STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1 To choose a town clerk.

Article 2 To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3 To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4 To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town and payment of statutory obligations of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 5 To see if the town will vote for a discount of four percent for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes if paid on or before July 1, 1933.

Article 6 To authorize the selectmen to issue interest bearing orders or notes to provide for the current year expenses in anticipation of taxes. Article 7 To authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

Article 9 To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of said town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10 To see if the town will vote to grant permits to druggists for the sale of liquor in said town for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes, under the provisions of chapter 144 of the Public Laws.

Article 11 To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of chapter 163 of the Public Laws relating to licensing the sale of milk and cream.

Article 12 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to confer and agree with the precinct commissioners and the water and light commissioners of Woodsville to consolidate the positions of tax collector and water and light collector and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13 To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

We submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1933. Upon the following pages will be found the detailed statements.

The reason for the increase in our indebtedness for the past year is the increase in the cost of the town poor.

All our assets consist of real estate bought by the Town for the taxes, plus amounts due from the State and County.

By an act of the 1931 Legislature the tax collector was obliged to deed to the Town during the year all property with unpaid tax over two years old. The collector extended the time of payment to twelve o'clock noon of December thirty-first to give all interested parties all possible chance to redeem their property.

Now we find ourselves with deeds of about twenty pieces of real estate, which the tax commission advise cannot be redeemed. For this reason we have inserted article 8 in the warrant, which if adopted will enable us to sell the property back to the original owner, if that person is in a position to purchase. If the original owner cannot purchase we will be obliged to sell to some other purchaser or rent the property.

We wish to call to the attention of the tax payers that the collector will be obliged to do the same thing this year on all property of the levy of 1930.

We wish to extend a great deal of credit to the taxpayers for their cooperation in the payment of taxes during the past year.

Taking into consideration that it was a very hard year to raise money for such purposes the Town of Haverhill collected in current and previous years' taxes, more than the entire amount committed for the year 1932, which we think was remarkable. There is always a question regarding the large amount paid the collector in the item of Town Officers' Expenses, amounting this year to \$682.41. We wish to explain that \$531.41 of this is returned to the Town in the collection of costs on previous years' taxes, the balance being for clerical work.

We wish to make another explanation as to the difference between uncollected taxes and taxes bought by the Town.

A great many taxpayers carry the idea that taxes bought by the Town are uncollected. The Town of Haverhill has no uncollected taxes, nor has it had for the past ten years.

"Taxes bought by the Town" are not uncollected taxes. The collector receives a check from the Town for all property bought by it the same as he receives a check or money from each individual that pays a tax bill or makes a purchase at a tax sale. The town gets its return for this expenditure through redemption by the property owner or through a deed from the collector of the property.

The foregoing Summary of Receipts and Payments as compared with a budget is submitted by your Finance Committee with recommendations—That in addition to the State, County and Poll taxes provided by law, the Town raise the sum of \$15,866.15 and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended in accordance with the foregoing budget as presented by the Finance Committee. The above amount was arrived at as follows:

The Budget set up for last year and the vote passed at the Town Meeting carried an appropriation of \$20,662.80 to balance the Budget.

In the Budget were included items to cover State Aid and Trunk Line maintenance to the amount of \$6,000.00. Before the taxes were assessed it was determined that the above mentioned items would not have to be used and they were deducted and taxes for 1932 were levied on a basis of \$14,662.80 to balance the Budget instead of \$20,662.80 as voted.

The difference between actual receipts and disbursements during 1932 show a deficit of \$2,957.85. The amount needed for support of town poor exceeded the Budget by \$5,574.56 against which a credit of \$1,200.00 received from the State for relief of families of unemployed should be applied. The present situation makes it necessary to increase our budget for this account \$2,000.00 over last year's estimate. The County tax exceeded the Budget estimate by \$1,768.57 and from what information we have we believe it wise to allow \$12,000.00 to take care of this item or \$2,000.000 more than last year.

