In this space last year we reported that the Town had conditionally obtained a Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$239,000.00 for the extension of sewer line to the Cottage Hospital. In 1985 the Town received those funds, awarded a general contract on the project and saw its completion by mid-summer. Fortunately, there were sufficient excess funds to repave Forest Street, a portion of Swiftwater Road and install some badly needed drainage improvements in the Four Corners area.

Otherwise 1985 might best be remembered as a year dominated by litigation. In the case of Skiway Owner's Association v. Town of Haverhill certain lot owners in the Mountain Lakes District appealed the vote of the 1984 Town Meeting in which the Town declined to lay out a road in the Skiway Section. After extended negotiation and a hearing before the Superior Court, the Court found no occasion to lay out the road as requested. Your Selectmen regret the legal expense incurred in this matter however felt bound to vigorously defend the Town's position as communicated to us by the voters.

In another Court, the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Worcester, Mass., the Town was successful in removing the remaining land of Town and Country Homes, Inc. from the bankrupt estate. Unfortunately, this appears to be only the beginning round in our attempts to collect over 10 years of back taxes and see those properties returned to a taxable status.

Briefly, a note on the budget as proposed by the 1986 Budget Committee. We observed that, aside from Committee members, town employees, and your Selectmen, there were fewer than five people at the Public Hearing on the 1986 Budget. We hope that the poor turnout is attributable to the notion that people feel that the Committee proposed a reasonable budget and not an indication of apathy. The total proposed budget is approximately \$786,000.00 as compared with about \$841,000.00 in 1985. In our view the budget as proposed is reasonable and we ask that it be approved at Town Meeting.

Finally, we thank all of those people who devoted their time and energy on behalf of the Town in 1985. We see no need to try to name them in this report since they did not give of themselves for public credit or acclaim. We know who they are and, more importantly, they know who they are.

## 1986 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT TOWN OF HAVERHILL, NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill, in the County of Grafton, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the James R. Morrill School in North Haverhill on Tuesday March 11, 1986 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following matters. Article One will be decided by written ballot. The polling booths will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. for voting on Article One. At 6:00 p.m. the meeting will adjourn to reconvene at 8:00 p.m. at the James R. Morrill School in North Haverhill, in said Town of Haverhill for consideration of the remaining articles in this WARRANT:

Article 1: To choose by a non-partisan ballot one Selectman for a term of one [1] year; one Selectman for a term of three [3] years; a Town Clerk for a term of [1] year; a Tax Collector for a term of one [1] year; a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three [3] years; a Treasurer for the term of one [1] year; a Moderator for a term of two [2] years; and a Supervisor of Checklist for a term of six [6] years.

Article 2: To announce the results of the balloting on Article One.

Article 3: To choose a Cemetery Commissioner for a term of five [5] years; to choose a Library Trustee for a term of three [3] years; and to choose any other necessary Town Official.

Article 4: To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and other Town Officers and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest bearing notes in anticipation of taxes and to provide for the expenses of the current year.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, appropriate, and expend gifts of Federal and State aid in the name of the Town of Haverhill.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds, by public auction sale or by advertising for sealed bids, except that the Selectmen would be empowered, but not required, to make one last offer to the person who was divested of his property and a late redemption would be allowed upon payment of all taxes, costs and interest.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next Annual Report.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town as recommended by the Budget Committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of \$43,000.00 for the following specific purposes

herewith indicated:

Appropriations for Debt Service

Long Term Debt	\$ 30,000.00
Purchase of Vehicles	\$ 13,000.00

Article 11: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to inventory the improvements required and project the future uses of the Municipal Building. Said committee to submit a report of findings and recommendations to the Selectmen by January 1, 1987.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars [\$2,000.00] for support of the Community Outreach Program. [By Petition]

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars [\$10,000.00] for the support of Cottage Hospital, Inc. [By Petition]

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars [\$5,500.00] to restore and preserve Town records.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Haverhill and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's [D.O.E.] present plan to dispose of radioactive waste, and into the D.O.E.'s competence to carry out such a plan. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the N.H. Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. [By Petition]

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written welfare guidelines prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

Article 17: To take any other action that may legally come before this meeting.

Dean Hammond moved the article be accepted as printed. Tony Smith seconded the motion. James Frezza made the amendment that "but not required" be changed to "and required". Tony Smith seconded the amendment. This amendment was defeated by a voice vote. This article was passed as printed by a voice vote.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to appoint

or elect a Budget Committee to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next Annual Report.

Paul LaMott moved the Moderator appoint a Budget Committee. Ezra B. Mann, II seconded the motion. It was so voted by a voice vote.

<u>Article 9:</u> To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town as recommended by the Budget Committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and pass any other vote relating thereto.

Dr. Laurel Lyons moved the article. Francis Lackie seconded the motion.

Dana Fullerton asked to amend the budget in the amount of \$2000.00 for the Tri-County Community Action Outreach Program. Seconded by Betty Abbott. This Ammendment was passed by a voice vote. Town Clerk, Helen Smith, asked to have the budget amended to have her salary increased by 5% or \$800 dollars. Winnifred Moran seconded the motion. This amendment was narrowly defeated by a voice vote. Homer May made the amendment that the budget be cut by \$42,461.00. Seconded by Earl Aremburg. After much discussion on this, the amendment was defeated by a voice vote.

Town Clerk, Helen Smith, made the motion that \$400.00 be put into the budget to pay the Deputy Town Clerk while the Town Clerk is on vacation. James Frezza seconded the motion. This amendment was passed by a voice vote.

The budget of \$813,631.70 was passed as printed, plus the amendments that were passed.

<u>Article 10:</u> To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The sum of \$49,000.00 for the following specific purposes herewith indicated: Appropriations for Debt Service

Haverhill/Newbury Bridge Bond	\$10,000.00
Grader Note	10,000.00
Revaluation Bond	20,000.00

Susan Hehre moved the article be accepted as printed. Ezra B. Mann, II seconded the motion. It was so voted by a voice vote.

<u>Article ll:</u> To see if the Town will vote to increase the appropriation for the libraries to \$25,000.00. (article inserted by petition)

Winnifred Moran moved the article. Susan Hehre seconded the motion. This article was passed by a voice vote.

<u>Article 12:</u> To see if the Town will vote to increase the appropriation for Cottage Hospital to \$10,000.00. (article inserted by petition)

Shirley Cobb moved the article. David Moore seconded. This article was passed by a voice vote.

<u>Article 13:</u> To see if the Town will vote to establish a vehicle capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA Chapter 35, and to raise and appropriate the amount of \$10,000.00, and further to appoint the Selectmen as agents to carry out the purpose of said fund.

Tony Smith moved the article. Ralph Fitts seconded. It was so voted by a voice vote.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept the prepayment of property taxes and/or resident taxes.

James Frezza moved the article. John Cobb seconded. Passed as printed.

<u>Article 15:</u> To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen, or a Committee appointed by the Selectmen to take any action necessary to implement the recommendations of the 1984 Fire Funding Study committee. (See Committee's recommendation on page 54 of the 1984 Town Report.)

James Frezza moved the article. Norman Ingalls seconded. Paul LaMott moved that this be referred back to committee. Ezra B. Mann, II seconded the motion. It was so voted.

<u>Article 16:</u> To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease, by sealed bid, the Town-owned property adjacent to the Dean Memorial Airport for a term not to exceed five (5) years.

Paul LaMott moved the article. Ezra B. Mann, II seconded the motion.

Brian Buchanan moved the article be amended by adding the following:

"The person who leased this property will become a co-operator with the Grafton County Conservation District and develop a Conservation plan to manage this land."

Kevin Bruno seconded the amendment. This article was passed as amended.

<u>Article 17:</u> To take any other action that may legally come before this meeting.

Homer May moved that the Tax Rates for the last four years be published annually in the town report as follows.

As described in Note 2, the Town has recognized tax revenues of \$39,368 and \$184,891 in its General and Property Tax Funds respectively, which do not meet the sixty day received in cash accounting principle (Interpretation 3). The Town believes that the application of this accounting principle which would result in a general fund balance \$78,608, giving a misleading impression of the Town's ability to meet its current and future obligations. decision. concur with their We

In our opinion, except that the omission of the financial statements described above in the second paragraph results in an incomplete presentation, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Haverhill, New Hampshire at December 31, 1984 and the results of operations and changes in financial position of its proprietary fund types for the year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis

Our radio operator's log, maintained by Shirley McKean, reflects increased use of our unicom and an increased number of requests for the use of the nurway landing lights.

At this time there are seven airplanes based here plus three ultra light planes, with steady transient activity. The small bushes and trees at the north end of the runway were cut, at the request of Burndy Corporation, to insure safe operation of their corporate aircraft. The buildings continue to be rented, the hangar is rented and the land is leased for agricultural use, as in the past.

This past summer the Federal Aviation Administration and the State Aeronautics Commission inspected the airport and we experienced no problems.

Programs at meetings during the year 1985 were as follows:

April 14: Slide show on possibilities for historical society activities, by Bradford Smith, Historian-in-Residence of the North Country Historical Project.

August 18: Exhibit of antique bottles of the region, by Dr. Edwin Blaisdell.

October 21, as guests of the Woodsville Progressive Club: Slide show, "Covered Bridges, Links to the Past," by Richard Roy, vice-president of the National Society for the Preservation of Covered Bridges.

Through changes in the constitution and bylaws, the annual meeting was moved to April and the fiscal year was changed to the calendar year. Watch for announcements of this year's annual meeting, or inquire of the officers listed at the end of this report.

