REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

The year just ended has proved again that the Town of Haverhill is in an era of adjustment to change. As an example, there were, in 1969, 839 transfers of property received from the County Register of Deeds office. For our Town, with a population of just over 3,100, this alone is ample evidence of the problems facing us.

We have welcomed many more land and property owners from other localities this past year. By far, they have already proved to be an asset and a welcome addition to our community. At the same time, concern has set in over the budding developments not only in our own town, but also in those towns surrounding us. We must, by careful consideration and planning, move ahead in the right direction; the one which will allow us to accept progress on the terms of our native heritage.

One thing is clarion clear. Although it is very difficult, seemingly impossible, to attract new industry to our Town, the natural beauty of our open spaces and the friendliness of our people is all that is necessary to attract the casual development in our town. Does it not make sense, then, that each of us should cooperate in the effort to protect our most valuable assets?

Your Selectmen have spent many hours considering these problems, and we solicit your guidance and support in finding the course which will best serve the needs and desires of our citizens.

We have lost more old friends this year. When we review the past and note their contributions to our town, we realize the enormity of our loss. They will be sorely missed.

Finally, the Selectmen wish to voice their appreciation for your patience and support this past year. We can only ask that it continue.

**PLANNING BOARD OF THE TOWN OF HAVERHILL
ANNUAL REPORT — 1969**

The objective of planning is to anticipate problems and to determine the needs of the town within the foreseeable future and by using the tools provided by state statutes to avoid those problems and provide the services needed by the townspeople.

Haverhill is feeling the pressure of an expanding urban population, primarily people seeking recreational second homes. This demand has tremendously increased land values and expanded the local economy through building and increased retail trade. But services to these new homesites must be provided by the town and certain existing values should be retained.

It seems reasonable therefore, that some standards be set by the town for road construction, layout and the division of lots so that land can be used in an orderly way and services, for example snow plowing, can be provided by the town at reasonable expense.

This, briefly, is the justification for the preparation of subdivision regulations for Haverhill which has been our major project to date.

The questionnaire prepared by the Board and made available to every known voter was well received and the response indicates that the townspeople recognize the effects of an expanding population on a limited land area and the need to deal with it sensibly.

There is very little we can do today that doesn't affect our neighbors in some way. An influx of people means problems as well as benefits. Hopefully we can accommodate everyone and still enhance the values that make Haverhill the town in which we prefer to live.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

Ambulance Service is considered an essential service. Many towns have had to take on the job of providing this service in the form of a volunteer unit or some other program. Even a volunteer service requires a sizeable budget to supply the equipment.

For two years now the Paul Ricker ambulance service has continued to provide this area with excellent 24-hour a day service. All that has been required from the area served is funds to cover his cash cost that he would not have if he discontinued ambulance service. He is willing to continue the same program in 1970 if cooperating towns will cover the following budget which is an amount over and above what regular ambulance fees cover.

During the 21 months that a group of 8 towns have been cooperating with Mr. Ricker in providing ambulance service, he had had 419 calls. These have been listed according to the town they were from. The 1970 budget has been divided among the towns based on the percentage of calls coming from a certain town during this 21-month period. The budget and the amount to request from each participating town was worked out by a group of 10 selectmen from the several towns meeting together on January 22. It was agreed at that meeting that the amount that the town of Haverhill should contribute to the over-all budget of \$6,600 would be \$3,300.

These funds are paid into a special ambulance account handled by the treasurer of Cottage Hospital, supervised by an ambulance committee and paid to Ricker Ambulance service on a monthly basis.

We appreciate the excellent ambulance service that we have received in the past and encourage our town to participate as budgeted in 1970.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

Fire Permit

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be *prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.*

Exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year imprisonment.

3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.

4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

WOODSVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

The reading explosion is still with us. Circulation figures show 3,115 more books leaving the library this year than during the past twelve month period. This is a total increase in volume over the past two years of 7,000 books.

What influenced this higher circulation? First, the winter was a bad one. If you had to be cooped up indoors, why not go to the library. Patrons did so and carried home 26,700 books and magazines. Take January 3, a day of ice, sleet, cold, and slippery streets. On that miserable day alone, 335 pieces of reading material left the library, a record for one day's circulation. As winter turned to spring, circulation kept on zooming, well over an average of 200 books per day, and extended the duties of the librarians to the limit.

