# ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 14, 1961, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one Highway Agent, one or more Auditors, one Library trustee for the term of three years, one Library trustee for the term of two years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years, one Trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways, as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town, as recommended by the Finance Committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purpose so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing Notes or Orders to provide for the current year's expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

We herein submit our report for the year ending December 30, 1960.

The trend of spiraling costs have presented many problems to the selectmen, as well as to yourselves. We have endeavored to keep within the Budget but, even after the most careful planning, have had greater expenses than were anticipated. The Town Poor Acct. has had several with extended periods of Hospitalization which have cost a great deal. It is impossible to anticipate who will be sick and for how long. The Highway Acct. has increased due to increases in costs of supplies and equipment repairs.

We would like to mention the new Cottage Hospital which was dedicated July 4, 1960. It will fill a need in our Town as well as the surrounding communities which so generously helped make it possible.

We invite your careful study of the detailed reports that follow.

We also wish to express our appreciation to all Town Officials and citizens whose assistance and cooperation has been greatly appreciated this past year.

#### WOODSVILLE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

#### Report of the Librarian

The Library has completed another year of active service both to the schools and the general public. The story hour for young children was conducted by the Librarian last summer and a book club for the older ones stimulated

interest in reading.

National Library Week was observed in the spring, starting with open house at which a committee from the Lioness Club served as hostesses. At this time the room in the basement, renovated by members of Mt. Gardner Grange, was formally opened with a Hobby Exhibit. Children's Book

Week was suitably observed in the fall.

Library Service Committees from the Lioness Club and the Woodsville Progressive Club have worked together, under the leadership of Mrs. Norman Mullen and Mrs. Emmett Cosgrove, to help the Library in various ways and to make the community more library conscious. Window displays have been arranged appropriate to each month, and the Library was most attractively decorated for Christmas. It is hoped that eventually a Friends of the Library Group will be formed.

The co-operative purchasing group, started year before last, now includes 7 libraries and is called the Grafton Co-operative. Quarterly meetings are held, attended by librarians and trustees. To these meetings a large selection of books is brought from the State Library, making possible a better choice for the local library. More books can be purchased due to the bigger discount available. One of the 10 Dorothy Canfield Fisher national awards for improvement in library service, given by the Book of the Month Club, has been awarded the Grafton Co-operative and will be presented in April at a luncheon in Concord. The award is for \$1,000.00. The Woodsville Library took the initiative in organizing this group.

The Librarian has attended the Grafton Co-operative quarterly meetings, as well as the annual meeting of the American Library Association in Montreal, and the annual sessions of the New Hampshire and the New England

Library Associations.

There were five new members on the faculty as schools opened in September. One at the elementary school and

four at the high school.

At the elementary school, Mr. John Billington of Sebago Lake, Maine, replaced Mrs. Lewis as teacher in grade seven and as boys' athletic coach. Mr. Billington graduated from U.N.H., Class of 1960, and holds a B.S. degree, and is a triple honor society member.

At Woodsville High School, Mrs. Alice Castello's return as choral director was appreciated by both the administration and the student body. Mrs. Castello previously directed music instruction in both the Woodsville schools in 1943-

1946.

Other new instructors are:

Mrs. Rebecca Ansley of Norfolk, Virginia, a graduate of Mary Baldwin College, Norfolk, Virginia, was employed to teach English, filling the position held by Mrs. Mullen who was not a candidate for re-election. Mrs. Ansley previously

taught in Norfolk, Virginia.

Mr. John Bartlett of Watertown, Connecticut, replaced Mr. Plante as science and mathematics instructor. A graduate of the University of Connecticut and with graduate credit at Central Connecticut Teachers College, his major fields are science, math, English, and Social Studies. He is teaching Chemistry, General Science, Advanced Physics, and Advanced Math.

Mr. Roger Wilson of East Ryegate, Vermont, a graduate of U.N.H., Class of '56, B.A., and graduate work at Keene Teachers College, replaces Mr. Bolos as social studies in-

structor.

We in America enjoy the highest standards of living and productive employment in the world. Although our people form only 6 percent of the world's population and occupy only 7 percent of the globe's surface, we consume 34 percent of the world's goods and produce about 50 percent of the world's manufactured products.

This material progress must be accompanied by moral and intellectual growth. It is a supreme function of education to see that humanistic studies and social sciences are kept abreast of technological progress so that man remains

the master, rather than the slave, of the machine.