The application for listing of part of Haverhill Corner in the National Register of Historic Places has been completed and submitted.

At the Ladd Street School, work has been nearly completed on the repair of the granite foundation and the grading for improving the drainage of surface water. Next will be the completion of the exterior painting and the renovation of the interior as a schoolroom.

At our museum in the Haverhill Library, there is continued development of the displays and furnishings. The major acquisition during the year was a tall clock with the face signed by John Osgood, who was a clockmaker and silversmith in Haverhill Corner from about 1795 to 1840. The Historical Society has agreed to assume responsibility for the Haverhill Heritage Trail, a project started by the Woodsville High School Honor Society with the help of the Woodsville Progressive Club. We welcome suggestions on additions or changes in the locations, historical information, or method of presentation.

We welcome new memberships, contributions, suggestions for programs and projects, and donations of articles of local interest for our museum or for the schoolroom at Ladd Street.

This has been a year of mixed reviews for the ambulance service. We did manage to implement a radio dispatching system with the cooperation of the nursing staff at Cottage. As a result, a considerable improvement in our response time is possible. Also on the improvement side are the efforts of the independent Woodsville Rescue Team in outfitting a complete new rescue truck that will go anywhere we go to assist in extricating patients from difficult or hazardous situations, including car accidents.

On the other hand, we have had some reversals this year. Our revenues have fallen as a result of increased difficulty collecting fees from individuals and from Medicare. Further, Medicare has placed a moratorium on rate increases in order to control their costs. Unfortunately, this freeze does not help to contain our expenses and we have found it necessary to apply for a rate increase now in order to obtain a raise when the moratorium ends. Our rates for ambulance services have been the lowest in the region for years. A base rate increase from \$50 to \$70 will keep us at least near the bottom. Our directors have tried to keep the bulk of our revenues coming from the users of our service and their insurance carriers in order to lower the costs to thos towns that support us. In keeping with that goal, we are not asking for anything more than the level of support that you provided to your ambulance in 1985. Thank you.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectment for timber tax forms.

#### GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following report in our continuing effort to directly communicate with our constituents.

Because of current favorable cash status and appreciable fund balance, Grafton County maintained a level tax requirement this fiscal year, actually reducing the tax requirement by \$200, and we anticipate an even better tax climate in the next fiscal year. However, due to the apportionment process of tax assessment by equalized valuation, some towns did see a slight increase in the county portion of taxes for 1985, though the majority of towns realized a decrease. The unusual fund balance is due to a combination of factors. including unused surplus in the previous budget, conscientious budget management by all departments, transfer of court expenses to the State, increased Nursing Home reimbursements, favorable returns on investments, increased Register Of Deeds revenues and continued Revenue Sharing.

Along with saving the County approximately \$300,000 in expenditures with the shift of liability for court activities to the State, we also anticipate receiving \$100,000+ annually in rent on space occupied by the court system.

Grafton County is experiencing the same problems as your local government in the insurance market. Costs are rising dramatically and in some cases insurance coverage is unobtainable. We have retained a consultant to review county insurance needs and available coverage with the hopes of procuring one total package. Because of the current unstable insurance market, we do not yet have any report or recommendation.

In cooperation with your local government and the State, we are striving for a smooth transition to the new system of welfare service delivery under Senate Bill 1. Settlement for assistance determination has been eliminated and towns and cities are now liable for all general assistance to needy persons in their towns, including transients. However, liability for expenses of all juvenile services and for persons assisted under the categorical grant programs will now be shared by the State and counties, removing town liability. Under Senate Bill 1 and the ensuing partnership between counties and the state Department of Children & Youth Services, the Commissioners note a new direction for juveniles, including the development of new alternative programs to out of home placements.

Energy conservation programs at the nursing home and courthouse have realized a considerable savings with the decrease in fuel and electric consumption, cutting consumption and dollar cost in half for courthouse fuel alone.

In our letter to you in 1983 we noted litigation in a retirement buyback suit where a negative decision would result in cost of \$70,000 plus legal fees with a potential domino effect on local governments. We are pleased to note that the County prevailed in this issue.

The Commissioners have changed weekly meetings to Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance at all meetings. The county budget recommendations are processed in May and June. We welcome input and strongly recommend public attendance at the public hearings usually held in June.

The main office is at 60 High Street, Littleton, with satellite offices in Lincoln and Woodsville.

Services to the Town of Haverhill include: 686 Nursing visits, 3 Physical Therapy visits, 1092 Aide hours, 383 Homemaker hours, and 81 Health Promotions.

#### NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

#### ANNUAL REPORT

Calendar year 1985 was a busy and productive year for the North Country Council as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to towns and cities in the North Country.

The Council is a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45 and is responsible for providing its member communities assistance in local community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation and various other community services. Besides the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legislative and funding issues at the state and federal governments.

In Haverhill, the Council assisted town officials in preparing a Community Development Sewer Grant (CDBG) which was funded for \$239,500 and also prepared a housing rehabilitation feasibility study CDBG which was funded for \$15,000. Coordinated with the Haverhill Development Corporation and town officials to initiate of a regional economic marketing program.

Economic development is an important part of the Council's overall agency mission. This year the Council produced a video promoting the North Country as "The Sensible Place to do Business." The video was developed to be a marketing tool to assist local development organizations publicize to southern New Hampshire businesses why the North Country is a logical choice of location. In October, the Council co-hosted with Governor John Sununu a development forum in Manchester to discuss with southern New Hampshire business executives the advantages of expanding to the North Country. Over 85 businesses participated in this affair and the response from the business community was very positive. The Council is now developing follow up contact with interested businesses through the State Office of Industrial Development.

The Council again provided information and guidance to several towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year saw well over \$2.0 million in Community Development Block Grant funds come to the region for such activities as housing rehabilitation, downtown revitalization, business revolving loan funds, and housing rehabilitation feasibility studies.

Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or one-time basis for subdivision and site plan applications.

The Council again co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series with the NH Municipal Association. The Law Lecture this year covered such topics as local planning board procedures, administration and enforcement of ordinances and review of recent court cases and state law changes regarding local land use planning. The Council also sponsored a separate Coos County Land Use Control Workshop which provided additional assistance to those local officials in the county.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

#### THE HAVERHILL DISTRICT COURT

The Haverhill District Court is the local court that the State of New Hampshire provides for the towns of Bath, Benton, Haverhill, Landaff, Piermont, and Warren. It is located in the Municipal Building in Woodsville.

The Haverhill District Court has jurisdiction over most matters that occur in the towns it serves, including all offenses related to motor vehicles, all misdemeanors, and all matters concerning the youngsters who live in those towns, such as acts of juvenile delinquency and of abuse or neglect, and matters concerning children in need of services. It also hears petitions and can offer relief in cases of domestic violence.

The Haverhill District Court has the power to hear and decide any civil case (a dispute between two citizens) involving not more than \$10,000.00 which does not concern the title to real estate. There is also a small claims division where cases involving \$1,500.00 or less can be brought for smaller filing fees, using simplified forms provided by the Clerk of Court, and in which the hearings do not require most legal formalities or technicalities. Most small claims cases, in fact, are conducted without the presence of an attorney. Hearings in such cases are usually held within 30 days after the papers are filed.

#### REPORT OF THE HAVERHILL POLICE DEPARTMENT



In the following pages of the Town Report, residents and taxpayers of the Town of Haverhill will find the Annual Report of the Haverhill Police Department. The Report represents an accurate and valid accounting of the activities of your Police Department for the past year.

In May, the Department changed over its dispatching from the Grafton County Jail to the Grafton County Sheriff's Department. From May 1, 1985, to December 31, 1985, the Department received 3,603 incoming telephone calls on its emergency line, 747-3322, an amount that far exceeded expectations. The dispatching change has proven tremendously significant in improving department efficiency and safety.

Also noteworthy during 1985 was the Department's drug investigations which resulted in two individuals being sentenced to State Prison terms. The Department conducted other major investigations in terms of child assaults which has resulted in one jail sentence for one individual. A second individual is yet to be sentenced.

Our total case count rose sharply in 1985 to 1448 from a 1984 high of 1137, largely due to increases in check cases and traffic complaints. Calls for Service jumped markedly from 5,039 in 1984 to 5,371 in 1985. Interestingly enough, the Burglary and Theft rate declined rather sharply, perhaps due to a favorable economy, less unemployment, and concentrated police patrols. Area merchants can look with pleasure at the Department's efforts on bad check investigations in 1985 which indicated recoveries for them in the amount of over \$8,500.00, however, the number of bad checks reported to the police rose sharply.

The Department's adult arrests rose significantly over 1985, with the juvenile arrest rate dropping. At year end, the Department possessed 13 outstanding arrest warrants for individuals on a variety of charges from Failure to Appear to Forgeries.

Our two cruisers amassed approximately 81,000 patrol miles during 1985, due in large part to increased calls for service and more overall activity in the Town requiring police attention and presence.

During 1985, Philip Shipman joined the Haverhill Police Department as the fourth full-time officer, graduating from the New Hampshire Police Academy in the fall and placing 7th in his class. He's proven to be a fine police officer and a definite asset to the Department.

Due to our concentrated patrol activity, the Department increased its Driving While Intoxicated arrest rate from 21 in 1984 to 39 in 1985. We intend to continue this activity as vigorously as possible.

