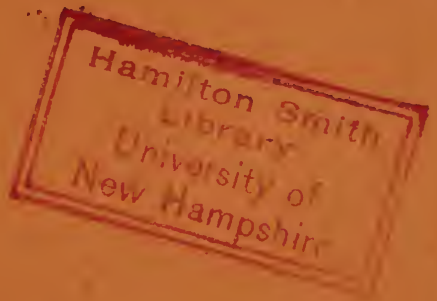

Report of the Public Library.

The library expenditures for the year are embodied in the report of the selectmen, and it is unnecessary to repeat them. The private account of the librarian shows, cash on hand March 1st, 1901, \$2.96, catalogues sold \$6.75. Received for library cards and fines, \$15.65, a total of \$25.36. Paid for incidental library expenses \$2.02, leaving a balance of cash on hand, \$23.34. There is also in the hands of the committee the sum of \$5.98, the dividend from the library deposit in the Hinsdale Savings Bank. The librarian reports an increase over last year in the whole number of books issued during the year, which does not reach however the high water mark of "99-1900, when the number was 16,013. This does not show any decrease of interest, but is due in part to the fact that the establishment of a reading room, makes a less call for magazines.

A word of explanation is needful respecting the amount of cash on hand in the financial report of the library. It was thought best by the trustees and library committee last spring not to purchase many books, as it was expected that the larger part of the yearly appropriation would be needed for the furnishing of a library room for which there had been no provision. An additional appropriation by the town late in the autumn for the completion of the town hall, provided means for the furnishing of both the library and reading room. An order for nearly 100 volumes of books was sent in early in January, but the bill for the same, \$106.53 was not rendered before the yearly accounts were closed, and is to come out of the yearly appro-

priation. This sum deducted from \$148.59, leaves a balance of \$42.06 to the credit of the library.

In the furnishing and equipment of the library, as of the reading room, at a conference between the town hall building committee, the selectmen as library trustees, and the library and reading room committees it was unanimously decided to "get the best," in order that the two rooms should be in keeping with the hall itself and it is not believed that the town would have been satisfied with anything less. Rooms so convenient of access, so perfect and complete in all their appointments cannot but be appreciated by the citizens of the town who will not regret the extra expense when the manifold advantages gained are considered.

Just here it is fitting to gratefully acknowledge the gifts to the library and reading room of an excellent crayon portrait of the late Charles J. Amidon, presented by his widow, Mrs. M. E. Amidon and his sons, P. F. and W. O. Amidon. Likewise a valuable oil painting from Mrs. George C. Fisk, of Springfield, a bust of Washington from the local Chautauqua circle and a finely mounted deer's head, from the late N. M. Worden.

The reading room has been open to patrons every evening since its establishment, while the library has heretofore only been available twice a week, and there is a very generally expressed wish on the part of citizens that some arrangements should be made whereby the library can be open for the issuing of books every week-day evening, and Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, and that the care of the reading room be transferred to the librarian, and this will be a matter for consideration at the present town meeting. Many people, especially those who live away from the village, are anxious to have the library open on Wednesday as well as Saturday afternoons, and for those within the village limits it would be vastly more convenient to be able to exchange books on any evening during the week and not be confined to Wednesday and Saturday evenings alone, and it is thought that this can be accomplished

without materially increasing the expenses of the two rooms over last year. The number of volumes now contained in the library and the interest taken by all classes in the library and reading room as they are now conducted, would seem to warrant some such arrangement as has been suggested above.

Report of the Tree Wardens.

Under the new state law, appended below, the appointment of wardens was made Sept. 13th, 1901.

Their appointment was made too late to prevent the mutilation of trees along the Brattleboro and Northfield roads by employees of electric companies. We have promises that these trees shall be properly trimmed and pruned so to save this town property from increasing harm that would otherwise result.

The wardens, under this law, have so far been able to save for the citizens, from ruthless improvident wood chopping, many trees to be a joy for the present and a trust for future generations.

This law, in defining and safeguarding our property rights along the highways, makes more urgent the duty of all to do their part to improve these highways, by better caring for the trees we have and intelligently planting more. It suggests the thought, that many of the children of to-day, fifty years hence, will point with pride to sturdy old trees that they or their school-mates planted.

AN ACT

In amendment of chapter 85, Laws of 1895, relating to the protection and preservation of ornamental and shade trees in the highways.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court convened:

SECTION 1. Mayors of cities and selectmen of towns shall, immediately upon the passage of this act, annually thereafter, appoint one or more tree wardens, who shall be discreet persons, resident of the city or town where appointed, interested in the planting, pruning, and preservation of shade and ornamental trees in public ways and grounds, whose business it shall be to perform the duties hereinafter specified, and shall be allowed such compensation for their services and expenses as the mayor or selectmen may deem reasonable.