When the Russian sputniks went into orbit around the earth, a storm of apprehension rolled over our country. How did it happen that Russia should lead the way in fashioning artificial moons to course in space? The country was told that our schools were neglecting science and mathematics. As Barzun put it, "The moment a satellite appears in the sky or a rocket fails to go off... nothing but science

and engineering seems to matter."

More, not less, math—The fact is that more boys and girls of high-school age are taking mathematics and science than at any other time in the United States. A study made by the National Education Association points out that the majority of public schools offer a full program in mathematics and science, and that those lacking a major course in these subjects are small schools with small enrollments. Furthermore, leaders in school administration have been urging state legislatures to establish larger school districts for years, in order to discourage high schools too small to provide an adequate curriculum. Lack of teachers, funds, and equipment makes it impossible for small schools to offer a full program of studies.

In times of such public excitement, it is necessary for leaders of public education to maintain clarity and control

in thought and action.

But as American satellites now circle the earth, and as mathematics and science take on a new popularity among our growing armies of space cadets, we can see the radical crash programs of 1958 in proper perspective. Tornadoes, cyclones, and hurricanes blow themselves out. Sound principles never die, but we cannot perpetuate democratic principles without daily and uncompromising effort.

Such effort is futile without the continued interest and understanding of the layman as well as of the school admin-

istrator.

The loyalty of the teaching staff, the executive action of the school board, and the support of the community are gratefully acknowledged.

The reports of Principal Mullen, Principal McKelvey and Mrs. LaMott, R.N., which follow, merit your attention.

Woodsville was invited to participate in the N.H.I.A.A. Basketball Tournament and consequently went to the finals where the team was defeated at Durham.

In the spring, Mr. John Bagonzi directed the baseball

team to a second-place finish in the W.M.L.

In curriculum development not much has been done to further any changes. However, a stronger philosophy of academic excellence seems to prevail amongst both faculty and students. #### WOODSVILLE GRADED SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

January 10, 1961

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of Woodsville Graded

School for the year ending December 31, 1960.

The enrollment for the school year 1960-61 has reached 325. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten —33, Grade 1—35, Grade 2—45, Grade 3—31, Grade 4—35, Grade 5—40, Grade 6—34, Grade 7—31, Grade 8—41. The school year 1960-61 should see a peak enrollment with

a slight decline setting in hereafter.

The Graded School lost two teachers in the junior high school—Mrs. Marion Lewis and Mrs. Beverly Gordon. These teachers were replaced by Mr. John Billington and Mrs. Glenda Evans. Mrs. Mary McKelvey is now at the Graded School full time teaching science in grades 5 and 8B, reading in grade 7, art in grades 5 and 7 as well as music in grades 1-8.

An Open House was held on the evening of November 9, in observance of American Education Week, at which a

large number of parents visited with the teachers.

Stanford Achievement Tests were given to grades 1-7 and Metropolitan Achievement Tests to grade 8. Otis Intelligence Tests were given to grades 3 and 6 and Pintner Intelligence Tests to grade 8. Aptitude and intelligence tests were also administered to grade 8 by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service.

A junior high school chorus was formed this year which has presented programs of Christmas carols at the Woodsville Hospital and the County Farm. The annual spring music festival for grades 1-8 was held on the evening of May 6 before a large audience at the Community Building.

Athletic teams at the Graded School include basketball and baseball for the boys and basketball for the girls. A regular schedule of games is played with teams from nearby schools.

I wish to thank Superintendent of Schools Phil Bennett, the School Board and the teaching staff of the Graded School for their constant co-operation in all matters.

- 1 pupil attended Child Guidance Clinic at Littleton January 14, 1960.
- 2 pupils attended the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic at Littleton on November 13, 1959.
- 1 pupil attended the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic at Littleton on January 8, 1960.
- 3 pupils attended the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic at Littleton on February 5, 1960.
- 1 pupil attended the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic at Littleton on May 13, 1960.
- At the Polio Clinics in Woodsville February 17 and March 15, 1960:
  - 9 pupils received 1st polio inoculations,
  - 8 pupils received 2nd polio inoculations, and
  - 25 pupils received 4th polio inoculations.

Routine vision tests were done in grades 1-12. Hearing tests were done in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11, plus all new pupils and pupils having hearing difficulties.

