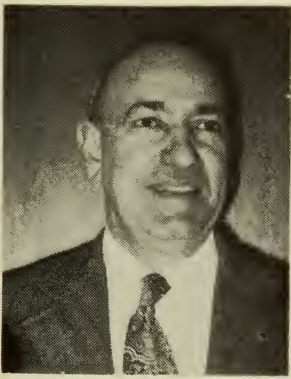


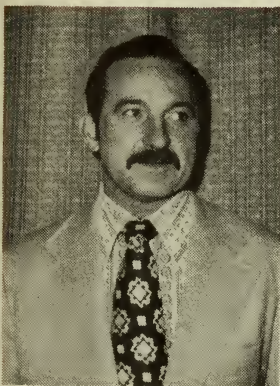

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING, March 6, 1973

Art. 1 — The Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 10A.M. by the Moderator, Richard L. Russman, for the balloting for Town Officers and for Officers of the Sanborn Regional School District, and for voting on two Special Questions on Zoning Amendments. It was voted that the meeting be adjourned after the close of the ballot counting until 7:30 P.M., March 7, 1973 at the Swasey Gymnasium.

The seal on the Ballots was broken by the Town Clerk. The Ballot Boxes and the Voting Booths were checked by the Moderator. The Ballot Clerks were: Mrs. Esther Greenwood, Mrs. Ellen Durling, Mrs. Irene White, Donald Day and Herbert Federhen III. J. Edward Stevens was the assistant Moderator. Harold H. Jillson was the Police Officer. Extra Ballot Counters at night were David Conant, Bernard Robie, Dwight Killam and Adele Russman.

SPECIAL QUESTIONS: 1. (Art. 17) Are you in favor of amending Article 2a of the Ordinance for the Protection and Direction for the use of land in the Town of Kingston, New Hampshire, adopted at the Annual Town Meeting held March 14, 1963, by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor the following: "ARTICLE 2a: Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of 200 (two hundred) feet and shall contain a minimum area of 80,000 (eighty thousand) square feet"? (as recommended by the Kingston Planning Board)

2. (Art. 18) Are you in favor of amending Article II C and Article VI, of the Ordinance for the Protection and Direction for the use of land in the Town of Kingston, New Hampshire, adopted at the Annual Town Meeting held March 14, 1963, as follows: (a) amend Article IIC by striking out Article IIC in its entirety and inserting in its place the following: "C. Every building lot shall have no more than one single family or one two-family dwelling thereon." (b) amend Article VI by striking out Article VI in its entirety and inserting in its place the following: "A. This ordinance does not affect in any way any dwellings, buildings, mobile homes or house trailers, now legally under construction in the Town of Kingston." "B. This ordinance does not affect any recorded lots that are legally existing, except that no more than one single family or one two-family dwelling may be built thereon."? (as recommended by the Kingston Planning Board)

March 7, 1973 – Swasey Gymnasium

Meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by the Moderator, Richard L. Russman who welcomed everyone to the 279th Annual Town Meeting. Prayer was offered by Rev. George Fisher, Pilgrim United Church of Christ. The Moderator introduced the Selectmen and the Town Clerk and congratulated the Selectmen for having no errors to be corrected in the Town Report.

The new voters were asked to stand, and those not registered to vote were reminded that they should not vote on any Article.

The Moderator announced two new appointments to the Planning Board – Stanley D. Penny and James E. Richard. He read the results of the balloting from the previous day.

The Moderator appointed the following to serve on the Finance Committee for a 3 year term: C. Steven Briggs, George Curtin, Bruce Sloan and Andrew Wight. He thanked those who had served their 3 year term. The Moderator explained that the Finance Committee consists of 12 members. They meet once or twice a year and their recommendations are meant as an aid to the voters. He recommended that the Selectmen get the budget out earlier in the future.

Art. 2 – A motion was made and seconded that the sum of \$282,562.00 be raised and appropriated to defray town charges for the ensuing year. An amendment was made that Article 5 be included in the budget and not as an article and can be acted upon in whole or in part. This amendment was declared null and void.

An amendment was made and passed to lay Article 2 on the table until we are finished with all other articles in the Town Warrant.

Art. 3. — It was voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow such sums of money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

Art. 4 — It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$606.00 and the State of N.H. will contribute \$4,039.90 for Class IV & V Highways under the provisions of the T.R.A.

