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## TOWN WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jaffrey, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall on School Street in East Jaffrey Village, in said Town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

Polls to be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon and to remain open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

2. To hear all reports, except that of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee, and to raise such sums of money as may be required for the support of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, fire department, Memorial Day, street lights, and all other Town Charges.

4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$386.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Regional Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,175.75, the same to be set aside for future State Aid Construction of Class II roads when State moneys become available.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$841.93 for construction of Class V roads upon condition that the State will allot the sum of \$3,367.71 or act in any way relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$5,000.00. Such sum to be set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund, in accordance with Chapter 160, Laws of 1943, for the purpose of constructing a Town Hall at such future time as the Town may decide, or to act in any way relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to construct a cement sidewalk on the Easterly side of North Street, beginning at the corner of North and Main Streets and extending to the storehouse of Jaffrey Mills, or act in any way relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international co-operation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to arrange for the installation of a street light on Ridge Crest Road and to raise and appropriate \$16.00 to pay for the electric service of said light for one year, as petitioned for by Arthur DeGrandpre and others.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to arrange for the installation of a street light on Old Peterboro Road near the residence of Homer Chouinard and to raise and appropriate \$16.00 to pay for the electric service of said light for one year, as petitioned for by Ruth P. Chouinard and others.

14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install a street light on Howard Hill Road near the residence of Alice E. Beauvais and to raise and appropriate \$16.00 to pay for the electric service of said light for one year, as petitioned for by Tracy Wilder and others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with Chapter 160, Laws of 1943, the sum of \$6,890.00, the unexpended balance in the Town Treasury which was raised and appropriated at the annual town meeting on March 14th, 1944, for the purpose of constructing a sewer on Stratton Road near Humiston Field and to authorize the Selectmen to expend said sum of money for the construction of the aforesaid sewer at such time as conditions may allow, or act in any way relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase the garage owned by Philip F. Grass, located on Blake Road near the Railroad Station, at a price not exceeding \$4,000.00 and to raise and appropriate the aforesaid sum of money to pay for said garage, which would be used by the Town for highway purposes, or act in any way relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 to construct a sewer on North Street beginning at a point near the former residence of Alvin Parker and be extended in a Northernly direction, connecting with the present sewer which serves the Northern end of said Street, or act in any way relating thereto as petitioned for by Andrew Pelletier and others.

18. To see if the Town will vote to take steps to have the names of the villages "East Jaffrey" and "Jaffrey" changed to "Jaffrey" and "Jaffrey Centre" respectively, or act in any way relating thereto as petitioned for by Delcie D. Bean and others.

19. To see what action the Town will take relative to plowing snow on private ways.

**TOWN SURVEYS**

**Report No. 10**

Selectmen of Jaffrey, N. H.  
Gentlemen:

Due to illness last year at the time when annual reports were made, I was unable to submit a report of survey made in 1943.

Therefore I submit a summary of the work done in 1943 and 1944 for which the total sum of \$1,000.00 was appropriated.

Gilmore Pond Road was surveyed Westerly from Highland Avenue around the South side of Gilmore Pond to the South Hill Road extension at the Southwesterly end of the Pond. The Cross Road from the Easterly side of Gilmore Pond past the old Libby Farm was surveyed to connect with previous surveys at Slab City. Survey of South Hill Road was continued Southwesterly to connect with Gilmore Pond Road.

The Highway from South Hill Road near the Northwesterly end of Gilmore Pond was surveyed to Priest Corner and continued past the residence of Hugh Morgan to the Fitzwilliam Road.

From Priest Corner the Highway was surveyed Westerly, crossing Fitzwilliam Road at Adams Corner and continued to Main Street opposite the residence of Pope Yeatman.

The survey of Main Street was continued Westerly from Dublin Road in Jaffrey Center to Yeatman's farm and in 1944 continued to the Gap Mountain Road. Fitzwilliam Road was surveyed to Chester A. Champney's and in 1944 completed to the Fitzwilliam line.

Gap Mountain Road was surveyed the entire length from Main Street to the Fitzwilliam Road and Cobleigh Hill Road was completed to the Troy town line.

The cross road from River Street near the Mountain Stream crossing, was surveyed to the residence of Fred W. Fassett as was the road from Gilmore Pond Road past Fassett's house to connect with previous surveys near the residence of W. B. McSkimmon.

Memorial Road was also surveyed from Dublin Road at the "Ark" to the Mountain Reservoir and connected with the survey of 1925 for the Water Main Extension.

All the closed traverses were computed, checked and adjusted.