Our successes as a Department in 1985 were realized through a close working relationship with many people and Departments; our three Fire Departments, the Grafton County Jail, the Grafton County Sheriff's Department. the New Hampshire State Police. the Haver-

hill District Court, the Haverhill Juvenile Diversion Committee, and the Budget Committee, to name a few. In order to maintain excellence and high standards, we must continue to re-evaluate our goals and methods of achieving them. We as a department cannot accept complacency and "doing things a certain way because they've always been done that way." At some point in the future, we must make an effort to computerize our administrative operation in order to avoid the tedium of records research and maintenance. The Department views this as a project to work towards in a constant effort to upgrade the delivery of services to the Town of Haverhill.

In closing, I would like to extend my deepest appreciation to the Board of Selectmen and their Administrative Assistant, Patricia Klark, for their patience, understanding, and assistance this year. They have made working for the Town of Haverhill enjoyable and challenging and embody all that is good and rewarding when working in a small municipality.

#### MINUTES OF 1985 WOODSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT MEETING

Present: Moderator Ezra B. Mann, II; Commissioners Maccini, Cowell and Fournier; Acting Clerk Gary J. Wood; approximately 55 voters.

At 7:30 p.m. Moderator Mann called the Meeting to order and read the 1985 Warrant in its entirety.

Article 1: W. C. Hill nominated E.B. Mann, II for Moderator. Seconded by Mr. Ernie Towne. W.C. Hill moved the nominations be closed and one vote be cast for E.B. Mann for Moderator. Unanimously adopted. E.B. Mann declared elected Moderator.

Article 2: Moderator Mann noted that Mrs. Marilyn Brunelle had resigned as Clerk for the District after many years of devoted and faithful service. Moderator Mann moved that the Commissioners be instructed to forward a letter of gratitude to Mrs. Brunelle for her efforts on behalf of the District. Ms. Joanne Knight seconded the motion which was subsequently adopted unanimously.

Terry Alexander nominated Patricia Klark for Clerk, which motion was seconded by Joseph C. Maccini. Larry P. Corey moved that the nominations be closed and that one vote be cast for Patricia Klark for Clerk. Bruce Robbins seconded that motion which was unanimously adopted. Patricia Klark was declared elected as Clerk.

Article 3: William G. Cowell nominated C. Thomas Chase for Treasurer, which motion was seconded by Thelma Strobridge. William G. Cowell moved the nominations be closed and that one vote be cast for C. Thomas Chase, which motion was seconded by Larry P. Corey. The motion was adopted unanimously and C. Thomas Chase was declared elected as Treasurer. Article 4: William G. Cowell nominated Robert F. Miller which motion was seconded by Virginia Thayer. Jay Holden moved the nominations be closed and that one vote be cast for Robert F. Miller. W.C. Hill seconded that motion and Robert F. Miller, after a unanimous vote in the affirmative, was declared elected as Auditor.

Article 5: Virginia Thayer nominated Winnifred Moran which motion was seconded by Helen Rogers. Virginia Thayer moved the nominations closed and that one vote be cast for Winnifred Moran. That motion was seconded by Helen Rogers, adopted unanimously in the affirmative, and Winnifred Moran was declared elected as Library Trustee.

Article 6: Larry P. Corey nominated Richard Guy, Joseph C. Maccini seconded the nomination, and Virginia Thayer moved the nominations be closed and that one vote be cause in the affirmative for Richard Guy. That motion was adopted unanimously in the affirmative and Richard Guy was declared elected as Fire District Commissioner.

William G. Cowell moved that those present express their gratitude to Mr. Conrad R. Fournier, for his fifteen years of devoted service as a Woodsville Fire District Commissioner. Mr. Fournier received a standing ovation from those present.

Article 7: Larry P. Corey nominated Robert F. Miller and Jay Holden moved the nominations be closed and one vote be cast in the affirmative for Robert F. Miller. The motion was adopted unanimously and Robert F. Miller was declared elected as Woodsville Water and Light Commissioner.

Article 8: There was discussion from the floor on which member of the Recreation Committee was ending their term. Virginia Thayer advised that she believed it was her term that was ending. Larry P. Corey nominated Virginia Thayer. However, Virginia Thaver declined the nomination. Larry P. Corey was nominated from a voice on the floor. However, Mr. Corev also declined the nomination. Jay Holden was nominated by Larry Corey, Oland Bylow moved the nominations closed and Larry Corey seconded the motion. Jay Holden weakly protested the nomination and gave a reason for him being unable to serve. The reason offered was ruled insufficient by the Moderator, the vote unanimous in the affirmative and Jay Holden was declared elected to the Recreation Committee.

At this point the Moderator, noting the many years having served in that position, expressed surprise that the first eight articles had been adopted unanimously with no discussion nor disagreement. The Clerk was instructed to note the Moderator's remarks, which he did.

Article 9: Jay holden moved that the reports of the officers be accepted as printed in the Annual Report, which motion was seconded by Larry P. Corey and adopted unanimously.

Article 10: Joseph C. Maccini moved the article, Virginia Thayer seconded and it was adopted unanimously.

Article 11: Larry P. Corey moved the article, Jay Holden seconded and it was adopted unanimously.

Article 12: Winnifred Moran, on behalf of the Woodsville Water & Light Department, moved that the Department pay the Woodsville Fire District \$5,000.00 in April of 1985 and \$5,000.00 in December of 1985. Helen Rogers seconded the motion which was adopted unanimously.

Article 13: Bruce Robbins moved the article, Marion Mullen seconded and it was adopted unanimously thereby appropriating the sum of \$3,500.00 to re-build the pump on the Fire Department's Dodge pumper.

Article 14: William G. Cowell moved that \$28,251.59 be appropriated. However, after some discussion, the motion was withdrawn by Mr. Cowell. Bruce Robbins moved to amend the amount appropriated to the Fire Department's equipment and maintenance item from \$4,000.00 to \$15,000.00 in order to make repairs to the Department's 1977 International Pumper Truck. Richard Guy inquired what repairs were necessary whereupon Chief Robbins explained the various items of overhaul that appeared necessary. Allen Wright inquired whether the District's capital reserve would be used to soften the impact of the requested increase. Joseph C. Maccini advised that the account could probably be used for such a purpose. Oland Bylow inquired whether the recommendations of the Town's 1985 Fire Study Committee to create three new fire protection districts would be accomplished this year. The moderator informed those present that those recommendations would not be implemented. There was more discussion relative to use of the capital reserve account. No vote was taken on Bruce Robbins' motion.

William G. Cowell moved that the District appropriate \$133,992.00 and raise through property taxes the amount of \$24,751.59. Joseph C. Maccini seconded the motion.

Bruce Robbins moved that the motion be amended to increase the amount appropriated by an additional \$11,000.00 to be taken from the District's capital reserve for Fire Department vehicles. In response

to a question from the floor, the Moderator explained that the amount to be appropriated by this Article was in addition to the \$3,500.00 appropriated in Article 13 of this Warrant. Larry P. Corey seconded the motion to amend, which motion was unanimously adopted.


The motion, as amended to appropriate \$144,992.00 under this Article, passed unanimously.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT SUMMARY OF INCOME AND EXPENSES Following two very busy years, 1983 and 1984, this year was relatively quiet, with only thirtytwo fire calls. A decline of almost 50%. This was evidently a quirk, as the first month of 1986 we have already logged 16 runs.

The chimney cleaning program we have done the last few years seems to be paying off. We feel our fire prevention efforts in the area and our high visibility in the community has made people more fire safety conscious. There has also been an excellent fire prevention effort undertaken at the Woodsville Elementary School for which the teachers should be commended. Few people realize or know, but in some foreign countries heavy fines and/or jail sentences are given for fires caused by negligence.

Many people who have gone by the fire station have thought we have a new engine. Actually, we don't, but the 1978 International went in for a body and paint job. The truck was gone for 14 weeks this summer and when it came back the yellow was gone and it was a beautiful FIRE ENGINE RED. In the future all apparatus in Woodsville will be red. Our experience with lime yellow wasn't good. Although it is more visible, it is less durable. A new addition at the fire station is our rescue truck, a beautiful new Ford chassis with a reconditioned body with all work done by the Rescue Team. The subject keeps coming up again so I would . like to state "The Rescue Team gets no Town or Precinct funding." All funds are from car washes, raffles, private donations, etc. Another project which was done this year was a pump repair and body job to the 1958 Dodge. This should extend the life of this truck and keep it a viable part of our fire fighting operations.

Our training program continued in a very active manner with many sessions in our precinct and some mutual aid drills as well as eighteen members attending the annual Twin State Fire School in May. It is particularly difficult to keep interest up when alarms are down in number. However, in this day and age it is critical to the fire department, precinct, town and the whole area to have welltrained and equipped manpower.

During 1985, I.S.O., the Insurance Services Organization, did a re-evaluation of the three fire departments in the Town of Haverhill. The news is good...all three departments had their ratings lowered. Although this is for commercial only, it should be noted that a reduction from 5% to 12% is in order in our town. The rating is based on equipment maintenance, training, water supply and other variables. I am very proud that we improved our rating.

In conclusion, there is a special thanks owed to the area businesses who have volunteer firefighters in their employ. I don't think people stop to realize the tremendous amount of money saved by the taxpayers because the firefighters are allowed to respond to fires. Towns that have full-time paid firefighters have budgets from \$200,000-\$400,000 and higher. These local businesses deserve your support.



<u>Article IV.</u> Joe Lavoie nominated and Earl Aremburg seconded Bob Smith for the three [3] year term as Precinct Commissioner. Carl Elsner was nominated for the three [3] year term by Dr. Laurel Lyons and seconded by Ridler Page. Bob Smith having a majority of the ballots cast was declared elected.

