HANCOCK 1982

Leafing through numerous newspaper clippings about Hancock in 1982 illuminates clearly the helpful and busy nature of the townspeople. I'm reminded of Shakespeare's words in the Merchant of Venice: "How far that little candle throws his beams. So shines a good deed in a naughty world."

Hancock's people are not immune to the naughty world, with its tragedies, follies and ill will, but they can be justifiably proud of the many little candles in their community which throw their beams in everyday acts of kindness, helpfulness and service.

The library, a vital part of the town, continued to receive generous gifts of money, recordings, memorial books and donations to the Ted Wells Building Fund. Fine art exhibits, arranged for by Sally Hamilton, were hung monthly.

The Village Ringers, a handbell choir directed by George Dechert, continued to broaden its musical abilities, performing in special concerts and at church services.

Many local residents continued to enjoy outdoor events and informational meetings sponsored by the Harris Center and Sargent Camp.

In January, the Youth Group began what was to be a busy year of social service and activities by sponsoring a CPR class for local high schoolers.

The Sportsman's Club's Perley Dunbar award was presented to Dr. Chester Allen for his contribution to the fish program and his all-around willingness to help whenever asked. The organization continues to sponsor a Hunter Safety course, with 20 participants at the March session.

Diane Streeter was named Employee of the Year for her work as assistant dietitian by Pheasant Wood Health Services Center in Peterborough.

In February, a 150-year-old barn at the old Ware place, now owned by John and Ellen Schadegg, collapsed under the weight of heavy snows.

The Hancock Branch of the Monadnock Hospital Auxiliary presented a special birthday celebration program for the Woman's Club, detailing the history of the organization and its contributions and services.

Town officials urged all residents, by letter, to attend the School District meeting in March to voice opposition to apportioning school costs solely (100%) on equalized assessed valuation.

Marian Harrington was elected selectman, only the second woman to be voted that position in the town's history. Voters at Town Meeting cut the proposed town budget by \$10,000, approved the purchase of a new cruiser and used grader, and authorized an increase in water rents to fund a study of the town water system.

The former Designworks building was sold to the First Church of the Nazarene. The building was later leased to Sandhill Wholesale, Inc., a distributor of woodstove accessories.

Bessie Hanson, a resident of the McKerley Medical Center in Concord, celebrated her 88th birthday at a party sponsored by the Woman's Club.

Work continues on the genealogy to the new town history, coordinated by Sheila Adams and Sarah Hutchins.

Budget cutting measures were cited as a reason for new dump hours.

In April, the church choir presented special music for Good Friday — "Calvary", a cantata by Henry Wessel.

Dorothy Otis celebrated her 82nd birthday with a visit to her late husband Earle's families in California and Massachusetts.

Find-Us-Farm, a garden center operated by George and Becky Lohmiller, was opened on N. Elmwood Road.

Sixty people participated in the annual Litter Clean-up sponsored by the Conservation Commission in May.

The Thrift Shop opened its doors for another successful season of fund raising for town, church and scholarship projects.

Selectmen authorized removal of electric lighting from 23 poles in town, another budget cutting measure.

The Town Meeting-approved new approach to the beach at Norway Pond was completed by Adams Construction Co.

United States and State of NH silk flags were presented to the Historical Society, gifts from former Senator Norris Cotton. A U.S. flag, flown over the Capitol, was also received from Congressman Judd Gregg.

A group home service for disabled adults was approved for Mary Fitzpatrick and Janet Holland, Bennington Road.

June was the beginning of numerous wedding anniversary celebrations: Burt and Marion Manning — 60th, Russell and Margaret Meikle — 50th, Bill and Carol Eva — 25th, Barbara and Al Senechal, 25th in July; Sophie and Herb Gardner, 50th in August; Bud and Nancy Adams and Ronald and Elaine Paquette, 25th in August; Norman and Phyllis Phelps, 25th in October; Pat and Glynn Wells, 25th in December.

In July, the Boston Post Cane was presented to Thomas “Burt” Manning, Hancock’s oldest citizen, who was 91 in May.

Fire destroyed a barn at the Harriet Haas home and, in December, a barn at the Sholin Kennels. The Haas barn was “raised” in August by HFD members and volunteers.

HFD purchased a rescue boat with donations solicited from townspeople.