Some new surveys were plotted on sheets on the 40 feet to an inch scale but no new sheets were started. On the outlying districts, the surveys were plotted on sheets the same size as the set of 68 but to a scale of 200 feet to an inch, a total of 13 of these later sheets being started.

## ANNUAL DISTRICT SCHOOL MEETING

March 13, 1944

At a legal meeting of the voters of the School District in Union Hall in said District in the Town of Jaffrey, on the 13th day of March at 7.30 o'clock in the afternoon pursuant to the foregoing warrant.

The meeting was called to order by Jason C. Sawyer, Moderator and the warrant read by him with the return of same.

Article 1. Fred L. Cournoyer moved that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Jason C. Sawyer for Moderator, for the ensuing year. Jason C. Sawyer at this time turned the chair over to Lewis S. Record. The motion was put by Mr. Record, seconded and unanimously carried. The Clerk cast one ballot for Jason C. Sawyer and he was declared elected and took oath of office in open meeting.

Article 2. Ferdinand Gordon moved that the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Walter H. Gentsch for Clerk for the ensuing year. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The Moderator cast one ballot for Walter H. Gentsch for Clerk and declared him elected and administered the oath of office in open meeting.

Article 3. Don Eaves nominated Ernest J. Pratt for member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Nomination seconded. Dr. F. C. Sweeney nominated Vernon J. Bean for member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Nomination seconded. Motion that nominations be closed, seconded and unanimously carried.

At this time the Moderator appointed for tellers: Homer Belletete, Leon Jackson, Ann Gordon and Georgia Eaves.

Empty ballot box was exhibited in open meeting by Moderator. The whole number of ballots given in was 149, necessary for choice 75, upon which Vernon J. Bean had 57, Ernest J. Pratt had 92 and Ernest J. Pratt having a majority of the votes given in was declared elected and took the oath of office in open meeting.

Article 4. Lewis S. Record nominated Lawrence W. Brown for Treasurer for the ensuing year. Nomination seconded. Moved that nominations be closed. Motion seconded and unanimously carried. D. D. Bean Sr. moved that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Lawrence W. Brown for Treasurer for the ensuing year. Motion seconded and unanimously carried. The Clerk cast one ballot for Lawrence W. Brown and he was declared elected Treasurer.

Article 5. Lewis S. Record moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$105.00 for District Officers to be apportioned as follows:

1. Salaries of School Board,	\$60 00
2. Salary of truant officer,	25 00
3. Salary of district clerk,	5 00
4. Salary of district treasurer,	10 00
5. Salary of moderator,	5 00
	\$105 00

Motion seconded and unanimously carried.

Article 6. It was moved and seconded that the School District reports as printed in the Town Reports be accepted and adopted. Motion unanimously carried.

D. D. Bean, Sr. moved that the following be spread on the Records:  
**RESOLVED:** It is the sense of the School District that the Durant Fund should be expended in part or in whole by the School Board in such

manner as to provide educational and recreational facilities for the students of Conant High School which otherwise would not be available in a district of this size.

Moderator declared Resolution out of order and would be taken up later when the Budget considered.

Article 7. Lewis S. Record moved that the Auditors to be elected at the Town meeting tomorrow also act as School District Auditors. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried.

Article 9. Lewis S. Record moved that the District appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 to retire Grade School and Auditorium Bonds.

Motion seconded and unanimously carried.

Article 8. Ernest L. Pratt moved that the School District accept the budget of the School Board as approved by the Budget Committee with the following alterations:

Item 18. Debt and Interest reduced from \$5,100.00 to \$2,100.00 and additional revenues estimated increased from \$3,500.00 to \$5,320.00, and for this purpose that the District raise and appropriate \$50,688.00 for the support of public schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

The motion was seconded.

D. D. Bean, Jr., moved that the budget be increased by \$2,500.00, that the motion on Article 8 be amended by reducing the amount of estimated revenue from \$5,320.00 to \$2,820.00 so that the total amount to be raised would be increased to \$53,188.00.

The Motion to amend seconded and carried.

The motion as amended now reads: That the School District accept the budget of the School Board as approved by the Budget Committee with the following alterations:

Item 18. Debt and Interest reduced from \$5,100.00 to \$2,100.00 and additional revenue estimated decreased from \$3,500.00 to \$2,820.00, and for this purpose that the District raise and appropriate \$53,188.00 for the support of public schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Original motion as amended unanimously carried.

D. D. Bean, Jr., moved that the School Board be authorized to expend up to \$2,500.00 of the funds derived from the Jules Durant fund to provide educational and recreational facilities for the students of Conant High School which otherwise would not be available in a district of this size.

Motion seconded and unanimously carried.