Dr. Campbell examined 150 high school pupils for fitness to participate in the physical education program. He also examined 98 pupils in grades 1, 4, and 8. When defects were noted, referrals were made to the family physician through a note to the parent. Many parents were present at these examinations and had an opportunity to discuss any health problem.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their generous support of the Sight Conservation Program.

Another Thank-you to Mr. and Mrs. Mullen for donations of footwear. Out-grown shoes and clothing are welcome and useful.

I wish to thank the American Legion and Auxiliary for the use of the rooms at the Post Home for the polio clinics. I also appreciated the invitation to the special program "On the Retarded Child" sponsored by the Ladies Auxiliary.

My sincere appreciation to Mr. Bennett, Dr. Campbell, Mr. Mullen, Mr. McKelvey, and their staffs, the parents and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in

the School Health Program.

#### REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Woodsville Community Recreation Program of 1960 saw many new additions, and increased its total participa-

tion by an appreciable number.

The 1960 Summer Youth Recreation Program commenced on July 5 and ended on August 12, 1960. There was a total of 191 students enrolled, 31 being from Wells River. Average daily attendance was 165. Two hikes were held during the program, and a swimming meet and field day terminated the summer activities. Transportation for the swimming was furnished by George White.

A vigorous summer baseball program was conducted, also, as part of the community recreation plan. New uniforms for little leaguers were purchased, and sponsors included: The American Legion, Rotary, Larty's Gulf Co., and H. O.

Taylor Chevrolet Co.

Two farm teams were organized and uniforms for the past year were used. A Babe Ruth team for the boys between the ages of 13-15 was organized and entered into the Triangle Baseball League. Uniforms were furnished by

Woodsville High School.

A Junior Baseball Team for boys in age group of 15-17 was organized and entered into the White Mountain Junior Baseball Conference. New uniforms were purchased, and sponsors included McAllister Jewelers, Ashley's Flying "A," Thomas Pharmacy, E. B. Mann Co., Fullerton Brothers, Happy Hour Restaurant, Walker Motor Sales, Riach's Red and White Store, Kelley's IGA, Scrugg's Hardware, People's Market, Woodsville Furniture Co., Cromwell and Veayo.

An amateur team, "The Woodsville Orioles," was sponsored by T. Borden Walker Enterprises and represented New England in the National Baseball Tournament at

Wichita, Kansas.

A little league soccer program was initiated in the fall and three teams were organized for boys between ages 9-13. The league was very successful and did much to foster an understanding of soccer principles and techniques among the junior high age students.

The 1960 Youth Center began on October 20, 1960 and has been well attended. Professional disc jockeys have been added, and enrollment of more than two hundred has made

for an active Saturday Record Hop.

Little League basketball for boys 9-13 commenced on

January 7 and saw a registration of over sixty boys for this sport. Games are played on Sunday and this program is self-supporting.

Little league basketball for girls was also introduced. Six girls' teams were organized, and enrollment of sixty-one

girls made this a very enthusiastic league.

A Wednesday evening volleyball league for both men and

women was started and is currently in operation.

The ski program initiated by the Lioness's Club of Woodsville last year is in full swing and participants are transported to Mittersill Ski Slope on Sunday afternoons. This has been a very enthusiastic program and has done much to return the sport of skiing to Woodsville.

The Woodsville Recreational Program has grown by leaps and bounds and can no more be considered a part-time program. It is anticipated that a larger budget will be necessary so that new equipment and facilities may be pur-

chased.

Much credit and appreciation must go to all the coaches and volunteers who have contributed so unselfishly in making a well-rounded recreation program for Woodsville.

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Haverhill School Auditorium in said district on the 21st day of March. 1961, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, Auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a dental clinic.

- To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the library at Haverhill Corner.
- 11. To act upon the following resolution: Resolved that the Haverhill School District petition the State Board of Education to become a member of a co-operative school district which may include, in addition to this district, the following school districts: namely, Bath, Woodsville, Monroe, Piermont, and Warren.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

An exceptionally small number of faculty replacements was necessary in September 1960. There was no change at the elementary school and only two changes at the Aca-

demy.

Victor R. Gueyette of Coventry, Vermont, a graduate of Lyndon Teachers College, Lyndon, Vermont, with a B.S. in Ed. degree, joined the Academy faculty after three years of teaching experience in Vermont. Mr. Guyette replaced Mr. Dodds as social studies instructor. He also coaches basketball and track.