Art. 5 — It was voted to take up Revenue Sharing article, item by item. Following items were voted: A. Fire truck \$28,000.00; B. Town Garage \$23,500.00, to be located on Peasley property on Main St. — Old Route 125. An amendment was made and passed that the excess amount of money over the contract price go towards heat, electricity, etc. for this building.

An amendment was made (but ruled out of order) that the funds from the sale of Property on Bartlett Street go toward the heat, electricity, etc. It was pointed out that in 1973, Selectmen have not been authorized to see tax deeded property.

C. Police Cruiser \$3,500.00; D. Grace Daley Property \$7,300.00 for heat, wiring and plumbing repairs; E. Library \$1,000.00 for repairs.

Total of \$63,300.00 to be appropriated and authorized the withdrawal of funds received and estimated Revenue from Revenue Sharing Funds for the year 1973 established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Art. 6. — This article relative to raising and appropriating \$2,500.00 for road work on Merrill Avenue, was defeated.

Art. 7. — It was voted to raise and appropriate \$750.00 to be used by the Kingston Conservation Committee.

Art. 8 — It was voted to lay this Article on the table. (relative to fees collected by the Kingston Planning Board).

Art. 9. — This article relative to sale of Peter Cornwell property to V.F.W. Post 1088 for \$1.00, was defeated. During the discussion, an amendment was made (but ruled out of order) that the land be turned over to the Conversation Commission.

Art. 10. — The original Article was entirely struck out and the following amendment was made and passed: that the Selectmen develop an organized and orderly approach to cope with roads that are not up to the specifications when the Ordinance was passed requiring the builders to have a Bond posted.

Art. 11 — Motion made and passed to "Pass over this article "relative to Travis Cove Road.

Art. 12 — It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of three for the purpose of planning for the celebration of the American Revolution Bicentennial which is beginning in 1974, and to raise and appropriate a sum of \$150.00 to be used by this committee for such expenses as may be incurred in the planning of aforementioned celebration.

Art. 13 — After much pro and con discussion, the following was voted as an amendment, by striking out the original article: Authorized the Selectmen to either trade or sell the Police Cruiser as they see fit. If it is traded, proceeds from trade shall be applied to acquisition cost of the new cruiser and if it is sold, the proceeds from sale, shall go into the General Fund of the Town.

Some other amendments included that the Article be tabled (not passed), and that the words "go into General Fund of the Town" be struck out and replaced by "go into maintenance costs of the new cruiser" — also Not passed.

Art. 14 — It was voted to raise and appropriate \$8,500.00 for

for the annual Salary of the Chief of Police to include two weeks paid vacation. There was much discussion on this Article and the following amendments were NOT passed: That all town employees get \$10,000.00 per year; That the Chief's pay be raised 5.5% in accord with the President's Wage and Price Control Board (vote on this amendment was Yes 103 and No 129)

(Counters were David Conant, Steven Briggs, Billy Gates and Andrew Wight.)

Art. 15 — It was voted to pass over this Article (relative to purchase of new Police Cruiser which was already granted under Revenue Sharing Article).

Art. 16. -- This Article was adopted as printed. Subject was Cemeteries. (Town Clerk requests that reference be made to this Article in last year's Warrant, as it was passed entirely as printed on pages 12 and 13 of the 1972 Town Report.)

Art. 17 & 18 -- Voted on ballot.

Art. 19 -- It was voted to allow the Selectmen to use the Grace Daley property for Town Offices, including storage and/or displays for the Town Museum (as amended).

Art. 20 -- It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Deeded Property at Public Auction.

Returned to **Art. 2** -- It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$291,962.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. (This new figure now included the added items of Articles 7, 12 and 14.)

Art 21 -- It was voted to accept the Auditors' Report and the Town Report as printed.

Art. 22 -- Michael Priore thanked Ralph Southwick for his six years of service to the Town as Selectman. Mr. Southwick did not run for re-election as he was elected Commissioner of Rockingham County on Nov. 8, 1972.

An announcement was made that there would be a Public Hearing Wednesday Night at 8 P.M. to discuss the School Bond Issue.