Automobile permits fell off \$1005.00 from Budget estimate. Against the above we saved on sixteen items in the Budget for a total of \$3,640.52.

The expenditure on town highways for last year was \$1,968.93 less than Budget estimate and as this is available for 1933 the Selectmen inform us they can get along with an appropriation this year for town highways of \$10,000.00.

We believe the policy of allowing a discount on prepaid taxes should be continued but as advantage of the discount offered was largely taken at the first date we would recommend one discount of 4% to be allowed for the prepayment of Real Estate and Personal Property taxes if paid on or before July 1, 1933.

The School Districts are effecting a 10% cut in salaries and through the cooperation of the Selectmen and District Commissioners we are assured that this same cut of 10% will be carried to every other officer in town.

Article No. 8 suggested by the State Tax Commissioners has received our careful consideration and we recommend its adoption.

Again we are appreciative of the cooperation and support given us by all the various officials.

February 6, 1933, I hereby certify that I have examined the books and accounts of the Commissioners of the Water and Light Department, of the Treasurer, and of the Fire District Commissioners, and find the same correctly totaled and propertly balanced. I further certify that on February 6, 1933, in the presence of the Treasurer and one of the Fire District Commissioners, I have burned the following paid obligations of the Woodsville Fire District:

Electric light loan bond No. 10, series of 1922 due July 1, 1932, \$1,000., with all coupons outstanding to date: Water loan bonds Nos. 28, 29 and 30, series of 1922, due July 1, 1932, \$1,000. each, with all coupons outstanding to date; Water loan bond No 7, series of 1924 due May 1, 1932, \$1,000, with all coupons outstanding to date: Electric light loan bonds. Nos. 13 and 14, series of 1924 due May 1, 1932, \$1,000. each, with all coupons outstanding to date; Water loan bonds Nos. 9, 10, 11, and 12 series of 1929, due February 1, 1932, \$1,000, each with all outstanding coupons due prior to February 1, 1933, except coupon No. 7 to bonds Nos. 61, 62, 63, 64, 65, 66, 69 and 70 as reported by the Treasurer, and there is a balance in the Woodsville National Bank of \$180.00 on the bond account to pay these outstanding coupons.

The sum of \$7,105.00 has been deposited in the Woodsville National Bank to pay bonds and interest due February 1, 1933, being Nos. 13, 14, 15 and 16 series of 1929, \$4,000. with coupons on bonds Nos. 13 to 150 inclusive, \$3,105.00.

This present year the enrollment has been 489. The teachers are as follows: Senior High School—Headmaster, G. Hampton McGaw, languages, history; Submaster, William Bryant Jr., science, mathematics; Lillias R. Warren, English, Latin, history; Marian E. Fenerty, domestic arts; Marion F. Eastman, commerce; Esther B. Lord, English, French; Bertha Davis, English, history; Howard F. Mason, mathematics, science.

Junior High School: Principal, Nettie McCoy, grade eight with music and mathematics in grade seven; Winifred Sargent, grade seven with science and French in grade eight.

Elementary School: Helen A. Franklin, grade six; Mary M. Mann, grade five; Marjorie E. Deming, grade four; Muriel Ellingwood, grade three; Mildred E. Emery, grade two; Florence Lang, grade one.

Alice M. Brown, music; Larkin Hosford, leader of the orchestras; Lottie M. B. Underhill, school nurse; William Burbank, Earl Whittier, and William Fillian, janitors.

We have had a number of problems arise this year due principally to the large enrollment in the high school. The laboratory and the commercial rooms are both crowded. By removing some partitions the laboratory could be made larger as could also the typewriting room. Both these alterations would cost but a small sum. The installation of recitation chairs equipped with tablet arms would make possible much more thorough work for the large classes which have to meet in the assembly hall.

We much appreciate the help given by friends in putting on food sales for the athletic association and for furnishing transportation for the teams. It would be hard to measure the benefit done by the milk supplied by the women's clubs and the clothing sent in by many people.