Guy D. Kenneson of Rumney, New Hampshire, a 1960 Plymouth Teachers College graduate with a B. of Ed. degree and majoring in physical education, joined the faculty replacing Mr. Hale. Mr. Kenneson teaches math, social sci-

ence subjects, and directs the athletic program.

Although a change of over 28% of a school faculty is not a situation that tends to promote continuity of instruction yet these two men have proven to be a definite step in the advancement of standards, both in instruction and in administration.

The September enrollment at the Academy was 97 resident pupils, a drop of six, and at North Haverhill, an enroll-

ment of 237 resident, a decrease of 33.

We in America enjoy the highest standards of living and productive employment in the world. Although our people form only 6 percent of the world's population and occupy only 7 percent of the globe's surface, we consume 34 percent of the world's goods and produce about 50 percent of the world's manufactured products.

This material progress must be accompanied by moral and intellectual growth. It is a supreme function of education to see that humanistic studies and social sciences are kept abreast of technological progress so that man remains

the master, rather than the slave, of the machine.

When the Russian sputniks went into orbit around the earth, a storm of apprehension rolled over our country. How did it happen that Russia should lead the way in fashioning artificial moons to course in space? The country was told that our schools were neglecting science and mathematics. As Barzun put it, "The moment a satellite appears in the sky or a rocket fails to go off . . . nothing but science and engineering seems to matter."

More, not less, math—The fact is that more boys and

girls of high-school age are taking mathematics and science than at any other time in the United States. A study made by the National Education Association points out that the majority of public schools offer a full program in mathematics and science, and that those lacking a major course in these subjects are small schools with small enrollments. Furthermore, leaders in school administration have been urging state legislatures to establish larger school districts for years, in order to discourage high schools too small to provide an adequate curriculum. Lack of teachers, funds, and equipment makes it impossible for small schools to offer a full program of studies.

In times of such public excitement, it is necessary for leaders of public education to maintain clarity and control

in thought and action.

But as American satellites now circle the earth, and as mathematics and science take on a new popularity among our growing armies of space cadets, we can see the radical crash programs of 1958 in proper perspective. Tornadoes, cyclones, and hurricanes blow themselves out. Sound principles never die, but we cannot perpetuate democratic principles without daily and uncompromising effort.

Such effort is futile without the continued interest and understanding of the layman as well as of the school admin-

istrator.

The loyalty of the teaching staff, the executive action of the school board, and the support of the community are

gratefully acknowledged.

The reports of Principal Jenkins, Mrs. LaMott, R.N., the High School Investigating Committee, and the North Haverhill Kindergarten Committee, which follow, merit your attention.

Routine screening tests were done. Vision tests are done each year. Hearing tests are done in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11, plus new pupils entering the school and all pupils that have

had hearing problems.

Our spring dental clinic was held and grades 1-3 participated. There was a total of 115 fillings, 14 cleanings, and 47 extractions of temporary teeth. It is interesting to note that no permanent teeth had to be extracted. Our dental program has been in progress several years. We fill permanent teeth only, do emergency extractions, and necessary cleanings. We always work in the lower grades. In this way, we have an opportunity to care for the first permanent teeth which is most important. After three years, the children that have attended the dental clinic have an excellent

start on the road to good dental health. The aim of these dental clinics is to teach the children the importance of early dental care and regular follow-up visits to the family dentist.

Transportation for these clinics is donated by interested parents and friends. The Lend-A-Hand Club at Haverhill and the V.F.W. Auxiliary at North Haverhill has been most helpful with many of their members volunteering transportation. The following people assisted at our clinic this year: Mrs. Russell Hatch, North Haverhill; Mrs. Madeline Bixby, Haverhill; Mr. Richard Lang, Haverhill; Mrs. Roland Clough, North Haverhill; Mr. Edwin Spooner, North Haverhill; Mrs. Thelma Willey, North Haverhill; and Mrs. Walter B. Morris, Haverhill. To each of you my sincere appreciation because, if there is no transportation there can be no clinic.

I want to report that we have a new scale for measuring height and weight at the North Haverhill Consolidated School. This should be a more accurate measure in keeping

our growth records.

Dr. McKinlay examined pupils in the 7th and 8th grades to determine fitness for participation in the physical educa-

tion program and athletic games.