<u>Article V.</u> Ed Morris was nominated for Treasurer by Earl Aremburg, seconded by Joe Lavoie. Ed Morris was the only person nominated, and having a majority of ballots cast, was declared elected.

<u>Article VI.</u> James Barber was nominated for auditor by Vern Wiggins, seconded by Joe Lavoie. James Barber having a majority of ballots cast, was declared elected. <u>Article VII.</u> Ridler Page moved and Joe Lavoie seconded a motion to place any surplus funds in the Capital Reserve Fund. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

<u>Article VIII</u>. It was moved by Dr. Laurel Lyons and seconded by Walter Young, that the Commissioners be authorized to borrow money to provide for current expenses, or for emergencies until taxes are collected and to give a note for the same. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

<u>Article IX.</u> It was moved by Earl Aremburg and seconded by Dr. Laurel Lyons that the Precinct appropriate the sum of \$44,712.63 of which \$12,238.61 is to be raised by taxation. The motion was carried unanimously by voice vote.

<u>Article X.</u> Ridler Page moved and Gayle Young seconded a motion that the Commissioners be authorized to spend such sums as may be necessary to repair and maintain the fence around the common. The motion was carried by a voice vote.

There was some discussion as to whether the band stand would be included in this motion.

Mike Lavoie asked that a rising vote of thanks be given to outgoing Commissioner Earl Aremburg for his many years of service. It was so done.

Homer May moved and seconded that 3 columns be added to the budget columns. It was so moved by a voice vote.

Mike Lavoie moved and Dr. Laurel Lyons seconded a motion that the Precinct accept a most generous offer from Walter and Carole Young for a new firehouse to be built on property in Haverhill owned by Walter and Carole Young. John Klitgord moved and Howard Evans seconded that we vote by ballot. The motion to ballot was defeated.

There was some discussion as to what the actual cost of the firehouse to the precinct might be. A road, sewage disposal facilities and lighting would be needed. Sue Holden spoke about using some of the Mildred Page fund to help defray part of the cost.

Marion Andrews moved the question. The motion to accept Walter and Carole Young's generous offer was unanimously passed by voice vote.

Walter Morris asked on behalf of Dana Leonard, that the Precinct extend the water line to his property on Sinclair [ST. Clair] Hill. Karl T. Bruckner stepped down from the moderator's position and spoke against extending any of the Precinct lines. To receive the benefit of our utilities was not fair unless the person also participated in the problems of the Precinct. The sense of the meeting was that we do not extend the water line but if Mr. Leonard wished he could petition the town selectmen for a change in boundary. The final say still residing with Haverhill Corner Precinct members.

Tony Smith moved and Mike Lavoie seconded, that we petition the Superior Court for authority to hold an Emergency Meeting so that we may immediately raise the money to help in the construction of the new firehouse. The motion was carried by a voice vote.

Joe Lavoie moved and Marion Andrews seconded, that the meeting be adjourned. The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

Compliant to a petition requesting a Special School Meeting, signed by seventy-three people, the inhabitants of the Haverhill Cooperative School District qualified to vote upon District affairs were notified to meet at the James R. Morrill Elementary School Gymansium, North Haverhill, New Hampshire on Monday, November 5, 1984 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon; by five members of the Haverhill Cooperative School Board. (James H. Walker, Ernest A. Towne, Alan P. Page, Carol Norcross and Stephen Whalen).

At 7:30 the Moderator Karl Bruckner called the meeting to order. Volunteers to check the ballot box were E. B. Mann and Tony Smith who inspected the boxes and found them empty. The Moderator sealed and locked the boxes.

The Moderator called the meeting to order and read the warrant. He said the warrant was posted at Indian Head Bank and James R. Morrill Elementary School. He asked if anyone desired the warrant read again. No response. He said "let us proceed". It was decided that peoples' minds were already made up as they had discussed matters between themselves. So they should cut out discussions and debate and bring the issue to vote.

Mr. Kinder moved the Article as stated in the warrant, seconded by E. B. Mann.

Vandy Morrill, former Secretary at James R. Morrill Elementary School, with children attending school, expressed concern about how affairs had been handled. She brought out in a dignified but forceful speech the situation concerning the two teachers, the loss of their jobs, and their active participation in Labor Unions. She told the people the Superintendent Norman Nullen had exceeded his authority in not rehiring the two teachers. She accused the School Board for not insisting on accountability from the Superintendent. She spoke of the money already spent on legal fees, etc., saying there would be more to come. She said this money could have better been spent on the children.

The Moderator asked if there was any other discussion. He then asked the people standing up back to come down and take seats.

Mr. May asked that the chairman of the School Board explain the other side of the situation.

School Board Chairman James H. Walker, Jr. said that four board members back the appeal. The three others, Peter Kimball, Carol Norcross, and Stephen Whalen do not. He said: "I've made no bones that I believe the administration did not handle this case entirely right. But I believe Mr. Mullen's original decision was a good one." Mr. Walker said that Mr. LeBarron was a fine quality teacher and coach, and an asset to the School District. He then spoke of the thirty-one students at high school not needing a full-time teacher so one teacher could cover shop classes at both Woodsville High School and Haverhill Academy Junior High School. Regarding Irving Fountain he said he didn't think he was a very good teacher. He said he often swore at the class, and flew off at the Prinicpal in front of the children. Mr. Walker said he had received many calls from parents complaining about Mr. Fountain. Mr. Walker said he was certainly not against teachers and not against children. He said we have some fine, outstanding teachers who don't get paid for a lot of things they do. He said you can't break N.E.A. It is the second largest union in the U.S. He said John Fessenden gets the best for the teachers in his job. He criticized the person writing reports of the activities of School Board and Superintendent for the papers using them to incite and irritate.

Richard Kinder asked the Moderator to explain what voting 'yes' and 'no' means.

The Moderator said 'yes' meant for the School Board and Superintendent and agents to stop the appeal. No means to go ahead. He said this was an advisory vote but not a binding one.

Mr. Homer May asked if he could ask the Superintendent to speak.

Mr. Mullen said it was not his place to speak because it was up to the School Board.

Moved by Richard Kinder to stop the discussion. Seconded by E.B. Mann.

The people proceeded to ballot. The count found 'yes', 149; and 'no', 97. The motion carried.

The Moderator asked if there was any other business that could legally come before the special meeting.

Mr. Bylow moved the meeting close. Seconded by Virginia Thayer. The meeting closed.

As people were rising, Mr. LeBarron spoke about special laws as litigation involved. People were moving out and further words could scarcely be heard. George Bartzis said something about "...made their point", etc.! Someone asked the Moderator if their School Board was going to make a decision. The Moderator replied: "Not in front of us!" Mr. Tueckhardt made the motion again to adjourn. Mr. Bartzis seconded it.

Pursuant to the Warrant, the meeting was convened at the gymnasium of the James R. Morrill Elementary School, in the Town of Haverhill, N. H. on the twenty-first day of March, 1985, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order by the Modera-Karl T. Bruckner, who said, "I will read only articles one and two, pertinent to our meeting this morning. The remaining articles will be read at the open meeting this evening when we reconvene at seven-thirty o'clock." He proceeded to read the articles. The Moderator then asked Mrs. Jean McKean and Mr. Wayne Dickey to inspect the ballot box. It was found empty and subsequently locked. The Moderator then declared the polls open until seven o'clock that evening to ballot on Articles I and II.

Before the beginning of the evening session Chief of Police S. Savage came to the front of the hall and asked the Clerk, Mary F. Ashley, to turn the check list over to him as requested by the Attorney General's Office at the close of the meeting. This she later complied to.

At seven o'clock, the Moderator Karl T. Bruckner spoke to the well-filled hall. "May I have your attention, please. Is there anyone in the hall, entitled to, who has not voted?" Receiving no answer, he declared the meeting closed until 7:30 p.m. while the ballots were counted. Mr. B. Peter Gould addressed the Moderator and asked if he could have two representatives to oversee the counting of the ballots. The Moderator asked Mr. Towne if he had any objections. Mr. Towne said he had no objections. Mr. Gould appointed Dick Sherburne and Ray Clough. The Moderator asked the Clerk to take account of this. The Moderator appointed members of the School Board, not running for reelection, Robert Maccini, Stephen Whalen, Carol Norcross, and Alan Page, to be ballot counters. Mr. Sherburne and Ray Clough came forward to oversee the process of counting ballots.

The Moderator asked to have the sound machine turned up. Then he said, "May I have your attention please?" This had to be repeated before he had the people's attention. Then he said, "Would you care to listen to me a minute? If you have picked up copies of the Warrant as posted, you will have what will be acted upon tonight. If you follow the Town Report you will be on the wrong railroad line. We are a little behind time but should get going before 8 o'clock p.m."

Mr. Meyers came forward with papers and the Moderator said: "Mr. Meyers has made 'hot copies' of the revised warrant and anyone who has not received them may come forward." They disappeared quickly.

The Moderator said that the ballots had been counted but first he wanted to share with the crowd an unofficial invitation ... "No Smoking!"

Haverhill count found Peter Kimball with 242 votes; George J. Bartzis with 21 votes. Woodsville count found Ernest A. Towne with 140 votes; B. Peter Gould with 142. Moderator with 414 votes. Others receiving votes were Kent Riach, Barry LeBarron, Oland Bylow, James Walker, Corey, and Winifred Moran. The Moderator said that the people should know that there was some talk about irregular ballots.

The Moderator said that now the results of the balloting was over, he would like to get on with the meeting. He said he would like to lay down some ground rules, there was a large gathering and if anything was to be said one would have to proceed in an orderly fashion. He said the article could be discussed. Then he said people must stand up or wave a hand to get attention. He said if you don't want to hear anymore, to cut off the discussion, say, "I move the article" and several other ways of carrying on the procedures.