Voted to adjourn at 9:00 p. m.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I submit at this time my twenty-seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the thirty-sixth in the series under union supervision. With it is included the report of Headmaster Gerald H. Faunce and the report of Mrs. Helen L. Towne, school nurse.

Several teacher changes took place at the opening of the school year.

Mr. Gerald H. Faunce was secured as headmaster. He is a graduate of Rhode Island State College, 1928 with the degree of M. A. from Columbia University in 1934. He was headmaster of Hancock High School for two years, Epping, N. H., for seven years, and Troy, N. H., for seven years.

Miss Henrietta Schmidt of Kennebunkport, Maine was elected teacher of the Social Sciences. Miss Schmidt is a graduate of Boston University with long experience in high and junior high work.

Miss Margaret F. Mathews of Cambridge, Mass., is teaching senior high English. She is a graduate of Columbia with a M. A. degree in 1933, and has taught in Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Jersey.

Mrs. Vera H. Rice, a former teacher in Conant returned as teacher of Junior High subjects and Junior Business Training.

The increased enrollment in the Grade School required the employment of a new teacher and Miss Jadwiga M. Sokul at Keene Teachers' College was secured as teacher of one division of the first grade.

Mrs. Abbie S. Brown took over grades 5 & 6, formerly taught by Miss Martha Ryder, who declined re-election to accept a position in Massachusetts.

Mrs. Louise Belletete who was part time teacher last year was appointed full time teacher of the fifth grade to succeed Miss Conway who resigned.

Mrs. Frances Forcier, a former teacher in the Jaffrey schools has taken over the part time teaching in the sixth grade.

Mrs. Mildred Whitcomb, for many years supervisor of Music, resigned at the opening of the school year to accept a position in Vermont, and Mrs. Amy Fitzgerald a former music supervisor in this town was elected to succeed her.

The total enrollment of the schools for the first twelve weeks of the present school year was 560. This is an increase of ten over the same period for last year and seven more than the enrollment for the entire school year 1943-1944.

The enrollment of the high school of 147 is within five of the enrollment for 1942-43 and is 21 larger than the enrollment for last year.

The war has taken several of the senior boys, as was the case last year and two years ago.

The classes in adult education have been continued under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Doucoumes of Keene. The interest shown these citizenship classes has been very good, and attendance has held up well throughout the year.

At the 1944 district school meeting it was unanimously voted that "the school board be authorized to expend up to \$2,500.00 of the funds derived from the Jules Durant Fund to provide educational and recreational facilities for the students of Conant High School which otherwise would not be available in a district of this size."



In carrying out the authorization of the meeting, the school board, headmaster and superintendent have given careful consideration to the more urgent needs of the school not covered in our ordinary budget.

The first expenditures were \$135.00 for a mat in the gymnasium, and the contribution of \$104.00 toward completing the names on the Service Plaque in Union Hall.

The opening of the instruction in instrumental music created a call for instruments that pupils wished to purchase on time. A fund of \$450.00 was placed in charge of Headmaster Faunce for this purpose.

As mentioned in the headmaster's report we are expending about \$400.00 in the purchase of reference books for the high school library. Other equipment needed for the science and home economics laboratory and the shop will be secured as the needs are determined and the equipment is available.

The scarcity of teachers which has existed for the past three years appears to be more serious than a year ago. To meet the situation it is necessary to ask for a considerable increase over the budget figures of last year.

While the item of salaries voted last March was \$32,983.00 it was necessary to issue contracts amounting to \$34,843.00 before all the positions were filled.

Jaffrey is fortunate in having a staff of trained and experienced teachers during this period of stress and anxiety. While many towns have had to get along with teachers who are poorly trained or ill fitted, our teacher changes have been few and the work of the grades and high school is showing satisfactory results.

I wish to express my appreciation of the capable manner in which Mr. Conrad took over the duties as acting headmaster last May. With the abrupt departure of the former headmaster Mr. Conrad took charge with less than two days notice and carried through successfully in a very difficult situation.

I feel that we all appreciate the quiet, yet effective way in which Mr. Faunce has taken over his duties and carried on his administrative work with success.

I take this opportunity to thank the school board, teachers, pupils, parents and all interested citizens for their loyal support during the past year.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The total number of pupils registered on September 1, 1944 in the high school was 147, of which 77 were boys and 70 were girls. In the Junior High School 80 pupils were registered, of which 45 were boys and 35 were girls. The enrollment was distributed by grades as follows:

The percent of attendance for the year 1943-44 was 93.5% while the state average was 93.4%. The number of tardinesses per pupil was 2.4 as compared to a figure of 1.6 for the state. The attendance and tardiness record for the present year continues to be poor—tending towards a lowering of the school's record and standing. Parents should endeavor to assume more responsibility in assuring the prompt and regular attendance of their children.

