



The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in theCounty of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell Memorial Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, and purchase of machinery.

5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health, and raise money for the same.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the support of the Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

15. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same, or take other action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Concord Hospital.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain road running from the Bear Hill Road to the farm of Mr. George Faulkner, and vote to discontinue the road from the farm of Mr. George Faulkner to the Patterson Hill Road.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to set out pine trees on the Connelly Place, and raise or appropriate money for the same.

20. To see what sum of money, not exceeding \$30,000., the town will vote to raise and or appropriate for the purpose of building, or re-building the engine house, town offices and fire-proof vault, or take any action relative thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to rescind a motion passed at the Town Meeting of 1952 relative to the appointment of the Highway Agent.

22. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a section of road from the south end of the Iron Bridge through the former underpass to a point ten (10) feet east of the Gulf Brook.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

MEMORANDUM OF AFFIRMATIVE VOTES AT ANNUAL MEETING 1954

Article 3. Voted, that Town Officers salaries for the ensuing year be fixed at following rates:

Selectman, \$6.00 per day. Supervisors of Checklist \$6.00 per day. Ballot Clerks \$8.00 per day. Moderator \$15.00 per day. Town Clerk \$100.00 per year. Town Treasurer \$300.00 per year. Tax Collector 1% of taxes collected.

- Article 4. a Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for highways and bridges, and that the income from rental of Town equipment, less expense of maintenance, be set aside for the purchase of future highway equipment.
- Article 4.b Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of \$4,350.00 to purchase a Loader, and that this money be taken from accumulated income from the Straw fund and used for this purpose, and that future income received by the Selectmen be applied on the Grader notes.
- Article 11. Voted, that the Selectmen are authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 12. Voted, that the Selectmen are authorized to reinsure the Towns' trucks & equipment.
- Article 18. Voted, that we appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be taken from the Straw Emergency fund to build a Town Highway Garage under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen.

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- Article 19. Voted, that the Selectmen are authorized to lease the Town Hall Building to the Davis-Woodman Post No. 78 of the American Legion for quarters and other activities.
- Article 20. Voted, that the Selectmen and the Town Planning Board are authorized to act jointly as a committee to re-construct the Engine House, Town Offices & fire-proof vault; that the work be started and completed as soon as possible after first thoroughly investigating the entire matter, and that money to be used for this purpose, not exceeding \$15,000.00, be appropriated and taken from the income from the Edna Dean Proctor memorial fund. so far as possible, and the Selectmen are instructed to borrow whatever balance is needed to complete the project; using future income from the above-named fund to retire principal and interest and that repavments be at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year or at such other rate as can be negotiated.

Voted, that the Selectmen are instructed to use the money raised and appropriated for building of the Town Offices and fire-proof vault, which was voted for this purpose at the Town Meeting of March, 1953, as far as it will go toward re-construction as voted under the first motion under Article 20.

Article 25.a Voted that we discontinue, subject to gates and bars, a section of road from Colleague Pond road to the Warner line, with the provision that it be kept passable for the forest fire truck.

- Article 25.e Voted, that we discontinue, subject to gates and bars, a section of road from the Frank Durgin place to the Hopkinton line, with the provision that it be kept passable for the forest fire truck.
- Article 25.f Voted, that we discontinue, subject to gates or bars, a section of road from Quaker Street to the Bear Hill road.

BUSINESS

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires — all add up to the *carelessness* that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating *carelessness* so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple — your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.

2. Be sure that all lighted material — cigars, cigarettes and matches — is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.

3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business and our Most Important undertaking! 1954 fire record for our town.

The town of Henniker is very fortunate in having over \$300,000.00 in trust funds. These funds were left to the town by former residents who loved the town, and were interested in it's future welfare.

The income from these funds are used for the upkeep and care of the Parks, Athletic Field, Cemeteries, Schools and the Aid of the poor.

The cost of building the Town Garage and balance on the Loader were both paid from the income of the J. R. Straw fund. This fund was established in 1935.