Also, the Supervisors of the Check List announced a session for re-registration on Saturday 12--2 P.M. and Friday 7--9 P.M.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:15 P.M. by vote of the people.

The Polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of KINGSTON in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the TOWN HALL in said KINGSTON on Tuesday the FIFTH day of MARCH next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectman and Town Treasurer to borrow such sums of money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.
4. To choose delegates to the Constitutional Convention from District 9.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$605.00 and the State will contribute \$4,032.43 for Class IV & V Highways under the provisions of T.R.A.
6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$10,000.00 to complete the Town Garage and authorize the withdrawal of this amount for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State & Local Assistance Act of 1972, to be added to the sum of \$23,500.00 already appropriated under the Revenue Sharing Fund passed in 1973.
7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$27,560.00 for a Town Tax Map and authorize the withdrawal of \$17,560.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State & Local Assistance Act of 1972, with the balance of \$10,000.00 to be raised by taxation.
8. To see if the Town will vote to set a maximum salary for the Road Agent of \$9,000.00 and a maximum salary for the Assistant Road Agent of \$8,000.00.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 to purchase a road sand spreader.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to purchase a tractor bucket loader.
11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to purchase a Rural Water Supply Hose-Pumper Truck. This truck will be used to replace the 1938 Diamond T truck which is being used as a water supply truck.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund towards the purchase of a Pumper Hose Truck for the Fire Department to replace the 1938 Diamond T Pumper Hose Truck.

13. On petition of Marilyn R. Lermond and 9 others on behalf of the Kingston Revolutionary Bi-Centennial Committee to see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$750.00 to be used by this committee for such expenses as may be incurred in the planning of the commemoration of the American Revolution.

14. On petition of Ernestine B. Meyer and 9 others to see if the Town will approve the use of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$27,560.00 to defray Kingston's portion of any capital expenditures incurred by any school building program.

15. On petition of William F.S. Deguio, Jr. and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the salary of the Chief of Police to include no less than two weeks paid vacation, which is a 5.9% increase over last year's salary.

16. On petition of William F.S. Deguio, Jr. and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for Hospitalization Insurance for the three full-time employees.

17. On petition of William F.S. Deguio, Jr. and 9 others, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate an amount of money sufficient to pay retirement costs to the New Hampshire Municiple Employees Retirement System for Full Time Elected Officials of the Town of Kingston. (Approximately 7% of the salaries of these officials, the balance to be paid by said official.) This sum to be paid by the Town of Kingston every year on a continuing basis to age of retirement for said office.

18. On petition of William F.S. Deguio, Jr. and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Neil R. Parker and Roger Nason, Sr., both elected officials of the Town of Kingston for the purposes of Social Security.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector annually. (a) The Town Building Inspector shall base his approval or rejection of a Building Permit on the provisions of the Town Ordinances and Regulations. (b) The Building Inspector shall make known his decision within ten days from the date he received the application. (c) The Building Inspector shall issue and a majority of the Board of Selectmen shall sign the building permit. (d) The Town Building Inspector shall retain each application fee which shall constitute full compensation for his services. (e) The fees for building permits shall be according to the following schedule:

\$.00 to \$500.00	\$ 2.00
\$ 501.00 to \$2,500.00	\$ 5.00
\$ 2,501.00 to \$10,000.00	\$15.00
\$10,001.00 or over	\$25.00

20. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen authority to sell Town land at Great Pond Park to abutting owners at a price commensurate with type and location of land. Purchasers of such lots to use same to increase lot size of abutting lots and so record these lots as not being separate lots.

21. On petition of James E. Richard and 11 other registered voters of Kingston, a request that the Town of Kingston accept Bartlett Beach Drive and Webster Landing Road as paved roads which have been inspected and are regarded as acceptable by the Selectmen and the Town Engineer.

22. On petition of Eileen M. Nash and 12 others to see if the Town will accept KENLIN LANE, OAK VIEW ROAD and SHENDOAR DRIVE as town roads.

23. To see if the Town will vote to put its antique horse-drawn Hearse in the custody of the Kingston Museum for preservation and display.

24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of a Town Dog Ordinance, as follows:

"This Ordinance is established and governed by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, R.S.A. Chapter 466.