Such a loss of time on the part of our pupils should be considered a most serious educational as well as economic loss. We, the teachers, can urge pupils to be present and on time, but it is up to the parents to demand better attendance on the part of their children.

### Miscellaneous

Extra-curricula activities, such as athletics, class dramas and socials, the physical fitness program, and prize speaking contests are being carried on as usual. No further elaboration seems necessary here.

We were fortunate this year in securing the services of Mr. Eddie Hamilton, as an instructor in instrumental music. At present thirty pupils are taking advantage of the weekly lessons, offered at reasonable rates, as well as the time payment plan, through which many of the pupils are securing their instruments.

In an attempt to stimulate a greater interest and utilization of the school library, a faculty committee has submitted for immediate purchase a list comprising three to four hundred dollars worth of new reference works. These new books, which will be paid for from the Durant Fund, will immeasurably increase the teaching outcomes in the English, Social Science, Physical Science, and Foreign Language departments.

### Looking Ahead

I am convinced that the citizens of Jaffrey want a good high school. They want every child to have an equal chance with every other child in New Hampshire or in the Nation. A good school and a fair chance are inseparable. Your desire is that your children shall have sufficient training to meet future requirements satisfactorily.

What these requirements may be, for each individual child, is difficult for anyone to foresee, but we certainly should bend every effort to provide that type of secondary education which will best meet the needs, abilities, and interests of our present-day school population.

Our first duty, then, would seem to be to examine our present curriculum in the light of these requirements, keeping constantly in mind the type of pupil with which we are working. Do we have the right courses? What are our pupils like, and what should they be studying in order to have their deserved chance? A glance at the following table, which vividly illustrates the increased popularity of a high school education in Jaffrey, should shed some light on the make-up of our secondary student of today.

It should be quite evident from the foregoing that the average high school pupil today is not what he was twenty-five years ago. Today we are getting the poor student along with the good, whereas a quarter century ago only those attended high school whom we might now term as "the cream of the crop". Since 1920 our school has increased by 182.7%, while the town's population has gained but 25%. This is not a situation peculiar only to Jaffrey, as may be gathered from army statistics in which it is pointed out that during the last war only one soldier in thirty was a high school graduate, whereas today they are one in every four.

This influx into our schools means that we must either train our boys and girls adequately here and now for the life work which they will enter into upon their graduation, or properly fit them for post-secondary education in higher institutions of learning.

While I have every faith in higher education and will never cease in my efforts to guide and encourage those pupils towards college who can plainly profit by it and adequately accomplish it, I do feel that our primary concern should be with those children whose formal education will terminate with graduation from Conant. The following statistics on our graduates for the period 1936-1944, still further convinces me along these lines.

Not only does this record indicate that we are sending but very few to college—only eight in nine years, but it also indicates that we are sending but approximately one fourth as many as the average for all high schools in the state. It should not be assumed, however, that we do not have the courses, or do not meet the standards set by the colleges, to enable our pupils to pursue higher education. Our curriculum and instruction is most adequate for that purpose.

What then should we do for our boys and girls that we are not already doing for them? Many of our girls are taking advantage of the four year Home Economics Course and still others are pursuing the course in commercial work. We are proud to be able to offer these two fine curricula for them. But with more adequate facilities and less crowded conditions the accomplishments in these two fields could be greatly increased. For the boys, who are at the present time in the majority in the high school, we are offering but two years of woodworking in addition to their academic or college preparatory work with which to fit them for

life. To many of these boys the academic work is unsuited, if not too difficult for them. They show little interest in it and they achieve generally poor results. The two years of woodworking is hardly what might be called sufficient training for careers.

My recommendation would be that, as soon as possible, more diversified show work in Trades and Industry be included in our program for the boys, and better equipment and more adequate space be provided for the girls who are now taking Home Economics and Commercial subjects in order that these boys and girls may be better fitted to become finer citizens of Jaffrey, capable of earning a good living at a respectable trade upon their graduation. The addition of such courses and accommodations will cost money and may entail some additions to the present plant, but to my mind they are needed and needed badly.

In conclusion, I wish to express my gratitude to the Superintendent of Schools, the teachers and pupils of Conant High School, the school board, and the citizens of Jaffrey for their support and cooperation during my first few months as headmaster. Their combined aid has greatly facilitated my task, and with a continuance of the same we may be assured that Conant High School will persist in ranking as an outstanding institution.

## **ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER**

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