The Depot restoration was reported on track by committee president Jim Curran, following a successful auction in August and other fund raisers throughout the year.

Hancock was “Alive With Music” for the 103rd Old Home Day parade and three-day celebration. A new event this year was a Kid’s Olympics.

The Woman’s Club donated six trees for Main Street and the Common. The trees, along with several others donated by residents, were selected and planted by Our Town Landscaping.

Dr. Herbert H. Uhlig was honored at MIT when a Corrosion Laboratory there was dedicated in his name.

Doug Briggs completed a two-month, 4,400 mile cross country bicycle trip.

Railroad tracks at S. Elmwood were the site of a series of research tests on rail safety by the Federal Dept. of Transportation.

Selectmen and Landfill Committee members applied in September for an exemption to the state’s Solid Waste District Bill, seeking to form their own district. The request was denied in December and selectmen requested a hearing on the refusal.

Hancock High School Class of 1932 celebrated its 50th anniversary of graduation at its annual alumni meeting.

In October, the library celebrated its 100th birthday with an open house and party.

Over 200 area residents participated in the CROP Hunger Walk, which covered an eight-mile course in Hancock.

Hancock’s tax rate was up \$2 a thousand.

The Halloween parade tradition returned after some years of absence, with costume parades by both the Preschool and Elementary School.

School Board representative Linda Kosnick was hostess for an informational open house, with guests Superintendent Dr. Robert Reidy and assistant principal Richard Dalhaus.

Girl Scouts and Brownies now have a newly refurbished meeting room at the Town Office Building. Special credit went to Cadette Terry Koziell, who coordinated and worked on the project to earn the G.S. Silver Award.

Jim Smullen began coaching a boys’ basketball team for students in grades 5-7 in the old high school gym.

A voluntary recycling program for glass, aluminum and cans was begun at the landfill in November.

Selectmen asked the advisory board to look at the problem of the cost of road repairs and to make recommendations for holding down expenses.

In December the town was saddened by the death of 18-year-old Terri Quinlan, killed in an automobile accident on Rte. 123, Antrim.

A tree ornament shower for Holly Bell was given by Tammy Garre to replace ornaments lost in a partition fire at the family's home in November.

A "Hancock School" sign made by Mert Knowles was hung over the schoolhouse door.

Students at the school were active during the year in chess and jogging clubs, a Thanksgiving dinner, a Christmas Fair, a clothing and sporting equipment exchange, and a fifth grade week at Ocean Park.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year has been a very smooth and rewarding year to be a selectman in Hancock. There have been few problems this year, and we seem to be making great strides ahead for looking into the next few years.

The landfill committee has done an excellent job this year in keeping up with the rules and regulations put forth by the State. They have started a recycling program for glass and metal. And, they have been updating the plans for the future use of the landfill.

The water department has also been busy doing a study of the town water system, and having test wells drilled in certain areas of the town. Now they are busy going over the results of the study and the test wells.

The selectmen were able to purchase the rights to a gravel bank in Greenfield this fall, which should assure us of a supply of gravel for the next ten years. With this in mind, and the town's overall indebtedness going down this year, the selectmen are recommending that the town start to upgrade some of the roads that have been in a poor state of repair for many years.

We would like to thank all of the townspeople, the town employees, and the people that serve on various committees that make Hancock a good town to live in.

SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF 1982 TOWN MEETING

Article 1: Harry Casler and Parker Starratt were elected as auditors for the ensuing year; Donald Lancey was elected sexton for the ensuing year.

Article 2: The Town accepted the budget in the amount of \$360,167 for estimated expenses, and the necessary sums for County tax, deduct the revenues and credits and raise the balance by taxation.

Article 3: Ballot Vote — Yes-132; No-189 — Adjusted Elderly Exemption question.

Article 4: The Town voted to authorize withdrawal of \$9,080.63 from Revenue Sharing funds to be used as partial setoff against the interest on the Fire Station Note and the Highway Department Building Note.

Article 5: The Town voted \$1,121.03 to be supplemented by \$7,473.55 from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for 1982.

Article 6: The Town voted to accept and appropriate \$9,576.46 in increased Municipal Highway Subsidy Funds for reconstruction work on Middle Hancock Road.

Article 7: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund.

Article 8: The Town voted against joining the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

Article 9: The Town voted against joining the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 10: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$8,500 for the purchase of a new police cruiser.