We earnestly solicit the continued cooperation of parents and friends during this time of shrinking appropriations. It is far better to keep the young people engaged in school and wholesome recreations, than to let them suffer from the demoralizing effects of idleness.

For a more detailed account of the activities of the high school and for reference to the long and faithful service of Mr. William Burbank, who died this winter, I would call your attention to Mr. McGaw's report.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my fifteenth annual report of the Woodsville High School, for the year ending January 20, 1933. Last year we recorded one hundred seventy-four pupils, and suggested that two hundred could be accommodated to the mutual advantage of all; this year two hundred and two have been registered. Nor can all this increase be attributed to the much mentioned depression, for only ten former graduates are among the number.

There are thirty-nine seniors, forty-five juniors, forty-three second year, and sixty-four first year, and eleven special pupils. The tuition list contains ninetythree names from eleven districts.

We have had the usual early winter epidemic of illness, yet forty-two pupils have been present every session during the first half of this year.

The thirty-sixth graduation last June made the total number of graduates five hundred and fifty-four. The Class of 1932 had twenty-nine members—Hazel A. Butson, Augusta J. Caravatti, Mildred L. Carpenter, Lawrence E. Davis, Elizabeth E. Davison, Mary L. Dearborn, Clara M. Dodge, Adella M. Duca, Bernside R. Farquharson, Harold N. Heath, Charles A. Irwin, Fred I. Jewett, Dorothy L. Mann, John A. Mann, Doris A. Martin, Frank M. Platts, Oreste R. Rosa, Bertha N. Snelgrove, Evelyn O. Stowell, Martha L. Thayer, Aurelio H. Venturini, Marion H. Wallace, Albion L. Weeks, James E. Wheeler, Richard L. Wheeler, Chester R. Whitcher, Claude K. White, Robert N. Wright, and Anna C. Zambon.

Oreste Rosa was counted first in scholarship rank, and Elizabeth Davison was second. To Frank Platts was awarded the Alumni Attainment medal, presentation being made by H. K. Davison of the class of 1911. The Perley N. Klark Music award for general efficiency and faithful service was presented to Elizabeth Davison.

There appear to be thirty-one recent graduates in colleges, normal schools, and other training institutions. To celebrate Education Week last fall three voluntary classes were started, astronomy, Bible, drawing, each appealing to a group of pupils who want to know. Rev. O. M. Polhemus and Miss Flavia Colby, interested citizens, have given generously of their ability as instructors. No expense has been incurred in conducting these classes.

A chapter of the national literary society called Quill and Scroll has been formed and there have been elected to membership three eligible pupils, Mildred Carpenter, Elizabeth Davison, and Martha Thayer. One great advantage of these organizations is the fellowship that arises in later years when meeting with other members who have similar interests.

Activities outside the class room program include a junior exhibition of public speaking; editing the Cycle; baseball; football; basketball, field hockey for girls; ice hockey for boys; orchestra; band; lyceum programs of music and dramatics; winter carnivals; scholarship day at Plymouth; a delegation attending the annual journalistic convention in New York; junior promenade; preparing daily lunch for fifty persons during the winter term; participation in patriotic community programs; and taking part in many other community social features.

There are many demands upon the time of our young people. It is to be much regretted that so little thorough preparation is made out of school hours. Thoughtful persons see that high school days are the time for storing the mind with consecutive ideas that give the power to think, rather than frittering away opportunity upon trivialities. It is probably as needful to consider one's outlay of time as it is to balance the financial budget.