1. All dogs within the Town of Kingston must be leashed or restrained at all times.

2. Failure to leash or restrain dogs will result in a fine, in the amount of \$5.00 for the first violation and \$10.00 for each subsequent violation, assessed against the owner of said dog. All persons refusing or failing to pay said fine shall be summoned before the Plaistow District Court.

3. Any dog found not to be leashed or restrained shall be seized and held by the Police Department in humane and adequate facilities for a period of ten (10) days at the cost of \$2.00 per day. Dogs shall be held by the Police Department for a minimum period of ten (10) days, said time period commencing with seizure; or, if the dog is carrying a license tag, upon notification of the registered owner. Thereafter, said dog may be destroyed.

4. If a dog is licensed and a registration tag is affixed to its collar, the Police Department shall make reasonable efforts to contact the registered owners.

5. All dogs must be licensed once a year, according to R.S.A. Chapter 466, with the Town Clerk. (Due May 1st, penalty after June 1st)"

25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of a Town Dump Ordinance, as follows:

(This ordinance is established and governed by the laws of the State of New Hampshire R.S.A. Chapter 147.

1. The Town Dump shall be used for the purpose of dumping garbage and refuse as defined in R.S.A. 147:23-29 only, and for no other purposes.

2. Every vehicle entering the Town Dump must have a Town Dump Permit Sticker on the vent window of the passenger side of the vehicle, effective April 1, 1974.

3. No person shall frequent the Town Dump for purposes of salvaging items therefrom without specific authorization from the Selectmen in each instance.

4. The use of firearms for any purpose at the Town Dump is prohibited.

5. Any violation of this Ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

6. Any portion of this Ordinance declared to be illegal or unenforceable shall not affect the legality or enforceability of the remaining provisions."

26. To see if the Town will vote to approve an industrial development known as Liquids Reclamation, Inc., an oil reclamation plant which is to be located on property of the Weatherbee Realty Trust off Pete Green Road pursuant to the provisions of Article III, Section D of the Kingston Zoning Ordinance of 1972.

27. On petition of Andrew S. Wight and 9 others, to see if the town will vote to amend Article No. 12 which was passed at the annual Town Meeting in 1956 by inserting the word "only" after the word "Department" so that it will read: To see if the Town will vote to accept land at the Great Pond dam site from the State of New Hampshire, this land to be used as a right of way to Great Pond by the Fire Department only, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. to build the same. This land was acquired in 1956 and also the appropriation was made at that time.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Deeded Property at Public Auction.

29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Auditors' Report and the Town Report as printed.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND CEMETERIES

The New Hampshire State laws require that all cemeteries be fenced. During the last few years we have fenced 60% of Greenwood Cemetery, all of Pine Grove and Mill Stream Cemeteries and a small part of Kingston Plains Cemetery. Happy Hollow Cemetery is enclosed with a field stone wall. This coming year we are requesting that the Town will vote us \$1,000.00 to devote to this work.

We sold 9-10'x10' cemetery plots and 5-10'x20' plots. Perpetual care has been placed on several old plots.

Due to the fact that there is more demand for the 10'x10' plots than the 10'x20' plots we will have to prepare space for more of the 10'x10' plots in both Greenwood and Pine Grove Cemeteries. There are ample 10'x20' plots available.

Due to the alertness of a neighbor, we were tipped off, that somebody was cutting trees in the back of Greenwood Cemetery. Upon investigation and with the help of the Police Department and the Selectmen we received \$407.05 in payment for what they removed.

The rear and east of Greenwood Cemetery are heavily wooded. We deem it advisable at this time to remove a lot of the larger trees so that the young trees will have a better chance to grow.

In September we transferred all of our 6% bank certificates of deposits (except the Mill Stream Cemetery Account) to 4-year, 8% certificates. This will increase our interest income about \$1,000.00 per year.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Recreation Commission is completing its third year in Kingston. Frank Gagnon and Arthur Pool's terms expired; Dwight Killam and James Latford were appointed to fill the vacancies. We have experienced a busy year composed of both success and failure.

On the positive side, the exercise program was successful last spring. Tennis lessons were sponsored by the commission and several women and 8 to 13 year olds took advantage of the opportunity. A group of women enjoyed a "Run Away From Home" day and matinee performance of "Godspell". Several women also participated in softball during the spring and summer.

