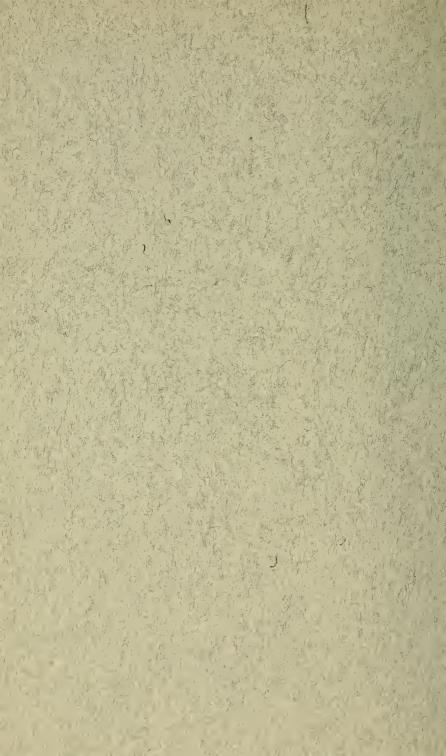

Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hudson, N. H., in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: [L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hudson on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see, by ballot vote, if the voters would favor the proposition of annexing Hudson to Nashua.

3a. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on highways.

4. To see if the Town will vote to observe "Old Home Week" and make appropriation to defray necessary expenses of same.

4a. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for Memorial Day.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,500.00 this year and a like sum next year, on the condition that the State contribute the sum of \$5,000.00 each of the two years mentioned, for permanent improvement of the Lowell Road—so called—as provided in an Act now before the Legislature.

6. To see if the Town will vote, in conjunction with Town of Londonderry, to discontinue road leading from near John Griffin place in Hudson to Johnson place in Londonderry, being road generally known as Break-neck hill road.

7. To see if the Town will adopt the policy of keeping roads in general open for automobile traffic in winter, make appropriation to purchase necessary equipment or take any action in regard to the matter.

7a. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for benefit of Public Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the building of sidewalks and maintenance of same.

9. To choose by ballot and major vote, a Tax Collector for said Town of Hudson.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the State Caucus Law.

11. To see if the Town will vote to hold the annual Town meeting in the Association Hall situated at Hudson Bridge, and to raise and appropriate money to defray expense of same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to choose three Assessors, who, with the Selectmen, shall constitute a joint board, for the purpose of reassessing Hudson property, and to raise and appropriate money to defray expense of same.

SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of the District:

The superintendent of the union, Mr. Record, has in his report touched upon numerous points of interest and made several recommendations. These are called to your attention and should receive your careful consideration before and at the annual meeting.

This year there are practically the same number of students from Hudson attending the Nashua High School as last, being divided as follows: 18 seniors, 16 juniors, 21 sophomores, 25 freshmen. There will graduate from the various Junior High Schools of Hudson this coming June 25 about children of which the majority will continue their school, and you will readily see from this that we can expect about 85 pupils to attend Nashua High next year, thereby requiring a large sum for High School Tuition. We are also faced with the transportation problem and it has become serious on account of the large number of children that require transportation.

We find that the schools in town are filled to capacity and the question of providing additional housing facilities for the children is with us again. We have already provided for opening the vacant room at the Webster Building and dividing the first grade there. The 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 6th grades are over crowded and it will be necessary another year to provide additional rooms.

The Centre Building has been put into excellent repair and most of the causes for complaint have been eliminated. We still find that the building should be shingled and the rooms whitened and varnished. The Webster Building and No. 1 and 9 schools will need only minor repairs and we believe that we can get along with only a small expense at these buildings.

We are advised that we will get the full amount of State Aid this coming year and you can see that we will require it all.

We have been able to retain all of our teachers but two and to them and the cooperation of our townspeople and parents, together with superintendent we want to extend our thanks for the excellent work done in our schools. The school buildings are your property and we extend to you a cordial invitation to visit and inspect each and every one of them at any time.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To The School Board of Hudson:

Gentlemen:

I have the honor of presenting herewith my sixth annual report as superintendent of your schools, and to this I have attached a report from your school nurse.

Attendance

In the past six years your average membership has increased from 261 to 410, with the increment of increase now growing larger. The following is the increase each year for the past six years, given in chronological order, 21, 16, 7, 2, 33, 69. With a small graduating class and indications of a large entering class, it is probable that the registration next September will be appreciably larger than the present membership, likely about 500.