ARTICLE 3. To hear reports of the School Board, Treasurer and the Superintendent of Schools and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Robert Maccini moved reports be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Seconded by James Hood. It was a vote in the affirmative and so declared.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other federal, state or private sources.

The Moderator asked, "What is your pleasure?" Mr. Richard Kinder moved that it be so authorized, Mr. Horne seconded the motion. There was no discussion. It was a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.

Paul Mayette moved the article. Seconded by Tony Smith. It was a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the district will vote to allocate to the Capital Reserve Fund an amount equal to 50% of the unencumbered balance for the fiscal year 1984-84, said amount not to exceed \$10,000.00.

Robert Maccini moved the article. Seconded by Mr. Bart Mann. Mr. Tony Smith asked why only 50%? Mr. Mullen answered that it could have been 75% but its whatever you people vote. It was a vote in the affirmative as printed. ARTICLE 7. To see if the district will vote to ammend Article 3 of the Articles of Agreement between the school districts of Haverhill and Woodsville to read:

"The Haverhill Cooperative School District shall be responsible for grades K through 12. Grades 7 and 8 shall be at Haverhill, utilizing the present Haverhill Academy buildings. Grades 9 through 12 shall be at Woodsville using the present Woodsville High School facilities. Elementary schools shall be located in Woodsville (Woodsville Elementary) and in North Haverhill (Morrill Elementary). The grade level organization of these schools shall be within the discretion of the school board."

The Moderator said that the vote must be by ballot: 2/3 necessary to carry. The vote can only be taken at a regular meeting after discussion. The motion was moved by Bart Mann. Seconded by Jane Frechette.

The results of the Committee headed by Mrs. Jane Frechette was a plan printed in the Town Report. The Study Committee selected a plan whereby Woodsville would have all grades one through three and James R. Morrill grades four through six. Each town keeping its own kindergarten. There were many concerned questions from people such as Tom Lang, Steve Whalen, Mr. Young, Peggy Estill, Susan Holden, Gerald Bickford, Mrs. Lehman, Mr. Homer May, Jay Holden and many others. Other alternatives were suggested and discarded. The James R. Morrill Elementary School is overcrowded, space is lacking and has safety problems. Many suggestions were offered by the Study Planning Committee. Mr. Kimball said that the board didn't have enough time to evaluate all the alternatives in the month they had been studying the plan. Mr. Bylow made the motion that the article be tabled until studied more thoroughly. The Moderator said there was already a motion on the floor. Mr. LeBarron said,

"If we vote yes, it will give the School Board and Superintendent permission of move our children from school to school." Mr. Simano asked the Moderator, "No matter how we vote, will the School Board accept or do as they want?" The Moderator replied, "I can't answer that, I'm just the Moderator." There was more discussion between Pat Lang and Robert Maccini and several others. Finally it was agreed to vote by yes and no. Time was taken out to count the ballots. The meeting was called to order again by the Moderator who read the results. Total number of votes 318. Necessary to pass 2/3 or 212. Vote found 'no' 210 and 'yes' 108.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money, not to exceed \$99,000.00 for the construction of an addition and renovations to the James R. Morrill Elementary School presently located on land owned by the Haverhill Cooperative School District, for equipping and furnishing said additions, for site development, for architectural and other service fees and for any other items incidental thereto and necessary for the said construction or alterations; to determine whether said appropriation should be raised by the issuance of sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Haverhill Cooperative School District in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. Chapter 33, as amended; to authorize the Haverhill Cooperative School Board to obtain State, Federal or any other aid that may be available; to authorize the Haverhill Cooperative School Board to determine the time and place of payment of principal and interest, fixing the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of note and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith; or to take any other action relative thereto.

The Moderator read the Article. It was moved by Tony Smith. Seconded by Winifred Moran. The Moderator said that this must be by written ballot and passed by a 2/3 bote. Mr. May asked, "What will the money be used for?" Mr. Alan Page replied "It is explained in the article." Dean Hammond asked, "What was the question?" "Not to fix the roof of this building", replied Mr. Page. Mrs. George asked: "Why did we drop this? Where is the other \$17,000.00 coming from?" Mr. Mullen explained about a bond issue and a public hearing. Voting the \$99,000.00 was to avoid a public hearing. He said the renovations downstairs might not be done. but they needed storage and bathrooms for the handicapped, etc. Carol Northrop said, "I feel that the figures are not realistic and recommend against it." Mr. Hood said that in his opinion \$99,000.00 would not be much of a building; the figures are so far off its ridiculous! He said they should go back and do their homework! Mr. Meyers replied that they had done their homework, had a plan that he thought was a good estimate. Kitchen stoves, appliances, etc. just had to be moved to a new spot. Mary Hutchins said she thought every building had a leaky roof. She said money was appropriated last year for rooves; what happened to it? Alan Page said we know what happens to flat rooves. We used part for the Bennett Building. This roof was too much to tackle in one year. Mr. Holden asked: "What kind of roof is going on the new addition?" Mr. Meyers said he was not an architect but they had employed one for sight plans and it looks like a slanted roof, but he couldn't say for sure.

Mr. Mayette said it had been ten years since he worked on the School Board. They knew about the problems in the kitchen then, called it as it was, it should be tabled until further study. Put it back in the hands of the School Board where it belongs. Mr. Mayette made the motion that the article be tabled. Seconded by several voters. The Moderator again explained the meaning of voting yes and no. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 from the Capital Reserve to replace the roof at the Bennett Building. Mike Lavoie said that in 1983 they asked for the same thing. The minutes of the 1983 Town Report concerning this was read by the Moderator. Mr. Lavoie said it was reported that he had been paid for fixing it, but he didn't. He asked, "How come the roof wasn't fixed? Where did the money go?" Dr. Frechette said that no money was used as no money was raised. No money was spent of the Bennett Building. An unrecognizable voice said: "Dr. Frechette didn't hardly answer the question." Supt. Mullen said that there had not been money enough to do both projects, so had tried to do the Alumni Hall project. They didn't raise any money and did not use any of the Capital Reserve in reinforcing the Cupola and back wall. For the construction on the tilt of the Cupola they are waiting for warm weather. A lady, name unknown, remarked that they may have worked on the Cupola, but it still looks as crooked as before.

"If we make the motion to raise \$15,000.00 to repair the Bennett Building," asked David Keith, "will you come back next year and ask for it again?"

Alan Page said that he had gone upon the roof with an Agway specialist and figured it would be done for \$28,000.00. To get 40% from the State it had to have the approval of the State, an architect, etc. He said he felt confident that it could be done at that price. An unknown lady asked when it would get done? She was answered by Mr. Page that it had to be done in spring before July when the books are closed and can't use the money.

Stephen Whalen said that the money should have been used in 1983 when it was appropriated. Mr. Simano asked if there had been a plan in 1983? Mr. Page said a plan wasn't needed then. It is now required. They hadn't planned then on a pitched roof. He also said he forgot to mention that insulation of the roof is included. Mrs. Poliquin asked if this would be put out to bid?

Paul Hunt addressed the Moderator and said: "I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 from the Capital Reserve to replace the roof at the Bennett Building with a two pitched roof." Seconded by many voices. It was a vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of the School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid and Building Aid Funds together with other income; the School Board to verify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriations, in accordance with the formula adopted by the Haverhill Cooperative School District; and the School Board further to certify to the Selectmen the amount to be raised by taxation by each of the two pre-existing school districts.

Mr. Robert Maccini made the motion, "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,214,873.30 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State of New Hampshire together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, and the balance to be raised by taxes by the town. Seconded by Alan Page.

Mr. Kinder said that we had a lot of choices to make, and would suggest a meeting recess for tabled article #8, and the rest of articles as teachers' salaries were still in negotiations. The Mediators have set a date in April, Factfinders in May. Last year it was necessary to call a Special Meeting and this way give us more time. "I make the motion to recess until the first Tuesday in May, May 7th, 7:00 p.m. in this hall." The Moderator said that when this was seconded there would be no further business tonight. The motion to adjourn is not debatable. Mr. May asked the Moderator for the floor. He said "I move that this motion be refused because this year we are being asked for \$1,502,786.00 against \$1,323,274.00." Mrs. Hehre said, "We can't pass part of the budget, its all or nothing." Someone else said, "I move that we adjourn until 7:30, May 7, 1985." Point of Order said the Moderator. Mr. Kinder's motion preempts not debatable. Dr. Frechette seconded the motion. The motion passed almost unanimously at 10:50 p.m. The meeting was recessed.

Due to the motion made by Mr. Kinder, seconded by Dr. Frechette and passed almost unanimously by those voting at the School Meeting, March 21, 1985, we are reconvened at the gymnasium of the James R. Morrill Elementary School, in the Town of Haverhill N.H. on the seventh day of May, 1985 at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening to comply with the remainder of the Warrant for the meeting of March 21, 1985, and Article #8 which was tabled.

The Moderator, Karl T. Bruckner, opened the meeting by saying: "The bewitching hour has been reached. I welcome you all here tonight", and continued to explain the above reason why the meeting was being held.

The Moderator explained that Mr. Kimball made the motion to adjourn this meeting. This, he said, is not debatable, but since so much is involved he

thinks it only fair to have one speaker pro and con on each side. Mr. Kimball explained that the 1985-1986 negotiations have not reached an agreement. At the Board meeting last night (May 6th) the board learned that the Association voted to accept the Factfinder's Report as of 7:30 p.m. tonight. The School Board voted last night not to let the report out tonight. The Board feels that the public should have the Factfinder's Report published in the media. The School Board feels you should vote to adjourn this meeting Mr. Kimball said, "At this time I make the motion to adjourn." Seconded by Alan Page.