Article 11: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$100 for the Grand Monadnock Arts Council.

Article 12: The Town authorized the selectmen to borrow up to \$7,500 for not more than two years to be put with \$12,500 of Water Department Reserve Funds, not to exceed \$20,000 to pay for an engineering study of the water system.

Article 13: The Town voted to pay the Town Clerk an annual salary in lieu of fees.

Article 14: The Town voted to pay the Tax Collector an annual salary in lieu of fees.

Article 15: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$11,800 to purchase and refurbish a used road grader.

Article 16: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$3,268.82 for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Article 17: The Town voted to raise and appropriate up to \$2,000 to improve access to the town beach.

Article 18: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$594.50 for the Mental Health Program of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Article 19: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$400 for a survey of a parcel of land being given to the Hancock Conservation Commission.

Article 20: The Town voted to ask members of the NH Congressional Delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution to "Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries.

Article 21: The Town authorized the selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town tax collector's deed by public auction, etc.

Article 22: The Town voted to ratify the agreement between the Board of Selectmen of Hancock and George C. and Joy C. Bonnefond.

Article 23: This article was postponed indefinitely.

Article 24: The Town voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 25: The Town voted to accept \$1,200 in cemetery trust funds.

Article 26: The Town accepted the reports of the auditors and committees as printed in the Town Report.

Article 27: One individual was dismayed about the timing and content of the selectmen's letter concerning Article #3.

Chief Coughlan offered resolutions for Michael Cass and Christopher Joseph.

It was noted that the Adjusted Elderly Exemption article can be placed on the Warrant in 1983.

Linda Kosnick thanked the townspeople for their input regarding school issues.

Tony Brown offered an applaud to the selectmen for the time they have put in.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the TOWN HALL in said Hancock on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon for ballot voting of Town Officers and all other matters requiring ballot vote; and, to meet at said TOWN HALL in said Hancock on Saturday, the twelfth day of March next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To adopt as the definition of the Flood Plain and Wetlands District the areas shown on the Federal Emergency Management Agency Flood Insurance Rate Maps, and to specify the land uses permitted in that District.
4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: To add definitions of Apartment House, Church, Home Occupation and School, and to revise the definition of Tourist Court, Cabins, Motel.
5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To clarify various land use restrictions.
6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To reorganize the requirements for special exceptions that may be permitted by the Board of Adjustment for Light Industry, Frontage, Home Occupations, and Removal of Clay, Sand or Gravel.
7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To add requirements for special exceptions that may be permitted by the Board of Adjustment for Churches and Schools.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand one hundred fifteen dollars and sixty-three cents (\$1,115.63) to be supplemented by seven thousand four hundred thirty-seven dollars and fifty-three cents (\$7,437.53) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program; or take any other action relating thereto.
9. To see if the Town will accept and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred ninety-nine dollars and fifty-one cents (\$8,599.51) in increased Municipal Highway Subsidy Funds; or take any other action relating thereto.
10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred fifty-one dollars and four cents (\$3,551.04) to the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association to support the continuance of health services now being provided through an agreement

with Home Health Care and Community Services, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a \$2.88 per capita formula; or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred ninety-four dollars and fifty cents (\$594.50) to support the Mental Health Program of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health service; or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the support of the Grand Monadnock Arts Council; or take any other action relating thereto. (By petition)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association; or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed three thousand eight hundred dollars (\$3,800) to landscape the Common in front of the Elementary School, so as to provide a grass play area for children and an improved parking arrangement, as proposed by the Common Commission; or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to disband the 1979 Hancock Bicentennial Committee and allocate a sum equal to the proceeds of Bicentennial memorabilia sales of the past three years (the sum of \$552.36) and the proceeds from all future sales to the establishment and support of a fund to repair the Hancock Meetinghouse steeple clocks; or take any other action relating thereto. (By petition)

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve and Building Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year, or to be expended by the Library Trustees, or to be added to by gifts of money; or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eighty-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$382.48) for the purchase of property for conservation by the Conservation Commission, this money to be allowed to accumulate from year to year, or to be expended by the Commission; or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, a non-profit agency, for the purpose of subsidizing child care costs for working parents; or take any other action relating thereto. (By petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as a setoff against the following debt service.

20. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the proposed Contoocook Valley Solid Waste Management District; or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Recreation Repair and Replacement Fund. All money donated or earned, exclusive of users fees, will be distributed among existing recreation department programs as designated by the donor. This fund will be allowed to accumulate from year to year or be expended by the agents of the fund. The Selectmen will be the agents of this fund; or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Hancock and to the health and welfare of the people of Hancock. These actions shall include: 1) Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990. 2) Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States; or take any other action relating thereto. (By petition)

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the selectmen as justice may require; or take any other action relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes; or take any other action relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town; or take any other action relating thereto.

26. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen; or take any other action relating thereto.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Your Advisory Committee was organized this past year in accordance with the Town Article which established it in 1950 and modified it by Warrant in a later year.

At regular and special meetings, the committee dealt with several subjects to assist the Selectmen in their administration of town activities, plus the routine commitment to review and advise on the line item budget and Warrant Articles requesting funds.

It was the committee's purpose this year to be advisory rather than a stereotyped group of "budget cutters." We have reached in Hancock, in certain categories of town activities, a point at which we must now say, "Pay now or pay later." Today, "later" may cost much more, and in any case, several expenditures cannot be delayed. Our town roads present the best example of money that must be spent now. In the committee's opinion, you are looking at a well-planned and scheduled program to accomplish needed road maintenance.

Finally, the committee appreciates the opportunity to have been selected to represent the citizens in this advisory capacity.

SANITARY LANDFILL COMMITTEE

During the last calendar year the committee has been expanded to contain a fourth member, Ken McLeod. Ken has been a valuable addition to this group.

The committee's activities this year were many and revolved around three specific areas: 1) survey and planning of landfill area, 2) initiation of recycling, and 3) preparation of information for compliance with new State laws.

The committee, with significant assistance from Ted Wells, surveyed the present landfill area for accumulated debris since the last survey performed in 1976. Also, the new area adjacent to the landfill and firehouse was surveyed and a map was drawn up of both areas.

The activity of recycling was begun on November 10 with glass, cans and aluminum being recycled. Since that time 46 barrels of glass, ten of cans and four of aluminum have been recycled (congratulations to all those who are participating and thank you).

In response to the new state law controlling sanitary landfills, the committee submitted a detailed plan (since rejected and appealed) to remain autonomous instead of becoming a member of a regional district. This item will be a major area of work for the committee along with recycling during the next year.

Committee chairman Ralph Neary will step down and be replaced by John Bozogan for 1983.

Throughout the year gifts have been generous, numerous and useful. We wish to express appreciation to all who have remembered the library with donations of money, books, magazines, puzzles and other articles. Some of these contributions have been given in memory of loved ones, both by individuals and organizations. Others, from friends aware of the

library's needs, were gladly-received donations, many to the building fund. A very special present, marked with a commemorative sterling silver plaque, is a beautiful stereo which combines radio, record changer and tape recorder. A special expression of gratitude is owed our library trustees who, without pay, spend countless hours making certain that the building, finances and librarians are all in good repair. A new member has been appointed to the Board of Trustees during the year and she has proved herself with ability, enthusiasm and diligence.

Despite all the good things which can be said about it, 1982 will be remembered most keenly as a year of loss and sadness. Twenty-two Hancock people died during that brief twelve months. Many of them had close ties with the library and all of us who spend time there miss their familiar footsteps and friendly greetings.

The loss of Jack Link, Chairman of the Trustees at the start of the year, was a tragedy to all who knew him. His wisdom, courage and unique sense of fun are unforgettable.

We also miss Sam Lessey. A faithful volunteer, Sam manned the checkout desk every Tuesday afternoon for at least two years. We look forward to his recovery and return.

Looking ahead, the library clan plans to continue to serve the people of Hancock in 1983 and hope it will be a year of health, happiness and peace.

TOWN LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

The library — and the town — suffered a deep loss from the untimely death of Jack Link, who passed away in May. Jack, who had been a Library Trustee since 1978, will be missed.

As the original building was completed in 1882, this was an anniversary year for the library. An open house, with entertainment, was held in October to celebrate this hundredth birthday.

Despite a reduction in Federal and State Funding, and the elimination of the Bookmobile program, along with continued inflationary increases in the costs of operating the library, the staff has managed to keep within the budget and still meet the standards that have made the Town Library one of the outstanding small-town libraries in the State. Because of the income from trust funds generously established over the years by supporters of the library, as well as current donations, the town was only asked to contribute 36% of the annual budget.