In 1919 we employed 10 regular teachers, or an average of one for each 26 pupils of average membership. Today we have 11 regular teachers for 410 pupils, an average of one teacher for each 37 pupils. This would be very satisfactory if the pupils were evenly distributed, but there is a membership of 293 pupils at the present time in the seven rooms at the Webster school, or about 42 pupils per teacher. Grade 1 has a membership of 52 pupils. This is too large a number of children in one room for efficient work. We can not reasonably expect any teacher to give so large a number of beginners the start which they should have the first year. A poor start handicaps the pupil throughout all the grades. Already pupils have had to be promoted from grade to grade in the Webster school, when their attainment would not warrant the step, in order to make room for the too crowded condition in grade 1. I believe you do not wish this condition to continue. There is but one remedy and that is to open another school. This school should draw about 20 from the first grade and the overflow from grades II and III.

Next September grades VII and VIII, which are now in one room, will probably enroll about 60 pupils making it imperative that these grades be separated. Even then, with two new schools opened, it is quite possible that there may be a congested condition in some of the grades. It is surely time to consider seriously where the new school is to be located.

Teachers

There were but two changes in your teaching force when your schools opened in September. I feel that the securing of a comparatively permanent corps of teachers has been the most potent factor in the improvement of your schools. I recommend that it be your policy in the selection of your teachers that you give preference to those candidates who are least liable to leave you after a year or two of service to accept positions in their home cities.

Comparisons

A statement recently issued by the state board of education tabulates the current cost per pupil of the average membership in the elementary schools in 247 of the school districts in the state. These costs vary from \$41.80 per pupil in Seabrook to \$253.16 in Livermore. The cost in Hudson for the last school year was \$53.01. While we are comparatively generous in the matter of transportation and salaries and are an average in books and supplies, there are but 14 school districts where the cost is less, and 246 where it is more. This would seem to indicate a careful judicious expenditure of school moneys in Hudson.

Civics and Health

The function of the public schools, as viewed from the standpoint of the state, is to instruct and train the pupils for the duties of citizenship, otherwise there would be no justification for the maintaining of a public school system. From the view point of the pupil or the parent, the school must contribute to the material or physical welfare of the child, and in the absence of confidence in this contribution the compulsory attendance law would be nearly impossible of enforcement. In this consideration it is significant that the first two of the seven objectives of education, as determined by the National Education Association, and generally endorsed by educational authority throughout the country, are citizenship and health. Instruction and training in the first concerns primarily the state, the second the individual, though both the state and the individual profit by both.

I believe the time has come when we should broaden and enrich our courses in both these subjects. The teaching of citizenship has long been a statutory requirement in the public schools of New Hampshire. There is now no lack of proper texts and the teachers are given a comprehensive view and training for this work in our normal schools. When the subject is properly handled in our schools, there will exist little need of restricted immigration.

Instruction and training for health is a more recent requirement of our statutes but is one which is receiving a decided public approval. Our health program in school should include besides instruction in hygiene and training in health habits, inspection and supervision of growth and development, in which the physician, the nurse, the athletic coach, and the home shall cooperate. I am certain we would do well to give these two subjects more attention and a more exalted place in the program.

In General

An appropriation should be made at the next dis-

trict meeting sufficient to complete the contemplated repairs on the Center School, and for the purchase of new furniture for two rooms.

I wish to call your attention to the attached report from your school nurse.

As you directed, I paid a visit to the town of Hudson on Feb. 2nd, I paid a visit to the local health officer, Mr. Merrill, and with the school nurse, a member of the school board and the health officer inspected the village school where I found conditions that were a credit to any town. The complaint made by the petitioners was on account of a certain skin disease condition known as impetigo which is not serious and if the parents would follow the instructions given by the school nurse would be easily corrected.

SCHOOL NURSES REPORT

Your school nurse submits herewith her report:

I took up the work early in October, succeeding Mrs. Priske, who left in June to take up other work. I find that the schools have been remarkably free from contagious diseases this fall and winter. This has been due to the remarkable cooperation of the teachers and parents in reporting the first symptoms of any sickness and having them investigated at once, resulting in the operation of them investigated at once, resulting in the reoperation of the sick child from the well ones.

Most of the pupils have been vaccinated, and I would call your attention to the law in regard to vaccination.

The lack of funds prevents the followup work that would make the work of your nurse more effective. You can see the need of clinics for the eyes, tonsils and teeth from the following statistics:
