You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

Polls open at 1:00 p. m. and close at 9:00 p. m.

The articles in the Warrant will be taken up at 8:00 p. m.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, repair or purchase of machinery.

5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health, and raise money for the same.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

15. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same or take other action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$962.00 for the support of Concord Hospital.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to engage legal advice on matters pertaining to the Hopkinton - Everett Dam, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Planning Board.

Article 2. VOTED, that the Reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees be accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate:

Article 4. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000.00 for the repair of highways and bridges and purchase of machinery.

Article 5. VOTED, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,100.00 for the support of the District Nurse; \$2,800.00 for salary and \$300.00 for transportation.

Article 6. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to defray the expense of observing memorial Day.

Article 7. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of Tucker Free Library.

Article 8. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for maintaining the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Article 9. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

Article 10. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Article 11. VOTED, that the Selectmen are authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. VOTED, that this Article be dismissed.

Article 13. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,164.28 for State Aid Construction of Class 5 Roads.

Article 14. VOTED, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

Article 15. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to maintain the Town Dump.

Article 16. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 17. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$874.00 for Concord Hospital.

Article 19. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for improving the street Fairview Avenue.

Article 20. VOTED, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 and use the unexpended balance of \$150.00 in fund for removal of Proctor Memorial Fountain, for Street Signs.

Article 22. VOTED, that the Town accept "Hope Road."

Article 23. VOTED, that the Selectmen are authorized to sell the Box Shop gravel bank by sealed bid with right to reject any and all bids.

Article 24. VOTED, that this Article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 25. VOTED, that we raise or appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a truck for the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT. That we raise \$2,500.00 by taxation and take the balance from the income from the STRAW FUND that is paid to the Town each year.

Article 27. VOTED, that this Article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 28. VOTED, that we take up Art. 29 before acting on this Article.

Article 29. VOTED, that the Town establish a Planning Board of seven (7) members, with powers and duties as set out in Chap. 36, Sections 1-15, N.H.R.S.A. 1955; said Board to consider present needs and orderly development of the town, prepare such zoning or other regulations as may appear necessary in the manner prescribed by law, and submit its recommendations (if any) to subsequent Town Meetings.

Article 28. VOTED, that this Article be referred to the Town Planning Board for study and recommendation.

Article 30. VOTED, that this Article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 31. VOTED, that articles of the Town Warrant be taken up in the evening at future Town Meetings.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

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According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

REPORT OF THE TOWN PLANNING BOARD

At the Town Meeting held March 11, 1958, voters approved a Planning Board to consider the needs and orderly development of the community. In accordance with existing New Hampshire enabling legislation, Selectmen created a Planning Board constituted as follows:

Harold Ayer, Karl F. Connor, Irving Goss and Henry J. Hope. Thomas A. Cullen was made the Selectman Representative. Ben Weeden was elected Secretary and Victor Kjellman, Chairman.

Numerous citizens have contributed of their personal energy and resources to further the work of the Board in the capacities of assistants and consultants.

Jack Hake, 1958 graduate of New England College as Assistant. Mrs. George Sanborn, Publicity; Gustave Bochert, Highway Planning; Adolphus Holton, Water and Sanitary Planning; Carl French, Recreation; Diamond Maxwell, Commercial Developments; Mrs. George M. Chase, Secretarial Work, and Dr. Harold C. Downes, Photographic Work.

Tremendous interest was indicated by the numerous high school and college students, residents of Henniker and members of the Hopkinton and Hillsboro Planning Boards who attended our eighteen meetings and were very helpful to us in our deliberations.

In addition Fred Auer and Dave Fosburgh of the New Hampshire Development Public Works and Highways, Gustav Lehtinen, City Planning Engineer, Concord, Robert Frazier, Resident Flood Control Engineer for the U. Sed. U. S. Army and Drs. Robert L. Campbell and H. Raymond Danforth met with us to help us in our work.

The Planning Board hopes to meet with Civilian Defense, School Board and Budget Committee representatives as well as with representatives of the State Board of Health and Water Resources Board this year.

Accomplishments thus far consist of preparing such basic data as land-use maps and traffic count studies. When these are complete the Planning Board will be one step nearer to the solution of some of the most pressing problems.

In the near future the Planning Board hopes to offer this community a zoning ordinance specifically designed to fit the needs of a small town. This is believed especially necessary to protect this community in view of the growth of New England College, flood control and the construction of new highways all around us.

Also, we hope to be able to make specific recommendations to the Highway Department concerning the proposed relocation of our main arteries.

We are working to have our water and sewerage systems plotted and to create an official Town Map.

Again we may need your help! Be assured that we shall not hesitate to ask for it as we did last year. We hope you will respond. If there are some of you who want to help do not hesitate to advise us.

Planning is not a one man job - it is everybody's job.

The above figures will show what the enrollment will be in Henniker High School provided we have no drop outs and no increases in the present classes that are already enrolled in school. We will of course have some drop outs, but we will have some normal increases too. In addition we have two factors which should tend to increase our enrollment. One is the growth of New England College and the other is the new highway which is coming as far as Hopkinton and the proposal to rebuild Route 202 because of dam construction in Hopkinton. The latter will permit people to more easily commute from Concord and Manchester. The dam in Hopkinton may affect us some temporarily, due to men working on the dam and moving their families to Henniker.