Second, publicity for the library quickened with a weekly book review column carried by the local newspaper. Also, during National Book Week, a display of books downtown in Hovey's store window brought to the attention of passers-by merits in patronizing their library.

While the President got into the act by making a speech in which he praised libraries to the skies, he later jolted the morale of every library in the land by asking Congress to cut Federal Funds for library services. Discouraged but not defeated by this blow to the budget, Woodsville trustees and librarians managed to find other economical means with which to purchase needed books, and circulation continued to climb. One method used is through borrowing from the state bookmobile which makes four visits annually. Woodsville Library led the state; we borrowed a total of 6,000 books. This service is of more importance than people realize. The demand from both adults and students is such that only through borrowing can the supply meet the demand.

Activities for the children this year included our annual Summer Reading Program. Over 50 children joined the "Read Your Way to the Top" contest. Each book read sent its reader up another hundred feet to the top of the mountain. The children made their own posters and kept their own records and thoroughly enjoyed every reading step. A coke and cookie party on the library lawn in August brought the very popular program to a fitting close. Prizes of books were awarded to the winners. Cooperation with our schools made giant steps this

year. Teachers gave advance notice of assignments, books were assembled, and students could then select their choice to use as references. Several personal visits by Mrs. Leonard, librarian, to each school helped to firmly establish cooperative efforts.

In the latter part of summer, 28 youngsters from Head Start were guests of the library. After a tour of the library and explanations of procedure in taking out books, Mrs. Leonard and Mrs. Cochrane presented each child with souvenir bookmarks.

Basement improvements were completed during early winter. Wall paneling and indoor carpeting have made all the difference in the world. What was just a storeroom, is now bright and cheerful and has provided additional space for various activities. It is hoped that a few tables and chairs can be purchased for this area in the near future. Indoor carpeting was partially installed in the main upstairs library room, also. A stereo record player was presented to the library around Christmas time as a gift from Mr. and Mrs. George Veayo of Woodsville. Played especially during the holidays, it was much enjoyed by personnel and patrons alike.

The greatest satisfaction felt by any librarian is when someone comes into the library to take out books for the first time, often through her own special efforts. This has happened several times this past year, and is as gratifying to the trustees as to the librarians. We would like at this time to commend Mrs. Leonard and Mrs. Cochrane for the fine work they are doing in creating high standards in Woodsville library facilities.

So, our library gets busier and busier, but we couldn't be happier about it. "Nothing marks the increasing wealth of our times and the growth of the public mind toward refinement, more than the demand for books"—(Henry Ward Beecher.) How about it? Have you visited your library lately?

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Haverhill Elementary School Auditorium in said Town on Tuesday, March 10, 1970 at eight o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other Town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one highway agent, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of Trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chapter 241 RSA, as amended.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders to provide for expenses of the current year in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of any real estate, acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds, by public sale or by receiving sealed bids.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. Shall \$165,287.73 be appropriated for the purpose of raising the Town's share of the cost of constructing a bridge between Haverhill, N. H. and Newbury, Vt., and the Selectmen be authorized to borrow \$160,000.00 under the Municipal Finance Act, and balance to be included in 1970 tax levy?*

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to exclude from its Social Security Coverage plan, service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system for the election of town officers as provided by section 59:73 of the Revised Statutes Annotated.

Article 13. To see if the Town will pass the following ordinance:

*An Ordinance Empowering the Town Planning
Board to Approve or Disapprove Plats*

Be its ordained by the Town of Haverhill at Town Meeting assembled:

1. The Haverhill Planning Board is hereby authorized and empowered to approve or disapprove of plats as provided by section 36:19 of the Revised Statutes Annotated.

2. The Secretary of the Planning Board is hereby designated as the officer who shall issue on behalf of the Town, certificates of failure of the Board to take action on any plat submitted to it for approval.

3. The Town Clerk is hereby directed to forthwith file with the Grafton County Registry of Deeds a copy of this ordinance with the date of its passage endorsed thereon.

