TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - (1) Town Officers' Salaries
 - (2) Town Officers' Expenses
 - (3) Election and Registration
 - (4) Expense and Care of Town Hall
 - (5) Police Department
 - (6) Vital Statistics
 - (7) Fire Department
 - (8) Cemeteries

 - (12) Insurance
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.
 - 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to

raise and appropriate for the general expense of Highway Department and Street Lighting.

- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for employment of a District Nurse and other health expenses.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,033.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust. (No amount recommended by the Budget Committee).
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of Town Dumps.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Expenses.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for Town Construction and permanent improvement of roads.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid.

- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate out of unexpended appropriations for repairs and supplies for the Tyler bridge. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Road Planning Committee and to require that the recommendations of the Committee as laid out for the fiscal year 1952-'53 be carried out in the year 1952-'53. (Submitted by Petition).
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to recommend the use of the 1952 Town Road Aid money for reconstruction of Gould Hill Road from Putnam's corner to its junction with the Penacook Road. (Submitted by Petition).
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to recommend using part of the 1952 Town Road Aid money to finish and oil the Sugar Hill Road from U. S. Route 202 at Guimond's Corner through to the Bassett Mill Road. (Submitted by Petition).
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to blacktop a strip of road on Kast Hill between the Raymond place and the Henniker Town line, about one-half mile. (Submitted by Petition without the recommendation of the Budget Committee).
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security act (Old age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).
- 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry

into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following recommendations submitted by the Town auditors.
 - 1. That separate warrants be issued to the Tax Collector by the Selectmen for property and yield taxes, poll taxes and head taxes.
 - 2. That delinquent poll taxes have a 20c penalty in lieu of interest added after October 1st.
 - 3. That the residents of the Town of Hopkinton be requested to notify the Selectmen of the number of shares of National Bank Stock owned by them within the State of New Hampshire to facilitate the addition to the tax warrant of assessment against these banks in order that this tax may be received by the Town of Hopkinton rather than by other communities of which these stockholders were former residents.
 - 4. That all money in payment for cemetery lots pass through the Town Clerk, to be recorded by him, and turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds through the Town Treasurer.
 - 5. That all money in payment for perpetual care pass directly to the Trustees of Trust Funds, to be recorded and accounted for by them.
 - 6. That the recent provisions enacted by the State Legislature pertaining to the consolidation of Trust Funds be taken advantage of, with the monies of the various funds being consolidated but the identity of the funds being maintained.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to ask the N. H. State Tax Commission to do a complete revaluation and reassessment of taxable properties in Hopkinton. (Submitted by Petition).
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to pay for the revaluation and reassessment of taxable properties to be done by the N. H. State Tax Commission. (Submitted by Peti-

tion without the recommendation of the Budget Committee).

- 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Estate of John Prescott Kimball, the income to be used for the Hopkinton Village Public Library.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed subject to the provisions adopted at the Town meeting of March 10th, 1925.

The sum of \$150.00 from the Estate of George M. Putnam for the care of the Samuel Eastman lot in the Old Hopkinton Village Cemetery.

RECORD OF ANNUAL MEETING

Hopkinton, N. H., March 11, 1952

Meeting was called to order at 9 o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, Lewis A. Nelson. The Warrant for the call of the meeting was read by the Moderator. The Moderator then called upon Rev. Paul Scruton to offer prayer.

Motion was made by Joseph H. Young and carried, that all articles pertaining to funds be acted upon after one o'clock in the afternoon.

Motion was made by Richard A. Brunel and carried, that Articles 17, 18, 19 and 20 be taken up after 1 o'clock.

Motion was made by Joseph H. Young and carried, that the polls remain open until 6:30 o'clock P. M.

The Moderator proceeded to act upon the following Articles:

Article 1: Election of Officers:

Fire Wards: Motion was made by Joseph H. Young and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Ernest S. Archibald for Contoocook, Harold M. Martin for W. Hopkinton, and Tracy Chellis, Hopkinton who were declared elected as Fire Wards for the ensuing year.

Tree Warden: Motion was made by John Graves and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Ernest S. Archibald, who was declared elected as Tree Warden for the ensuing year.

Weighers: Motion was made by Joseph H. Young and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for

Horace Stanley, who was declared elected as Weigher for the ensuing year.