SECT. 2. Towns and cities shall have control of all shade and ornamental trees situated in any public way or ground within their limits, which the tree warden deems reasonably necessary for the purpose of shade and ornamentation; and it shall be the duty of the tree wardens, as soon as possible after their appointment, to carefully examine the trees, situated as aforesaid, and to plainly mark such trees as they think should be controlled by their municipality, for the purposes aforesaid, by driving into each tree, at a point not less than three nor more than six feet from the ground, on the side toward the highway, a nail or spike, with the letters "N. H." cut or cast upon the head. Said spikes or nails shall be procured by the secretary of the forestry commission, and furnished by him to said officers as may be required by them for the purpose of this act, at a cost not to exceed \$500 a year. If any of the nails or spikes shall be destroyed or defaced, it shall be the duty of the warden to renew them as soon as possible after he is informed or discovers that they have been removed. They shall also have the power to designate from time to time, in the same manner as hereinbefore directed, such other trees within the limits of the public ways and grounds as in his judgment should be preserved for ornament or shade.

SECT. 3. If any of the trees designated as aforesaid should prove to be private property, and the owners thereof refuse to release or convey their interest therein to the municipality, the tree warden shall acquire them for the use of the city or town, by purchase, if it can be done at a fair price. Failing in this he may, on petition for that purpose, acquire them in the same way and manner, and with the same right of appeal to their owners, as in the case of land taken for a highway.

SECT. 4. Towns and cities may annually appropriate money not exceeding in the aggregate fifty cents for each of their ratable polls in the preceding year, to be used by the tree warden in planting, pruning, protecting, and, whenever necessary, acquiring, shade and ornamental trees within the limits of their public ways and grounds.

SECT. 5. Whoever desires the cutting and removal, in whole or in part, of any public shade or ornamental tree may apply to the tree warden, who shall give a public hearing upon the application at some suitable time and place, after duly publishing and posting notices of the hearing in two or more public places in town, and also upon the tree or trees which it is desired to cut and remove; provided, however, that the tree warden may, if he deems it expedient, grant permission for such cutting or removal, without a hearing, if the tree or trees in question is on a public way outside of the residential part of the town limits, such residential part to be determined by the tree warden. No tree within such residential limit shall be cut by the tree warden, except to trim it, or removed by him without a hearing as aforesaid. The decision of the tree warden shall be final.

SECT. 6. It shall be unlawful to cut, destroy, injure, deface, or break any public shade or ornamental tree, or to affix to any such tree a play bill, picture, announcement, notice, advertisement, or other device or thing, whether in writing or otherwise, or to paint or mark such tree, except for the purpose of protecting it, and under a written permit from the tree warden, or to negligently or carelessly suffer any horse or other beast, driven or being lawfully in a public way or place, to break down, injure, or destroy a shade or ornamental tree within the limits of said public way or place, or to negligently or willfully, by any other means, break down or injure any such tree.

SECT. 7. Persons violating any of the provisions of this act shall forfeit not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars to be recovered in an action of debt by the tree warden or any other person for the benefit of the town or city in which tree is situated, or to be fined not less than five or more than one hundred dollars.

SECT. 8. Owners of land abutting on the highways, and all other persons, are hereby prohibited from burning brush within or beside highways without first removing the brush such distance from the trees within the highway as not to endanger or injure them in any manner.

SECT. 9. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Statistical Report.

PARENTS AND GUARDIANS:

We herewith present for your consideration the statistical report of the schools of the town for the year ending August 1, 1901.

The census of school children was taken in the month of April last by Mr. Charles Stearns, who was appointed agent for this purpose and shows the following facts:

Whole number of children between the ages of five and sixteen years, 348; boys, 163; girls, 185. Number of children between the ages of ten and sixteen years who cannot read and write the English language, none. Mr. Stearns also reports that there are several children just arrived at the age of five years who have not attended school, but will be found in our schools at the beginning of the school year.

Our schools during the year have made commendable progress, and both teachers and scholars are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts.

We are pleased to note that the graduates of our High school are admitted upon certificate without hesitation to the various colleges, where they are able to maintain a creditable rank comparing favorably with those from similar institutions in larger places.

Let us not forget that this high standard of excellence can only be maintained by thorough work in each grade and the active co-operation of all of our citizens, and it will be the aim of your committee to maintain our schools so that they will fully answer the advancing requirements of the times.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

ARTICLE 1. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the selectmen, auditors and town officers.

ART. 3. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the year ensuing.

ART. 4. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for the support of the poor, for the maintenance of the fire department, for the support of the high school, for lighting the streets, and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

ART. 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of an ice water barrel, or act in any manner thereon.