A good record, a favorable attitude, and a pleasing impression are still the valued means toward success. These things the school gives opportunity to achieve. Wm. W. Burbank, the janitor, died on January 3, 1933. He had done some of the usual vacation week cleaning, and then feeling unable to continue, had sought admission to the local hospital. Mr. Burbank had given more than sixteen years' service, over a quarter of his life time. He took particular pride in the neat appearance of the building. For many years he made his living quarters in the schoolhouse and was thus on duty day and night. On several occasions his presence prevented transients entering the building and probably doing damage, and thereby he saved money for the district. He had come into close contact with some thousand pupils, who will miss "Bill", and who will long remember his general sense of fairness and desire to have things right.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HAVERHILL

We, the undersigned members of the Haverhill School Board submit the following report:

We wish at this time to call the attention of the voters to the large cash balance appearing in our Financial Report of June 30 of last year. The insurance on the Pike school building of \$4,000.00 is included in this amount. Last year's report indicated a probable balance of \$2,500.00 at the end of the year. This amount was reduced by \$600.00 which we expected from the Trustees of Haverhill Academy, but which was not paid. At our suggestion the payment was deferred until January that an additional six months of interest might accrue, and that in the future the payments should be made in January instead of June because the need is always greater at that time. Thus our estimate of last February was less than \$100.00 from the actual balance of June 30. Our budget this year indicates that we expect to close our accounts in June with a small balance on hand in spite of this reduction in our income. We also wish to call the attention of the voters to the particular items of the budget rather than the whole amount of the assessment required to balance it. The assessment is slightly more than last year. A study of the individual items shows a decided decrease in the proposed expenditures for operating expenses. The difference in the amounts of the June balances and the first payment of \$1,000. and interest on the Pike school building account for the increased assessment.

The building of the new school was the outstanding project of the year. Probably it will be remembered that the building burned between the time of the posting of the school warrant and the meeting itself. It was therefore impossible to take any action at that

time except informally. It was proposed however, that the School Board proceed with the plans for building not to exceed \$6,000.00, and submit their findings at a special school meeting to be held when such plans had reached a definite point. After spending some little time and thought, to determine just the sort of building seemed best suited to the needs, we employed Mr. Merton A. Fletcher of Claremont as architect to work out plans and specifications which were submitted for bids and the successful bidder was the C. D. Marsh Construction Co. of Woodsville. It was found necessary to petition the Superior Court for authority to appropriate money at a special school meeting, which was done, and \$2,000.00 was appropriated in addition to the \$4,000.00 insurance money, and it was voted that the School Board be authorized to build the school house at a cost not to exceed \$6,000.00. We are pleased to report that the work was carried out very successfully and that a thoroughly modern up-to-date building was completed ready for occupancy at the opening of the school year in September at a total cost of \$5,954.44. The \$2,000.00 was borrowed from the Woodsville Guaranty Savings Bank, payable in two installments of \$1,000.00, each with interest, the first of which appears in the budget.

The School Board is taking this opportunity of publicly expressing its appreciation of the work which is being done at Haverhill Academy by Mr. Jenkins and the other teachers in promoting the extra-curricula activities of the school. The general public should realize that it is a remarkable achievement to provide a school with its athletic teams, its band, orchestra and glee club, see that equipment and instruction are provided and pay the whole cost through the united efforts of the school and its teachers. The expense of this program has been gradually increasing from year to year as new undertakings are developed and may reach the total of \$1,000.00 per year in the very near future. Let us remember, as taxpayers, that most towns are making appropriations to care for these expenses. We are not.

In this connection we would bespeak for the Academy better support from the parents and general public. Altogether too few parents are present at public affairs held by the school. Too little is known about what is being accomplished. It is not enough to vote an appropriation. Personal interest on the part of every townsman is a big asset.

In closing, we call attention to the fact that we are this year omitting the usual statement of the "Haverhill Academy Account" which has been published in the past. The figures in these statements are taken from the Financial Report and are merely a repetition under the present system of accounting. The figures in the Report satisfy in all respects the agreement with the Trustees of Haverhill Academy with the deduction of the tuition paid to Woodsville. The retiring member of the board is Dr. Fred C. Russell.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith present my third annual report to the School Board and Citizens of Haverhill.

During the year 1931-1932 the total enrollment was 400; the per cent of attendance, 93.25; number of cases of tardiness, 490; school visits made by members of the board, 9; by the superintendent, 413; by citizens, 389. Of the pupils cited above 3 in the elementary grades and 12 in the high school were enrolled as nonresidents paying tuition. There were also 19 elementary and 11 high school pupils for whom tuition was paid to other districts.