4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Article 14. To see if the Town will pass the following ordinance:

An Ordinance to Create a Conservation Commission

Be it ordained by the Town of Haverhill at Town Meeting assembled:

1. The Town of Haverhill hereby adopts the provisions of Chapter 36-A of the Revised Statutes Annotated, entitled "Conservation Commissions".

2. The Selectmen shall appoint a commission of not less than three (3) nor more than seven (7) members as provided in section 3 of said Chapter, which shall have all the powers and duties as specified by said chapter.

3. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

Article 15. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

* This article to be voted on by written ballot at the Town Hall, North Haverhill, March 10, 1970, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. Results of vote will be announced at regular Town Meeting upon presentation of the article.

WOODSVILLE RECREATION

The 1969 Recreation program commenced in May with the beginning of a double season in Little League baseball. Opening-day ceremonies were held and over 60 boys participated in the doubleheader activities. Coaches included Robert Frazer, Howard Pyle, Victor Roy, Pierre Baker, Floyd Gibson, and Ron Hemenway.

The double season in baseball worked out very well as it paralleled school activities and Youth Recreation activities.

Outside games were played with Groton and West Lebanon. All-Star teams played in the Lyndonville, Vermont Boys Tourney and did a commendable job.

It is anticipated that an additional Little League baseball field needs to be constructed to alleviate crowded practice sessions and to allow for farm team games and practices.

Babe Ruth baseball commenced in June and the Woodsville entry, coached by Arnold Blood, was composed of 15 area players. Thirteen through fifteen-year-olds participated in the Triangle Baseball League. The local team did a fine job by finishing runners-up to champion, Haverhill, N.H.

The Woodsville Summer Youth Recreation program began on July 7. More than 200 youth recreation children were enrolled in the program. Of this total, 33 were from Wells River. A staff of 17 was employed and a very intensified program was planned and conducted. Herbert Chamberlain's bus was contracted for the swimming trips to Hall's Lake and the summer weather accommodated the swimming instruction. Activities were scheduled regularly in the morning and many special events and innovations were included. These included: a pet show, doll fashion show, bicycle rodeo, record hops, crafts exhibits, nature and craft projects, leagues in baseball and basketball, clinics in baseball and basketball, and picnic hikes.

The Summer Y.R. Program furnished many recreational outlets for the needs of the 8-14 year-old group. A heavy-duty slide was purchased and used extensively as part of Community Field equipment. The need for playground equipment such as swings, teeter-totters, and merry-go-rounds is imminent as the growth of the young segment of the program increases. Many thanks are extended to the parents who helped make the program a great success.

A summer basketball league for high-school age students was very successful. The league was comprised of six teams including: Bradford, Lincoln, Haverhill, and three teams from Woodsville. The program was self-supporting through the employment of players fees.

The fall recreation program started in November with the opening of Youth Center. Dance bands throughout northern New Hampshire have been hired and attendance has been average.

Little League basketball has been in operation since November, 1969. Coaches include: Victor Roy, Buddy Laturneau, Pierre Baker, Daryll Zampieri, Mike Mullen, Joe Laturneau, and Robert Gibson. The skating rink at the high school has been prepared and supervised by Ray Garceau and Daryll Zampieri as part of the recreation program this year.

We hope that the recreation needs of the community are realized and that the program while now is adequate will be allowed to expand for total maximum participation.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Haverhill Consolidated Elementary School Gymnasium, North Haverhill, New Hampshire, on the 31st day of March 1970, polls to be open for the election of District Officers at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, with action on the remaining articles in this warrant to be taken commencing at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 1. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, three members of the School Board, one from the pre-existing Haverhill School District for a term of three years, one from the pre-existing Woodsville School District for a term of three years, and one Member-at-Large for a term of one year.

ARTICLE 3. To hear any reports of the School Board, Treasurer and the Superintendent of Schools and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. 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For the most part our students adjusted to the change very well. Construction was not completed, and certainly the administration, teachers and students at both the junior and senior high are to be complimented for their cooperation and patience.

Children in the Connecticut Valley who attend school in our Cooperative District are receiving an educational opportunity not available in all sectors of the state. This program that was so well received by the voters of the pre-existing districts has proven that when people work together for the welfare of their children only success is the final outcome.

