The Polls will open at 9:00 A.M. and close at 6:00 P.M. To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,700.00 for Town Officers' Salaries.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Town Officers' Expenses.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Election and Registration Expenses.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Expenses of Town Hall and other Town buildings.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Police Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for a two way radio communication with the State Police of New Hampshire for the Police Department. (This article submitted by petition and unapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,750.00 for the General Expenses of the Fire Department.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Fire Protection.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Care of Trees, including spraying trees in the Hopkinton and Contoocook Precincts, and for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.00 for Insurance.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for use of the Planning Board.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the employment of a District Nurse and other Health Expenses.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for the Care of Town Dump.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,000.00 for Town Maintenance of Highways and Bridges. (Summer Work \$15,000.00; Winter Work \$12,000.00.)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the General Expenses of the Highway Department and Street Lighting.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,367.40 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$9,115.98.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for Town Poor.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for Cemeteries.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Damages and Legal Expenses.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$725.00 for Social Security.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Town Construction and permanent improvement of roads.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Sidewalk Construction. (\$300.00 for sidewalk from Checkerberry Lane to the Harold Martin School \$500.00 for sidewalk to be completed from Hankins property to the Hopkinton Fair Grounds.)
- 33. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00, (\$3,000.00 to be raised by taxa-

tion in 1961 and \$3,000.00 to be raised by taxation in 1962) to request the State Tax Commission to reappraise the real estate in the Town of Hopkinton. This article submitted by petition and approved by the Budget Committee.

portion of the old Jewett Road which lies between the end of the travelled section and the edge of the State property.

- 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the 1961 Tax Levy.
- 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute Inventory Blanks not earlier than April 1st of the tax year.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE NURSE

- 1. The Hopkinton Public Health Nursing Association provides for nominal fees, a trained nurse whose duties are to visit the sick in need of nursing care, minister to them in their homes, teach their families the simple rules of hygiene, ventilation, preparation of food, etc., when necessary.
- 2. The nursing service of this Association will work in cooperation with the Public Health Nursing Division of the State Board of Health.
- 3. The nurse shall be administratively responsible for the conduct of her work to the chairman of the executive board of the Hopkinton Public Health Nursing Association.
- 4. The nurse shall wear uniform as prescribed for State Board of Health Nurses.
- 5. The nurse is required to respond to every call, but will continue with the case only under the direction of a physician.
- 6. Orders for treatment given by the nurse shall come through medical men designated by this organization.
- 7. The nurse shall be on duty from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. with one hour for lunch, from Monday through Friday. She shall be subject to emergency calls through a doctor. The nurse will be allowed two weeks vacation with pay and two weeks sick leave with pay per year.
- 8. Daily visits to acute cases for a period of a week shall be allowed weekly visits to chronics.
- 9. The nurse shall not be required to attend patients with contagious diseases nor those in quarantine.

- 10. The fee to be collected by nurse is set at 50c per visit. Night fee when nurse is called by doctor for emergency will be \$3.00.
- 11. All complaints shall be handled through the executive committee of this Association.
- 12. The nurse shall respond to all calls from the school teachers as soon as possible. She will also transport children home who have become ill while in school if parents are unable to do so.
- 13. The nurse will assist the school physician in doing the yearly physical examinations in the schools.

Resolved, by Hopkinton School District at School District meeting convened, that the report of the Hopkinton School Planning Committee concerning requirements for additional classroom space, particularly in Contoocook village, be accepted and that the recommendations of the Committee for construction of an eight room addition to the north end of the high school be adopted, and further that the School Board be instructed to appoint a building committee and otherwise authorized and directed to take necessary or appropriate action to implement this building plan.

Mr. Andreson explained the drawings which the committee had drawn up. There was a lengthy discussion on this plan versus a separate six room grade school.

Adopted in the affirmative.

Mr. Murray George offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

I move that the Hopkinton School District in School meeting convened, authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the District such advances, grant-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or State Agencies.

Adopted in the affirmative.

Mr. Murray George offered a vote of thanks to the School building committee.

Mr. Stanley White offered a vote of thanks and appreciation for the work which Mr. Joseph Ransmeier did while on the School Board for the past six years.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL SCHOOL MEETING

The Special Hopkinton School District Meeting was held at Hopkinton High School Auditorium on April 23, 1960.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by the moderator, Philip S. Dunlap.

Prayer was offered by Archdeacon Donald Lyons.

The Moderator recognized Mr. William Sterling who offered introductory remarks in regard to the school — offering two plans, No. I and No. II.