It is a disappointment that the Senior Citizen group which we had brought together has discontinued meeting. It was discouraging that the high school group cancelled a concert we had helped them plan. Interest was not sufficient to produce two one act plays in spite of people willing to direct. The fall exercise program was discontinued due to poor attendance.

Our prime effort was the summer playground program. Attendance was slightly higher than last year but fluctuated a great deal. The program was directed by John Paolino and Meredythe Impey, assisted by Jeff Robie and Dawn Emerson and many volunteers. There is a need to hire an experienced person to be in charge of the young children not interested in organized sports.

The Red Cross Swim Program was successfully directed by Lynn Bartlett. Kingston children participating numbered 108. It would be desirable to combine the swim program if it were possible. The Commission is grateful for the use of school and state park facilities and equipment.

Two Halloween parties were sponsored by the Commission with approximately 600 children attending. The Veterans Club, V.F.W. and V.F.W. Auxiliary, P.T.A. and Police Department helped make these successful.

Interest in a skating rink and hockey league has continued. The Commission voted to provide lumber and plastic for a rink. William Deguio has been in charge of the labor for this project. The hockey league has been organized by William Dee. Hopefully the weather will cooperate and make this project successful.

KINGSTON PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT — 1973

This report covers the work of the Planning Board as it was constituted prior to Town Meeting and the Board as reorganized after Town Meeting.

In January and February, hearings were held on proposals to increase lot sizes in Kingston to 80,000 square feet and to restrict building to one- and two-family dwellings in the Town. Both proposals were passed by ballot vote in the March elections.

Mrs. Doris Smith left the Board following the completion of her term in March. The Board reorganized as follows in March, 1973:

The Board again suffered a high turnover of members. During the year, Alice Meehan resigned and was replaced by J. Kenneth Fowler. James Jackson replaced Bruce Sloan and Eileen Nash took Linda Roberts' place on the Board as Secretary.

Due to the heavy work load of the Board, regular meetings were switched from Tuesdays to the first and third Thursdays of each month. Second and fourth weeks were used as workshops to establish zoning change proposals.

Joint meetings were held during the year with the Board of Adjustment and Selectmen to discuss appeals procedures; with the Conservation Commission to discuss zoning and subdivision regulations; with the Regional Planner, Jon Gilmore, for information the Region and State would provide on zoning and subdivision. In addition, Town Counsel, David Engel, spent time with the Board discussing our current ordinances and proposed changes. Cy Weeks, of the University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension Service gave a presentation to the Board on the advantages and disadvantages of mobile homes and mobile home parks.

A total of 46 meetings were held in 1973. During the year 18 subdivisions were approved and 1 denied.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE KINGSTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1973 your Fire Department has responded to a total of 259 Emergency Calls:

- 101 Ambulance Calls in town
- 87 Ambulance Calls out of Town
- 61 Fire Calls in Town
 - 5 Mutual Aid Calls to Neighboring Towns
 - 3 False Alarms
 - 2 Bomb Scares

During the year the Firemen's Association contributed \$3,000.00 to the Town. This money was earmarked for F.M. Mobile radios to be installed in trucks.

During the year, 13 firemen attended "State Fire School" training at Lily Pond and Meadowood. We also ran a local state training school in cooperation with the towns of East Kingston, Newton and South Hampton. The main subjects of this school were ladders and breathing equipment.

We continue to run our regular Monday evening training and familiarizing sessions. At the writing of this report, we have 71 active firemen.

Looking ahead to the 1974 Town Meeting, the Fire Wards and the firemen have an article in the Town Warrant requesting the amount of \$25,000.00 to purchase a Pumper-Hose Truck. Due to the fact we have no town water system with hydrants, this truck will serve as a rural water supply system.

At the present, we are using the 1938 Diamond T Pumper for this purpose. During the late 1950's, we converted this truck to be a rural water supply pumper by installing a 500 G.P.M. (Gallons Per Minute) front pump, removing the water tank, and renovating the whole body behind cab to carry a large supply of hose.

At the present time, this truck carries 1500 ft. of 4" Hose and 2000 ft. of 3" Hose. It also carries the necessary fittings to use this hose properly.

Due to the 36 year old age of this 1938 Diamond T Chassis, we are becoming very skeptical of its continuing to be reliable. Reliability of fire equipment is rather important.