The Moderator then announced that there would be one speaker for the opposition as he had stated before. Mr. Mike Ackerman said that on April 6th they had opened the Factfinder's Report immediately so that neither side had any advantage. He spoke very urgently about their side of the situation saying that the people coming to the meeting this evening were intelligent enough to accept it or reject it without more time and money being spent.

It was agreed that because all the facts had not been made public that a Special Meeting should be called in approximately three weeks from today.

Peter Kimball again made the motion to adjourn. Seconded again by Alan Page. The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned.

Pursuant to the warrant for a Special School District Meeting, the meeting was convened at the gymnasium of the James R. Morrill Elementary School in the Town of Haverhill, N.H., on the 28th day of May, 1985 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Karl T. Bruckner, who said he was glad to see the people once again this year. He said he was not practicing legal discrimination, but to make things easier, he would like people who were not legal voters of the Haverhill Cooperative District to sit in the area to their left, or his right. He said the meeting was being held per order of the Superior Court, Presiding Justice William R. Johnson posted May 13, 1985, giving the School District the same authority as at an Annual School District Meeting.

The Moderator, Karl T. Bruckner, said that he had been presented with a petition from ten legal voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District requesting that the Moderator conduct a vote on Article II and III by secret written ballot. The Moderator said: "Any vote on Article II and III will be by secret ballot."

ARTICLE I. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Haverhill Cooperative School Board to expend the sum of \$15,000.00 from the Haverhill Cooperative School District Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing the roof of the Bennett Building; and to authorize and direct the Trustee of Trust Funds of the Haverhill Cooperative School District Capital Reserve Fund to pay over to the Haverhill Cooperative School Board the sum of Fifteen Thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) from said capital reserve funds, all in accord with R.S.A. 35:15-17.

The Moderator read the article as printed. Mr. Robert Maccini moved it be so authorized. Seconded by Mr. Alan Page. There was no discussion. It was a vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

The Moderator, Karl Bruckner, read article II as follows:

ARTICLE II. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$215,642.00 to fund the increase on all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and fringe benefits for the 1985-1986 school year, which appropriation would fund the findings and recommendations made by the fact-finder in his report of 29 April, 1985 and which monies represent the increase in "cost items" over the 1984-1985 salary and fringe benefits.

Mrs. Hehre made the motion to do so. Mike Ackerman seconded it.

The Moderator asked if there was any discussion on the article.

Mr. Whalen said that on behalf of the School Board, he didn't support the base salary of the fact-finder's report. He said that the District was poor and he feels that the teachers are not paid enough but couldn't see any other way. He said he would like to ammend the article to 12-2 base which would be better. Seconded by James Walker.

"What was the 'summer pay'?", asked Mrs. Henson. "10% for the agricultural teacher and two guidance teachers, \$800.00 each for summer work", was the reply.

Barbara Uresk said she thought we had to vote on the fact-finders report as printed. Mrs. Hehre said that we were taking the risk of losing quality teachers. Mr. Ackerman said he didn't know why we bothered to negogiate. He said they started in September 12-2, went to Fact Finders for fair treatment, then came back 12-9; salaries were low; competitive to others. 12-5 was the lowest in fact-finders report. He said the time had come to support the teachers or they will leave. We need new teachers every year, because ours can make more elsewhere than here. "I think figures of impartial people should be accepted", he said.

Al Light asked the School Board to give some information on the Fact Finder's report. School Board member Alan Page said that the Board realizes a teacher's increase is necessary. If the base is to go to 2 the teachers will receive 12.4% increase in salaries. He said it could not be done in one year.

Mr. Rutherford talked about questions confronting the voters and quoted many figures. The Moderator said: "We must restrict discussion." School Board member Mr. Whalen spoke about the position of Blue Cross/Blue Shield and thought it should be in the Fact Finder's Report. Board member Alan Page said that \$8,600.00 basically put into the regular budget was not part of the Fact Finder's report. Mrs. Hehre said that it was put in every year in case of the fifteen day sick leave item. Tony Smith and Mr. May asked concerned questions about fringe benefits which were answered. Mrs. Hehre asked, "What would happen if the article is defeated?" The answer was that when the Fact Finder's report is not agreed upon by both sides, "they must go back to the table and negotiate".

Mr. Bradley Kidder, the School Board's attorney, was allowed to speak for the board on some questions. Mr. Kidder asked if he was a qualified voter. To even things, John Fessendon, the teachers' representative, was allowed equal time. Mrs. Roy moved article II. Seconded by Lois Henson. Tony Smith, Mr. May and Mr. Mullen spoke in discussion.

The Moderator called for a voice vote on article II. He was reminded of the special petition for written ballots on articles II and III. It was a point of order. The Moderator stated we would vote on article II by paper ballot. This was done. "Has everyone cast a ballot who is entitled to vote? I declare the ballot closed." The ballots will be counted."

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator who said: "Number of ballots cast, 216. 'Yes', 90; 'no', 126. Motion defeated."

Mr. Maccini made the motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$131,852.00. Seconded by Mr. Rutherford. It was a vote by paper ballot. Number of ballots cast, 212. 'Yes', 132; 'no', 80. The Moderator declared the Article passed as ammended to \$131,852.00.

ARTICLE III. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials, employees and agents (in addition to the "cost items" appropriated in article II) and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as may be received from State Foundation Aid and Building Aid Funds together with other income the School Board may receive; the School Board to verify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenues and appropriations, in accordance with the formula adopted by the Haverhill Cooperative School District; and the School Board to further certify to the Selectmen the amount be raised by taxation by each of the pre-existing school districts.

Alan Page moved that the sum of \$2,239,272.00 be raised according to the above article. Seconded by Robert Maccini. Mr. Page explained how he came by the figure when questioned by Mrs. Frechette. Mr. May said that the figures given by Mr. Page were not correct. He said Mr. Haskins received \$108.00 per week increase. Mr. Page told him to look on page 163 and see the difference between last year and this.

An unrecognizable woman from the back of the hall asked about differences paid this year over last. Mr. Kinder spoke about equalizing items. The condition of a tractor bought in 1983 was brought up. Dr. Frechette questioned the roof on the James R. Morrill Elementary School. Tony Smith asked if the Bennett Building was to receive a pitched roof. Maccini answered questions. Mr. Steenburgh laughingly said he hoped they repaired a little spot above where he nearly drowned last year (as Town Moderator).

Mr. May complimented the School Board. He said we are not getting the best we can buy, but the best we can afford. He said we didn't have a wire mill in town, as Lisbon does, to help defray expenses. Mr. May asked the teachers and School Board to consider what we are paying in taxes. "With taxes going up, I ask that this motion not be passed." #### PETITION FOR PERMISSION TO HOLD SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

TO THE HONORABLE JUSTICES OF THE SUPERIOR COURT:

NOW COME your petitioners, the duly elected and qualified School Board of the Haverhill Cooperative School District, with a place of business in the Municipal Building, Court Street, Woodsville, New Hampshire 03785, and, pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A.197: 3, respectfully represent as follows:

1. The Haverhill Cooperative School District maintains grades Kindergarten through 12 for the Haverhill and Woodsville school districts. This is in accord with its statutory duty to provide education to the pupils of the Haverhill School District. See R.S.A.189:1-a.

2. The Haverhill Cooperative School Board has been negotiating with the Haverhill Cooperative Education Association, NEA-NH, for the past school year. The parties have been negotiating for a new collective bargaining agreement to be implemented as of 1 August, 1985. The parties have been unable to reach an agreement. As a result of a bona fide impasse between the parties, mediation was entered into but did not result in resolution of the outstanding issue.

3. The Haverhill Cooperative School Board warned the 1985 Annual School District Meeting to be held on 21 March, 1985. See R.S.A. 197:1. At that annual school district meeting, the voters voted to adjourn the meeting until 7 May, 1985, in the hopes that the parties would resolve the bargaining impasse and would be able to present a complete budget to the voters at the reconvened 7 May, 1985 school district meeting.

4. The parties entered into fact finding and received a fact finders report dated 29 April, 1985. The fact finders report makes findings and recommendations relative to an increase in salaries for the teachers in the bargaining unit.

5. By statute the fact finder's "findings and recommendations shall not be made public until the negotiating teams shall have considered them for ten (10) days." R.S.A. 273-A:12 I.

6. The 1985 Annual School District Meeting reconvened at 7:30 p.m. on 7 May, 1985. Since the fact finder's report could not be considered at this time, the meeting was adjourned without establishing or voting upon a budget.

7. An emergency exists in that the Haverhill Cooperative School Board does not have an authorized appropriation for the 1985-1986 school year which appropriation should have been made between 1 March and 25 March, 1985 (see R.S.A. 197:1) and which appropriation must be made as soon as possible in order to allow the Haverhill Cooperative School District to compete for teachers in the spring job market, order supplies and materials in timely fashion for the September opening of the following school year, or pay bills after 1 July, 1985.

8. Further, an emergency exists in that the collective bargaining statute specifically states that the fact finder's report shall be submitted to the legislative body "which shall vote to accept or reject so much of his recommendations as otherwise is permitted by law." (R.S.A. 273-A: 12 III). The school board has rejected the fact finder's report (See R.S.A. 273-A:12 III) and thus the report must be submitted to the voters.