I want to thank Mr. Bennett, Dr. McKinlay, Mr. Morrill and his staff, Mrs. Sawyer, and the parents and pupils for their continued support of the school health program.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE TO HAVERHILL SCHOOL BOARD

As directed by the School District voters at the last annual school meeting, this committee has examined and investigated the problems at Haverhill Academy. Opinions and suggestions were obtained from many district voters. These, along with several other possible solutions, were thoroughly discussed by the committee. Of all the possibilities looked into, the committee selected three as the most practical and feasible for this District. Each of these was examined by the committee in detail and at length.

Utilizing Pearson Hall.—The first proposal calls for renovation of the second floor of Pearson Hall to provide a large classroom, a home economics room and a library. The present laboratory and home economic rooms would be remodeled to provide a modern, well-equipped laboratory. Your committee estimates that construction, equipment and remodeling costs would be near \$30,000.00. Financed over 10 years at 4%, this sum would increase taxes by about \$.82 for every \$1,000 of valuation. Annual operating costs would increase by approximately \$5,000 for an additional teacher salary. This staff addition would permit the school to offer a three year French course in addition to the present subjects.

Your committee is aware that this plan would not provide the second large classroom which the school administration feels is necessary. Neither would it provide a teachers' room, a student infirmary (which would also double as a doctors', nurses' and dentists' examining room), locker space or a more healthy dining area. More importantly, it would not solve the rather considerable fire hazard created by having two boilers in the basement of the Academy building, located directly beneath the stairwell. For these reasons, your committee is not in favor of this solution.

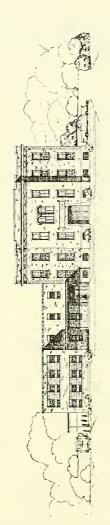
Building a new addition.—The second proposal which the committee examined in depth, was that of an addition to the present plant to provide a new shop, laboratory and home economic room. The present lab and home economic rooms would be remodeled to provide a large classroom and

a small library.

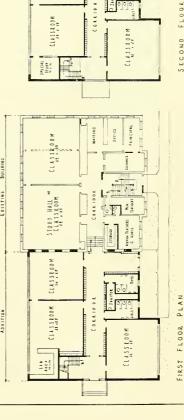
Construction costs would approximate \$100,000.00. Financed over 10 years at 4%, this sum would increase taxes by about \$2.38 for every \$1,000 of valuation. Operating costs would rise by \$15,000 a year to cover new teacher

salaries. These staff additions would permit the school to offer courses in Music, Woodworking, Auto Mechanics, Cabinet Making, Electricity and French. Heating and maintenance costs for the new addition would also be added to the annual operating costs.

This proposal again does not provide the second needed large size classroom. It would not provide the teacher room, student infirmary, locker space or improve the eating facilities. It would, however, provide a shop which would enable the school to offer subjects needed to qualify as a "comprehensive" high school.

Because of the failure of such a plan to remedy so many of the present inadequacies and because it would provide shop facilities which this committee as well as the school authorities feel would not be utilized by a sufficient number of students, we feel this is the least attractive and practical of the three proposals.

Consolidating with Woodsville.—The third proposal is for consolidation of our High School with Woodsville. Addition of 5 classrooms to the Woodsville plant, which is in relatively modern condition, would provide sufficient room to accommodate students of all Districts.

Construction would total close to \$150,000.00. The exact effect this will have upon the Haverhill tax rate cannot be determined until the value of the present Woodsville plant has been determined by the State Tax Commission. Your committee roughly estimates, however, that the increase would be not less than \$1.20 per \$1,000 equalized valuation and not more than \$2.86 per \$1,000 of equalization valuation. Our share of the annual operating budget would be estimated at \$14.04 per \$1,000, which would be in lieu of the present operating costs for Haverhill Academy.

It should be noted that this proposal would eliminate the fire hazard problem. It would provide all necessary classrooms, shop facilities for those who require them, a teacher room, infirmary and locker space. Lunch area facilities—now located in academy basement, would be more healthful in that they would no longer be next to the toilets. One drawback is the possibility that abandonment of the present facilities would have an adverse effect upon the social and economic life of Haverhill Corner.

Impact on Haverhill Corner.—Your committee is not unmindful of the impact consolidation may have upon Haverhill Corner. We have considered this problem at length and

have come to the following conclusions: First, that the Woodsville school and area is not so far distant or so socially and economically divorced from the Haverhill Corner Area that there would be a great loss to the Corner. Ten miles is a relatively short distance this day and age and we feel Haverhill Corner can call a consolidated school its own just as well as it always thought of the Academy as its own. More importantly, perhaps, the advantages which our school children can gain from a consolidation will bring the community of Haverhill Corner many more real advantages and benefits than would the retention of a school in buildings more than 60 years old, with limited course offerings and teaching staff.