The Association purchased the pump for this new unit several years ago for the price of \$2,000.00. It is presently

installed on the muster truck. If the Town votes "Yes" for this vehicle, the 1000 G.P.M. on the muster truck will be installed on the 1953 GMC Muster Truck. This vehicle will be able to carry 4500 ft. of 4" Hose on 2 large Powered Hose Reels.

This amount of 4" Hose would enable us to reach a water supply from any property in town. We are unable to do this with the amount of hose we now carry.

If the voters of Kingston approve this purchase, it will be from 1½ years to 2 years before this truck could be constructed and delivered to us. This would make the 1938 Diamond T close to 38 years old.

I certainly hope we will be able to purchase this truck so that we can continue to upgrade our Fire Department.

During the past year, the volunteer firemen have discussed whether to ask the Town for hourly pay or whether to stay unpaid volunteers. The final decision was that the men would much rather have good equipment to work with than to be paid.

I wish to again thank all the dedicated firemen and ambulance personnel for their many hours of service to our Town. I also wish to thank all others for donations of time and money to our common cause.

KINGSTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

In 1973 the Conservation Commission attended various meetings with other Commissions and regional and state agencies to gain information to benefit our town.

We wish to thank you for your fine response to the questionnaire circulated during March which was very successful in gaining the interests and ideas of the residents. We have analyzed and categorized your answers and comments for future use.

The Commission met with the Planning Board during the year to discuss problems throughout the town. More joint meetings are planned for 1974.

We highly recommend that all departments work together towards adoption of a master plan outlining future goals of our town. Now is the time to protect our natural resource—water—before it is overcome by its No.1 enemy: pollution.

The Commission received the Ford Foundation grant and has been working on locating all town-owned land and preparing an inventory of its natural resources. Many thanks to Cindy Nadeau for spending many an hour at the Registry of Deeds. Upon final completion of this project, recommendations will be made to the Selectmen so that full use of the lands' potential can be attained. Our efforts in deed research will benefit preparation of the tax map.

In the fall the Commission sponsored a slide program "African Safari" with Dr. Charles Bailey of Hampton Falls, N.H. Dr. Bailey showed slides of wildlife and conservation projects in Africa.

John Bakie constructed and placed into use a number of duck nests on Pow Wow River with the co-operation of the State Conservation Department.

Cindy Nadeau resigned in October due to the increasing number of meetings being held by the Regional Planning Board. Sorry to lose you Cindy.

We answered and investigated several complaints during the year, making recommendations for solution to the parties involved or notified the proper state or local authorities.

This past year the Webster family turned over a number of acres of land around Cedar Swamp Pond, just off Route

125, to the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests to be known as the Gideon Clark Webster and Isaac William Chase Webster Wildlife and Natural Area. The Webster heirs have expressed a desire to see such activities as horseback riding, hiking, cycling and possibly snowmobiling in this area. The Conservation Commission would also like to see other areas in town set aside for this same purpose for the wildlife and natural beauty and recreational pleasure of the town's people.

VISITING NURSE REPORT

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association is a Community Health Service providing skilled nursing care on an intermittent basis and physical therapy to patients in their home. Service is provided by registered professional nurses and a registered physical therapist experienced in public health. Care is provided through orders from each patient's physician.

The nurse gives treatments such as changing surgical dressings, hypodermic injections, etc. She assists with the rehabilitation of persons (of all ages) handicapped by arthritis, heart trouble, diabetes, cancer, stroke, mental illness, accidents, and similar conditions. The nurse instructs designated persons to give needed care between nursing visits, and teaches families and individuals good nutrition and understanding of special diets; she advises new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies; provides tuberculosis and psychiatric follow-up and refers, when appropriate, to other agencies. The physical therapist evaluates, establishes, and /or carries out a program to return the patient to his maximum abilities.

The Association provides the services of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital, who assists in planning for the necessary care required for the patient to return to his home.

A Well Child clinic, sponsored by the Association and the Division of Public Health, is held monthly, and provides physicals, immunizations, and well child care to eligible children.

A total of 586 nursing and therapy visits were made to nursing and therapy visits were made to 100 individuals in Kingston. A total of 14 families with 23 children were served at the Well-Child Clinic, Exeter, N.H.