9. At a hearing held before the Public Employee Labor Relations Board on 2 May, 1985, a representative of the Haverhill Cooperative Education Association, NEA - NH, represented that the warrant for the 1985 annual school district meeting was defective. When the PELRB would not hear the issue, the representative stated that the issue relative to the warrant would be pursued through the Superior Court by the teachers' union. Therefore, the special school district meeting would correct any such alleged deficiency relative to appropriations.

10. For the above reasons, the Haverhill Cooperative School Board contends that an emergency does exist and that if the Court should grant this Petition, the articles set forth in the proposed Warrant will read as follows:

ARTICLE I. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Haverhill Cooperative School Board to expend the sum of \$15,000.00 from the Haverhill Cooperative School District Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of replacing the roof at the Bennett Building; and to authorize and direct the Trustee of Trust Funds of the Haverhill Cooperative School District Capital Reserve Fund to pay over to the Haverhill Cooperative School Board the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (15,000.00) from said capital reserve funds, all in accord with R.S.A. 35:15-17.

ARTICLE II:

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$215,642.00 to fund the increase on all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and fringe benefits for the 1985-1986 school year, which appropriation would fund the findings and recommendations made by the fact finder in his report of 29 April, 1985, and which monies represent the increase in "cost items" over the 1984-1985 salary and fringe benefits.

ARTICLE III: To see what sum of money the

District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, employees and agents (in addition to the "cost items" appropriated in Article II) and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as may be received from State Foundation Aid and Building Aid Funds together with other income the school board may receive; the school board to verify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenues and appropriations, in accordance with the formula adopted by the Haverhill Cooperative School District; and the school board to further certify to the Selectmen the amount to be raised by taxation by each of the pre-existing school districts.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray that the Haverhill Cooperative School District be authorized to hold a Special School District Meeting on Tuesday, 28 May, 1985 at the James R. Morrill Elementary School Gymnasium, North Haverhill, New Hampshire at 7:30 p.m., pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 197:3, as amended, and for the purposes hereinahove stated.

#### REPORT OF THE BUDGET ADVISORY COMMITTEE

During the past three months, the committee has held eighteen meetings. Our process of review this year was similar to last year. We received a preliminary proposal. We then held a series of meetings with the various principals and were given written comments from some of the staff. We then worked on the preparation of the budget we are presenting to you tonight. At the January 8, 1986 meeting of the school board, you decided that you did not want a figure for instructional salaries included in our proposal.

At our meeting on Monday January 13, 1986, we were provided with the figures for a current contract base of \$12,400.00 and an '86 - '87 base of \$13,750.00. Using the new figures, we are recommending a 1986 - 1987 budget of \$2,610,995.07. This figure includes the deficit appropriation of \$51,102.04. The percent of increase without the deficit is 14.3% or \$320,621.03. As we reviewed the budget, we identified some of the major areas of increase over which we had very little or no control. They are:

1) Teachers salaries and fringe

(\$13,750.00 base) \$168,835.21
2) Special Ed Program 1200 series 75,807.00

3) Vocational Education 1300 series 23,950.00
513 Transportation

- 4) Regular Ed 1100 series 16,000.00 569 HS Tuition (court placement) 16,000.00
- 5) Office of the Superintendent Services 200-2321 series 27,306.66

These five items represent an increase of \$311,898.87 The committee has budgetted for increases in many areas but we have also made some cuts.

Some of the considerations that we have made in this budget are:

- The continued planned purchase of text books for the school system. We are suggesting that one series be replaced at the elementary school this year. The same text to be used at both sfhools.
- The committee recommends the elimination in the Co-curricular area of the position of Vocational Coordinator.
- We would like the school board to review the Physical Education program in the schools.
- 4) An appropriation which was not included in the repairs and maintenance budget which the committee feels should be placed before the voters as a separate article is the replacement of 3 roofs. (The Community Building at the High School, the gym roof at Morrill School, and the cafeteria roof at Haverhill Academy.) The committee feels the sum of \$80,000.00 would cover the work. There is additional work to be done, but we felt those repairs should wait until next year.
- 5) The committee did not feel the guidance program should be expanded to the elementary school level. We do feel funding should be available for a teafher of Social Science and English at the high school and a primary grades teacher.
- 6) As the committee worked on the budget, we became very aware of just how expensive

quality education has become. As we neared the end of our budget process, the members reached a decision which we feel should be presented to the voters. Therefore, we will be presenting a petition to the school board asking that a warrant article and the necessary meetings be held to allow classes for kindergarten through 3rd grade to be held at the Woodsville Elementary School and classes for 4th through 6th grades to be held at James R. Morrill School on a trial basis for the next two years, ('86-'87 and '87-88). We know that this plan is controversial, but the economic savings to the tax payers is important. Under the current situation in the '86-'87 school year, we will have 4 first grade classes for 63 students, 2 second grade classes for 60 students, 2 third grade classes for 48 students (but 31 of those students are at Morrill School), 2 fourth grades for 50 students, 2 fifth grades for 52 students, and 2 sixth grades for 48 students. Our plan would use only 3 teachers for first grade classes, would allow 3 teachers for the second grade level and would allow the upper classes to be divided evenly. Please refer to the attached information sheet.

This plan as you can see would offer an improved teacher student ratio with balanced class sizes. Some of the savings would come from the elimination of the teacher's aides (an approximate savings of \$24,000.00). We could consolidate the libraries for the grade levels at each school rather than funding dual books. Better use of teaching materials and student supplies that would be shared.

If the plan works, it would provide a solution to the overcrowded classrooms, the need for a library and a special ed room at James R. Morrill School. We have not placed a value on the cost of those renovations but we will be obtaining a figure for you. As you are aware, the State guidelines for education will soon place us in a position where we will have to make those renovations if the town does not find another alternative. We have requested a guideline figure from Mr. Arthur Clough as to the cost involved with the changed bus routes. When this figure is available we will provide it.

We feel this plan saves money and provides for improved educational opportunities. The trial basis will allow the town to implement along term solution to the various problems faced by the school system.

In addition, the committee would like to make the following recommendations:

1) An hourly pay scale for all hourly employees should be developed with increases based on performance. The scales should have maximum which when reached, the employee would then receive cost of living adjustments to their rate.

2) Because instructional salaries total approximately 60% of all expenses, the committee again this year recommends that a performance based salary schedule be implemented as soon as possible.

We would like the school board to inform the committee members of their decisions, opinions, and suggestions. The committee would also like to take this opportunity to thank the teaching staff, other district employees, the school principals, and the superintendants office for their help and cooperation in preparing this budget.

### LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Long Range Planning Committee is expecting to complete two subcommittee reports, from its curriculum subcommittee and the population subcommittee, by the first week in March. In the interim, the building subcommittee is analyzing existing historical operating data for each of the district's four schools and is anticipating additional data from the Superintendant's office by April 15, 1986.

The Long Range Planning Committee's steering committee plans to restructure subcommittees in April, once the building committee has had time to develop its report, to enable the group to more readily compare existing school operating plans to available alternatives.

The steering committee hopes to present to the school board the Long Range Planning Committee's recomendations to the School Board by fall of 1986.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my twenty-first annual report to the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District.

At the conclusion of the 1984-85 academic year Mr. Howard Evans, ateacher and administrator in the district for thirty-seven years, retired. Howard Evans was an ombundsman for kids and always worked for their welfare. His dedication to this district was always 100% and he never asked anyone to do anything he had not done himself. It is fair to say that Howard Evans, for many years has sacrificed his own personal interests in the service of education. Howard has received very little in return save the satisfaction he gained from doing work of benefit to our community that no one else has done, and perhaps could have done. Service of this kind is rare at anytime, and very nearly extinct these days; and the entire community is the better for Howard Evans having lived and worked here. For his unselfishness and devotion we, who have appreciated his work, thank him and wish him well.

This district has not as yet, received its final results of the statewide testing program administered recently. In the near future we will recieve final statistics which will indicate the rating of each school in the state. In other words, we will know how well we stand against the other schools in the state in an educational achievement basis in addition to an athletic won and lost record.

Our school district budget reflects a deficit of \$51,102.04 from the fiscal year 1984-85. It is difficult to point at all areas of the budget that are overexpended and say that these are the reasons. But we will list the areas and readers can make up their own minds:

Income/Revenue amounts received that were less than budgeted:

DATE: January 22,1986

To see if the District will vote to ammend Article 3 of the Articles of Agreement between the preexisting school districts of Haverhill and Woodsville. "The Haverhill Cooperative School District shall be responsible for grades K through 12. Grades 7 and 8 shall be at Haverhill, utilizing the present Haverhill Academy buildings. To see if the district will appropriate the sum of \$25,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund to build a new Butler roof over the Morrill Elementary School Gymnasium. Special Article by the School Board but <u>not</u> with their support:

To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to build a new Butler roof over the Haverhill Academy Kitchen Cafeteria.

In addition to the special article previously listed there will be an article in the warrant to fund all negotiated items for the 1986-87 fiscal year. This new arrangement has been at the suggestion of our legal advisor since the negotiated settlement has become a major portion of the school district budget.

### REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SHCOOLS

I herewith submit my sixteenth annual report to the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District.

Last year the 3-3 plan which called for a redistribution of our elementary school students among our two elementary schools was defeated at our annual school district meeting. A similar plan will appear on the school district warrant this year. The plan will call for grades one, two and three to be located at the Woodsville Elementary School and grades four, five, and six at the Morrill. The kindergartens will remain the same; one at each school. The wording in this year's article stiputates that the plan be implemented on a two year trial basis. Last year it was hoped that the newly formed long range study committee, using information provided by the State Department of Education, could offer alternatives to the situation. Thus far the material provided by the state to the long range committee in the form of utilization studies has merely confirmed what we knew already.