The ever-growing increase in population reminds us that the library will eventually need

more floor space, as outlined in the 1974 and subsequent reports. It is anticipated that a major drive for funds will be made at some future date when our national economy is on a more solid footing. In the meantime, the existing Improvement Reserve Fund has been combined with the newer Ted Wells Building Fund, and transferred to the Trustees of Trust Funds for their investment. This fund, designated as "The Library Improvement Reserve and Building Fund" cannot be utilized for any other purpose than "the alteration and/or improvement of the Hancock Town Library Building", and the income from it will continue to be reinvested by the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Continued growth of this fund is considered important to the town, as private funding is much easier to attract when potential donors can be assured that the library is receiving steady support from local sources.

We extend our sincere gratitude to the many volunteers who have given their time and talents to help the librarians operate the library. Some of them have been in the public eye behind the check-out desk; others have worked weekends and during closed hours. They all contribute significantly to the functioning of the library and help to keep our expenses within the limits of our budget.

HANCOCK FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Hancock Fire Department responded to 80 calls from December 1, 1981 to December 1, 1982. There were 5 accidents, 34 medical emergencies, 1 car fire, 2 barn fires, 3 house fires, 9 chimney fires, 2 lost persons, 21 mutual aid calls, and 3 false alarms. Due to an increased number of rescue calls, our training and equipment purchases are being expanded in this area.

Almost all of our 27 members have had either first aid or CPR training, and 6 of the members are certified as EMT's. In addition to our monthly meetings we have at least one evening of training each month. This training includes ladders, Scott air packs, fire procedures, forestry, pump operations, driver training, etc. Several of the members also attend training at the Meadowood Fire School training area.

In an effort to expand our equipment and effectiveness, we held some fund raisers. In August we prepared the OLD HOME DAY CHICKEN BARBEQUE; in November we sold raffle tickets; and we hold the New Year's Dance. We also raffled a boat that was donated to the fire department. Many of the residents generously made the fire department beneficiary of gifts and donations made in memory of their family members that have passed away.

Through our fund raisers and donations over the past 3 years, we have been able to add over \$20,000 worth of equipment outside of our budget requests. A few examples of our purchases are a rescue truck, some medical emergency equipment, ice auger, portable generator, high intensity lights, radios, etc. The Ladies Auxiliary also had raised money for tables, chairs, silverware and other things to help outfit the kitchen.

We would also like to thank Bud Wilder and Wayne Fisher for seeing to all the maintenance to our trucks. It is a big help in reducing our budget costs, and we know all units will be ready when needed.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 with the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

1982 REPORT OF THE HANCOCK PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board in 1982 held thirteen regular meetings and one public hearing concerning proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance and the subdivision regulations.

The Board approved six subdivisions during the year. All were minor in the number of lots involved.

For ballot vote at the March 1983 Town Meeting, the Board has proposed five amendments to the Hancock Zoning Ordinance. One relates to a new definition of the Floodplain and Wetlands District and the land uses in that district. Another involves the addition and clarification of certain definitions. A third amendment makes minor changes in various permitted land uses. The last two are designed to reorganize the provisions for special exceptions that may be allowed by the Board of Adjustment.

COMMON COMMISSION REPORT

Spring of 1982 was heralded in mid-April with the annual erecting of the Fountain, after its several parts had been derusted and given a fresh coat of green paint.

Engaging in some extra-curricular activity, some dead trees in the area of the Common were removed with the cooperation of the State Highway Department, during August. Earlier in the month, a Norway Maple was planted at the southern end of the Common, a gift to the Town from the Woman's Club. Appreciation goes to the Town Highway Department for their almost immediate response to repairing a road cave-in beside the Common to eliminate jarring jolts to autoists.

A "first" was enjoyed by the Common Commissioners by having a float in the Old Home Day parade, giving the townspeople a chance to see the Commission's equipment.

Customary and expected repairs were made during the summer to the aging but defiant Bandstand which yearly withstands the onslaughts of mischievous youngsters.

A plan to landscape the Common in front of the Elementary School is in the making, to provide a grass play area for the children with an improved arrangement for parking, and will be presented at the Town Meeting.

Another year has gone by and the Fountain is once again stored away to await another Spring.