In an era of inflation it is difficult to keep our school budget within perspective. After many hours of study and deliberation the school board is presenting an austerity budget. Principal factors in our budget increase are teachers' salaries, Social Security and retirement, high interest on additional money borrowed for capital outlay, repairs to buildings and equipment, and Supervisory Union expenses.

Thus far we are having a fine educational year. With the re-evaluation of our curriculum, new opportunities, and computer education we are now on the threshold of excellence in education. We have a long way to go but at least we have made a start.

Next year the Haverhill Cooperative School District will undergo an evaluation of its educational facilities and curriculum in order to maintain membership in the New England Association of College and Secondary Schools. We foresee no problem for our continued membership.

The junior high school program is maturing beyond our expectations. Our seventh and eighth grade youngsters seem happier and are achieving well in their new environment.

May I take this opportunity to sincerely thank the Haverhill Cooperative School Board, teachers, and taxpayers for their wonderful support during the past year.

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1969-1970, will receive a salary of \$16,000.00, which is made up as follows: \$3,000.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$13,000.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.

Therefore, the chief question confronting educators and laymen today is "What kind of education must be provided by our schools to enable our youth to function constructively and efficiently within our society?" The answer is that schools must accept the responsibility of instilling a set of values, attitudes and motives which will foster an intellectual awareness, alertness and curiosity within the student population. From our schools must emerge young adults who are equipped socially, morally and educationally to contribute to themselves, their communities and their nation in a way acceptable to society and in harmony with the interests, needs and desires of other individuals.

With the formation of the Haverhill Cooperative School District during the 1968-69 school year the faculty members and administrators of Haverhill Academy and Woodsville High School were presented with a tremendous opportunity to improve the educational programs for our children. Throughout the school year, these members held numerous meetings in evaluating, analyzing the present curriculum and devising and proposing a new program of studies, guidance and extracurricular and inter-scholastic programs for the following school year. The membership on these faculty committees felt that if we truly want to meet the needs of the individual student, we must be willing to change and try new methods such as team teaching, core and computer instruction and independent study and work programs. The success of these programs and other innovated methods will be determined by the support

that they receive from *all* persons who are willing to act in making education the most important process in the life of an individual.

In the fall of 1969 many changes occurred in faculty personnel as a result of the merger of Haverhill Academy and Woodsville High School. Teachers for the 1969-70 school year are listed under the Superintendent's Report.

Needless to say, the primary objective in our school philosophy is to stress, promote and achieve excellence in the academic program; however, an extremely important aspect of any total educational program is its extra-curricular and inter-scholastic activities.

Our students have received many social and cultural benefits from their participation in the various clubs and organizations that we have. Not only do a large percentage of our students benefit themselves, but also the school and the community gain from the unselfish time and effort contributed by the students in such areas as plays, concerts, scholarship grants and exciting athletic teams.

It must be mentioned that the climax of our entire activity program in 1969 was the gaining of the state championship titles in basketball and baseball. Not only were we extremely pleased with bringing these trophies back to Woodsville, but we were also extremely proud of the manner and appearance of our athletic teams and student supporters in the play-off contests. The coaches of the athletic teams and the advisors of the various school clubs are to be complimented on the fine guidance and leadership given to our students throughout the school year.

I wish to thank the school board, the superintendent of schools, the faculties of Haverhill Academy and Woodsville High School and the people of Woodsville and the surrounding communities for making the past year a most stimulating and rewarding educational experience.

HAVERHILL ACADEMY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Haverhill Academy Junior High School opened on September 4, 1969 with an enrollment of 151 pupils—74 in the 7th grade and 77 in the 8th grade.

Our teaching staff consists of the following full-time teachers:

Mrs. Mary Beth Dickey—Home Economics and Librarian
Mrs. Glenda Evans—English 8, associated subjects, Core Program

Mr. Howard Evans—Social Studies 7

Mrs. Mary McKelvey—Science 7-8

Mrs. Doris Slight—English 7, associated subjects, Core Program

Mr. Robert Smith—Social Studies 8, Core Program

Mr. Lloyd Steeves—Math 7-8, Coaching

The Junior High School shares with the High School the following teachers:

Mrs. Salome Campbell—French 8

Mr. Robert Fiset—Physical Education

Mr. Jeffrey Proctor—Guidance

Mr. Dean Webb—Shop 7-8

Certain days of the week teachers of: Art (Mr. Dale Feid), Vocal Music (Miss Edith Emery), and Instrumental Music (Mr. Stewart Armstrong) are at the Junior High to carry on in their respective teaching areas.