- We are over utilized at the Morrill Elementary School where we have an enrollment of 207 students. There is insufficient space for remedial reading, special education and the school lunch program.
- We are underutilized at the Woodsville Elementary School where we have an enrollment of 160 students and extra classroom space.

In any case the problems for the primary grade students at the Morrill are immediate not long range. For many of them their needs will be met now through the redistribution plan or they will never be met. There are other aspects of this idea concerned with better use of staff and wider options for grouping.

It's a good plan and once again I recommend it for your careful consideration.

Last March a long range study committee was formed for the purpose of studying options for the most efficient use of our educational resources in the future. The committe was subdivided into three major components. A building committee was formed to make a thorough appraisal of our facilities. A curriculum committee is reviewing present programs and assessing future meeds in terms of state standards. The population and public relations committee is attempting to determine how many children we will have enrolled over the next few years. To date the work has involved trying to establish exactly where we stand now with respect to buildings, staffing, curriculum and enrollments. The next step will be to establish priorities and finally to present options to the school board and the voters.

At the end of the 1985-86 school year Mr. Howard Evans submitted his resignation to the Haverhill Cooperative School Board. Howars's employment in the Haverhill Cooperative School District and the pre-existing Haverhill District spanned thirtyseven years. For the past sexteen years he served as principal of the Haverhill Academy Jr. High. Howard was a fine teacher and administrator but most of all he was the number one advocate for his students. His standards for scholarship and behavior were extremely high and he never wavered. Howard had the moral courage to speak out on educational issues regardless of the political climate of the moment. His presence will be missed by co-workers, parents and most of his students.

Our best wishes to him for a happy retirement.

A word of welcome to our new administrators, Ms. Pamela Lewandowski, principal of our elementary schools and Mr. Richard Carter, principal at the Haverhill Academy. Pam and Dick have been valuable additions to our administrative staff.

My thanks as always to the members of the School Board, the principals and their staffs and the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School Distict for their support.

### WOODSVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND JAMES R. MORRILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

In September of 1984, the Haverhill Cooperative School District elementary schools opened their doors on another school year. Woodsville Elementary welcomed 173 students and James R. Morrill Elementary 206. Welcoming the students were two new teachers at Woodsville Elementary -Ms. Karen Jessemen in one of the two sixth grades and Mrs. Karen Aldrich in the fifth grade. At James R. Morrill Elementary, the new teachers included Mr. Arthur St. George in the sixth grade, and Ms. Phyllis Colby and Ms. Susan Jensen in the two second grades.

Under the direction of Principal, Charles Meyers, the schools experienced another successful year and continued their efforts to expand their curriculums and improve their instructional programs. The newly purchased science programs were fully implemented and attention continued to be focused on mathematics instruction. The social studies curriculum was targetted as the next area of concern and a review of the existing curriculum was begun. Sample textbooks were solicited for preview from a variety of publishers in the anticipation of purchasing a new series during the 1985-86 school year.

Morrill Elementary have moved the schools forward along the path towards educational excellence in education is spreading from the secondary schools to the elementary schools and on the state level new and stricter minimum standards are being developed for the approval of public elementary schools. It is thus imperative that we not lose but increase our momentum in effecting improvements in our schools.

Among the curriculum areas that should receive future consideration are language arts, health, and computer education. In the areas of programs and services, attention should be given to the development of a comprehensive program of guidance services and a program for the gifted and talented as well as to expanding the library collection. Lastly, consideration should be given to the performance expectations and values that the schools are communicating to students. Are we placing sufficient emphasis and recognition on academic achievement and more importantly, are we promoting and rewarding good citizenship?

On behalf of the staff and students at Woodsville Elementary and James R. Morrill Elementary, I would like to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Haskins, the Haverhill Cooperative School Board, and the people of the community for the continued support.

As everyone is aware of the scope of responsibilities expected of educational institutions continues to expand. This situation is quite understandable as school reflects to a great degree the complexity of our society today. Schools have had to assume over the years the primary responsibilities of not only meeting the educational needs of our youth but also to provide opportunities for social and moral development. Under the best of circumstances these responsibilities place a tremendous task upon a school system.

Woodsville High School over the years, I believe, has made a conscientious effort to provide the necessary learning experiences which, if accepted by students in the appropriate manner, should provide them with the sufficient skills, knowledge and proper attitudes to enable them to achieve a successful future.

A recent factor that will have a major impact upon our school in the very near future is the "new" minimum academic standards for secondary schools that have been adopted by the New Hampshire State Board of Education. <u>Full</u> implementation of these revised standards (by September 1988) will not only require the reorganization of several of our curriculum areas but also the necessity of the hiring of additional personnel. As we must expand our "elective" offerings in both the English and social studies areas for the 1986-87 school year, we are recommending an additional staff member which will enable us to meet these new requirements. It should also be noted that beginning with the graduating class of 1989, these students will be required to have obtained a <u>minimum</u> of 19 3/4 unit credits to meet the minimum graduation requirements. It now becomes extremely important that students, with assistance from parents and the school, plan their programs of studies very carefully as to enable them to meet the necessary graduation requirements within a four year span.

We had several staff changes at Woodsville High School for the 1985-86 school year. The extracurricular program continues to be a very important and integral part of the educational process. For those students who participate and are committed to its goals, the activity program provides them with numerous benefits, educationally and socially. It is an area, other than the classroom, where students can excel and experience the feeling and meaning of success and accomplishment. Our appreciation must be given to these students who have represented themselves and their school so well; and to our coaches and advisors for their time and effort in making this aspect of education so successful and beneficial.

To complement the regular activity and academic programs we have provided our students with opportunities for computer instruction and field trips to art exhibits, theatre productions, museums, etc. at such locations as Boston, Portland, Maine, Manchester and Hanover, N.H. The educational and cultural experiences and benefits that our students have derived from these activities have been made possible through funds received from the Haverhill Academy Corporation. We sincerely extend our thanks and appreciation to the "trustees" of the "Corporation" for their generous support.

Also to Carole and Walter Young we extend our appreciation for their contributions that made it possible to completely reconstruct King's Plain. We now proudly possess an athletic field that ranks with the best.

In addition to the above support Mr. and Mrs. Young continue to provide generous financial assistance to many of our graduates seeking a college education through scholarships funded by the Carole and Walter Young Foundation. Upon behalf of the scholarship recipients and our school we extend our appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Young.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools, members of the Haverhill Cooperative School Board, the faculty and other staff members of Woodsville High School and the citizens of the Town of Haverhill and the surrounding communities for their continued support and understanding.

I began my second year as school nurse in Haverhill by attending "The Second Annual School Nurse Institute" at Saint Anselms College in Manchester, N.H. in August 1984. The three day program was very informative. Some of the presentations included the role of the school nurse in today's society, learning styles and teaching strategies and chronic illness in children.

In the fall all students participating in sports at the junior high and high school received physicals at school by Dr. David Frechette or privately with their family physician.

The annual immunization survey required by the state of N.H. was completed in October. Most new students were up to date. Those who did not meet the state's minimum requirements were brought up to date by their family physician or at the school clinic.

On October 3, 1984 the Cohase Lions Club sponsored the Preschool Vision and Hearing Clinic at Woodsville Elementary School. Fifty-four children were screened. A special thank you to all the high school students who assisted with the program. I would also like to thank the Lions Club for their willingness to serve the needs of the children in Haverhill.

All hearing and vision screenings were completed and referrals made when necessary. Jill Levy, our speech therapist did retests for students failing the hearing screening. The Lions Club have helped obtain eye exams and glasses when needed. Again I would like to thank the Lions for their continued support.

Screening physicals were done in grades four, eight and eleven. This exam includes a urinalysis, blood pressure and hemoglobin test. Any defects noted were referred to the parents for follow-up with their family physician.

Scoliosis screening was conducted in grades five through eight. This examination is done to detect curavature of the spine. Again defects noted were referred to the parents for follow-up.

The dental clinic was held at Dr. Robert Munson's office in Braford, Vt. Monies for the clinic came from money raised at the school district meeting along with donations from the following organizations: The Haverhill Chapter of the Salvation Army, Woodsville United Methodist Women, and the VFW Auxiliary, Haverhill Memorial Post #5245. Monies donated were used for covering clinic costs and transportation.

In April, the Littleton Home Health Agency conducted a Cancer Awareness Program for the high school senior girls. In May a Venereal Disease Program was presented to students in grades nine, ten, eleven and twelve, again by the Littleton Home Health Agency. I want to thank Julie Hohmeister and her staff for bringing these programs into the school.

In April Dr. Mark Harris of Bradford, Vt. presented information to our elementary school faculties on pediculosis. A film was shown and a question and answer period followed. A special thanks to Mark for taking time out of his very busy schedule.

In April an immunization clinic was held at each school. Students in need of boosters were brought up to date. I wish to thank Linda Chase and Jan Kinder for their assistance with these clinics. In May a film on menstruation was shown to the 4th, 5th and 6th grade girls at both elementary schools. Information on female developement was presented to the girls and a question and answer session followed.

In May kindergarten registration was held at both elementary schools. Parents were made aware of immunization requirements and the need for a physical examination before entering school in the fall.

During the year I attended many pupil placement team meetings and the following conferences: May 7, 1985-An ounce of prevention: Promoting Good Health for our Children and Youth in Concord, N.H.