Recommendations.—This committee feels that consolidation of the Haverhill, Woodsville and Bath schools grades 9-12 is the most feasible solution for the reasons given

above, and for the following additional reasons:

1) It would provide the most modern and fireproof plant

of the three proposals;

2) It would offer the widest range of subjects and extracurricular activities, with full-time student guidance to see that our children make the fullest use of these offerings;

3) It would permit more flexible scheduling of courses and activities thus allowing each child, regardless of his or her abilities, to reap the full benefits of the expanded facilities and curriculum offerings;

4) It would provide facilities more attractive to prospective teachers and thus help us to acquire better qualified personnel than we might otherwise be able to obtain;

5) It would give our children the best education at the

lowest possible cost.

Your committee recommends therefore, that an article be placed in the warrant for the coming school district meeting, calling for consolidation of the Woodsville-Haverhill-Bath Districts at the 9-12 grade level.

## REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER

## Township of Haverhill, N. H.

## For Year Ending December 31, 1960

In February we had a 3rd polio vaccine clinic at No. Haverhill and 162 received the vaccine including adults.

Three immunization clinics were held in No. Haverhill in October, November and December and 399 attended for either 1st, 2nd, 3rd or 4th polio shots, smallpox vaccination, whooping cough, tetanus and diphtheria vaccine. The Lend-A-Hand Club, V.F.W Auxiliary and the Graduate Nurses Club sponsored these clinics. They were conducted by the N. H. State Health Department in cooperation with the Health Officer and school nurse.

Woodsville had three adult polio vaccine clinics sponsored by the Graduate Nurses Club and the American Legion Auxiliary. A total of 280 polio vaccine shots were given.

The Heaf tuberculin test was given to the 1st, 8th, and 12th grade pupils, teachers and kitchen workers in Haverhill, No. Haverhill and Woodsville schools. This clinic was conducted by the N. H. State Health Department in cooperation with the school superintendent, doctor and school nurse. Follow up is done by chest x-rays of positive reactors and testing of all contacts.

Home visits were made and clinic appointments arranged for when necessary. Time was not available for many home visits to infants and preschools. This is regrettable since a great deal of Health Education, Nursing care in the homes, referrals to doctors and clinics to have defects corrected could be done with a Full Time District Nurse for Haverhill

Township.

My sincere thanks for cooperation received.

## WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

Dear Sir:

The White Mountains Region Association respectfully requests that the enclosed Article be included in your 1961 Town Warrant.

This is the 24th year that the WMRA and the 46 North Country towns have collaborated in a program of regional economic development and promotion. We think the number of years of cooperation and mutual benefit is a pretty good indication of the effectiveness of doing collectively what cannot be done individually.

We look forward to your town's continued support and pledge our continuing efforts to improve those conditions upon which the North Country's, and your town's, business

depends.

A number of towns have justly complained that the system upon which we have based our request for town appropriations in the past was outmoded and unfair. Formerly, we requested a fraction of one percent of a town's assessed valuation. This was obviously unfair to those towns where property had been re-assessed at a higher rate. Some towns now assess at from 70 to 80% whereas others still assess at from 30 to 40%. This year, therefore, we are requesting a fraction of one percent of a town's equalized valuation as taken from the State Tax Commission's 1958 list (the most recent one compiled) of equalized valuations.

Where we formerly asked each town for 10/1,000ths of 1% of its assessed valuation, we are now asking for 7/1,000ths of 1% of its equalized valuation. The percentage is lower because of the equalized base, and the resulting amount request is less for those towns having a higher assessment rate, and somewhat more for those towns having a lower assessment rate. Thus, we are asking an amount from your town which is proportionate to that which we are asking from each of the 45 other towns. We hope you concur that this fair share system is the most equitable to

all concerned.

If your town has a budget committee, we would appreciate your advising it of the amount we have requested and

the explanation of how it was determined. If the above is not clear, or if questions arise which are not answered here, please contact us in Lancaster, and we shall be pleased to be of assistance.

lations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands. Second—by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning—don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles—make sure they are out

—use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.