ARTICLE I

Mr. Robert Russell offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Resolved: By Hopkinton School District in special district meeting convened,

That the vote of the School District taken at the regular annual meeting on March 9, 1960 pursuant to Article 3 of the Warrant and adopting a plan for the construction of an addition to the high school intended, in part, to house six elementary grades be and hereby is rescinded:

Further, That the School Board be authorized and instructed to appoint a building committee to proceed forthwith to develop plans and estimated costs for the construction of a new six-classroom elementary school building, without present cafeteria or activity room but adaptable to expansion to include such facilities, as well as for the temporary adaption of the two downstairs classrooms in the present Maple Street building for use as a cafeteria-activity room to be used in conjunction with the new six classroom building, and for the construction of a two-classroom addition to the high school building; and

Further, That the School Board shall be otherwise in all proper respects authorized and directed to do every-

thing necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of this Resolution.

Mr. Russell explained the resolution and discussed the needs at the High School and the Maple Street School.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Peter Haslam who read the report of the Hopkinton School Planning Committee.

Mr. Francis Blanchard was recognized by the moderator and explained the plan for the addition to the Maple Street School Plan.

The chair recognized Mr. William Andresen who spoke on the proposed plans for the addition to the High School.

Mr. Fred Roberts was recognized by the moderator and gave details about a six-room addition to the Maple Street School using part of the old school building as an activity room and cafeteria.

The chair recognized Mrs. Edith Allison who spoke in favor of the majority plan.

Mr. Alfred Chandler was recognized by the moderator who explained the addition of two rooms to the end of the present High School Building.

The moderator recognized Mrs. Mildred Corson who yielded to Mr. Arman Fermanian who spoke in favor of the plan advocated by the majority.

Mr. Stewart Nelson was recognized by the chair who spoke on two issues, the first being future requirements and the second financial.

The Moderator declared a two minute recess.

The chair recognized Mr. Robert Lincoln who spoke for the majority plan.

Mr. Joseph Ransmeier was recognized by the moderator who spoke in favor of the separate six room plan at Maple Street.

The chair declared a one minute recess.

A lengthy discussion followed.

The moderator called for the question on the resolution.

HOPKINTON SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT OF SPECIAL EMERGENCY SCHOOL MEETING

The Special Hopkinton School District meeting was held at Hopkinton High School Auditorium on December 10, 1960.

ARTICLE I

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Philip S. Dunlap.

The warrant for the Special School District Meeting was read by the Moderator.

ARTICLE II

The chair recognized Dr. Howard Lightfoot who offered the following resolution seconded by Mr. Norman Davis:

Resolved that the report of the building committee be and it is hereby approved and that the recommendation of the committee, calling for a four-room high school addition and a six-room elementary school complete with cafeteria-activity room at the Maple Street site, be and it is hereby adopted.

Mr. Robert Russell was recognized by the Moderator who then discussed the elementary school plans voted upon in September and the present recommended plans.

The chair recognized Mr. Edward Leadbeater who reported for the Hopkinton Budget Committee.

The chair recognized Mr. Jay McLauchlan who described location, site, etc. showing a chart with the new school plan which includes six classrooms — cost \$155,000 — \$11.82 per square foot — Total figure \$175,388.

Mr. Francis Blanchard was recognized by the Moderator and showed a map of the plot on Maple Street explaining such.

The chair recognized Mr. Robert Russell who de-

scribed the second drawing on the plans. Estimated cost \$60,600 — \$10.60 per square foot.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Roy Cluff who explained that the meeting had been granted by the Superior Court and the School Board — not members of the building committee.

Mr. John Hardie was recognized by the chair and reported on the financing, explaining that the meeting was called to authorize a bond issue to raise the sum of \$234,000. He also stated the effect the building would have upon taxes.

The question on the resolution was offered by Dr. Howard Lightfoot and a brief discussion followed. The resolution was then adopted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE III

Mr. Ivan Bohannan made the following resolution which had been seconded by Mr. Owen French:

Resolved that the District appropriate the sum of \$239,000 for the purpose of construction and providing the high school addition and the new elementary school building (including cost of land acquisition), as authorized under Article II and that said sum be raised by borrowing the same on the credit of the District as provided in the Municipal Finance Act as amended and any other statute or authority thereto enabling.

(Ballot vote, 2/3 majority of those present and voting required for adoption)

Discussion on the resolution followed.

The voting was cast by secret ballot.

A division vote was taken as follows:

ARTICLE IV

The chair recognized Mr. Shepard Wilder who of-

fered the following resolution seconded by Mr. William Newell:

Resolved that the nine members of the building committee, whose names were signed to the report submitted under Article II, be and they hereby are appointed, as a building committee with power to act with the school board in supervising the school construction programs authorized by this meeting.

