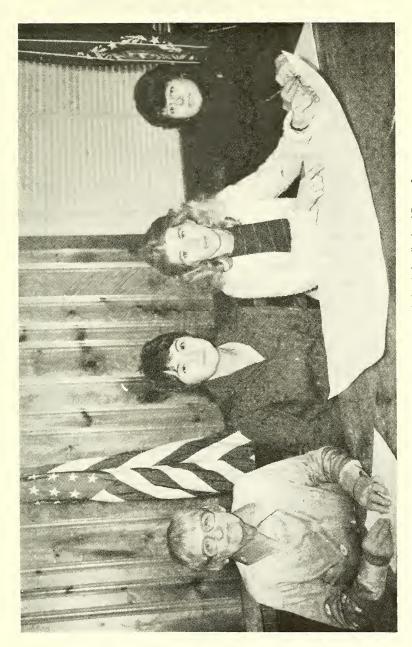

# REPORT ON THE GILFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 16, 1977

The annual Gilford School District Meeting for 1977 was called to order at 7:30 P.M. on Wednesday, March 16, at the Gilford Middle High School by Moderator Milham.

Moderator Millham read the results of the school district election. Michael Sullivan was elected an auditor by write-in votes. There was a tie between JoAnne Graham and Mary Lou Grevatt at 336 votes for school board member. The recount was scheduled for Tuesday, March 22nd.

Article I. Mrs. Grevatt moved that the salaries of the School Board, Truant Officer, and any other officers or agent of the district for 1977-78 be set at \$2,220. to be as follows:

Treasurer	\$1	,000

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Millham. Mr. Richard Campbell, Chairman of the Budget Committee, announced that the Budget Committee approved this article. The article passed.

Article II. Mrs. Millham moved that the reports of the agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen shall be accepted as printed in the 1976 Town Report. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Grevatt, and it was passed.

Article III. Dr. Sanfacon moved that since there are no committees to be chosen at this time, we pass to the next article. The motion was seconded by Mr. Thompson and passed.

- Article IV. Mr. Campbell moved the sum of \$2,324,785. for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. The motion was seconded by Dr. Sanfacon.
- Dr. Sanfacon said that this was a realistic, moderate increase, and that there were 100 more students each year per school district.
- 200 Instruction. Principals are scheduled to get a 5% increase in salaries. Teachers' salaries will reflect a 6½% increase for Blue Cross-Blue Shield Family Membership.
- 220 Library Books and Periodicals. It was explained that there would be phased spending for two more years for the acquisition of library books. Neil Flaherty asked how many books were lost. Mr. Morrison explained that 300 books had been lost at the Middle High School Library and students were asked to pay \$8.00 per lost book. The ratio of library books per pupil is 12-15 at the elementary school and 20-25 at the Middle High School with 7 to 8 text books per student.
- 235.2 Testing. Mr. Jack Boyd asked if we have tests to compare the achievement of Gilford students to those in other schools.
- Mr. Brunelle spoke for the elementary school and explained that there was testing for math, reading, and spelling, and scores for students in all grades showed test results above grade level.
- Mr. Morrison explained that the testing was more individualized in the Middle High School. For scholastic aptitude tests, scores range between 200-800. The high verbal score was 620 and the highest score in Math was 790. In New Hampshire the average was 446 in English and Gilford students averaged 427, and Math was 488, and Gilford pupils averaged 483.

- Mr. Blandford said that college students felt that they had been well prepared at Gilford.
- 290.6 Printing. Mrs. Sheila Weeks asked why there was no newspaper or major printing at the printing shop at the Middle High School. Mr. Morrison explained that the school had graphic arts, but the shops were not sophisticated enough for major jobs.
- **500 Transportation.** It was explained that if the band goes more than 200 miles, it raises its own money.
- 855 Insurance. Mrs. MacDonald moved that the allocation for insurance be increased from \$48,119 to \$70,312. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Grevatt.
- Dr. Sanfacon explained that there was a  $6\frac{1}{2}$ % total increase for teachers, and 2.7% was for Blue Cross-Blue Shield. The town employees had a  $4\frac{1}{2}$ % increase. There is \$7,000 included for track changes.
- Mr. Arthur Nighswander, the Town Counsel, said that the school board must make a decision on this insurance because it had been negotiated with the teachers, but the agreement was held in abeyance until the school district meeting.
- Mr. Robert White asked for comparison of benefits of teachers and non-teaching staff. The teachers have  $6\frac{1}{2}$ %, non-teachers 5%.
- Mr. Donald Chesebrough suggested that Article IV be increased by \$22,193 to include the insurance increase proposed.

Account 855 was passed.

1010 Coaching Salaries. It was asked how many personnel were involved in coaching salaries. Mr. Morrison explained that there were thirty-five positions. It was suggested that coaching for interscholastic activities could be volunteer.

Account 1267. Mr. Thompson moved that the new equipment allocation be amended from \$11,555 to \$14,555. The motion was seconded by Mrs. MacDonald. There was a lengthy discussion of the items listed for equipment. The amendment was defeated.

The final figure for Article IV is \$2,346,198.

Article V. Mrs. Millham moved to empower the School Board to ask the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State of New Hampshire, Department of Revenue Administration, to conduct a certified audit of the school district's 1976-77 financial records by no later than January 1, 1978. It was seconded by Mrs. MacDonald. The motion passed.

Dr. Leo Sanfacon, who was retiring from the School Board, was given an appreciative gift by school board members.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 P.M. by Moderator Millham.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDANT OF SCHOOLS

This is the fifth year I have had the honor of submitting to you the annual report of the Gilford School District.