Up to the present time the enrollment this year has been 419. Of these 315 are in the elementary grades, 104 in the high school. Tuition is received for 2 elementary and 17 high school pupils. In addition to those in the town schools, the district pays tuition for 9 high school and 17 elementary pupils in school at Woodsville.

Wilson; Pike Primary, 25, Mabel Tragansa; East Haverhill, 12, Lucia Morrill; Number Six, 19, Rose M. Minickello; Number Ten, 12, Clara Richardson; Brier Hill, 15, Mary M. Robinson; The Center, 21, Freda Canning; North Haverhill Grammar, 25, Sadie R. Carr; North Haverhill Intermediate, 32, Doris Darling; North Haverhill Primary, 32, Maxine L. Anderson; School Nurse, Lottie M. B. Underhill.

The change in the curriculum at Haverhill Academy, brought about by the introduction of the commercial course and the consequent opening of domestic arts courses as electives has been fully justified. In view of the large number of pupils taking this work the need for typewriters is urgent.

The interest shown by many friends of the schools has been very gratifying. The present of an Edison phonograph by Mr. Frank Keyser to the North Haverhill school was much appreciated. The transportation furnished to the teams and the opening of the village library on Wednesdays have been a great help in carrying on the extra-curricula and regular activities in Haverhill Academy.

In view of the unsettled conditions of the times cooperation of parents and schools is more needed than ever. Plenty of sleep, simple food, cleanliness, and a deep interest in the school work are vital factors in affecting the children's present and future welfare.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my ninth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School for the year ending January 31, 1933.

The total enrollment to date is 103. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the Academy. The greatest number previously enrolled was 92. This was during the school year 1927-1928. Last year's enrollment was 91. Of this year's enrollment 54 are boys and 49 are girls. There are 21 seniors, 21 juniors, 28 sophomores and 33 freshmen. Eighteen are tuition pupils.

The following pupils graduated in June: Lindol Atkins, Edward Fadden, Cora Hillsgrove, Ione Keith, Elsie Nelson, Dorothy Robinson, Maurice Slight, Lucia Willard, Eliza Wright and Lillian Wright.

First and second honors were won by Eliza Wright and Cora Hillsgrove respectively. Cora Hillsgrove alsowon the John Dexter Locke Latin Prize.

The usual athletic activities have been maintained with an increasing number participating. The baseball team was one of the best in many seasons, losing but one game and decisively winning from all its other opponents.

Several school parties, sponsored by the different classes, have been held, the orchestra furnishing the music for dancing. The Girls' Glee Club furnished the entertainment for the annual Christmas Tree Party. A large number of parents, pupils and friends have attended each and all of the parties.

A Student Council, composed of 16 members of the school, 12 of which are elected by the different classes and 4 from the two upper classes, elected at large, was organized at the beginning of the year. The purpose of the council is to give the pupils an opportunity to participate in formulating the policies pertaining to school activities.

The program of studies is essentially the same as last year except that physics and chemistry are now alternated in the junior and senior years. Also economics and sociology has been added to the list of electives in the Latin course.

The introduction of the commercial course and the general broadening of the other courses to include more and more electives has many advantages but it, at the same time, imposes upon parents and pupils the responsibility of making an earlier decision as to the choice of post-secondary work. Formerly all the courses required each pupil to take such subjects as would meet college entrance requirements, but under the present system, where pupils are given considerable freedom in the choice of subjects, it often happens that pupils have not sufficient credits in certain groups of subjects required by the post-secondary institution of their choice. Usually if the choice of post-secondary work can be made at the beginning of the junior year, sufficient time then remains for the pupil to elect such subjects as will meet the requirements of that institution, regardless of the course pursued during the first two years.

The very generous support given the activities of the Academy by the community as a whole is deeply appreciated.