At the 1946 Town Meeting it was voted to set aside as an emergency fund, 40% of the annual income. This fund is the James R. Straw income fund.

At the last Town Meeting it was voted to use part of this fund to build the Town Garage. This made it possible for the town to have a new garage at little cost to the taxpayer. Besides the garage \$4,275.00 was paid from the annual income for the purchase of a Loader. This income is now paying for the grader. If the town did not have these Trust Funds, our property taxes would be about 11% higher.

REPORT OF TOWN PLANNING BOARD

The Town Planning Board met immediately after the last Town Meeting to consider the Town Garage which the Meeting had authorized. Agreement was reached on site, size, materials and method of construction of this project, which has since been successfully carried to substantial completion by the Selectmen. Cost to date appears in their report

The Planning Board also considered at this and several subsequent meetings the Engine House, Town Offices and Vault Reconstruction project also authorized. It will be recalled that a \$2,000.00 appropriation by the 1953 Town Meeting for Town Offices and a fireproof record room or vault in the basement of Tucker Free Library had been held over the previous year on recommendation of your Board. It appeared prudent to incorporate these improvements with changes at the Engine House to make it a more fire safe structure, provide adeque e space for equipment, etc.

Preliminary estimates of alterations to the Engine House which would provide a reinforced concrete first floor, add about ten feet in length in one story constructi a, fit out basement for offices and vault, provide new en rances, etc., indicated a cost of about \$15,000.00 the amount of the appropriation. Appearance of the building would be little changed.

Some members of the Board felt that it would be preferable to have a new building for an expenditure of this order. After investigation of fire houses recently constructed in other towns and available sites, it appeared that a one story concrete block structure of adequate size for fire house, town offices and vault, could probably be constructed for \$16,000.00 or \$17,000.00 plus the proceeds of the sale of the present land and building. Other members of the Board favored a substantial building for these purposes in keeping with the Library and the High School, probably on the present site. This would, of course, cost considerably more than the sum appropriated.

Finally, in voting on the several alternatives considered the only majority agreement of your Board was for use of the present site, whether for a new building or remodeling the existing one. In view of this, and of the fact that a new and proper vote of the Town is necessary to use Trust funds as voted by the last Meeting, this matter is recommended to your attention for consideration and indication of your pleasure at the coming Meeting.

Some further discussions have been had on Town sewers, and base maps are in hand. Basic data has not yet been compiled, however, and no recommendations are in order as yet.

The problem of spraying shade trees, particularly the elms, has been considered. Losses of trees and considerable town costs for removal are occuring where the Dutch Elm disease has gained a foothold. It is believed that the Town should have a Tree Warden, and appropriate funds to begin a spraying program this year.

Planning Board membership is the same as that of the Budget Committee. In accordance with the original intent, no formal Budget Committee report is submitted, but members are prepared to discuss items of the budget as individuals at Town Meeting. The majority of the Committee approved the budget drafts they reviewed or helped prepare this year.

The State of New Hampshire

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cogswell School auditorium in said district on the eighth day of March, 1955 at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary School Officers for the ensuing year.

Polls open at 9:00 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and take any action relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund and other sources: the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes.

5. To see if the district will vote to approve use of the proceeds from the Dodge Fund for school achievement or such similar awards as the Court may approve.

6. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

This fall we started the school year with a large turnover of teachers in the high school. The new teachers are Mrs. Barbara Proctor, Junior High and Commercial; Robert Deane, English and Foreign Language; Miss Nancy Philbrick, Home Economics and Science, and Mrs. Marilyn Hayward who returned to take over Mathematics and Science after a year's absence. Early this fall, Mr. Economopoulos was released to accept another position and his place was taken by Maurice Boulanger.

In the grade school, Mrs. Edith Hadley returned from her leave of absence and took up her work again with the first grade. Mrs. Nina Buxton has taken over the second grade, and Mrs. Roberta Greenly has been employed on a permanent basis for grade four. Another change has been made in the school staff; that of building custodian. Mr. Norman Greenly has been appointed to the custodian's position in charge of both school buildings. The basic idea is that not only will he be responsible for keeping the buildings clean but will also take care of minor repairs and painting. Norman has done an excellent job. He is a hard worker and has been very conscientious about getting the buildings in good condition.

This year, we are operating our schools in Henniker without any state aid money. Last year it was cut from \$1,650.00 to \$492.99. This year, we did not get a penny. We are, therefore, in a position where our school costs increase but our financial help from the state decreases so that property owners find their taxes increasing each year.

The school population is beginning to show an increase and in the next two years the high school will have a large increase. There were eight seniors registered in September and twenty-seven eighth graders; there are thirteen Juniors and twenty seventh graders, so we will have an increase of approximately twenty-six in two years in the high school. There are sixty-six children in the first two grades which will cause a further increase when they get into high school. The figures for the pre-school drop some for the next four years and these grades should average about twenty-two. Then it increases again with twentyfour one year olds and twenty-eight under one year with about four months to go on the year.

Last year the number of births was the greatest in the history of the United States and it has been exceeded by this year. Statisticians were estimating that the peak of enrollments in the schools would come in 1956. Now they do not know when the peak is going to be reached. Each year we have more children in school and extra teachers must be secured. Teachers have been scarce and each year they become more scarce. This makes it difficult for the small towns to meet their demand for teacher replacement. The students at the teacher colleges who graduate in June are already talking of asking more money for starting salaries than did last year's graduates.

These are indeed critical times in American Education and in New Hampshire Education my sympathies are for the school board members who serve their communities. Increased enrollments and short teacher supplies mean increased costs with a totally inadequate state aid program which means increased tax rates.

I wish to thank the board, the teachers and the people of the community for the cooperation I have received during the past year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, members of the School Board, and citizens of Henniker:

It is indeed a pleasure to submit this report, my first, as Principal of Henniker High School.

As in past years the school has not been without changes — educationally, physically, and in administrative and teaching personnel.

The results of the workshop held at Hopkinton are slowly being put to use as more students are receiving individual attention. More classes are being separated into groups so as to take care of the wide range of abilities within the classes, therefore, avoiding unfair competition between youngsters. More is being done by the teachers with test results, so as to find strengths and weaknesses of each student. It is a slow process and time consuming, but results, thus far are gratifying.

The testing program has taken place again this year in grades 9 and 11. Results, as yet, have not been returned and, meanwhile, we are working with the 10th and 12th grades. Each student is brought into conference, the test's results are explained, best fields of interests and chances of success are pointed out. The weaknesses are also discussed so that these weaknesses can be overcome if they are in an area in which the student is having scholastic trouble. If indications are that innate ability is lacking, the student is guided into some other area of study.

Some attempt is being made in remedial reading. Too many students are having difficulty with their school work because of poor reading habits, lack of fundamentals and skills in reading, poor eye span and various other deficiencies that are conducive to poor reading. In the Junior High School we have made the English period an hour in length, so that more time can be spent at remedial work.

The shop program, which is being utilized by 67% of the student body, has now added two attractive offerings — metal-spinning and silk-screening. These two new subjects, plus the standard subjects of woodworking, auto mechanics, drafting and welding make the shop program one of the most comprehensive general shop programs in the state. The girls' counterpart, home economics, is also being widely used, with classes in Family for 11th and 12th grades, sewing in the 9th and 10th and general home economics for the Junior High School. Undoubtedly, the vocational program in the school is proving its educational value by its wide use.

The rest of the school curriculum has changed but little. However in the Junior High we have changed the schedule somewhat, so that gym may be offered every day. The philosophy behind this change is to expose the youngsters to organized and supervised gym classes, as many of the students at this age do little in the form of exercise. This program has also helped to eliminate double study halls for the 7th and 8th grades. We found that study periods of 80 minutes for pupils at the Junior High level were too long.

Again this year the drop-out rate has been about 10% — much too high a rate at any time. Compared to other schools of a comparable size however, the rate is fairly low. The opportunities offered in a school of this size are ample to satisfy most, and study of the records shows that reasons other than school problems were given for leaving.

As to the graduation class of 1954, records reveal that five of the thirteen graduating have gone on to institutions of higher learning, with two more planning to go on late this year or next fall. Certainly this is an enviable and admirable record. Of the remaining six graduates, two are in the armed service, one is married, one is farming and two are working locally in worthwhile employment. It would be interesting to trace the twelve year history of any graduating class, in any high school. This class of 1954 started in first grade with twenty-five. Twelve years later fifty percent had been lost for one reason or another. This fifty percent is about the natural average loss over the twelve year period.

Physically the changes in the High School have not been big ones, but nevertheless, necessary. A new typewriter has replaced an outmoded one, and two more are expected this year. It is hoped that at least one of our antiquated and worn out sewing machines can be replaced with an up-to-date machine. Room five was attractively redecorated during the summer. This fall the boys' shower room was enclosed in order to stop splattering over the locker room floor. These changes are needed improvements in order to run an efficient and worthwhile educational program.

The greatest change in the school came in the form of personnel. Mrs. Barbara Proctor, who replaced Miss Sally Healy in Junior High subjects and typing, is doing a creditable job. Mrs. Marilyn Hayward returned to teach mathematics after a year's absence. She is well known to the community and doing a commendable piece of workk. Miss Nancy Philbrick, a Keene Teachers' College graduate, is doing a good job in biology and home economics. Mr. Robert Deane, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a year's experience at the Junior High level, is doing a remarkable work in English. Mr. Dwight Baker and Mr. John Kontinos, in Junior High and shop respectively, are back with us. Their work, as in the past, is of the usual high caliber. Henniker is fortunate in having a staff of experienced teachers and ultimate results of the experience can only be seen in the finished product. Despite heavy class schedules the staff is not lacking in professional growth. Mr. Baker and Mr. Deane attended summer school last summer. Mr. Deane plans on returning this summer. Mr. Kontinos took an advanced welding course at New Hampshire Technical Institute this past semester and is planning on a course at Keene Teachers' College this second semester. Your Principal, who replaced Mr. John Economopoulos in October, plans on finishing his work for a Master of Education degree this summer.

Education is not the part time growth of an individual. It is not the cramming of subject-matter for several hours a day. It is the development and growth of the whole individual, each individual different, each with his own needs, interests and aptitudes. Treating the whole means close co-operation between school and home. Alone we can treat only a part — together we can accomplish much.

I would like to express my thanks and gratitude to the Superintendent, the School Board and especially to the parents, many of whom were interested enough to come in and discuss the problems of their children. Co-operation of all is needed in order that the children may receive the best that the school can offer. What is good for the child is and should be our sole desire.

A total of 17,427 lunches were served to children, 1,593 more than last year, and the number of lunches served to adults was 1,192, or 93 more than the previous year.

The Federal government extended milk program began in December 1954 with an increased consumption of an average of 45 one-half pints daily. This milk is available at recess or at noon to all who wish it. The cost to the child is four cents each one-half pint, and there is a four cent reimbursement per bottle from the federal government. At Christmas five children were given milk for four weeks by a local charitable organization.

There may be some misunderstanding in regard to surplus foods. These are given by the federal government and are used in the general program to supplement foods purchased, so that better menus may be served. These surplus foods are thus made available to all children participating in the program.

Children unable to pay for lunches may obtain them, provided the School Nurse and the Manager of the Lunches approve. This year there are only six on the noncontributing list.

New lighting fixtures were recently installed in the kitchen and store room, for which we are grateful.

Any one is privileged to visit the program or talk with us at any time. Although there is still money due from last year from a few, almost all do their part.

We are grateful to the Superintendent, the School Board and the teachers for their help and cooperation.