One of the purposes of the Junior High set-up was to be able to group these children according to their ability. This has been done. Each grade is now divided into three divisions—A, B, C. We anticipate that children will achieve more and have a “feeling of belonging” if they are with others of their own abilities.

French has been instituted in the 8th grade, the A and B groups only at the present time.

All students have Shop (boys) or Home Economics (girls) at least twice weekly.

We have pioneered, at least in our area, the concept of the so-called Core Program. Suffice to say, that only by teachers in the English and Social Studies fields working closely together, an enrichment program has developed which has given the children information and experience that they would not have received otherwise.

Our School Lunch Program opened the first day of school with a good wholesome lunch for the students. Mrs. Morris and her helpers are to be commended for their fine contributions. We now serve 130 children each day.

The construction of the addition to the buildings is progressing and should be available to us in January. Then we will have a Home Economics room, a Shop room, a Cafeteria, and a kitchen. A locker will also be provided for each child. It is hoped that an "Open House" will be observed upon the full completion of the addition.

We have problems of course, in our school as all schools do but it is felt that these problems are small and will be worked out in time.

It is hoped that the teachers at the Junior High and the parents of the children involved may work together to instill in the children that school is a place of study and learning and that a sense of good citizenship must prevail.

I wish to thank students, parents, teachers, secretary, custodian, school lunch ladies, school nurse, Haverhill librarians and especially the School Board and you, Mr. Mullen, for all the help, cooperation and good wishes since being at the Junior High School. May the future bring us even closer together for the benefit of the students.

HAVERHILL CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL
REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of the Haverhill Consolidated School for the year ending December 31, 1969.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 194. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten 22; Grade 1, 35; Grade 2, 28; Grade 3, 21; Grade 4, 22; Grade 5, 32; Grade 6, 34. Grade 1 is split into two sections. The establishment of a kindergarten this year is a big step forward educationally for the children of the Haverhill area.

Haverhill Consolidated School is making wide use of educational television from channel 49 in Littleton. Programs are being used in the following categories: Art, Health, Literature, Music, Phonics, Science and Social Studies.

An art program has been introduced into the school under the supervision of Mr. Dale Feid. Instrumental music is being taught in grades 5 and 6 by Mr. Stewart Armstrong and vocal music in grades 1-6 by Miss Edith Anne Emery. Mrs. Lucille Pike, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching kindergarten and Miss Gloria Blake, a graduate of Lyndon State College, is teaching grade 2. The remainder of the teaching staff has stayed the same.

The school lunch program is serving 75 percent of the student body. The program this year is under the supervision of Mrs. Greta Morris.

Achievement and intelligence tests were given in October to grades 2, 4 and 6 under the state testing program. Tests given were the Stanford Achievement Test Battery and the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests. Under the state program these tests are machine scored in Iowa City, Iowa at the Measurement Research Center. The results were received by the latter part of December and are now being studied by the administration and teachers.

Stanford Achievement Tests are given in grades 1, 3 and 5, Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests in grade 3 and Metropolitan Readiness Tests in kindergarten under local sponsorship.

New stair treads are being applied to the stairs in the old building. These treads are cutting down on slipping and noise.

Plans are being made to relocate the cafeteria in the gymnasium. If this is done a kitchen should be added on to the gymnasium. I strongly recommend that a library be added to the school and a part time librarian be appointed to provide library services to the pupils. Part of the present cafeteria area could be converted for this use.

Children with the most severe reading difficulties are being given individualized attention in the Remedial Reading Program. Mrs. Kathleen White has been specially trained in diagnosing and helping children with reading difficulties. Diagnostic tests are administered to locate the area of difficulty in reading.

I wish to thank Superintendent Mullen, the School Board and the members of the Teaching Staff for their cooperation in all matters.

WOODSVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL
REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of the Woodsville Elementary School for the year ending December 31, 1969.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 257 pupils. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten, 45; Grade 1, 40; Grade 2, 34; Grade 3, 34; Grade 4, 29; Grade 5, 34; Grade 6, 41. There is a morning and an afternoon session of kindergarten and grades 1 and 6 are split into two sections.