Some of the classrooms in the high school are crowded now because the rooms are smaller than the normal high school classroom. The following table will compare the present classroom with what is considered desirable size classrooms. With classrooms now crowded and indications that our school population is increasing, means that Henniker will have to provide more space.

Increased enrollments and need for increased space means more money to operate the schools, and in New Hampshire that means more money from the person who owns real estate. In the next legislature there are two bills which will be presented which will give a small amount of relief to the local taxpayer. One will be a bill asking for State Aid for transportation which is a large item in our budget. Another bill to be introduced is a flat grant aid of \$10 per pupil for all school districts, which would amount to approximately \$3,000 for Henniker if the bill were passed. There will also be some Federal Funds on a matching basis to buy equipment for Science, Mathematics, and French.

Cost of education continues to rise not only in New Hampshire but throughout the nation. Increased teacher salaries is one major factor. Although the salaries of New Hampshire teachers is well below the national average, teacher supply is not appreciably better and in some categories the shortage of teachers is very serious. Beginning teachers press for higher salaries each year and demand better working conditions which makes it difficult for small communities with limited tax bases. When a community has to add building costs and hire additional teachers to meet the swelling population the tax rate begins to jump. Yet we have demands on a national scale for more and better school programs in order to counteract the spectacular results of the Sputniks.

One of the solutions that is being tried is the consolidation of small high school districts into larger units so that a richer high school curriculum can be offered and taught by teachers who are specialists in the field. The idea has been gaining momentum in Massachusetts, but progress has been very slow in New Hampshire. However, more people are becoming interested in consolidation and

feel that it is the only answer for small high schools.

There is a serious study going on involving New London, Sunapee, and Andover which have small high schools plus several small towns who do not have high schools. There is considerable interest in the program, and a great deal of work has been done by the committee. The three large towns have accepted it conditionally, but whether they can overcome the prejudices and fears is questionable.

There have been several changes in the high school staff this year. Mr. Raymond Demars is the new shop teacher replacing Mr. Brennon and a series of substitute shop teachers. Mr. Clifford Richer replaces Mr. Kasairas as English and Social Studies teacher. Miss Jean Babson is the new commercial teacher. There were no changes in the elementary school this year.

There is a definite trend toward delaying the entrance of children into the first grade. Research indicates that the best age to begin to learn to read is six years and six months, and yet some children enter school at the age of five years and eight months, almost a year before most children are ready to learn to read.

The present regulation in Henniker states that a child must be six before the following January 1st. A move is under consideration to require that a child be six years old before he enters school. If adopted, this policy would go into affect in September of 1960.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of schools, members of the school board, and citizens of Henniker.

It is a pleasure to submit my second annual report to the above named persons.

The enrollment of the junior and senior high school seems to be increasing each year. We now have 125 students, 81 in the high school and 44 in the junior high school. This is a total increase of 13 over last year. To further develop this picture, we anticipate an influx of 30 or more students for the next two years. This means we can expect a plurality of 14 next year and 17 the following year. These facts dictate the necessity for investigation into the possibility of expanding the present plant. Most pressing is the inadequate size of the class rooms. What the building of the dam, re-routing of roads, and anticipated growth of the college means in terms of school population can only be a theoretical guess. It would appear to mean future growth in all aspects of community living.

On June of last year, fourteen students passed through the doors of Henniker High School and out into society. Once again most of the graduates are furthering their education. Four are attending college, one is training for technician, one is studying in the commercial field, and two are attending hair styling school. Of the remaining six, one is married, four are working and one is in the service. By projecting the plans of this years graduating class, it would appear that for the past two years, 50% of the classes go on to further training. This, of course, is a fine record.

Once again we are fortunate to have a competent staff. Mrs. Woollett again heads the English-Language department. Mr. Lord, who was incapacitated for a short while due to an appendectomy, is in charge of our Math-Science program. Mr. DesRoches continues to handle Social Studies, Music, Math, and Band. Mrs. Simpson directs our Home Economics curriculum as well as instructing in Biology, Art, and coaching the cheerleaders. Mr. Alex Craig was with us the first semester as a student teacher in English.

In my report to you last year, I mentioned a continuing effort for more guidance. I am happy to say that all high school students did and will receive some assistance in vocational selection. We have instituted achievement tests in all of the major subjects areas. These tests are used in many ways. Juniors are being encouraged to take the National Merit Scholarship test, for this is an excellent indicator of college success. We have expanded our vocational resource material so that students may investigate the various fields of interest. We now have information on a greater number of colleges than in the past. The increased importance of the guidance area is due to the fact that our society is so demanding and complex that students, with the aid of home and school, should be exposed to the varied choices that lie before them and be able to make some reasonable decision prior to graduation.

Other evidence of growth is present. We now have a Physical Education program that most may participate in. Commercial courses are now being offered as well as Art, Auto club, Drama club and two periods of Band. Our library is much improved and books are constantly being purchased to continue this improvement. A curriculum change will take place next year that will eliminate Latin.

and add a third year of French to our program.

What the future holds is mostly conjecture. However, we will continue to be deeply concerned and alert to the improving of learning situations as well as resource material. This concerted effort to make Henniker High School a better place to learn can only be realized if the community shows interest, co-operation, and understanding. Let us work together for we have the same goals in mind. Prepare the youth of America to think and act intelligently and we will have a finer country.