- Sextons: Motion was made by John Graves and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Ira Putney, Daniel Dustin, Ernest Archibald and Leon Holmes, who were declared elected as Sextons for the year ensuing.
- Surveyors of Wood & Lumber: Motion was made by Chapin Hoskins and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Thomas B. Card, Stewart Astles and Arthur S. Duston, who were declared elected as Surveyors of Wood and Lumber for the ensuing year.
- Town Forestry Board: Motion was made by John Graves and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Bernard Reen, who was declared elected a member to the Town Forestry Board for a term of three years.
- Budget Committee: Motion was made by Chapin Hoskins and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for James A. Weast and John K. Graves, who were declared elected as members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years.
- Town Road Committee: Motion was made by Richard A. Brunel and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Parker who was declared elected for a term of five years.
- Fence Viewers: Motion was made by Clifford Gallant and carried, that the Clerk cast one ballot for John K. Graves, Bernard Reen and John A. Brock, who were declared elected for a term of one year.

Article 23:

The Moderator declared the resolution carried in the affirmative.

Scott Calahan and moved its adoption: Resolved, that the Collector of Taxes give notice on October 1st in each year to those persons whose poll taxes shall be then unpaid, of the amount of the same, and if the same shall not be paid, with twenty cents for such notice, within fourteen days thereafter, the collector of taxes may distrain therefor. The Moderator declared the resolution carried in the affirmative.
- 3. The following resolution was offered by W. Scott Calahan and moved its adoption: Resolved, that the residents of the Town of Hopkinton be requested to notify the Selectmen of the number of shares of National Bank Stock owned by them within the State of New Hampshire to facilitate the addition to the tax warrant of assessment against these banks in order that this tax may be received by the Town of Hopkinton rather than by other communities of which these stockholders were former residents. The Moderator declared the resolution carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator declared the resolution carried in the affirmative.

Article 31: The following motion was offered by E. C. Leadbeater, that the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, and Committees for 1951 as printed in the Town Report, be accepted, typographical errors be excepted. The Moderator declared the motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 32: The following motion was offered by T. N. Troxell, that the citizens of Hopkinton, N. H., in Town Meeting assembled, March 11, 1952, wish to record their sincere appreciation for the time and attention unselfishly given by the Town Selectmen, year after year, for the welfare and protection of all of us. The Moderator declared the motion carried in the affirmative.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY COMMITTEE

During 1952 TRA construction proceeded on the Briar Hill and Farrington Corner roads. Some preliminary work was started in widening the Straw road. It is recommended that the work on the Straw road be completed as planned for approximately 0.7 of a mile. It is also recommended that the recent construction on the Briar Hill and Farrington Corner and Sugar Hill roads be surfaced or stabilized as part of this year's TRA work.

The Committee feels that a program of adequate ditching and culverts on all town roads is necessary before starting on further reconstruction of individual sections. This would be the first step in the process of stage construction of the town system. It should eliminate the mud holes and make year around travel possible.

The Committee further recommends that the remainder of this year's TRA and town construction funds be spent on drainage and culverts and that it be continued until completed. This work will have to be to the standards required by the State for TRA construction and will be a part of the future construction.

A map has been prepared and will be posted in the Town Hall showing the proposed classification of Town Roads into the three classes suggested in last year's report.

- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the employment of a District Nurse and other health expenses.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Concord Hospital.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the Control of White Pine Blister Rust. (No amount recommended by the Budget Committee)

Specifications for said Grader and attachments to be established by the Town Highway Committee and Selectmen, said Grader will remain directly under the supervision of the Selectmen, the operator of the Grader will be appointed by the Selectmen and approved by the Highway Committee. All income from rentals of said Grader and attachments over and above operation and maintenance cost will be used to retire the above indebtedness. Upon retirement of the notes, said balance of income will be deposited with the Trustees of Trust Funds to be held in the Capital Reserve Fund, the income and principal of this Fund to be expended only upon approval of the Budget Committee and by vote at Town Meeting for the replacement of said Grader and Attachments.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one Road Agent for the Whole Town, effective forthwith and superseding any Road Agents elected at this meeting and to authorize the Selectmen to fix his compensation.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional Compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector a salary of one Percent of all the taxes collected, except the State Head Taxes.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to take over the Street Lighting in Hopkinton Precinct and Contoocook Precinct, this article to take effect upon adoption.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Contoocook Fire Precinct rental for use of the street floor of Columbia Hall, so-called, located in Contoocook Fire Precinct for use as a Fire Station, said rental to be a sum agreed upon by the Selectmen and the Contoocook Fire Precinct Commissioners.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to designate all woodlands now in its possession and that which may hereinafter come into its possession as Town Forests and instruct the Selectmen and the Town Forestry Board to establish a management plan for said Forests, said plan to be approved by the State Forester.

- 4. To see if the district will vote to approve the expenditure of \$1416.61 made by the School Board for new equipment for the New School Building. (This was approved by the Town Budget Committee and the State Board of Education as an emergency expenditure.)
- 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to expend the sum of \$1633.39 for additions and improvements to the New Building. The

total amount in this and the preceding article (\$3050.) is money received from the sale of the old High School property and will not involve raising tax money.

6. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee, which was established as a result of action taken at the District Meeting on March 8, 1949, considers that it has substantially completed its assigned duties and therefore submits this as its final report.

At the present time the eight upper grades of our school system are housed in a new building, a building which has become a reality after studies begun by the Town Planning Board in 1947. For those who would like a review of the steps taken, reference may be made to reports published annually in the Town Reports by the Planning Board, the Building Committee and/or the Superintendent of Schools, for the years ending December 31, 1947 and subsequently. On April 23, 1952 ground was broken for our new building, thus starting the concrete realization of this long needed educational facility. The first spade of earth was turned by Harold Martin, Chairman of the School Board and a member of this committee from its inception.

Despite delays due to shortages of materials, a strike of laborers, and increased costs, largely occasioned by the Korean warfare, Blanchard Stebbins has proved to be a good contractor and has done his work well. In like manner, Irving Hersey Associates have proved to be good architects.

The first public use of the new building was made when we held "open house" on Sunday afternoon, December 28, 1952, on which occasion about 600 people from our own town and surrounding communities took advantage of the opportunity to inspect the building.

On Monday, January 5, 1953, when schools opened for the winter term, 202 pupils were assigned to new

seats in a new building. All pupils from the six grades in the old High School building, together with the 5th and 6th grades from the Hopkinton Village and Contoocook Graded schools moved in. The removal of the two upper grades from the elementary schools has greatly relieved the congested conditions in those buildings. The 3rd/4th grade room in Contoocook is still overcrowded but this situation will be corrected by a split of the grades and addition of a new teacher next year.

Your Building Committee has, since its formation, held about fifty meetings. There have been headaches and heartbreaks when unforeseeable snags and delays have developed, and we unfortunately lost some of our valuable committee members — Wendell Clough by his death, and Priscilla Hayward and Deborah Hoffman because they left town. However, the work of the Committee has been lightened to no inconsiderable degree by the constant knowledge that its aims were also the strong desires of a large majority of fellow townsmen, without which the new school could not be a reality. The voluntary efforts of the school's friends, including the students, have been so numerous that space does not permit the listing of the individual contributions of time, money and work. These contributions have provided or will provide the following items, the total value of which approximates \$5,000.00:

Although classes are being held in the new building, the work of the contractor is not entirely completed as yet, in that there are still some details remaining unfinished. In addition there are some items outside of the contract remaining to be done or which are desirable, including:

More shelving for storage, ceiling for the shop and lunch room, finish grading, landscaping, drives and walks, porticos, partition for shop class room, more lockers, etc.

Some of these things would have been included in the original contract except that we had to cut some corners in order to stay within the limits of our available funds, and our foremost aim was the achievement of the essentials. However, the funds in the hands of the School Board, together with the balances in various voluntary accounts will make a substantial contribution toward the completion of the items listed.

It was our expectation that the new building would serve a long-felt need for a community center for the Town, and we are gratified that it is already being put to that use.

The long awaited event finally took place. On January 5, 1953 all pupils from grades five through twelve were moved from the old buildings into the New School Building. I know that the people in the community are very proud of the new school, but I am sure that the pupils are much more proud of it. They may well be proud of the building and of the community which provided them with such a fine school. It has been truly a community project and one which should give everyone connected with it a tremendous feeling of satisfaction.

The members of the School Board and Building Committee deserve a great deal of praise for the amount of time and hard work they have put into the building program. At times, things looked very discouraging, but they never gave up. Each new obstacle meant just a little more effort and it was overcome. You just can't beat that kind of spirit. The community, too, was asked to do more than their fair share, and responded in a remarkable way. The various organizations and individuals are too numerous to mention but their work is sincerely appreciated.

We have a new building and now we must make the best possible use of it, and I know that we will. We will be able to improve our special fields such as Shop, Science, Physical Education, Home Economics and Music. It will be possible now to add a Commercial Course to our Curriculum. The Board has provided for an additional teacher and equipment in their new budget.

The crowded conditions in the Grade Schools have been mostly relieved for the time being. The third and fourth grade room in Contoocook has too many pupils for one teacher and the fourth grade should be moved down stairs next year. This has also been provided for in the budget. The increase in the budget, this year, is due then mostly to increasing the staff of teachers with some additional operating cost due to the new building.

At the beginning of the present school year, we had the same staff of teachers that we had at the end of last year, a very good record. However, at Christmas time, Miss Barbara Saturley resigned to get married and was replaced by Mr. George Hayward.

I have enjoyed the year in Hopkinton very much, and things on the whole, have gone very smoothly. I think the response of the people of Hopkinton to our needs for new equipment was one of the greatest thrills that I have had in my teaching experience.
