THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L.S)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to meet the expenses of the Public Library, the ensuing year
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

- 8. To hear reports of auditors and committees, and to act thereon.
- 9. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$150.54.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 to pay note due on Fire House June 2, 1943, and also to raise the sum of \$400.00 to pay additional notes due on the same in 1956, 1957, and 1958 in order to reduce principal on long term note.
- 11. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$75.00 for Health Department, to be used to care for Public Dumps, and expense of Health Officer. Money to be expended on approval of the Selectmen.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise, and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Trustees of the Trust Funds for reimbursement on part of the principal.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to repair Driveway in Lakeview Cemetery.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

We wish as trustees to state here our appreciation to Mrs. Whiteneck for a task well done. We have hopes in time to build a reference library and to stimulate more reading among adults and juveniles.

We voted to increase the pay for the Janitor's services to fifteen dollars per year, instead of ten, as formerly.

We also want to thank the school committee for the wax applied to the floor in the library and for Mr. Estabrook's services in applying it. There is a great improvement in the appearance of the floor.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

'Total Expenditures

I take pleasure in presenting my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

The Statistical Report is for the school year ending June 30, 1942. This report is followed by the reports of the Headmaster of the High School, the School Nurse, and the Music Supervisor.

The following changes have taken place in our teaching staff since the last report. Miss Jeanette Saigh, teacher of grades three and four at the Central School, resigned her position and the vacancy was filled by the election of Miss Dorothy W. Lowe. Miss Elizabeth Stimmell was elected as teacher in the Junior High School room. Mr. Charles Tracy was appointed to the position held last year by Mr. John Norton. Mr. Tracy's health forced him to resign at the end of ten weeks. Mr. Edward Lylis was finally secured to replace Mr. Tracy.

The enrollment for the year covered by this report was one-hundred and seventy-eight, showing an increase of three over that of the year previous. The school attendance averaged 95.50 percent of the membership as compared with the state average of 94.31 percent.

There were nine boys and girls who completed the work of the eighth grade last June, and all of them have entered a high school this year. The medal awarded each year by the Sons of the American Revolution to the eighth grade pupil who has best exemplified the principles of good citizenship, was presented to Dorothy Brickett.

The report presented by Miss Thurber contains detailed information about the Hampstead High School.

We have had many changes of teachers at the High School and extra teaching loads for those on duty, yet this condition has been general in the smaller schools. Because of Hampstead's connection with the State Teacher Colleges and the State Board of Education, we have received greater assistance from them than would otherwise have been the case. There is every reason for believing that the situation will be better the rest of the year. In past years the town has paid the salaries of two teachers at the High School. The

reduction in available teachers at the State Teachers' Colleges make it necessary to provide for a third regular teacher for next year.

Word came recently of the death of Miss Helen Thomas, School Nurse, on leave of absence because of illness. Miss Thomas gave many years of untiring service to the physical welfare of the children here. During the present school year the work of school nurse is being done by Mrs. Jessie Soule, R. N., of Salem, N. H., in an enthusiastic and efficient manner. We hope to hold a dental clinic this spring if a dentist can be secured for the work.

Special reports from the elementary rooms are here included.

The Hampstead Central School has had a very successful war stamp drive, with sales totaling \$224.15 since the beginning of school last September. A scrap drive was held recently, material being collected in a wire enclosure constructed by the fifth and sixth grade boys. In the first and second grades sand table construction has supplemented the study of the Pilgrims and the Indians. At Christmas time the children made gifts for their parents. These were wrapped and tied at school. Special study has been given to good health in this group. Daily inspection is made every morning and the results are kept on the "Healthy-O's" chart.

A good manners chart in grades three and four has done much to improve the conduct of these children. The object of the chart is to "keep the slate clean", since a check signifies a misdemeanor. Fourth grade geography students have made diaries of an imaginary trip into the Belgian Congo. For a Christmas activity the children of both grades made Christmas cards using spatterpaints on white paper.

Grades five and six have organized an "All American Club" this year. Children are encouraged to bring in a

hobby to discuss and display. These hobbies have developed the worthy use of leisure time. At Christmas time this group made decorated tray covers for the Soldiers Hospitals as their part in Junior Red Cross work. Parents and friends were invited to attend the Christmas observance in which the entire school took part.

Troop I of the Girl Scouts of Hampstead, which meets once a week, includes four second class scouts, and four tenderfoot scouts. Miss Ruth Caddell is Scout Leader. Activities for the year have included a hike, a Christmas party, and an afternoon of games out of doors.

The Central School was in need of exterior painting and this work was done last summer. The porch at the High School building required considerable repairs.