The elementary school is making wide use of educational television from channel 15 in Hanover. Programs are being used in the following categories: Art, Health, Literature, Music, Phonics, Science and Social Studies.

An art program has been introduced into the school under the supervision of Mr. Dale Feid. Instrumental music is being taught in grades 5 and 6 by Mr. Stewart Armstrong and vocal music in grades 1-6 by Miss Edith Anne Emery. Other members of the elementary school staff are the same although some teaching assignments have been changed since last year.

The school lunch program is serving a large percentage of pupils and teachers. The program this year is under the supervision of Mrs. Greta Morris.

Grades 2, 3 and 5 are overcrowded this year and additional help should be provided for these grades with large enrollments.

Achievement and intelligence tests were given in October to grades 2, 4 and 6 under the state testing program. Tests given were the Stanford Achievement Test Battery and the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests. Under the state program those tests are machine scored in Iowa City, Iowa at the Measurement Research Center. The results were received the latter part of December and are now being studied by the administration and teachers.

Stanford Achievement tests are given in grades 1, 3 and 5, Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests in grade 3 and Metropolitan Readiness Tests in kindergarten under local sponsorship.

I would recommend that a part time librarian be appointed to provide added library services to the pupils. Mrs. Barbara Jones has been teaching two sessions of kindergarten this year and has been unable to spend as much time in the library.

Children with the most severe reading difficulties are being given individualized attention in the Remedial Reading Program. Mrs. Kathleen White has been specially trained in diagnosing and helping children with reading difficulties. Diagnostic tests are administered to locate the area of difficulty in reading.

I wish to thank Superintendent Mullen, the School Board and the members of the Teaching Staff for their cooperation in all matters.

In September 1968 a lazy eye clinic was sponsored by the New Hampshire Division of Health and the Woodsville Cohase Lions Club. This clinic was held at the Woodsville Elementary School. Pre-school children were tested for lazy eye blindness (Ambloopia) and when symptoms were found the child was referred to his eye doctor for follow-up testing. In order to correct this condition it is important to detect it and treat it as early as possible. The Lions Club members did an excellent job organizing and conducting this clinic.

The annual Dental Clinic was held in the spring. Children were taken to Dr. Munson's office in Bradford. Fifty three pupils were examined and thirty-two received treatment. Seven mornings were made available with funds raised through the local school District. We received matching funds from the New Hampshire Division of Public Dental Health this year. We again owe the success of this clinic to the interested parents and friends that donated the transportation for the Clinic. The

following people transported the children this year: Mrs. John Wardrop; Rev. Philip Anderson; Mr. Everett Sawyer; Mrs. Harry Moses; Mrs. Roland Clough; Mrs. John Farnham and Miss Marie Aremburg.

During the year nine pupils were tested at the White Mountain Community Services Center. These children were tested for reading and learning problems.

One pupil was examined and treated at the Othopedic Clinic in Hanover.

On November 7, 1968 a special cancer film was shown to the Senior girls and their mothers. Dr. Berry was present and answered questions and gave a talk after the film was shown.

May 1, 1969—3 pupils from Haverhill Academy and 26 pupils from Haverhill Consolidated School were screened for speech and hearing defects by the staff from Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center.

May 16, 1969—registration was held for children eligible to attend Kindergarten and 1st grade in September, 1969.

Several meetings were attended during the year. Especially helpful were the Conferences held at the White Mountain Community Services Center in Littleton. Dr. Anthonisen met with the school nurses and discussed many problems such as school phobias, drug abuse and other topics as requested by the group. Mr. Froberg and Miss Page from the clinic staff have met with us frequently to advise and counsel.

During the first semester I attended a course given at Laconia. Dr. Margaret Riggs lectured on "Special Educational Problems and Techniques."

All routine vision and hearing tests were completed and referrals made when necessary.

This has been a sad year due to the illness and passing of Mr. James Morrill. I am grateful that I had the opportunity to work with this great teacher for nearly eighteen years. No one that knew him will ever forget this kind gentleman.

I want to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Evans, Mr. Lizotte, the teachers, parents and pupils for their cooperation during the past year.