In the spring of 1977 we lost the services of Robert Morrison as principal of Gilford Middle High School. He had been employed by the school district since August 1, 1973 and spent almost four years in organizing the school and developing its program. There is little doubt that the Gilford Middle High School will reflect his influence for years to come.

Later last spring we were fortunate to obtain the services of William McLean as Robert Morrison's replacement. An experienced secondary administrator, William McLean came to us from Lebanon where he served as principal of the high school. He and his staff have been taking a long hard look at the curriculum, and it is certain that there will be some changes and revisions, since the school's program is now almost five years old.

The elementary school continues to reflect the hopes and expectations of the community. There is no doubt in my mind that the school is very much in tune with parents, the community, and the children it serves.

The education of handicapped children is becoming a national as well as local concern. The citizens of our town will hear more about this in the years immediately ahead.

Providing community leadership in steering the school district in a direction representative of popular consensus is perhaps the most important task of a school board. Our board has for the past year been looking very hard at setting educational goals for the Gilford School District and in the process has taken great pains to secure community participation at all levels.

As I stated at the end of last year's report, "The shake down is over; we are on our way." This comment certainly seems to be as appropriate now as it was then.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD CHAIRPERSON

The 1976-77 school year has been one of growth and change for the Gilford School District. Growth in that the enrollment for the district has continued to grow faster than the projections. The October, 1977 enrollment was 1,246 against 1,175 of the previous year. Change in that Robert Morrison, the first middle school — high school principal, resigned to take a post with Exxon Oil Company in Libya. Mr. Morrison was commended for doing an exceptionally fine job of getting the new school programmed and equipped for a strong start.

He was replaced by William McLean, who came to Gilford from the principalship of Lebanon, N.H. High School. Mr. McLean, among other things, has begun to take a strong look at curriculum development and is establishing the groundwork for the accreditation evaluation of the high school which is scheduled to be done by the Association of New England Schools and Colleges next year.

The elementary school, under the principalship of Tom Brunelle, this year received a Category I evaluation from the New Hampshire State Department of Education, which means that by state standards we have met all minimum requirements outlined by the state.

The school board continues to meet at least twice a month. During most months the board has met weekly. The school board members also assume responsibility for other meetings which include Supervisory Union #30, staff development, teacher negotiation, Area I vocational program, AREA meetings with Gilmanton, special Gilford School District committees, and Budget Committee.

Residents and taxpayers of the school district are encouraged to attend school board meetings which are held on the first and third Mondays of every month. School board members are always available to hear the concerns and ideas of the public. We all recognize that communication is important but that it is not an easy thing to accomplish.

Gilford has shown strong support of its schools over the years. This is apparent in the quality of the educational program that exists. This does not mean that there will not be room for improvement or change. Especially changes that reflect the needs of the community. Education is the responsibility of all of us—school board, school administration, school staff, students, parents, and residents.

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination and audit of the accounts of the Gilford School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer, School Lunch Program, Building Fund, Athletic Fund and Student Activities Fund.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1975 and June 30, 1976: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the General Fund as of June 30, 1975 and June 30, 1976 are presented in Exhibit A-1.

As indicated in Exhibit A-1, the current surplus of the District increased by \$17,070 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976.

#### Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

A statement presenting an analysis of the factors

which caused the change in current financial condition of the District during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976 is included in Exhibit A-2.

In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976 a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$59,827 less a revenue deficit of \$21,619 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$38,208.

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the Capital Projects Fund as of June 30, 1975 and June 30, 1976 are presented in Exhibit A-5.

The resources of the Gilford Middle-High School Building Fund amounted to \$42,803 at June 30, 1976.

These consisted of cash of \$1,432 and investments of \$41,371. The fund balance at that date included an overdraft of appropriations of \$304,628 and unappropriated surplus of \$347,431.

#### **Long-Term Indebtedness:**

#### Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-7)

The outstanding long-term indebtedness of the District as of June 30, 1975 and June 30, 1976 is shown in Comparative Balance Sheets contained in Exhibit A-7.

As indicated in this Exhibit the long-term debt of the District decreased from \$4,525,000 to \$4,200,000 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976.

#### Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-8)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements (principal and interest) as of June 30, 1976 is presented in Exhibit A-8.

A classified statement of General Fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is presented in Exhibit B-1.

#### Gilford Middle-High School Building Fund: (Exhibit B-2)

A statement showing the activity in the Gilford Middle-High School Building Fund account is contained in Exhibit B-2.

#### SCHOOL TAX ACCOUNT

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Gilford for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1976 is presented in Exhibit F.

As indicated in this Exhibit at June 30, 1976 the School District had received from the Town of Gilford the total amount of the 1975-76 school tax of \$1,742,488.

## GENERAL COMMENTS Gilford Middle-High School Building Fund — Overdraft of Appropriations and Municipal Finance Act:

As indicated in Exhibit A-6 (Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures) there was an overdraft of appropriations of \$304,628 at June 30, 1976.

The unappropriated surplus of \$347,431 consists of income from investments, accrued interest, and a bond premium, as presented in Exhibit A-5.

These funds have been used to increase the total of appropriations. The Municipal Finance Act provides that unless properly authorized accrued interest and premium as well as interest on invested funds, may not be used to increase the total expenditure appropriation.

Article 5 of the March 19, 1974 Gilford School District Meeting did not appropriate a specific sum of money. The district should initiate procedures to properly appropriate the amount of money to complete this project.

The district did not maintain any control over receipts for the building fund. It is recommended that in the future the district maintain some sort of receipts register.

#### CONCLUSION

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the Auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.