The resolution was adopted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V

Mr. Clifford Sharpe was recognized by the Moderator and offered the following resolution seconded by Mr. Harry Parker:

Resolved that the school board, with the advice of the building committee, be and they hereby are authorized to appoint an architect, to enter into all contracts necessary for carrying out the construction program authorized by this meeting and to execute all other written documents and to do all other acts and things necessary and proper thereto. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

ARTICLE VI

The chair recognized Mr. Robert Lincoln who offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Resolved that there be transferred to the school board from the capital reserve fund for the new school program all sums held in such fund, including any funds realized from the sale of the old Hopkinton Village school house, and that the school board, with the advice of the building committee, be authorized to expend the same on the equipment and facilities of the additional school rooms authorized by this meeting.

- 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following school district officials, with the polls to be open at 9:00 o'clock in the morning and to remain open continuously until 6:00 o'clock in the evening:
 - A. Moderator
 - B. Clerk
 - C. Treasurer
 - D. School Board member for three years
- 2. To choose a Moderator pro-tem until a new moderator is elected and qualified.
- 3. To see if the meeting will vote to recess to reconvene on Wednesday, March 15, 1961 at 8:00 P.M., at the Hopkinton High School.
- 4. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to take any action thereon.
- 5. To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 6. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the Salaries of School District Officials, Agents and Employees, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the applica-

tion against said appropriation of such sums as may be received from any State or Federal program for the support of public education, together with other income: the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

- 7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or State Agencies.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600 to purchase six sections of bleachers for the Hopkinton High School gymnasium to complete the seating arrangement (Put in by petition.)

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Since January 1960 when I made my last report to the School District, we have had our regular March meeting and two special school district meetings. At the last special meeting, held on December 10, 1960, a bond issue was voted for the construction of an elementary school at the Maple Street site and a four room addition to the high school. Since this meeting the school board and the building committee have been extremely busy finishing the many little details that have to be done before our proposed new construction can become a reality. The bonds must be sold to the best advantage of the district; detailed drawings of the new construction completed; specifications agreed upon; and a contractor selected who will build the kind of a building we want at the price we can afford to pay.

As the new space is needed desperately at the high school and at the grade school, both the school board and the building committee are making every effort to have the building ready as close to September 1st. as possible. I hope that at our school meeting in March we can announce the name of the contractor for the new buildings and some of the details which will be of interest to everyone.

We have had good publicity about our high school progress, and reports from our graduates who are now in college are most encouraging. We do have a fine high school program, a fact that is recognized throughout the state. This is a credit to the community and something of which we should be proud, but we shouldn't feel satisfied. We cannot relax in our efforts to continue to improve our whole school program. There are still areas which need to be improved. Our foreign language program should be extended either by adding a fourth year of French or adding another language. Our physical ed-

ucation program is practically non existent and our guidance program should be expanded. Perhaps these programs will have to wait until we get caught up on our building programs or until we get another source of revenue besides a real estate tax.

Much emphasis has been placed on the high schools throughout the country in the past several years due in part to the spectacular success of the Russian Air Scientists and the various survey reports, particularly those of Dr. Conant. As a result, I fear that perhaps our elementary schools and our elementary teachers have been somewhat overlooked. I feel sure that the success of our high schools have been greatly influenced by the work our elementary schools are doing. I Believe that we have a dedicated group of teachers in both our high school and elementary schools and we are fortunate to have them.

As I visit the schools and see the children in the classroom, in the lunchroom, and on the playground, I realize what an exceptionally fine group of children we have in Hopkinton and how happy I am to work with them.

This school year saw some changes in the staff — Mrs. Marguerite Roberts as Home Economics Teacher, Mrs. Carolyn Roberts as Business Education teacher, and Mr. Frank Hounsell as Science instructor. For the current year, two additional teachers were added because class size made it necessary to have two seventh-grade and two eighth-grade sections each year. I feel that the division of junior high classes into regular and accelerated divisions has worked well. It has now become possible to devote more time toward giving the regular classes a better grasp of the fundamentals necessary to successful completion of high school work and at the same time to challenge to a greater degree those students of superior ability. Students who have successfully completed the junior high grades in regular sections will have the same opportunity to elect college preparatory courses in high school as has always existed.

One of our most pressing problems, that of space, will be taken care of by the building program soon to be started. The staff has made a study of course content and improvements are being made constantly. In this study we have made use of many members of the State Department of Education. There is always with us the problem of growth and its impact upon the expansion of the curriculum. As we grow, consideration must be given to additional offerings. At the present time, the areas of foreign language, art, physical education, and mathematics (for those who will terminate their education upon graduation) seem to be the areas where future expansion should come.

The people of Hopkinton can be justly proud of the type of education offered the students of Hopkinton as witnessed by the school being designated as one of the outstanding small high schools in the United States.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the people of Hopkinton for their support and cooperation.