There is good progress in the work of all our schools. The fundamentals are being adequately stressed. As an aid in directing instruction in the fundamentals, standardized tests are given each year. Mental tests are also given all pupils during the fourth and ninth year. Thus we are able to determine the achievement of both the class and each individual member as compared with the national norm. These tests are valuable in helping to determine points of weaknesses in each pupil's development and this helps the teacher to furnish drill where it is most needed.

The World War that is being waged is bringing great change in our way of living. Education is being effected. The elementary schools have not been effected to any great extent to date. The High Schools, due to loss of teaching personel, and older pupils, to the War Service, have been effected to a greater extent. To date there has been but little difficulty in getting supplies, but the supply of teachers is such that the loss

of a good teacher can hardly be replaced. It takes four years to train a teacher, and the enrollment at the Institutions preparing teachers is very greatly reduced. Every effort, financial and otherwise, should be made to retain satisfactory teachers. Salary adjustments should be made to meet, as far as possible, the conditions and practices of the times.

The work of the teacher in the public school has increased materially in recent years due to changes in ways of living. The school finds it necessary to furnish training in an increasing number of directions. The teachers have been performing a real service in conducting the registration in the rationing of sugar, gasoline, and fuel oil, and directing the scrap collection and the sale of war savings stamps. It has meant extra work, but this has been done cheerfully in compliance with the requests of our government.

I would like to express my gratitude for the cooperation of the parents and citizens, as well as the special assistance given by local organizations.

In closing I wish to express appreciation of the courtesy and assistance given me by the School Board and the teaching force.

To the Superintendent and School Board:

The annual report for Hampstead High School is hereby submitted.

School opened this year with a somewhat decreased enrollment. The total enrollment for this year is as follows:

Hampstead High School like other schools throughout the country has been deeply affected by the war emergency. Our enrollment has been considerably decreased as the year has advanced. One member of the school has enlisted; several others have left to work.

Early in the year the executive council recommended and the school adopted the plans of the High School Victory Corps, the nationwide organization through which high school students unite their efforts for the cause of victory.

Recognizing the urgent need for educated leaders of the future, we are striving to provide pupils with experiences and knowledges which will enable them to assume their rightful share of such leadership. The acute shortage of teachers has made it necessary for many upper classmen to assume extra responsibility for school management which they have accomplished in a very efficient manner.

School subjects have been interpreted with a view to most practical application of knowledges and skills taught. Although we have not had the opportunity of having a full time teacher qualified to teach a course in pre-flight aeronautics, we have had a substitute for part of the time who was so qualified and who gave students of mathematics and seniors some interpretation of the relation of the subjects which they were studying to the subject which is uppermost in the minds of so many boys today.

The high school has been represented in every community war effort including the training for the duties of air raid wardens, motor corps, first aid unit. The

girls have also participated in Red Cross knitting and sewing, home nursing, and the making of surgical dressings.

Although transportation difficulties necessitated the curtailment of the program in interscholastic athletics, we have endeavored to keep training for physical fitness through playground activities and community contests of various types. Because of our lack of a submaster who could direct athletic activities for the boys, we appreciate very much the assistance which Rev. Kenneth Underwood has been able to render.

The lack of teachers has been very acute, making it necessary for several substitutes from the colleges to serve for limited periods and for those on the regular teaching staff to carry a heavier teaching load.

The annual operetta has become almost traditional. This year "Sunbonnet Sue" under the direction of Mrs. Thompson was produced in a very creditable manner and was quite a financial success.

Recognizing the need for recreational activities within our own community, a group of individuals representing various local organizations met at the invitation of the high school executive council and formed a Community Recreation Council. One community party was held in October, a Christmas party in December, the operetta in January, and other activities are tentatively planned for succeeding months.

An electric record player has recently been purchased to provide means for playing records for music for dancing. It is hoped that the sale of old and broken records will materially reduce the actual cost of this machine. A gift or loan of records suitable for the development of music appreciation will be very acceptable.

We wish to express our appreciation for the gift of a folding cot which Mrs. Charleton gave us to use in first aid. As usual, the Parent-Teacher Association has provided a generous supply of magazines for our library. The difficulty in obtaining an adequate supply of reference books makes this contribution doubly appreciated. Mrs. Sanborn continues to supply copies of the Christian Science Monitor and we are still able to obtain the Readers Digest with a special study supplement at reduced rates.

The school lunch program is being continued this year with marked success.

The extremely cold weather caused a serious freezing of pipes soon after the Christmas recess and demonstrated the need for much more thorough insulation of the building. Considerable progress has since been made in this respect which should provide for an appreciable reduction in the amount of fuel consumed.

In spite of the many difficulties which have confronted us this year, the excellent spirit of the pupils has been very encouraging and we hope for much greater accomplishment during the remainder of the year.
